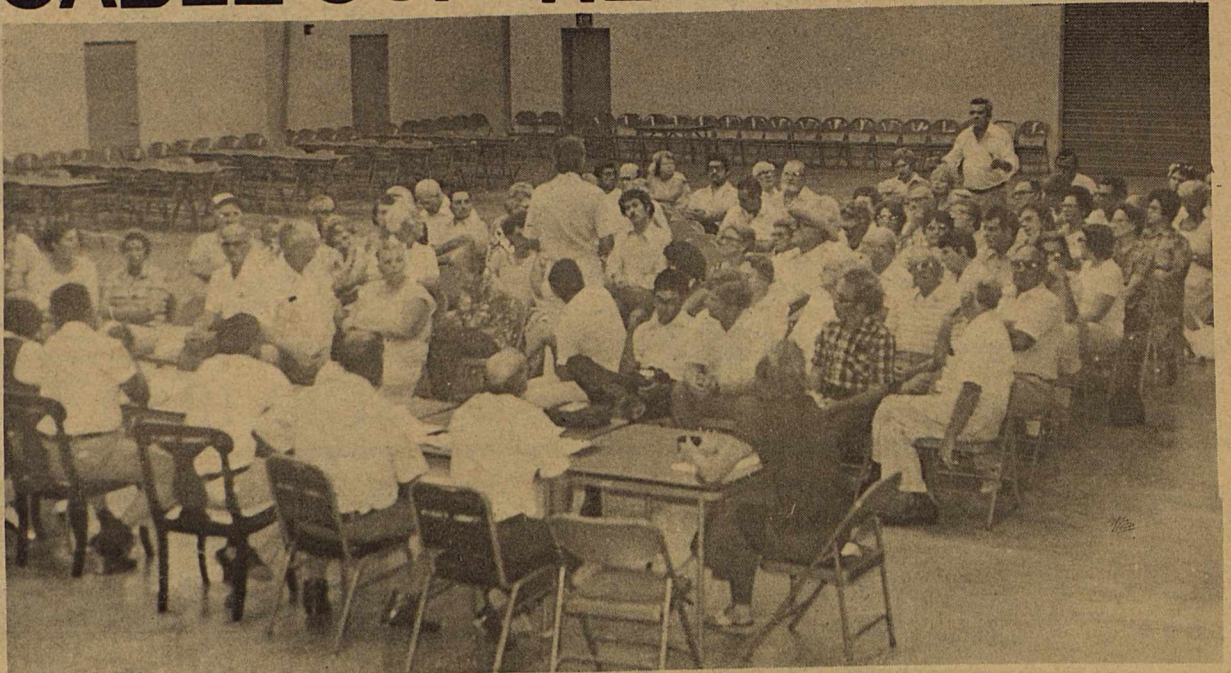

Plants & Posies

COMBINATION PLANTERS.....

Many plants look their best when potted singly, yet a community of plants in one pot is often striking.

There are many possibilities for combination planting, but the only rub is make sure the group of plants have similar needs. Use contrasting colors, shapes, and textures. Combine tall growers with low growing spreading or trailing plants. A variegated leaf plant next to a green leaf makes an appealing pot as does contrasting smooth leaved foliage with rough leaves. Avoid putting too much in one container, ususally two or three different plants are enough. The main concern is that you grouping of plants have the some light and water requirements.

Available are special equipment such as cassette machines, Talking Book Machines, headphone, pillowphones, remote control units, as well as speed controls for the cassette machine. All of these are provided free of charge on extended loan to eligible persons for as long as the need is there.

Materials catalogs are available with specific book titles for records or cassettes or they may be selected for the recipient if the subject area of interest is indicated on the application. Applications are available from the K.C. Public Library.

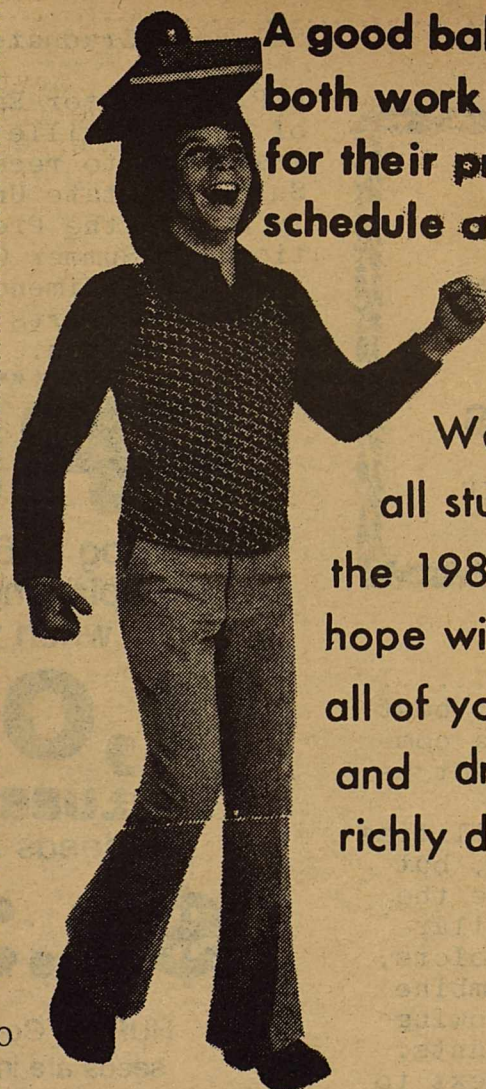

IT'S ALMOST FALL GARDENING TIME AGAIN

UVALDE--Fall gardening time is
nearly upon us. Before long, back
yard gardens will be harvesting
tender, succulent home grown
vegetables for immediate consump-
tion or canning.

What can be planted in the
fall garden? "Anything that was
planted in the spring garden with
the possible exception of sweet
corn," answers Dr. Jerry Parsons
area vegetable specialist with
the Texas Agricultural Extension
Service. He says sweet corn may
be difficult because of insect
problems during the fall.

Parsons says eggplant, pepers
an tomato transplants should be
planted early enough to insure
production before fall frosts
occur. Even cold-hardy plants
of broccoli and cauliflower
should be set out now, he notes.
However, the right types of
transplants should be used.

Parsons recommends Big Set,
Bonus and Spring Giant varieties
for tomato lovers, Rio 66 sweet
peppers, Green Comet broccoli,
Black Beauty eggplants and Snow-
crown for cauliflower connoisseurs.

To make fall gardening more
productive he recommends that
gardeners plant cool-season ve-
getables in one area of the
arden and warm-season plants in
a separate area. "This separation
will allow removal of warm-season
vegetable plants after they have
been destroyed by fall frosts"
he says.

Parsons defines cool-season
vegetables as those of which the
vegetable parts--roots, stems,
leaves, and buds or immature
flower parts--are eaten. Two ex-
ceptions to this rule are warm-
season crops--sweet potatoes
(roots used) and New Zealand
spinach (leaf and stem used).

Warm-season crops are those
vegetables of which the immature
or mature fruits are eaten.

Cool-season crops normally
differ from warm-season crops in
that they are more hardy or frost
tolerant, seeds germinate at
cooler soil temperatures, maintain
shallower root systems, plant size
is smaller, respond more to nitro-
gen, usually require more frequent
irrigation and harvest is not sub-
ject to chilling injury at temper-
atures between 32 degrees F. and
50 degrees F.

tables plus detailed information
about recommend fall home garden
care.

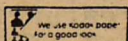

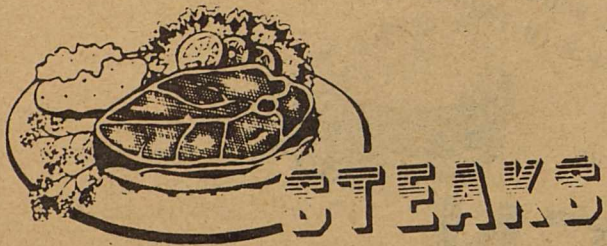

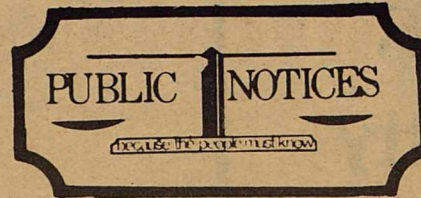

TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF WATER RESOURCES

AUSTIN--The Texas Department of Water Resources has published a report on the chemical and physical characteristics of water in principal estuaries on the Texas Coast from data collected during water year 1975.

Report 245 contains data from a cooperative investigation by the Geological Survey and the Texas Department of Water Resources. The purpose of the investigation was to obtain information of the chemical and physical characteristics of water in the estuaries. This information is necessary in planning for the

use and portection of water in the estuaries.

The report is the seventh in an annual series of basic-data, technical reports on the estuaries. Interpretive reports are prepared and published after sufficient data becomes available to establish the characteristics of an estuary.

The Texas Department of Water Resources, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and the Army Corps of Engineers at Galveston cooperated with the USGS and provided data and field assistance in the investigation.

Estuaries included in the investigation are the Sabine-Neches, Brazos, East Matagorda, Colorado, Lavaca-Tres Palacios, Guadalupe, Mission-Aransas, Nueces, and Laguna Madre. Not included in the investigation was the Galveston Bay and Rio Grande estuaries.

The report is titled "Chemical and Physical Characteristics of Water in Estuaries of Texas. October 1974-September 1975." Copies of the report are available without charge from the Texas Department of Water Resources, P.O.Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711.

Volunteers for Vision, Inc.

The Texas Department of Health and the Texas Education Agency have enlisted the aid of volunteer groups to help schools meet the needs of the Texas Vision Screening Act of 1979. That Act, effective September 1, 1980, is targeted toward

young children entering kindergarten or first grade, and students transferring into Texas from another state.

One of the organizations sought by the state is Volunteers for Vision, Inc. From inception, the primary purpose of "V for V" has been to seek and find the visually disadvantaged child. Organized in Washington, D.C., during the Johnson Administration, to work with the national Head Start program, the non-profit group has through screening identified thousands of children whose ability to learn was impeded by a malfunctioning vision system.

Mrs. Janelle Hill, Texas Coordinator for Volunteers for Vision, stated that, while living in Washington, D.C., Luci Johnson, daughter of the president, spent many hours as a volunteer screener in the District. In 1969, in Austin, Luci Johnson Nugent was elected president of the first Texas V for V Chapter; she helped to organize other Texas chapters and again participated in many vision screenings, this time in her home state.

"We are pleased that Texas has passed this law," Mrs. Hill said. "A child doesn't know he cannot see--there is no pain involved. Therefore, his or her problems are not always recognized unless parents, teachers, and interested persons see that every child is given a professional examination or a vision screening by trained volunteers at an early age.

Texas Department Of Community Affairs

AUSTIN--The Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) announced today that it will launch a major campaign this fall promoting a partnership between business and government to create employment opportunities in over 100 Texas Counties.

The campaign is part of a new collaborative effort known as the Private Sector Initiative Program created by Title VII of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA).

"Since 80% of all jobs lie in the private sector," TDCA executive director Sid Wieser noted in making the announcement "Business support is crucial in helping solve employment problems.

Using the theme "Workin' Partnership: CETA's Enterprising Idea for Texas Employers," the TDCA campaign will encourage business and industry to hire and train eligible workers.

"The goal of the program,"

Wieser said, "is to bring unemployed and underemployed into the mainstream of the work force. Equipping workers with marketable skills will allow them mobility in the private job market and the chance to become self-sufficient."

"This can mean less reliance on government support systems, which in turn benefits all tax-paying residents of Texas," Wieser continued.

The partnership is also designed to be responsive to business needs in training and jobs programs, according to Bud Harris, director of TDCA Manpower Services Division.

If a CETA employee qualifies under certain guidelines, Harris explained, the employer can be reimbursed up to fifty percent of the workers' wages for training costs. In addition, if the employee qualifies under one of seven specially targeted groups, such as Viet Nam veterans or the

handicapped, the business could qualify for additional tax credits.

"We want to make businesses aware of the local nature of this program," Harris said. He explained that the federal funds are locally administered in the 100-plus counties under TDCA sponsorship. The counties are divided into 15 geographic areas, each with a local entity to administer funds.

"This allows more efficient use of the monies," he said, "since a local body has good knowledge of its area's needs.

"Moreover, private business has a lot to do with these funds," he continued. "A state Private Industry Council, composed in the majority of business people, creates the major link between government and business. And each has its own Private Industry Task Force to represent the business community."

"This is one of the few times," Harris added, "that business can have a direct say in how a federal program is run which affects them."

"What makes this program really viable," Harris said, "is that workers are trained according to local business standards for real work situations in the market place. The ultimate goal is long-term unsubsidized employment in the competitive job market."

"This is one program that is not just a stop-gap measure," Harris stated, "It is a real opportunity to prepare a great many people, from the school drop-out to the displaced homemaker, to be permanent, tax-paying members of the working community."

"Our sponsorship, one of several in the state, covers counties and towns with populations of less than 100,000," Harris concluded. "There are hundreds of businesses in these areas, ranging from small retail operations to large manufacturers. We hope to express the programs' benefits to as many as we can."

The "Workin' Partnership" campaign kicks off in September with print and film materials to reach local employers and business leaders, and community-wide public service announcements. The campaign highlights companies already involved in the private sector program, employees who are being trained or have advanced through the program and local sponsors representing several areas of the state.

CETA's Private sector initiative program has received widespread support from well-known business organizations, including the National Alliance of Business, the National Newspaper Association and the American Society for Personnel Administration.
