

Federal Budget Could Entail Farmers' Disaster Insurance

A "catastrophic" crop insurance may become part of a plan to wean Congress from handing out so many disaster payments, according to the Agricultural Department.

It could cause real problems, because dollars spent to aid farmers would have to be considered part of the federal budget, even though it would help the government.

Because disasters can't be predicted, they are not currently considered as part of the

The system in which farmers can't get help with when floods, hail, drought and other perils wipe out their crops, will be reformed if the proposal is passed. It will be a part of the budget proposal for the Agriculture Department.

At the annual meeting of the American Agriculture Movement in Lubbock last week, Agriculture Secretary Mike Epsy said that the proposal is being reviewed by the Office of Management and Budget. He said the reform proposal

would provide a larger subsidy to allow premiums to decline.

The current crop insurance that the government has is poorly used, partly because of high premiums. In fact, less than 40% of the eligible acres are covered, and the govern-

ment has been paying out \$1.40 for every dollar in premiums, the General Accounting Office has said.

Farmers also know that Congress readily approves disaster aid each year. Even farmers

Better Business Bureau Report

The cost of credit card fraud is \$3 billion per year and growing. Everyone pays for credit card fraud in higher finance charges and annual membership fees. Stealing a credit card is only one type of credit card fraud; there are others. For example, there are thieves who pick discarded receipts or carbons out of trash cans to get the card numbers, and there are dishonest clerks who make extra imprints of cards for personal use or to sell, And, you might receive calls or letters announcing that you have won or been selected for a free or unbelievably lowpriced travel package. The catch is that your credit card number is required for identification purposes only. You can protect yourself by signing new cards immediately when you receive them; carry your cards separately from your wallet, destroy all carbons on receipts, save all receipts for purchases made and notify the card company in advance of a change of address.

The Texas Lemon Law is designed to help the owners or

who have had repeated problems with their new vehicles and cannot get them repaired. The owner or lessee can request that the vehicle be repurchased, replaced or repaired if they have given the dealer a reasonable time to fix the defect; the vehicle has been out of service for a total of 30 accumulative days furing the warranty period or within one year of delivery, or the dealer has attempted to repair the same defect four or more times during the same time period. Vehicles covered under the Texas Lemon Law are cars, trucks, vans, motorcycles, all terrain vehicles and motorhomes. The vehicle defect or condition must be reported with the warranty term or no later than 18 months after you have taken delivery. Consumers may find



who don't buy insurance collect something.

According to Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Neb., a top congressional advocate of reform, the government has averaged \$1.5 billion to \$1.6 billion in combined crop insurance and disaster payments each year.

It would be enough to protect farmers from total losses, even though the catastrophic coverage would be low.

Those farmers who get the free coverage would be brought into the system and given the option of buying more coverage at a cneaper rate than what is current. A larger pool should spread the risk and lower costs to the government and private companies that write the government-subsidized policies.

The bottom line is that Congress would be able to refuse disaster payments.

It will allow the people in Congress to say that this is "free", not to expect any more handouts, and that if you want better coverage and want to be virtually "risk-free", then you should think about buying your own insurance.

Though the details are not yet approved, and could change, the concept of the administration plan resembles one drafted last year by former Representative Glenn English, D-Okla.

That plan called for offering free coverage of all catastrophic losses-those in excess of 65 percent of normal yields. Additional coverage could be purchased but would not be subsidized. However, some premiums could end up being cheaper than the subsidized ones presently are.

A Perspective on Pain

Though pain is indeed the curse and feet. of a fallen world, sometimes the inability to feel pain is a more horrid curse.



Focus On Faith Curtis Shelburne

Dr. Paul Brand is a Christian physician who has devoted his life to treating people with Hansen's disease, leprosy. Many of them would give a fortune if only they could buy physical pain. One such individual was a man from India named Sadan. Dr. Brand, along with co-author Philip Yancey, tells Sadan's story in the fine book Fearfully and Wonderfully Made.

When Sadan came to Dr. Brand's clinic, leprosy had a terrible curse. shrunk his feet to half their normal size and shortened and paralyzed his fingers. For four years Brand and his staff worked to stop the destruction of his feet and to reconstruct his mangled hands. Finally, Sadan was ready to go home for a weekend visit.

Filled with excitement, Sadan looked forward to the reunion with his family. But, before Sadan left, Dr. Brand was very careful to review with him the dangers he faced. You see, he

Pain is not always an enemy. still had no feeling in his hands

The reunion was a joyful one. That night Sadan slept in his own room for the first time in four years. But the next morning he recoiled in horror when he looked at his left hand. Part of his index finger was mangled and bleeding. It had been gnawed by a rat and, with no sensation of pain, Sadan hadn't known it. He was crushed, but more determined than ever to stay the weekend.

The next evening Sadan stood sentry over his own body, reading while his family slept. But late in the night his eyelids betrayed him and he dozed off. What he did not know until morning was that his right hand had slid over onto the side of a hot oil lamp. The skin had burned off to the tendons--and he'd had no way to know it. For Sadan, the absence of pain was

Now, I do not believe for a moment that God causes pain. That's Satan's work. But perhaps the ability to feel pain is, in some cases, not a curse but a blessing. Perhaps the absence of pain might cripple a man just as surely as a glut of it might destroy him. Brand and Yancey are right on target when they comment that what we need is a proper "perspective on pain."





Ms. Thompson said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commer-

cial lenders, the interest is 4.5

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Ms. Thompson said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 8, 1994 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in

applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Thompson said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations and cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Muleshoe is open from 9:00 to 5:00 Monday through Friday.




