### FORT CLARK HISTORIC DISTRICT ADDED TO NATIONAL REGISTER

Fort Clark Historic District, a significant Kinney County historical site, was officially listed in the National Register of Historic Places on December 6, 1979. Nominated for inclusion in the Register by the Texas Historical Commission, the site is now formally recognized for its contribution to the history of the American people.

Established in 1852 as a protective post on the El Paso Road, Fort Clark is a well-preserved representation of a frontier cavalry station of the 19th century. Used as military post for nearly a century, Fort Clark also displays the evolution of construction techniques and materials.

The National Register is a nationwide inventory of historic properties considered to be worthy of perservation for their cultural and historic values. Fort Clark Historic District is one of approximately 650 Texas sites of archeological, historical, or architectual significance which have been included in the National Register, under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966

It's time for the generation of  
 hard feelings. Election time and  
 the time of campaigning is fer-  
 tile time for creation of bad  
 feelings. When voting time comes  
 emotions run high. Unfortunately  
 qualifications of candidates  
 plays a small part in the casting  
 of votes. People vote their emo-  
 tions. A critical analysis of  
 qualifications on the part of  
 the electorate would never have  
 elected a Kennedy, a Johnson,  
 a Truman, or a Carter. The same  
 principle holds in local election  
 Most people vote as their emotion  
 dictate. This leads to emotional  
 upheavals. Many candidates try  
 to win votes by currying favor  
 with the voters irrespective of  
 the law. Many wildly stretch the  
 truth of their qualifications to  
 try to impress the electorate.  
 Some seek to degrade their op-  
 ponents hoping to steal votes  
 that might go to the opponent.  
 Some appeal to "race" and "cul-  
 ture" to seek to gain votes.  
 Many people who favor and support  
 certain candidates are often  
 more outspoken than the candi-  
 dates themselves. It should be  
 that any candidate is considered  
 on his merit, his character, his  
 qualifications, his integrity  
 and his ability and then voted  
 as the best in the field. It

should also be that where the  
 election is over there should  
 be no rifts of friendship, no  
 bitterness, and no hard feelings.  
 almost always friendships are  
 severed and hard feelings leave  
 lasting scars. Lets hope that  
 no candidate nor campaign will  
 seek to win by trampling on his  
 opponents and no one will say or  
 do anything in the campaign that  
 will leave a bad taste when the  
 election is over. After all I  
 have a given right to vote  
 for whom I choose and so does  
 every other legal voter. I don't  
 want someone to rob me of my  
 privilege and I have no right  
 to question the vote of another.

This designation does not in-  
 fringe upon the private property  
 rights of site owners. It does  
 offer a measure of protection  
 from disturbance in any federally  
 funded or licensed project such  
 as highway or reservoir constru-  
 ction. National Register proper-  
 ties are also eligible for fin-  
 ancial assistance through the  
 grants-in-aid program. Such funds  
 can be used for acquisition, pre-  
 servation, or restoration of the  
 sites. The federal funds distri-  
 buted to the states as grants-in-  
 aid are not tax monies. They  
 are part of lease payments to the  
 Department of the Interior for  
 resource exploration on public  
 lands. Funds are allocated to  
 the staes each year through the  
 Hertiage Conservation and Rec-  
 reation Service of the Interior  
 Department. Money is administered  
 in Texas by the National Register  
 office in the Texas Historical  
 Commission, under the direction  
 of Truett Latimer, State Historic  
 Preservation Officer and Executive  
 Director of the agency.

The Texas Historical Commis-  
 sion is the Official State Agency  
 for Historic Preservation. It acts  
 as a clearinghouse for preserva-  
 tion information, sponsors edu-  
 cational and consultation pro-  
 grams, and publishes preservation  
 related materials. The agency is  
 responsible for the state historic  
 marker program and for an exten-  
 sive program of workshops, pub-  
 lications, and services in the  
 fields of preservation, archeol-  
 ogy, and museology. The Commis-  
 sion works closely with a net-  
 work of 250 county historical  
 commissions as well as 237 non-  
 profit heritiage organizations in  
 the state.

Dear K.C.,

Last Friday Miss Else Sauer  
 and Mrs. Charlotte Golemon at-  
 tended a book workshop about art  
 and related subject matter hosted  
 by the Del Rio Public Library.  
 At the workshop popular art se-  
 lections in books and records  
 were discussed by representatives

of the San Antonio Public Library  
 Disrict 10. Our librarian was  
 given assistance in selecting  
 several hundred dollars' worth  
 of books and records. This pro-  
 gram and the funds for purchasing  
 those books and records are a-  
 nother free service provided for  
 State Library members. For the  
 past 3 or 4 years our library  
 has been receiving these and  
 other benefits for state library  
 members on a "probationary basis."  
 These benefits are now in jeopardy  
 as our deadline for meeting all  
 the qualifications draws near.  
 This is why it is so important  
 for us to impress the County  
 Commissioners with the need for  
 them to approve a budget for the  
 library of at least \$5,000 plus  
 a large enough percent of the  
 county tax dollars to pay a lib-  
 rarian. So far our County Lib-  
 rary ( a county institution) has  
 received no percent of the tax  
 dollar and is the only county  
 library in the San Antonio/Dist-  
 rict 10 not to have met state  
 membership requirements. For  
 those of you who care about the  
 future of our library and its  
 accessability to our county cit-  
 izens, its adults and its youth,  
 then plan to attend the next  
 County Commisioners' Meeting.  
 YOur preseence will help to se-  
 cure a better future for our  
 county library.

This is surprising diversity in the economic forecasts that have come to my attention in recent weeks. Some financial experts, highly regarded in the private sector, are saying that their early predictions of a recession this year may prove to be false. I think of the comment once made by President Truman, who said he wished he could seek advice from one-armed experts only, because he was tired of hearing definitive statements followed up by the phrase "On the Other Hand!"

Certainly the economic effects of Middle East events provide little to be happy about. At this writing, there are some expectations that the hostage question may be answered soon, and we would all rejoice if those Americans in Tehran were to return safely. But on the other hand, to use the phrase that made President Truman unhappy, if Soviet action in the Persian gulf area should cut oil supplies from that region or if the OPEC nations increase prices again, the effects would be most serious.

### FORESEE DEFENSE JOBS

I do foresee that our House Armed

Services Committee will provide the increases in the defense budget sought by President Carter, and we may ask the Congress to spend even more on rebuilding our military strength. One result would be more jobs for American workers in aircraft plants and shipyards. I think we are going to have to spend more government money on personnel, military and civilian, in our armed services, because we face serious problems in attrition to private industry.

We recently heard testimony from Admiral Thomas B. Hayward, Chief of Naval Operations, describing how young machinists' mates, trained at government expense, were being lured from the service. They can get private jobs with paid vacations, life insurance and health benefits while living at home with their families, and receive more take-home pay than the Navy could provide them in overseas duties. He said--and I agree--that more must be done to retain military personnel, whether these people be Navy, aircraft pilots or mechanics, or Army technicians. If they are kept in the service, other jobs will open for civilian.

### SOME PROSPECTS BRIGHTER

Some experts now forecast that we shall see an easing of the mortgage money costs and a decline

in home costs. These factors would stimulate the construction business alsway an important factor in our economy. One benefit could be recovery of the automobile market and other big-ticket items such as household appliances.

In appreciation of the brave Tehran action of Canada's Ambassador Kenneth Taylor, the House last week approved a special gold

medal for him. He carefully planned to evacuate six American diplomatic personnel when the Canadian delegation left Iran, and even stayed behind until he was sure our people had departed safely. On the 100th day that 50 other Americans were being held hostage in our Embassy, the House honored Ambassador Taylor. Our whole Nation shares gratitude to him and his associates, as well as to the other diplomats and media people who helped the Canadians keep secret the presence and then the safe departure of the six Americans. 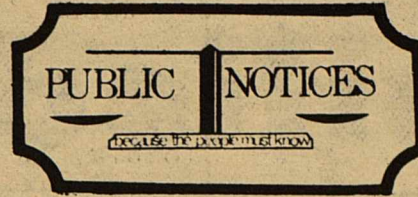

Between February 28 and March 4 all fifth and ninth grade students of the Brackett Independent School District will participate in the first Texas Legislature Assessment of Basic Skills Test Program. Brackett students will be among 500,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests statewide. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40-60 minutes to complete.

Mr. Wills stated that the third grade will be added to the annual sequence during the 1980-81 school year, according to plans announced by the Texas Education Agency. (TEA) These tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory score may retake the test each year they remain in high school. The Westinghouse Data Score Systems of Iowa City, Iowa will help administer the 1980 test program. They will also develop and field test new items for the 1980-81 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

The school system will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June board meeting. Individual student scores will be reported only to the student, his parents or guardian and the personnel directly involved with the student.

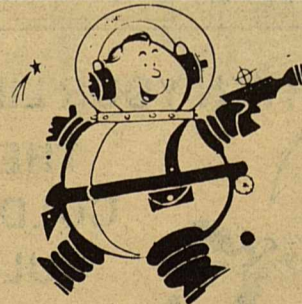
