After some of the excitment cooling off and the Tortilla Eaters have hopefully gotten back into a more stable mood it's time for:



- 1. All tortillas will be supplied by the Association: a. Distance - Flour tortillas b. Accuracy - Corn Tortillas.
- 2. No objections will be allowed on quality of tortillas after the toss.
- 3. In the event of a tie, the Judges will call for a "Toss-Off".
- 4. Participants may enter as often as wants as long as fee is paid.

DISTANCE CONTEST

- 1. Furtherest throw of 3 tosses will be used to determine the winner.
- 2. Point of impace will be measured in a straight line from the tossing point perpendicular to the tossing line.
- 3. Distance will be measured to the edge of tortilla's fartherest edge from the tossing line.
- 4. Largest peice of tortilla in case of breakage will be used with rules same as above.
- 5. Tortilla must be tossed flat, without mechanical devices.
- 6. Entry Fee \$3.00



I REMEMBER

Did you ever eat o'possum? Well I remember as a child I ate it many times. My father was the superintendent of a large oil refinery. We were a family in the middle income bracket. There was never a day we did not have fresh meat on the table. Living in town this of course came from the meat market. Turkeys were not as readily available in those days as they are now. Early in the fall every year Dad would walk down on the washita River a couple miles from the refinery. There was a tremendously large cottonwood trees there that had three "possum hollers" in it. Dad would climb the tree and find a couple of "possums". When he reached the ground he would thump the nose of each possum and they would "sull" so you could carry them by the tail and they would be as inactive as they were dead. Dad would take these back to the refinery where he had a large covered box in which he would put them. In those days there were no fancy cafeterias in such plants and no snack bars. Men went to the plant to work. They took their "coffee break" at home. It was not over work to work 12 hours a day, six days a week with an hour off for lunch. Each man brought his own lunch. When men finished eating they would take the scraps that were left and feed the possums. By

Thanksgiving Day these possums would be rolling fat. For many years this was our Thanksgiving Day treat. Possum baked with sweet potatoes as my mother fixed the dish was a delicious treat. The meat was a little on the sweet side and a little greasy like fresh pork, but was heartily enjoyed. I'm glad I grew up in the days before such sophisticated or do you plan some day to go? ways precluded such things as "eating possum". If you've never tried it --- don't knock it! You don't know what you've missed.

"The Spanish, who then owned that area, wanted to set up a buffer zone between the English colonies and New Spain. They figured a community of escaped African slaves would help them do that."

Hancock said that the escaped African slaves intermarried with Seminole and other Indians to form a distinct group that was neither Indian nor Black, and they retained their Gullah language through succeeding generations.

He also explained that Gullah originated on the African west coast.

Hancock - the first person to discover that Gullah is spoken in Texas - stumbled on the fact through a tape recording he heard from a university student who had been there studying American history.

Hancock doesn't know how many people speak Gullah in Brackettville. He estimated the number of speakers there to be about four hundred or so.



You have signed a real estate purchase contract for that split level home you've wanted, and the title search of public records has shown no matters affecting the security of your ownership. Apparently, the way is clear for you to complete the transaction that will assure good title to your new home.

Or is it?
In a western state, a home buyer had scarcely completed his purchase when notice was

received from the Internal Revenue Service that the federal agency intended to seize the property to satisfy two tax liens recorded against previous owners of the real estate. These liens were duly filed but were not detected before completion of the purchase due to confusion in the records and title search.

Since the buyer was protected by owner's title insurance, the title company paid the tax liens to protect the insured against financial loss.

opposing rights Many may be claimed in real property, with tax liens being only one example. Such rights will not always be disclosed by a title search. Among other rights that may exist in real estate are mortgages, special assessment liens, judgments against current or former property owners, ownership use and occupancy restrictions, mineral rights, air rights, and easements both above and beneath the ground.

For a one-time premium at closing, owner's title insurance will pay for the defense of an attack on title as insured—and will either eliminate undisclosed title defects or pay valid claims.



WHAT IS GULLAH?

If you happen to drive through Brackettville, Texas, and you hear a language that sounds like the speech of space aliens don't be surprised - it's only Gullah, a secret African language that has survived in Texas and in other areas of the United States.

Prof. Ian Hancock, of the University of Texas in Austin, is studying this phenomenon of an African Creole speech that has survived in isolated areas since the early days of slavery.

Hancock says that the Gullah, or mixture of African and English, that is spoken in Brackett-ville is the oldest and purest form of this secret language existing today.

"What they speak here is the earliest form of Gullah, "Prof. Hancock told the Examiner. "It's very pure. The Gullah that is spoken on the East Coast, in Georgia and the Carolinas, has a lot more African in it.

"The people whose descendants live in Brackettville left the East Coast between 1699 and 1760, and fled from slavery down to Florida."




"The officer collared him and asked why he was chasing the ambulance at such a high rate


