LONE STAR CHAPTER CYSTIC FIBROSIS CHAIRMAN ANNOUNCED

Mrs. Lupe Pena was today named Chairman of a Bike-A-Thon in Brackettville by Reuben Duke President of the Lone Star Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

She will be conducting the Bike-A-Thon to raise funds which will support research and care for children affected by cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis and other related lung-damaging disease.

Cystic Fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited by one in every 1500 babies born in the U.S. Both parents carry recessive gene for CF and number among one in twenty persons in the U.S. who may be carriers, usually without knowing it. With improved therapy and constant research, many CF patients are now living into early adulthood.

"Most people do not realize there are millions of children affected by lung-damaging disease and by participating in our Bike-A-Thon, you can help these children who can't take breathing for granted," said Mr. Duke.

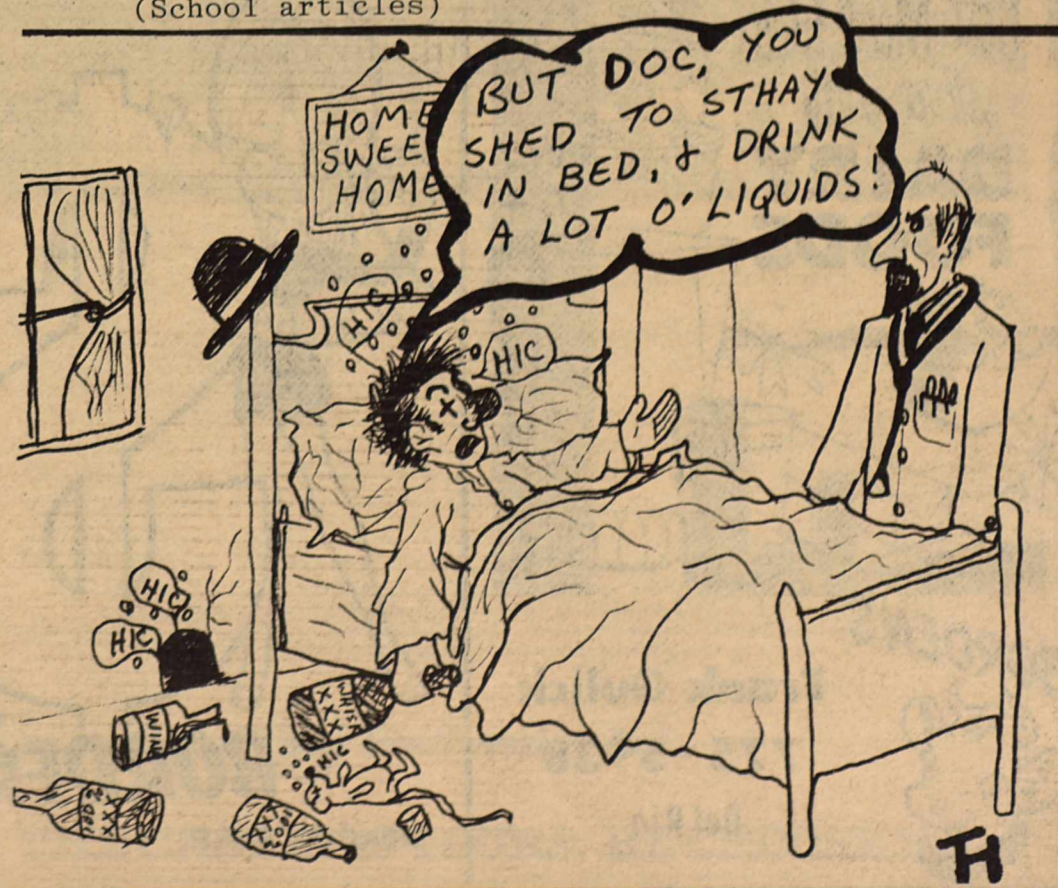
G.E.D CLASSES REGRISTRATION

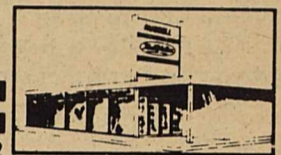

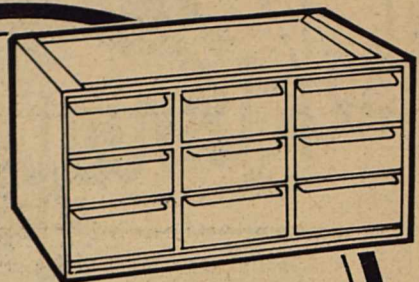

AERIAL SPRAY AT THE PROPER TIME

Some very erratic results have been experienced from aerial spraying mesquite. The percent of kills have varied greatly from year to year and from pasture to pasture.

All the factors that affect kill are not known. Some are and should be considered when planning to spray.

Do not spray earlier than 40 days or later than 90 days after the first leaves appear in the spring. If the spring is unusually early, spray about 10 days after the leaves begin turning from light to dark green. Moisture should be sufficient to promote normal growth at least 30 days prior to spraying.

You can expect less effective treatment by spraying too early in the spring, or when growing conditions have been poor, or too soon following drought breaking rains. Under these condition spraying should be delayed until most of the leave have fully developed.

Spraying should not be done when the wind velocity is in excess of 10 miles an hour or when the temperature is above 90 degrees.

In more recent years it has been found that soil temperature plays an important role. The soil temperature should be 75 degrees or more at the 12 to 14 inch depth. Three fourths or more of the area treated should have tempertures of 75 degrees or above.

The moisture previously used by the trees is available for grass growth after spraying. Resting the pasture during the growing season immediately following the treatment helps the grass to take advantage of this additional moisture.

The effects of spraying usually last 4 or 5 years. A repeat application at that time is usually needed. Two properly applied sprayings usually result in a high percent kill.

Walter and Darnette Goodloe were chosen as Campus Clowns for the second year in a row. Walter is a junior and his sister, Darnette, is a senior.

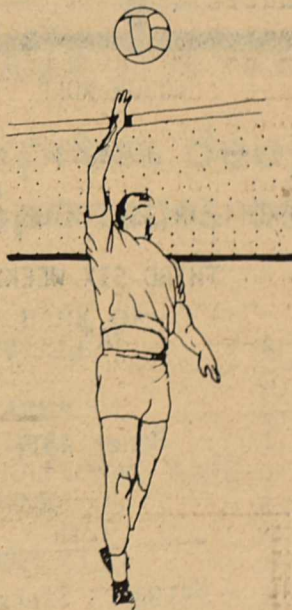

Dilley Wolves visits the Tigers!

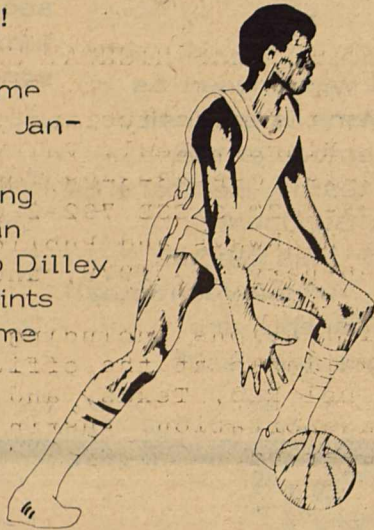

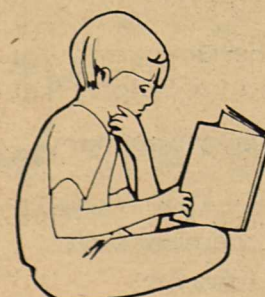

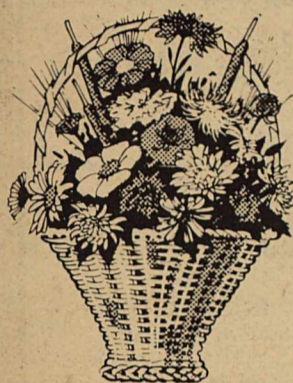
