During the past few days a number of events have occurred in the City Council that have been reported by several reliable sources to the CAVALRYMAN.

1. The failure of the City Council and Mayor to appoint a replacement for Alderman Richard Garcia, who has missed many more council meetings than specified for his removal by the City Ordinances.
2. An attempt by the Mayor and a City Councilman to enact an ordinance preventing City Employees from filing for public office.
3. Failure to notify the Official newspaper of the county 24 hours in advance of any special meetings as called for under the Open Meetings Laws.

The mayor nor any of the City Council have asked for the re-signation of Alderman Richard Garcia even though he has missed many more meetings than prescribed by City regulations to be automatically removed from office. Is he still on the City payroll? Has Alderman Louis Dimery ever been paid for his duties as Alderman?

There have allegedly been attempts by Mayor Gomez and at least one other City Councilman to force City Manager Tim Ward to resign as City Manager since he filed for a County Public Office in the upcoming November general election. YET there has been no suggestion that Alderman Joe Garza resign his position on the Council even though he ran and was elected the Democratic nominee for a County office! What is good for the goose is good for the gander!

When I first heard that the City had hired a "Young, Wet behind the ears Banker", I cringed I know that I was not the only person in this community that had the same feeling (even though I may be only one that will admit it). It did not take too long for Tim Ward to prove his worth. He pitched in with both hands and got the City organized. I have seen him put in overtime with the mud up to his knees. I have seen him stand up to the big companies that have tried to run over us

with their bluffs. I have also seen him help the old person that was confused and bewildered. I have seen him pull ALL the City employees together and work as a team. I think the City of Brackettville would have a hard time finding another Tim Ward..... PARTICULARLY AT THE SALARY HE RECEIVES!

Mr. Editor and All,

We have, roughly, three thousand residents in Kinney County, or about one thousand taxpayer. When the county spends a thousand dollars, it costs the average tax payers one dollar. The county budget is over FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS.

We are apparently planning a new tax collecting facility, costing eighty or ninety thousand dollars. This will cost the taxpayer eighty or ninety dollars to find out how much taxes he has to pay.

It is not required by the state to spend any fixed amount. Some counties are saving money by converting existing facilities and personnel to collect the property taxes. An outside licensed appraiser is not required as any person who is willing and will become certified withing five years may be appointed property appraiser.

We have a number of expensive examples of mismanagement of funds, in our slipshod jail, unfinished library and architectural misfit of a Civic Center. We have the choice of tightening our budget or continuing to mis-

spend. Let's stop and think which we should do.

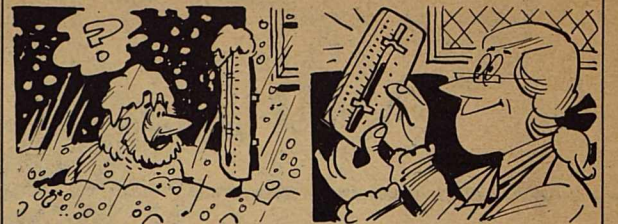

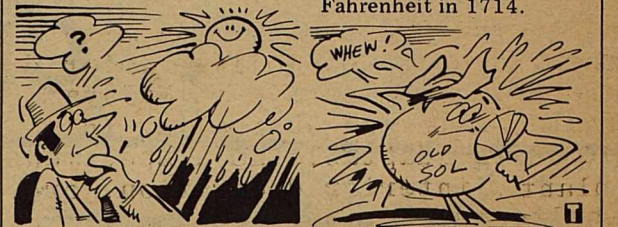

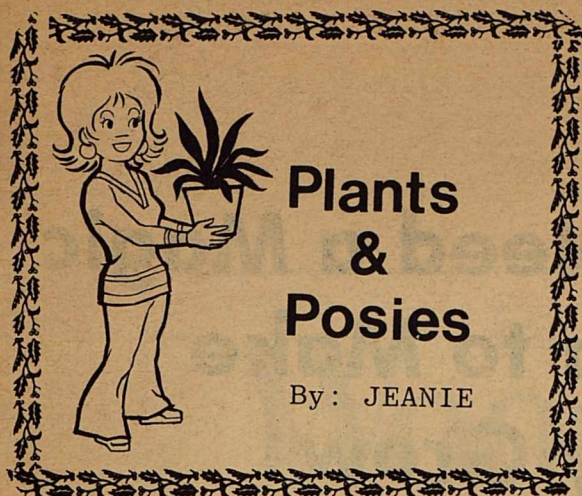

FICUS BENJAMINA (Weeping Fig)

The Ficus Benjamina with their deep green foliage color are primarily native to Malaya, India, Asia and Australia. This plant is adaptable as a specimen plant, interior decoration, or sheltered patios.

The Ficus can tolerate a dry atmosphere, but does need fresh air. As a house plant, it would be suited to a clear east or west window. As a patio plant it should be moved to a warmer area when temperatures fall below 40 degrees. The Ficus is most adaptable to soil that's evenly moist, but not constantly wet. Burning and shriveling of the leaves occur if the plant is too dry.

Cut back the growing tip to stimulate new growth and prune to desired shape. Remove unsightly branches or growth.

Repot in early spring with a rich soil. Do not fertilize newly potted plants right away. With proper care and good growing conditions, your Ficus benjamina will be with you for years to come

The 96th Congress has already taken more votes and worked more hours than all but two congresses in ~~histry~~, but our work is not finished. We are now in recess until November 12 so that Members may report back to their constituents prior to the November 4 election, which will decide who will hold all House seats as well as the Presidency, Vice-Presidency and one-third of the Senate seats.

The session thus far has been somewhat slower than normal, but I have never felt that fast pace was nearly as important as careful and thorough study of all legislative proposals. This year, in an effort to improve the quality of work by the Congress, we changed our budgeting system to provide wiser control over all government spending. I think the new system will work better in the future, but I am convinced that citizens expected us to be diligent in appropriating and spending tax dollars.

ATTENTION TO ENERGY

Reviewing the legislative achievements of this Congress, it has recognized that Middle East developments emphasized the importance of increasing our domestic energy supply, so has given attention to many bills aimed at improving our domestic fuel situation. We enacted into law the Energy Security Act launching a new porogram of developing synthetic fuels, fegan innovations on harnessing ocean, thermal and wind energy, and we began efforts to harness our nation's huge supply of coal to meet needs formerly met by oil and gas.

I opposed the Windfall Profits tax, because I could not accept the levies on royalty owners

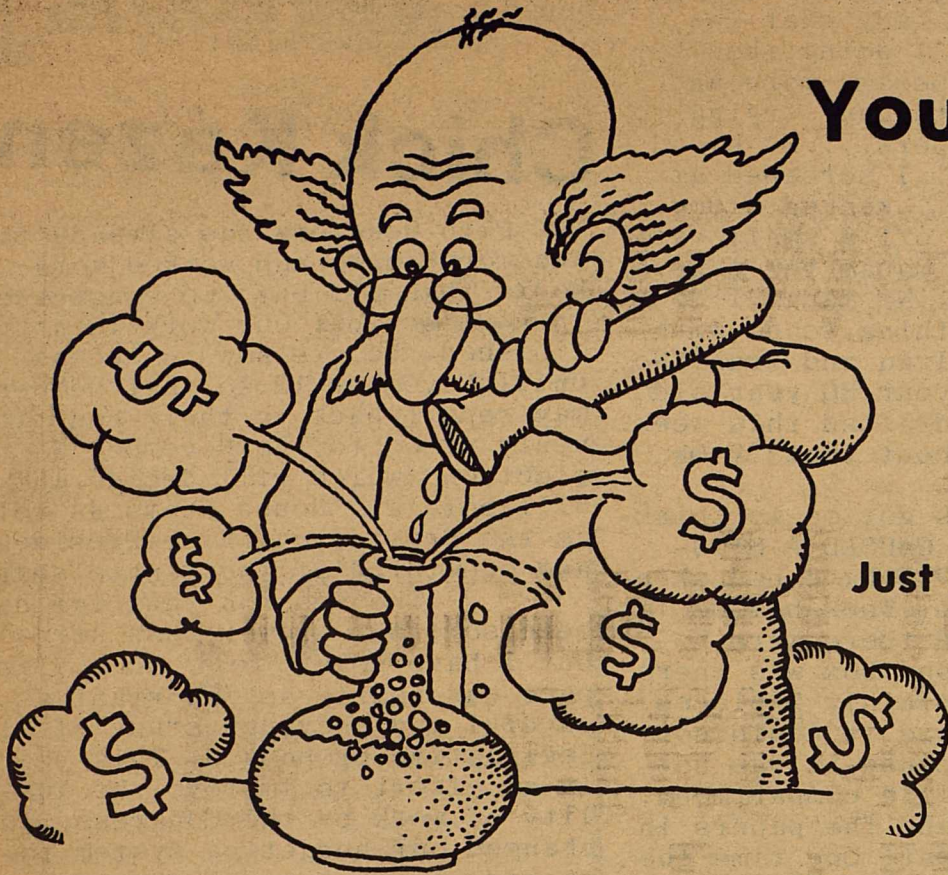

The Governor's Committee on Employment of The Handicapped

Five Texans were honored this afternoon for their outstanding contributions to the rehabilitation and employment of persons with disabilities. The five were awarded Governor's Citations during a ceremony in Austin at the Villa Capri Hotel. The awards were presented by Allen Clark, Jr., Special Assistant to the Governor Bill Clements.

The Governor's Citation for Meritorious Service was presented to Charlie Perkins of Cleburne; Martha Arbuckle of Austin received

the Handicapped Texan of the Year Award while E-Systems of Garland and Cardinal Body Shop of Beaumont were honored as Employer of the Year. The Physician of the Year Award went to Dr. Donald Rathbun of El Paso.

Employers, representatives of local mayor's committees along with state and federal officials and persons with disabilities attended the session.

In his address to approximately 400 persons at the meeting Clark announced that the Governor has issued a proclamation establishing October 5-11 as Employ the Handicapped Week in Texas in conjunction with the President's National Employ the Handicapped Week proclamation. Additionally, Clark presented a proclamation signed by Governor Clements declaring 1981 as the International Year of Disabled Persons in Texas to follow the guidelines issued by the United Nations and U.S. Council for the International Year of Disabled Persons.

The Texas Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped was established in 1949 at the request of President Harry Truman, who established the President's committee. The Texas Governor's Committee was recently restructured so that an ongoing program could be developed under the guidance of a 14 member committee of citizens chaired by Sam D. Millsap of San Antonio and supported by fulltime staff members. The morning program featured reports from the Chairman, Executive Secretary, and a panel which discussed the implementation of activities for the forthcoming International Year of Disabled Persons.

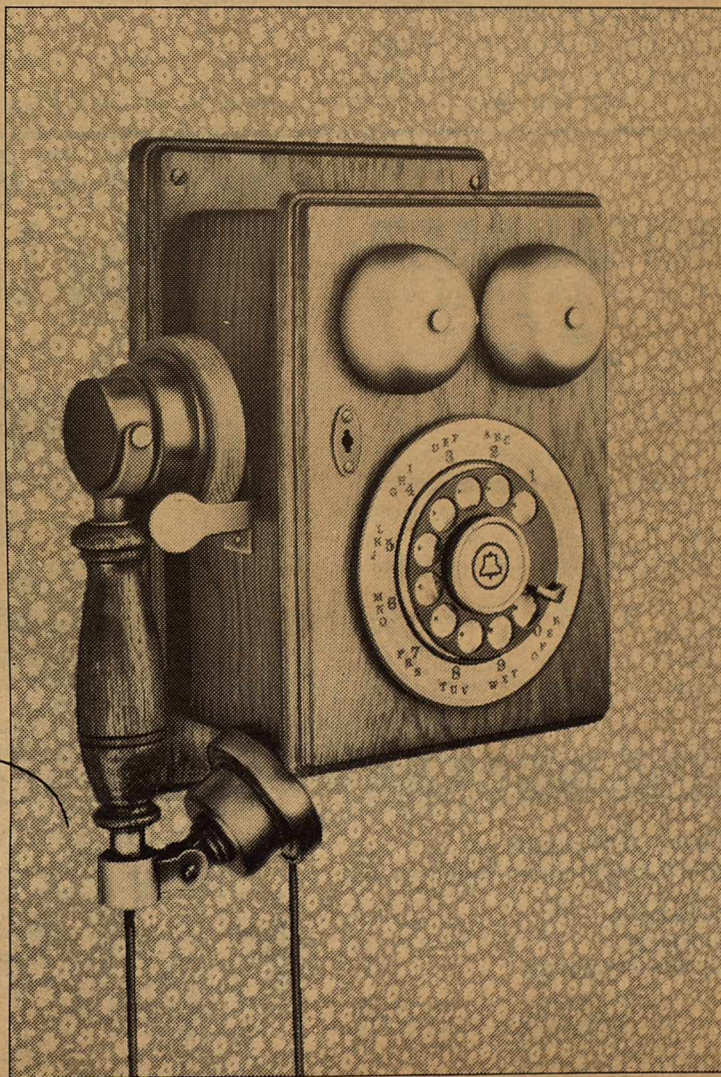

and small producers. I argued that their relatively small gains should not be assessed in the same manner as the major oil companies. On many occasions, I pointed out that this tax was described as a levy on the major oil companies, while as a matter of fact we all knew that they would pass the tax on to the consumers, so that you and I would have to pay it.

BIG DEFENSE PLANNING

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I was pleased that we persuaded our colleagues to vote \$157 billion in new spending for defense. It was the largest defense appropriations bill ever approved in peace-time, and I believe it was enacted because Members of both parties recognized the obvious need to keep our nation second to none in military power.

We of the Armed Services Committee based our planning on three elements: the deterrence of nuclear attack on the United States, the prevention of nuclear or conventional war against our nation and our allies, and the ability to provide quick, effective action wherever it was needed.

I think the American People, along with elected officials, share the credit for maintaining our strength so that no enemy will seek to dominate us.

REDUCE GOVERNMENT

We sought to cut the size and accompanying costs of government, and we voted to reduce federal regulations and paperwork. To help the housing industry that is so important in our economy,

we improved the Housing and Community Development law as well as the Fair Housing bill. Important actions were taken to improve the environment.

We who have been concerned about the San Antonio electric utility's high fuel costs were pleased to get House approval of a section of the railroad bill that would protect the City Public Service Board and its customers for the time being from continued escalation of coal freight rates. Our Congressional intent may reinforce that protection if a court suit is filed to declare that particular provision unconstitutional.

SAD, PROUD AT EXPULSION

One historic action was the House vote to expel Representative Myer of Pennsylvania. I cast my vote for expulsion with sadness that any Member should face such action the first by the House since 1861, when three Members were expelled for treason, but I was also proud that the House fulfilled its obligation to maintain the standard which the Constitution, our laws and our oaths of office impose on all of us who take the Constitutional oath.

I feel that justice was done by the hearings of our Committee on Standards of Official Conduct and that when we passed by a vote of 376-30 the motion for expulsion, we did justice to the citizens who sent each of us here as stewards of their trust. I was shocked at the video tapes of Representative Myers' actions, but after viewing them and reading high admissions, I felt certain that the House had no choice but to expel him.

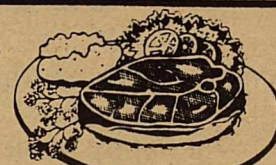

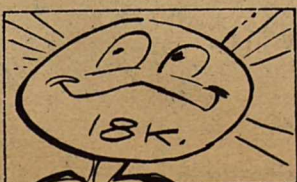

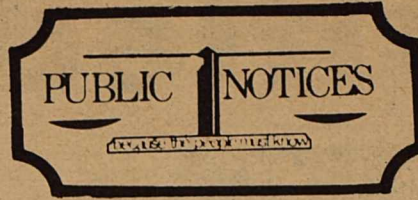

WEST-NUECES-LAS MORAS SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION ELECTION

An election for a director to serve in Zone 2 on the West Nueces Las Moras Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 12, 1980 in/at the Longhorn Restuarant announced Lee Schermerhorn chairman of the board. The election will be held at 12:00 NOON.

State Law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live within a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 21 years old.

Legal qualifications state that candaidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district must own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

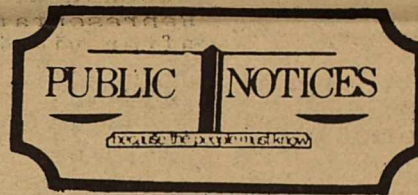
Zone 2 of the district includes an area from a line beginning at the intersection of the North Kinney County line and FM 674 and taking in the area between FM 674 and FM 334 that lies in Kinney County.

The purpose of the West Nueces-Las Moras SWCD, with headquarters in Brackettville is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights or landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.
