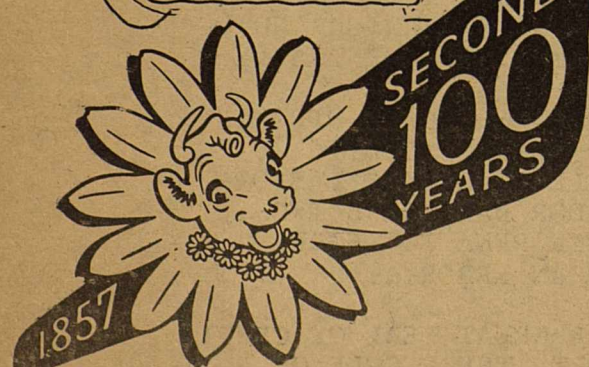

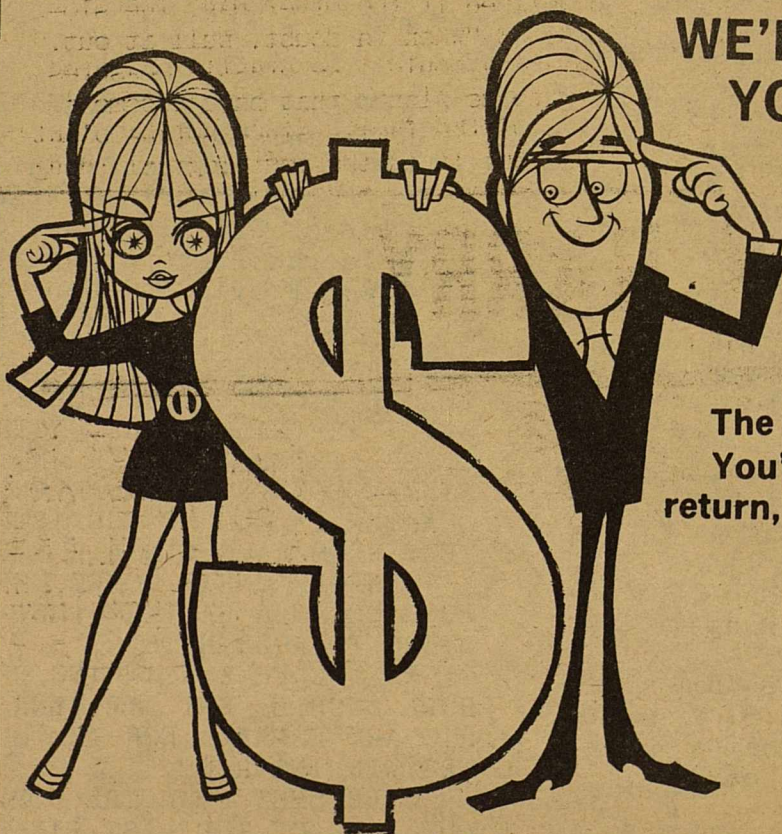

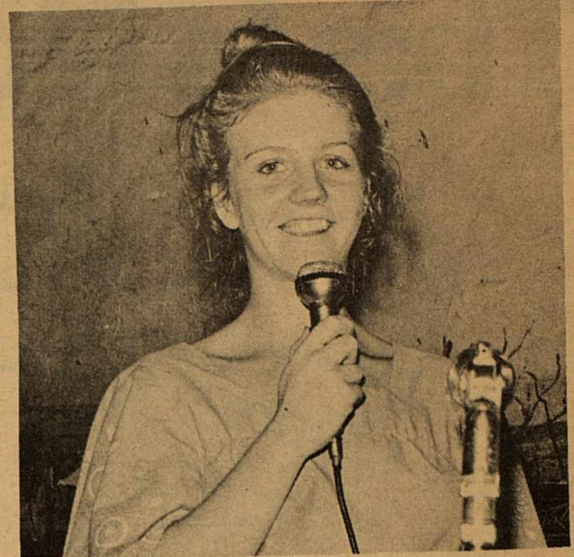

**Growing Fall Vegetables & Annuals
in South Central Texas**

A culprit called "summer heat" has no doubt worked its evil magic on your Spring garden by now, and a quick inspection of the site will reveal rows of yellowing and dying plants.

This yellowing and dying is a perfectly natural result of the general weather and insect conditions your garden site is exposed to during these summer days.

That yellowing and dying can be caused by heat, spider mites or nematodes. All these villains are particularly busy in the garden during hot months.

Of course, you may be one of those fortunate few who have escaped the insect plague, but don't you feel too happy—you still have problems. Look at your tomatoes and beans. Have you noticed how large your plants are getting, and yet they are producing fewer

and fewer large fruits?

Have you noticed your bitter cucumbers and the unusual shapes? Why are your tomato blooms falling off? They had just started setting! All of these problems are caused by the culprit "summer heat."

Tomatoes will not set fruit during cloudy, cool conditions, nor will they hold their blooms when daily temperatures average over 80 (71 degrees night-90 day). Many other vegetables, such as cucumbers and corn will not receive proper pollination during hot weather which results in a malformed product. Hot weather also causes slowed vegetative growth resulting in poor quality produce such as better cucumbers!

Well, what should one do when confronted with these disasters? The solution is simple—a bumper sticker described it the other day. The slogan was "When in doubt, pull it out." This may sound like drastic measures for those plants that have become a part of the family since spring planting, but it is the most logical thing

to do.

Let's examine the condition of existing flowers and vegetables. If you have nematodes, your only choice is to remove all vegetation and treat them with Vapam. This must be done now so that a fall garden can be planted in early August. If you have a heavy infestation of spider mites, there is no way you can get sufficient spray coverage with Kelthane or any other chemical on a tomato plant that is eight feet high and four feet wide—proper penetration and coverage on the bottom of leaves is impossible. The best way to rid yourself of a bad mite problem is probably to pull the plant out and destroy it. Be sure to bag and get rid of it since the plant contains adult mites and eggs which can cause problems in the fall garden.

The fertilizer that you applied last spring has been used by the plant or washed away from the soil. The best technique for fertilization of a fall garden is to broadcast or spread 20 pounds of a balanced fertilizer per 1,000 square feet and work it into the soil. This tillage also will aerate the soil and encourage fall vegetable root growth.

We have told you to remove most of your garden and prepare for a fall garden. You might consider leaving your okra, cherry tomatoes and peppers if they are in good shape but replant everything else for maximum production.

This area of Texas is called the Texas Winter Garden Area. Why? because more kinds of high quality vegetables and flowers can be grown with more success during the fall season than in the spring.

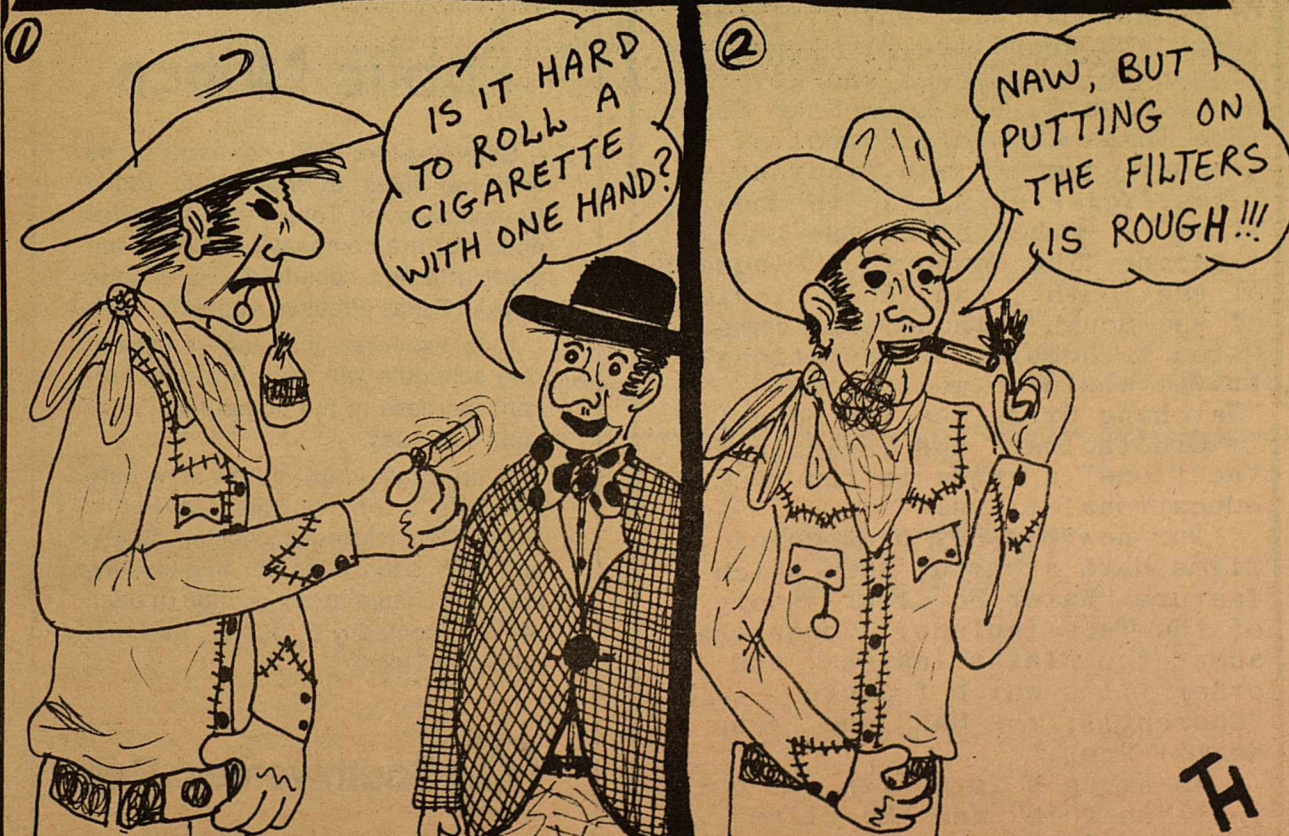
The reason is simple. In the spring, we plant in a cold soil and cool weather which is not advantages for seed germination and plant growth. Then the hot weather hits. In the fall we plant in a warm soil and set fruit in the cooler days of autumn. A new fresh plant also will perform better.

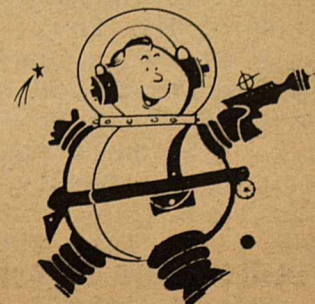

MEDICAID DENTURE PROGRAM EXPIRING

Medicaid recipients with dentures being prepared should contact their dentist as soon as possible according to the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Medicaid recipients who applied for dentures prior to November 27 1978, and haven't yet received them have a short time period to receive them before the program expires. Some Medicaid denture recipients have until July 31 to receive their denture plates, others must receive them prior to August 31, 1979.

Dentists certified to provide the dental plates have been notified to contact their patients if the service has been initiated but not completed.

After the cutoff dates the Medicaid program can no longer pay for the dental work. A high demand for dentures and preparatory work caused an early expenditure of funds allotted for the program. Funds committed prior to November 27, but not paid before the cutoff date will be returned to the state treasury as lapsed funds. State law requires the action and established the cutoff dates.

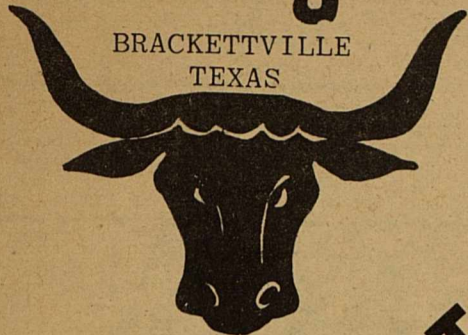

PROPERLY USING GRASSES

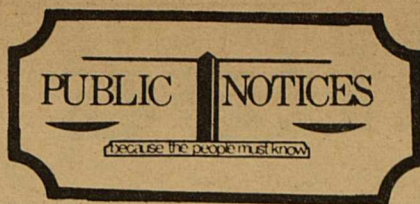

One of the goals of Conservation Districts and the Soil Conservation Service is proper grazing use of all rangeland. Proper grazing use is defined as taking half and leaving half or grazing no more than 50% of the current year's growth of the key foliage plant.

To understand the theory of proper grazing use one has to first understand the food factory within a grass plant. Ninety-five percent of the plant food for grass growth is taken from the air into the leaf in the form of carbon dioxide. In the presence of sunlight the leaves combine carbon dioxide from the air; and water, nitrates, and minerals from the soil to make plant food. Five percent of the plant food is taken from the soil. Roots gather raw material such as water, nitrates and minerals which are converted into plant food by the leaves. Roots also serve as store houses for plant food.

It can easily be seen that due to the presence of more leaves on a properly grazed grass plant there are also more roots below the surface. This results in more production per acre, more reserve plant food, increased plant vigor and more seed production.

Thirty percent of the roots are replaced each year on properly grazed plants. When more than 50% of a key forage grass in a pasture is grazed the ability to replace foliage at the beginning of the next growing season is diminished. New growth must be supplemented from the root system. When root reserves are needed to supplement growth, more than 30% of the roots killed each year.



NOTICE OF HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS FOR 1979

The Brackettville ISD hereby announces that all persons are entitled to receive an exemption of \$5,000 from the market value of their residence homestead for the purpose of school taxes. In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

To qualify for these exemptions, an application must be filed with the school district tax office by July 19, 1979. Application forms are available at the school tax office located on Ann Street.

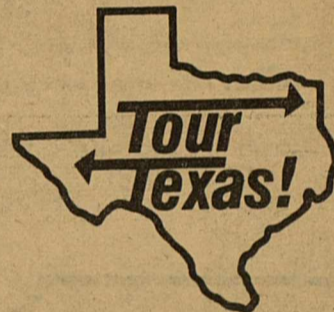
Overgrazing rangeland and key forage plants year after year will weaken and eventually kill preferred grasses. When key grasses are weakened and killed undesirable grasses and vegetation fill the void making once productive rangeland less productive.

By implementing grazing system and deferred grazing, proper use on rangeland can be accomplished. When half of the key grass in a pasture is removed stock should be moved to another pasture. By rotating stock and resting pastures based on proper use, range land management can be carried out.

The half that is left provides protection to the soil from wind and water erosion. It serves to control the soil

temperature in both summer and winter, prevents crusting of soil so that water penetrates more readily and the decaying roots provide channels for water to enter more rapidly. The half that is left also provides food for the microscopic organisms, earthworms, molds, and bacteria that are present in the soil to keep it alive and productive.

- Keep the outside sections of central air conditioning free of obstructions; the unit must have free circulation of air for good performance.

- Use draperies, blinds, shades or awnings to keep direct sunlight out of the house; plant trees and shrubs to provide additional shade.

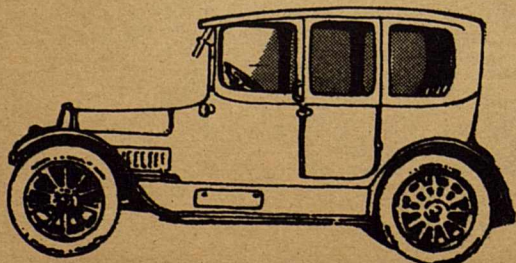
