
He stated that EVERYONE who is interested in any certain area of Civil Defense and/or if just want to know what Civil Defense can do in general come on out to the meeting.

KINNEY COUNTY PROJECT SHOW



The Kinney County show is January 18-19. The show will be held at the Kinney County Civic Center. Anyone who lives in Kinney County can place exhibits in the show. Exhibitors in the youth division, ages 5-19, must be under the supervision of the vocational agricultural teacher, vocational Home Economics teacher, County Extension Agent, or Classroom teacher. The exhibitor must sign his entry form and have it co-signed by his supervisor. Entry forms must be turned into the county agent or supervising teacher prior to the project show.

Exhibitors are limited to one entry in each class. Youth division entrants are limited to four entries, each in a different class. Senior and adult division entrants can place five items on exhibit.

All food entered in the project show will be sold, if agreeable, to the exhibitor, and the proceeds given to the 4H and FFA.

Ribbons will be awarded to each exhibitor.

All divisions, except food will be due Thursday, January 17 from 3-5pm. Foods are due on Friday morning, January 18 between 8-9 am. Judging will be-

We sometimes make mistakes in

 cushioned on the Judeo-Christ-
 ian ethic as set forth in the
 Bible. This foundation has been
 bolstered by education. A
 causal reading of the Koran
 will readily reveal the differ-
 ent paths taken by Christ and
 Mohammed. The Kohmeini reveal-
 ed the basic tenet of the Mus-
 lin faith when he said, "This
 is a battle between Islam and
 blasphemy." Torture(and the
 imprisoning of personnel by the
 rabble in Iran is a form of
 torture) and death has always
 been more than acceptable to
 Islam as long as it was turned

 Iranians to accept their one

 create sympathy to make accep-

 have not slaughtered the Ameri-

can prisoners do not make them
 saints. They still are criminals

 to justify the unreputant crim-





Admission is \$.25 for students and \$.75 for adults.


JONES ELEMENTARY STUDENTS PRESENT ANNUAL CHRISTMAS SHOW

Picture Memories



Brijido Rivas and Leonard Gomez are the only FFA members showing steers at the livestock show this year.


JUDGES ARE CHOOSY




Students sing the Back-to-school blues. Teachers join in.

LIVE STOCK SHOWS ARE THEY WORTH IT??

If you have ever had to justify the existence of junior livestock shows, you will appreciate these observations from O.S. Daniel, a noted livestock judge and head of animal science department at the University of Georgia.

Before we discuss the merits of a junior livestock show, maybe we had better define it. First of all, it is not a junior livestock show; it is a youngster show where livestock are used as props or visual aids. About 90 percent of the people who come to a show come to see their youngsters or someone else's show themselves.

A junior livestock project should never be sold as a money making project. It is a teaching project.

It teaches youngsters to get along with people, whether they win or get beat.

Livestock feeding teaches responsibility. If the feeder learns nothing more than to hear the alarm clock and obey it, feeding is worthwhile.

Junior projects teach youngsters to attend to details. In livestock feeding and especially life, it is the little things that count.

Decision-making is the most painful task that a teenager has. The good animals shown this year didn't just happen to be here. Somebody planned it that way.

Feeding teaches youngsters to plan. Without a good planning job, we are sunk. Somewhere along the line we hope our feeders

will learn a little about live-stock production,

We don't expect every youngster who feeds a club calf to become a beef cattle breeder. Neither do we expect every little league player to play for the majors. I think sometimes we are prone to look at investments through the wrong end of the telescope. For example, we don't buy a car, we buy transportation; we don't buy a TV set, we buy entertainment. By the same token we don't invest toward a premium list or buy some youngster's calf or pig in a premium sale. Rather, we invest in the future of a youth who in turn will help keep America the greatest country on earth.
