#### DISTRICT 4-H CONTESTS SCHEDULED IN UVALDE

UVALDE---More than 400 Southwest Texas 4-H members are in the final stages of preparing for district contest competition here Saturday (April 28).

Results from this contest, which will be held on the campus of Southwest Texas Junior College, will determine who goes on to the State 4-H Roundup this summer at College Station.

Most of these youngsters are survivors of county competitions involving hundreds from the 19 counties embraced by Texas Agricultural Extension Service District 13.

Winners and runnersup from each of the 30 senior events will go to Texas A&M University June 7-8 to compete against the top finishers from the other 13 Extension Service Districts from state honors.

Competition also will be held Saturday at Southwest Texas Junior College in the junior events, with the top three teams

in each qualifying for honor ribbons.

Juniors, however, will not earn a trip to state roundup, which is restricted to seniors.

Competition will begin at 9:30 a.m. after a general assembly which begins at 9 a.m. at LaForge Hall.

Members of the District 4-H Council, adult leaders, subject matter specialists from the Uvalde Research and Extension Center and County Extension agents from throughout District 13 will assist in the big youth event.

The Governor signed a memorandum urging Texas communities to pay special tribute to senior citizens during the month of May.

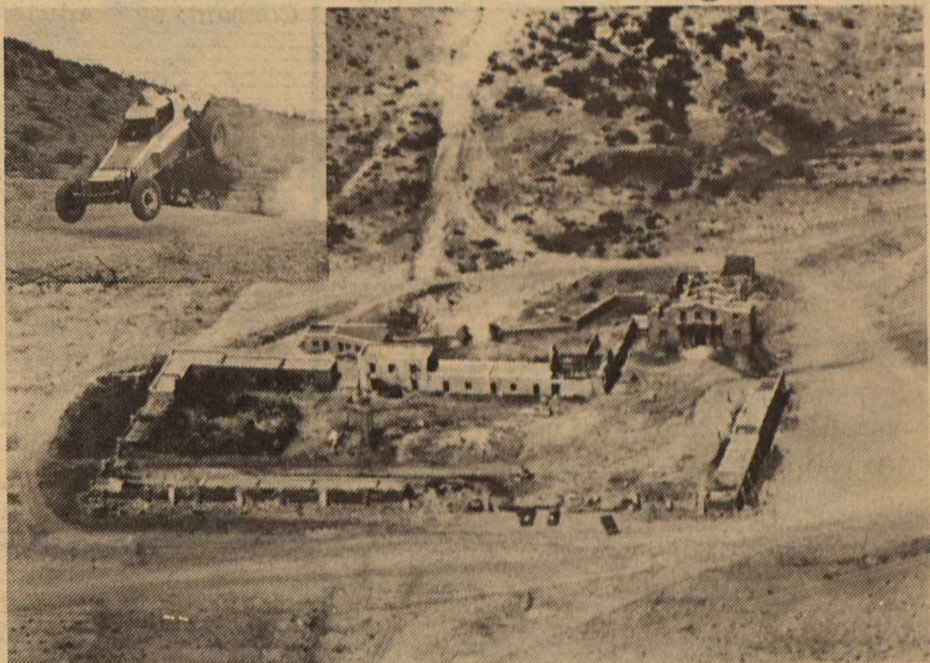

### What's Happening Around Alamo Village?

Twice a year that dormant "circle" becomes a treacherous Off Road Race track. High-powered vehicles speed around the 32-mile track of rough terrain at chilling speeds, for the public to witness.

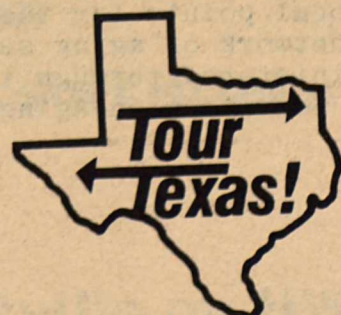
On May 5, starting at 10 a.m., racers from all over the state will compete for the prize winnings in the Alamo West 250 Off Road Race. Drivers in the race risk everything, including their lives. Anything can happen to cars entered in the "Alamo West 250." It is not unusual for motors to burn out, wheels to run off, and the cars to turn over.

Communications covering the entire 32-mile course, including 11 check points, will be supplied by the Radio Amateur Emergency Service Corps and volunteer members of the San Antonio Repeater Organization. In the event of an emergency, in-

stantaneous communications will be available from anywhere on the tracks, back to the control point. This volunteer award-winning group was the only communication link during the devastating August '78 Texas Hill Country Floods when all telephone communications were lost.

Spectators will be able to see the most exciting features of the race from a high vantage point near the Alamo set, where the race will begin. It will be an exciting day for spectators who will enjoy not only the races, but tour the movie site and the Village Cantina will be open serving food and soft drinks.

Alamo Village is seven miles north of Brackettville, TX, on FM 674. Aging and nutrition projects for
the elderly throughout the
state.

Certificates signed by Gov.
Clements will be awarded to
seniors who have provided out-
standing services to their com-
munities.

These awards will be present-
ed at luncheons, picnics, and
other activities scheduled by
regional and local agencies pro-
viding services for the elderly.

The calendar of special
events for older texans month al-
so includes arts and crafts ex-
hibits, talent shows, dances,
domino tournaments, senior olym-
pics and free health screenings.

The screenings will focus
on common infirmities of the
aging, such as glaucoma, diabets
hypertension and hearing impair-
ments. They will be conducted
at local helath fairs, organized
in cooperation with health offi-
cials and medical professionals.

Sponsoring Area Agencies on
Aging and nutrition projects
serve as focal points for the
statewide network of aging ser-
vices, administered through the
Governor's Committee on Aging.

During the month of May,
Kinney County will clebrate
Older Texans Month by having
open house to display arts and
crafts and having a few tourn-
aments and of course the dinner
on the 16th of May, with guests
from surrounding counties. We
will also be visiting other
counties in the area. So we urge
all you good people out there
to do something special for an
elderly person in your family
during the month of May, It'll
make you feel good.

SEARGEANT APPOINTED

Kinney County businessman-rancher
Tommy Seargeant has been appoint-
ed to a select regional advisory
council to the Texas Department
of Human Resources (TDHR). Sear-
geant joins fourteen other pro-
minent South Texans on TDHR's
Community Advisory Council.

The group includes
city, county, and state-elected
officials, education, business,
professional and community leader
form the twenty-one county area
comprising TDHR Region 09.

"The Community Advisory
Council is a creative and unique
approach to public accountability
for this region," said TDHR Re-
gional Administrator E.R.Crum,
"This agency is committed to
citizen involvement and is resol-
ved to account to the public for
expenditure of tax dollars."

The advisory council is
expected to provide direction and
recommendations as to the impact
of TDHR services on the local
communities. Administrator Crum
continued "TDHR's social and
economic impact on the community
is immense. With about \$250 mil-
lion expenditures in this region
alone, it is important for the
public to be aware of this impact
and how the funds are returned
to the area economy. We anti-
cipate that the council will faci-
litate such communication between
the department and the community,

as well as enhancing community
perspectives of departmental pro-
grams and finally serve as an
advocate in support of depart-
mental programs." After a period
of frequent meetings to estab-
lish council concerns, by-laws
and officers, the group will
regularly convene every two
months. Additional committee
meetings will be held as needed.

**GREEN THUMBS**

This is the year of the roses. It is difficult to imagine that roses could be any more beautiful than they have been this year. The cold of winter was just enough and the rains and moisture have been just right. There are several things to keep in mind. When the rose bloom fades it is good to cut off the old bloom. The rose will bloom longer this way. Also be very careful to check you roses. If you see any of the leaves begin to look gray and perhaps curl some you should immediately treat the rose. It has a fungus. You can use an expensive fungicide or you can do just as good a job by simple dusting the rose with powdered sulfur. It is much cheaper and easily obtainable from any garden supply house. Go by the directions on the can and your roses will soon be healthy again. This will take care not only of powdery mildew but also several other fungi. If your rose leaves are developing black spots and turning yellow it is likely that this too is caused by fungus. Treat it the same way. Just a little care in time will provide you with many beautiful roses for a good while to come.
