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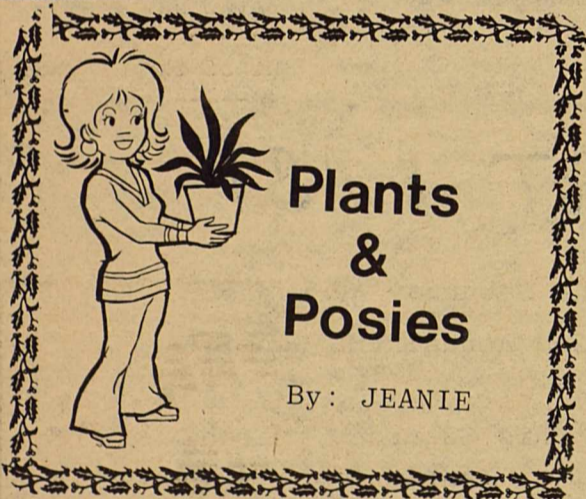

JACARANDA.....

Jacaranda are small trees
or shrubs that grow to 30 feet
in the wild. The Jacaranda
Memosifelid is an indoor species
with fernlike foliage. It is a
single stemmed plant until it
reaches a height of about 2
feet then it begins to branch
out into a graceful shrub. The
leaves are bright green and on
mature plants are up to 15 inch
long.

The indoors shrubs grow
best in bright light, with some
direct light. They do well in
normal room temperature and
can tolerate as low as 45 degree
during the winter rest period
water thoroughly but let the top
half of the soil mixture dry
out before watering again.
Fertilize regularly for better
growth. Pruning can be done in
the spring if needed.

FORT CLARK DAYS

FORT CLARK HISTORICAL HOMES TOUR

Five private homes, located within the newly designated Fort Clark Historic District will be open on Sunday, April 5, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. as a fitting finale for the two day 5th Annual Fort Clark Days Celebration.

While all of the homes are built of native limestone from the Fort Quarry, variety will be the keynotes. A Field Officer's Quarters, one of the double-set of Officers Quarters, an Army kitchen-mess hall, a barracks, and an officer's polo locker building have been adapted to private home use. Boundless imagination and individuality are reflected in each one.

The largest one, known as the Patton House, is owned by the Brown Foundation. General George Patton resided here while he was Commanding Officer of the 5th Regiment. Primarily used for gracious Texas-style entertaining, it's 10 bedrooms have accommodated many VIP's, including President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The other Officer's Quarters, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Purvis, is typical of the other thirteen Colony Row double houses, in floor plan only. A warm and loving home filled with family mementoes, the Purvis' stamp is very much in evidence.

Located across the Parade Ground and next to the Museum (formerly Guard House) is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Raul DeMint. Part of the Headquarters Barracks, it is a step from the past into the present. More modern in decor, the 2,000 sq feet of living space include a bedroom loft. The wide verandah, typical of all the barracks, is an added charm.

Mr. and Mrs. John Meyers showed great foresight when they selected one of the three remaining army kitchens to be their home. Originally built to serve 72 enlisted men, on of

these were built behind each of the Barracks. This comfortable home is filled with heirlooms and collections reflecting the wide range of interest of its' occupants.

The last home on the Tour is constructed with in the rock walls of an officer's locker room, a part of the Polo complex. A Polo Cage was on one end, and the Polo "jumps" to the side. Mr. and Mrs. Dave Bixby saw the possibilities and created "the biggest three room house on the Fort." The main part of the house is completely open, with a bedroom and bath at either end. The 1850 theme has been adapted to casual, country living.

Don't miss this opportunity to journey through the history of this 128 year old Frontier Cavalry Fort. Ticket for \$2.00 may be purchased at the Museum during Fort Clark Days, April 4&5. One ticket entitles you to visit all five homes.

UVALDE--A future oriented "force" is working in this community.

Young people in 4-H Clubs learn and grow under the direction of almost 23,000 trained volunteer leaders who meet with them in almost every Texas community, Chavez explained.

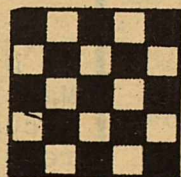
County Extension Agents provide 4-H program direction and management in every county of the state.

The program receives further support through this link as part of the United States Department of Agriculture.

State, County and Federal Support then, combine to make 4-H a unique organization, Chavez said.

But it's the support of private citizens, organizations, corporation and foundations whose assistances make it possible to multiply 4-H public resources many times over, he stressed "More than five million boys and girls participate in 4-H every year in the United States," Chavez said.

"They are learning and growing through the development of their head, heart, hands and health--4-H is shaping tomorrow's world."

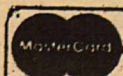
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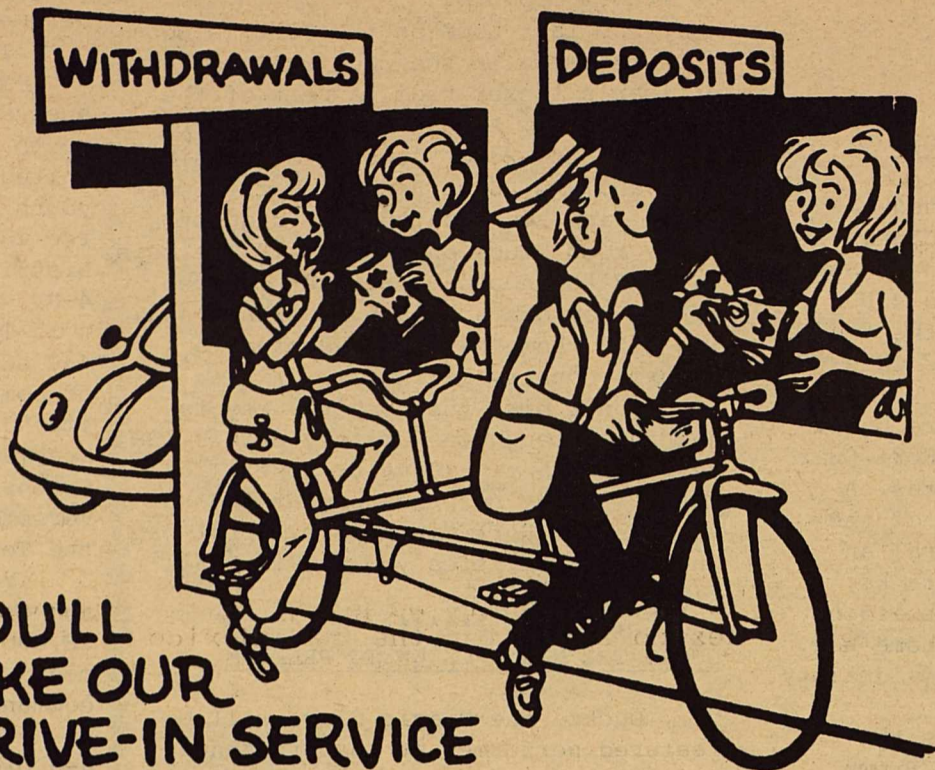

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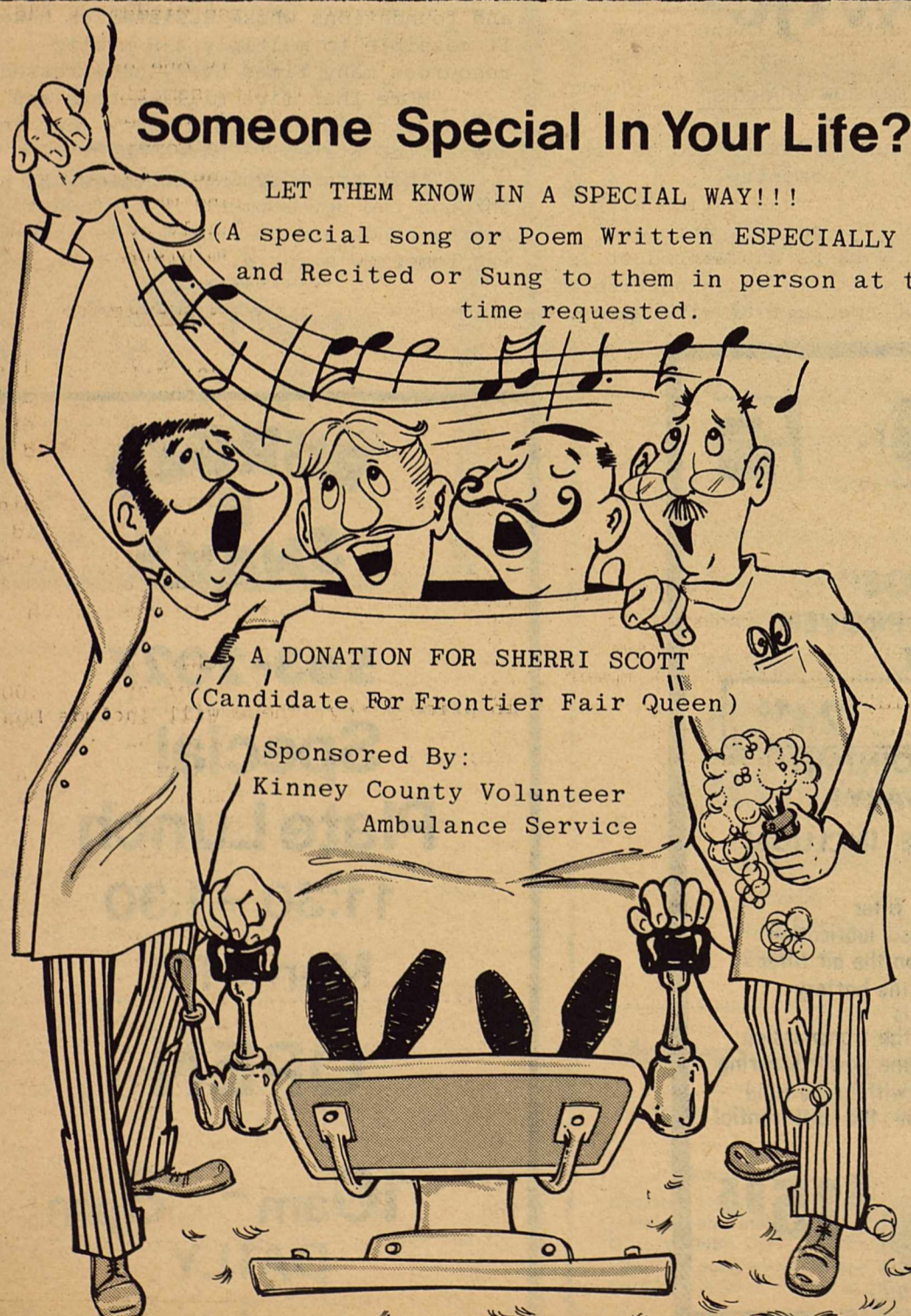

Kazen in Washington

President Reagan's budget message, sent to the Congress last week, deserves and will get through study. Reductions in federal spending, plus cuts in taxes, are the two essential elements in the administration's voluminous proposals that will require time to examine carefully.

I recognize that our nation has many problems, but I am not ready to say, as the President has, that our economy is "in the worst mess since the Great Depression," a condition due mainly to large government expenditures.

Our spendable income per capita after taxes and adjusting for inflation, has nearly doubled since 1961. Our health is better, so that life expectancy has increased from 70 to 74 years in the past two decades. Our national debt, alarmingly large, is lower in relation to the size of our economy, and the federal share of total debt in this country was 57 percent of our gross national product in 1960, while today it is 31 percent. More than three times as many young people are getting a higher education, and nearly four times as many minority youth are in college. The mortgage debt of our private sector was \$229 billion in 1961, when the national debt was \$293 billion. Now our national debt is \$950 billion, while the mortgage debt total has reached \$1.2 trillion.

WASTE MUST BE ELIMINATED

The picture is not good. Certainly we can do better. We must eliminate fraud and waste in government programs, but we ought to recognize that federal spending is only on inflation factor, and perhaps a less burdensome factor, than high energy costs and high interest rates.

I find many people may be over-eager for tax cuts, perhaps because they do not understand the Administration's proposals. Let me offer a simple table of what the President's program would do to a family of four, over a four-year period:

INCOME per Family	TAX CUTS
\$10,000	\$ 746
\$30,000	\$ 2,680
\$100,000	\$16,985

As this table shows, the family earning \$100,000 a year would get tax cuts 23 times those for a family earning \$10,000, though its income is only 10 times as great. The President's budget urges big cuts in unemployment insurance, food stamps, child nutrition, aid to families with dependent children, etc., while it would reduce taxes on the higher income brackets by nearly \$8 billion in the next four years.

SUPPLY SIDE DEFINED

The supply-side economic planners contend that as federal

spending is cut and taxes reduced, more money will flow into the private sector to create products and jobs that people want. The President's program means people will do without a lot of existing federal services, but he told people what he expected to do and he won the election so I believe he should be given the opportunity to test the methods he advocates. One might ask what happens if Administration plans do not work, but that is a future question. I predict that after the Congress has carefully studied the Administration plans, he will get a high percentage of his proposals approved.

ON DELEGATION TO MEXICO

In June, I shall be going to Mexico again for the U.S.-Mexico Interparliamentary Conference. Presidents Reagan and Lopez-Portillo have had one meeting, plan another next month, and have agreed that our nations should seek closer cooperation on the many items of mutual concern that will be on our agenda. I am pleased that Speaker "Tip" O'Neill has appointed me to serve on our delegation and has given me the opportunity to participate in discussions that are very vital to our country and particularly to South Texas.

This is the season of foundation building in the Congress, as we work on President Reagan's budget proposal. The legislative branch of the government has the constitutional responsibility of acting on those recommendations, so the emphasis in the House and Senate these days is on establishing priorities as our Committee consider where federal dollars are to be spent.

I want to share with you information obtained last week when General David Jones, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, appeared with the individual service chiefs to discuss the need for the Rapid Deployment Force, the military organization to be prepared for action anywhere in the world where our national interest may require a military response.

Appearing before our House Armed Services Committee, General Jones cited our national interest in Southwest Asia, principal area of concern for the Rapid Deployment Force, known as the RDF. The Soviets will dominate the area, essential to the world's oil supply and site of troublesome regional bitterness, if we lack power there, he said.

NATIONAL WILL ESSENTIAL

The United States' top-ranking military man told us that we must strengthen the confidence of Middle Eastern nations that we are able and willing to help them if they face Soviet aggression. We must build alliances in that region, with an essential factor the advance planning that pre-positions ships, men and equipment and provides prompt support if those advance units go into action.

Flexible and versatile forces are needed, he said, since we could be forced to fight on the coasts or inland deserts and mountains. General Jones explained that the variety of needs supports the Joint Chiefs'

view that the RDF should combine elements of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines, rather than seeking a single RDF organization.

COMMITTEE DECIDE

The RDF questions are typical of those being considered by Committees, which we in the House know as "little legislatures." Each focusses on certain areas of responsibility and makes recommendations to the whole House, based on the Committee members expertise and experience. The decisions are essential to planning federal activities.

Decisions are sometimes complicated. I often recall a discussion several years ago on funding the National Science Foundation. Congressman Tom Harkin of Iowa said he sometimes tells his audiences how the government had provided \$100,000 for a study of viruses in monkey kidney cells. The work by Dr. John Enders of Harvard University won him a Nobel prize, but no application of the new knowledge was found so the study went on a

shelf. Congressman Harkin said he found no one who thought the government had invested the \$100,000 well.

FOUNDATION FOR NEW STUDY

Several years later, another scientist, working in a different field, found the answers to perplexing problems in Dr. Enders' research. It helped him to solve his own dilemma so that Dr. Jonah Salk was able to produce the vaccine that saved millions of people from polio. Congressman Harkin said that when he provided this additional information to his audiences, all saw the wisdom of the monkey study.

The Salk vaccine is one example of how great benefits sometimes develop from unexpected sources. It also shows why our House Committees work so hard to examine priorities in budget planning, and why the Congress works so diligently over budget proposals from the Administration.

NEW YORK BULL RIDER IN SUPER BULL

Bobby DelVecchio, Bronx, N.Y. fulfills his ambition riding at the George Paul Memorial Super Bull. Bobby says, "Ever since I started rodeoing I've wanted to go to the George Paul Memorial Super Bull. It's as important as going to the National Finals for a bull rider, not just for the "Big Money," it's the prestige involved--just one of those things that will go down in the history books."

Along with DelVecchio, many nationalities will vie for over \$40,000 in prize money. These will include Donny Gay, seven times World Champion, Mark Longoria, a young Mexican man in his 4th year of pro rodeo, Bruce Dale, and Don Johansen, Canadian cowboys, and Charles Sampson, a young black cowboy from Los Angeles, California, who won the bull riding in Houston this year. Returning this year from Charleston, Ark., will be Denny Flynn,

winner of two out of three of the previous Super Bull Contests and 1975 winner of the World Series; also Kenny Wilcox, winner of the 1980 World Series and leading the PRCA bull riding at this time.

The top 40 bull riders are invited to the "gold mine" of bull riding. The bulls are carefully selected from over 400 of rodeos greatest

PUBLIC NOTICE OF TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE TO HOMEOWNERS

The Brackett Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additonal \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"DISABLED," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the cose of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did receive an application or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 563-2323.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at Ann Street--opposite corner south of the Post Office.

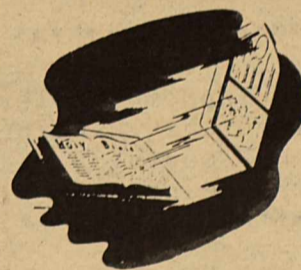

For only \$3.20, a Mailgram message allows 50 words (including sender's and receiver's name and address, salutation and close), and is transmitted electronically to a post office near the addressee for delivery with the next business day's mail.
