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### BVFD RECEIVES CHECK

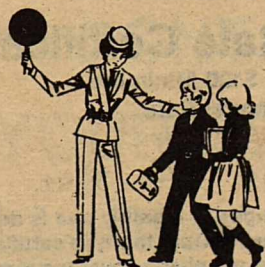
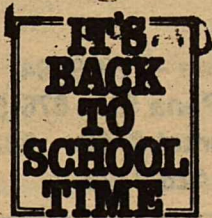

JUVENILES IN FEDERAL CASES NO LONGER EXEMPT FROM PUBLIC DISCLOSURE

A federal judge in Oklahoma has ruled that the press is not covered by a provision of the federal criminal code penalizing the public disclosure of the name or picture of any juvenile involved in a federal crime. On June 5 U.S. District Judge Thomas Brett ruled that the federal statute applied only to federal court personnel.

The ruling comes from a case in which Oklahoma City's two major newspapers were warned that if they printed the name of a juvenile being tried for murder in a federal court they might be held in contempt. The newspapers subsequently filed suit to declare the statute unconstitutional or inapplicable to the press. The Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press also filed an amicus brief with the court.

Another note on publishing names of 3 juvenile offenders: A circuit judge has dismissed a \$75,000 libel suit against the Lebanon (Tenn.) Democrat and said that the newspaper acted responsible in identifying a juvenile charged in the death of a cab driver.



### PELARGONIUM..... (Geraniaceae)

Pelargonium is the correct generic name for the small shrub commonly called geraniums. The pelargonium plants are popular as house plant are prized for either their attractive sometimes scented leaves or their striking flowers and most of them are hybrids. The following hybrids of P.domesticum are both attractive and generally available as well.  
P.d."Chrous Girl" has ruffled petals of an attractive lavender color almost cover in bright salmon spots.  
P.d."conspicuous" has showy flowers whose petals have deep red veins and are blotched with black  
P.d."Dawn" has flowers of an apricot color that is unusual for pelargoniums.  
P.d."Easter Greetings" has petals of cherry rose covered with orange-brown markings.  
Proper Care-- Light..Pelargoniums need at least four hours of direct sunlight in order to flourish and flower well.  
Temperature...Normal room temper-

atures are tolerable at most time Watering...Water moderately enough to make potting mixture moist through out each watering, allow only thetop 1/2 inch of the potting mixture to dry out. Feeding...apply standard liquid fertilizer.

## PUBLIC DRAWING FOR PERMITS

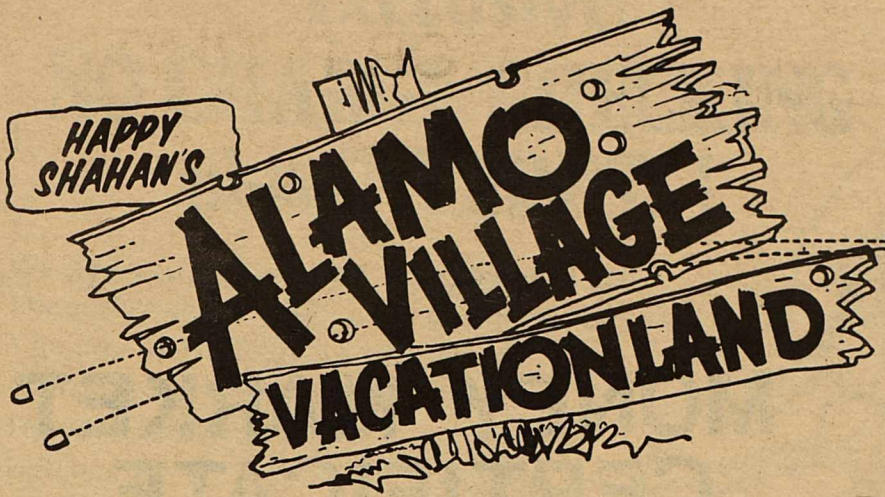

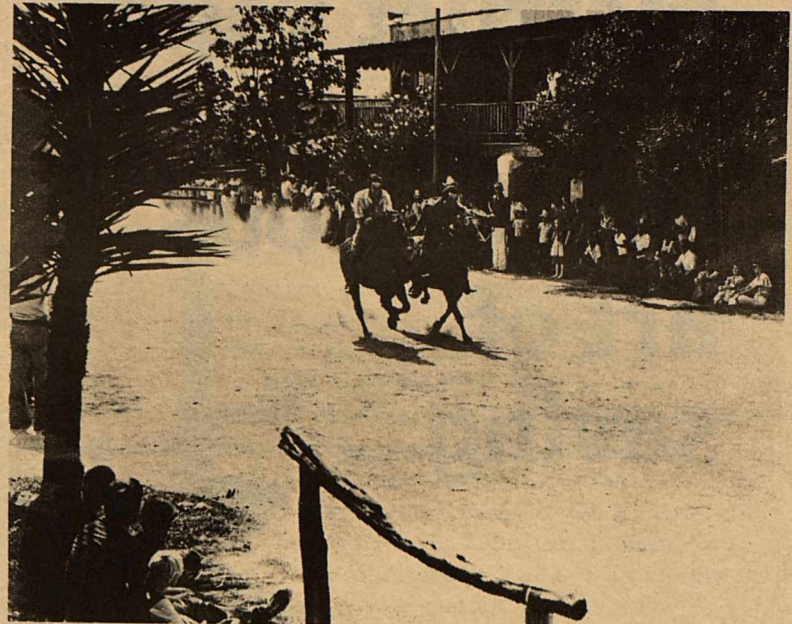

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### CHILD WELFARE WORKSHOP

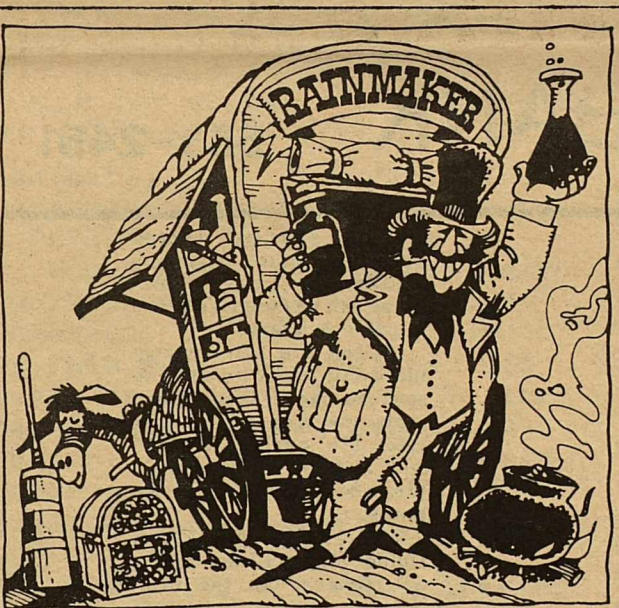
This past weekend, the Region IX Child Protection Council held a training planning workshop in Hondo, Texas. The Region IX Council co-ordinates and supports the efforts of County Child Welfare Boards in twenty-one counties in South Texas.

The workshop last week began Friday night with two informative sessions one on Child Abuse and Neglect and the other on the placement of Children when such action is required. The first session involved presentations by the Council Chairman, Rev. Bill Hughes of Atascosa County, and two cases workers for the Department of Human Resources in Medina County, Shauna White Huser, and Cathryn Langfeld. The second session on child placement featured Ms. Kathy Kidd who is the Placement Coordinator in San Antonio at the Region IX office.

A total of thirty-five attended the workshop and this included representatives from ten County Child Welfare Boards. Kinney County Child Welfare Board had two representatives and included Shandy Herman and Lucy Shipman

The session on Saturday morning revolved around plans for 1981-1982. Each county shared their successes from last year and together they assessed needs for the year ahead. The Region IX Council will seek to provide workshops to help train local workers and to help develop a preventive program in our county and throughout the whole region.

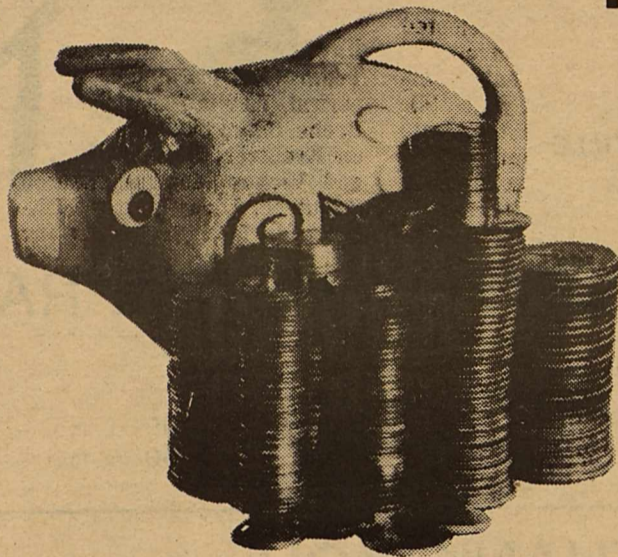

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation has announced a sign up deadline of August 31 on Wheat in Kinney County.

To participate in the USDA sponsored program, a farmer must make application by that date. Anyone with a share in the crop is eligible.

Applications and information about the program can be obtained from many local crop insurance agents or from the area FCIC office.

Purpose of FCIC is to protect a farmer's annual crop production expenses from unavoidable natural hazards like drouth, hail, frost, insects and disease.

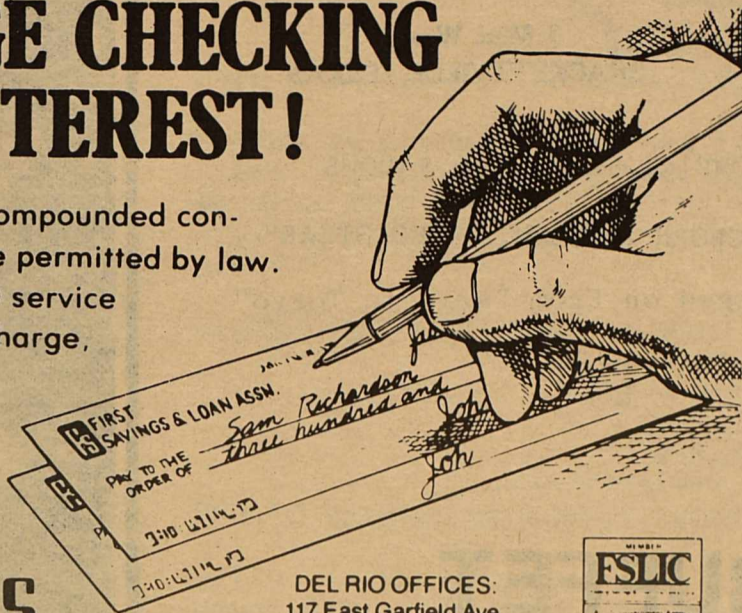

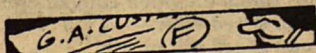

**ALL BRANDS AND MARKS ON TEXAS LIVESTOCK MUST BE RE-RECORDED**

Fort Worth--Texas livestock producers must re-record all brands and marks on their livestock with the county clerk's office in the counties where they raise livestock, beginning August 30, 1981, says Don C. King, secretary-general manager of Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The law provides for a six-month re-registration period. After Feb. 28, 1982, any unrecorded brand becomes available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The Texas brand law, passed in 1971, was the subject of a recent ruling by Texas Attorney General Mark

White that says owners of marks and brands must re-register them during the same six-month period every 10 years, without regard to when they originally recorded them. A small fee is charged for each re-recording by the county clerk.

The law also notes that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the county clerk in the county in which the livestock are held, King said.

The primary objective of the brand law is to provide the county clerks with an accurate, updated report of marks and brands every 10 years.

Producers operating in several counties must re-record their marks and brands in each county because the county clerk has the responsibility for recording this information in his or her county only.

In the event it cannot be determined from existing records who first recorded the mark and brand in a county, then the person who has been using such means of livestock identification the longest shall have the right to have them recorded in his or her name. There is no limit to the number of marks and/or brands a person can record in a county as long as the requirement of the law are met.

Minors may have marks and brands separate from that of the father, mother and guardian but they must also be re-recorded.

When the marks and brands are re-recorded or recorded for the first time, the location on the animal where the brand is applied must be shown. If the brand is applied to more than one location of the animal, it must be re-

corded as a separate record of that brand.

The county clerk of each county will publish a notice announcing the re-recording of livestock brands order in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days.

The county clerk also must make sure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location of the animal. This eliminates the chance of two or more people in the county duplicating the same brand and location. Further, the county clerk must make certain that the brand location on the animal be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$50.

King encouraged all livestock producers to use marks and brands and to re-register these marks and brands promptly.

"A properly applied, legally recorded brand is proof of ownership. It increases the chances of recovering stray, missing or stolen livestock and serves as a great deterrent to thefts as well," King said. "A good brand eliminates many markets and outlets where a theft may dispose of an animal."

The marks and brand information collected through the Texas county clerks and through brand inspection at livestock auction markets and terminals in the state on a weekly basis has proven invaluable in the recovery of stolen and strayed livestock, King said. In 1980, TSCRA field inspectors working with the TSCRA computer in Fort Worth and other state and local law enforcement agencies, recovered or accounted for livestock and ranch property with an estimated total market value of \$1.13 million.

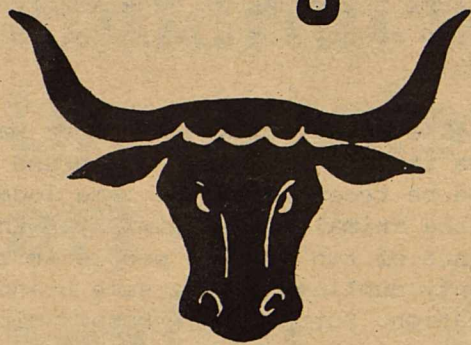

How high was your heating bill last month?

Heating bill!!! Here we are in the searing heat of a Texas August, and this boy is talking about heating bills! Doesn't sound like he's too tightly wrapped.

But wait a minute — while you're fanning yourself and putting your feet in ice water just trying to stay cool, the Reagan Administration is planning legislation in Washington that would raise your winter heating bills

and probably make your blood boil. The President's top men have recommended immediate price decontrol for natural gas. It's a move that would make the big oil and gas companies happy, but you'll be paying for their smiles, since it will double and possibly even triple your gas utility bills by 1985.

"Decontrol" has a nice ring to it, until you begin to examine what it costs, who pays for it, and who profits from it. It turns out to be just another chorus from the old song, "Them that's got is them that gets, and I ain't got nothing yet."

In Texas alone, it is estimated that decontrolled gas prices would cost household users nearly two billion dollars extra each year on our gas utility bills. But such a number is too big, too impersonal to grasp. Here's what it means to you: a typical

homeowner's annual bill for natural gas under current law is \$575, not exactly cheap — but under the President's proposal, that would rise next year to \$940.

And that's not the end of it by any means. In addition to this direct increase on our monthly gas bills, a rise in gas price also would radically inflate the cost of other things we buy. Most electricity in Texas is generated by natural gas, for example, and the White House plan would inflate that cost by \$40.3 billion over the next five years, and the electric companies are allowed to pass every dime of that increase directly through to you under the "fuel adjustment" section of your light bill.

Small businesses and merchants will see their gas costs rise by a billion a year, and industrial users will get an increase of about \$7 billion a year. Needless to say, practically all of this will be passed along to You-Know-Who in the form of higher prices for goods and services.

Well, yes, say the proponents of this price increase plan, but this is going to be good for Texas, since we are a natural gas producing state and decontrol means all those Texans with gas wells will be in high cotton. Hold it, say the opponents of the plan — we're all for helping any of the truly deserving little gas producers who might be financially strapped, but that's not what the President's bill does. Hiding behind the skirts of the little producers are the biggest companies in the world — half of the gas produced in Texas is in the hands of 10 big oil companies, including Exxon (which controls a fourth of all Texas natural gas), Gulf, Mobil, Phillips, and Shell, not exactly poor boys.

What do you say? Should we turn loose the utilities and oil companies to raise these gas prices, or should we hold the line? Make your opinion heard by writing directly to the President. He says he wants to hear from you — give him an earful. His address is: President Ronald Reagan/The White House/Washington, D.C./20500.

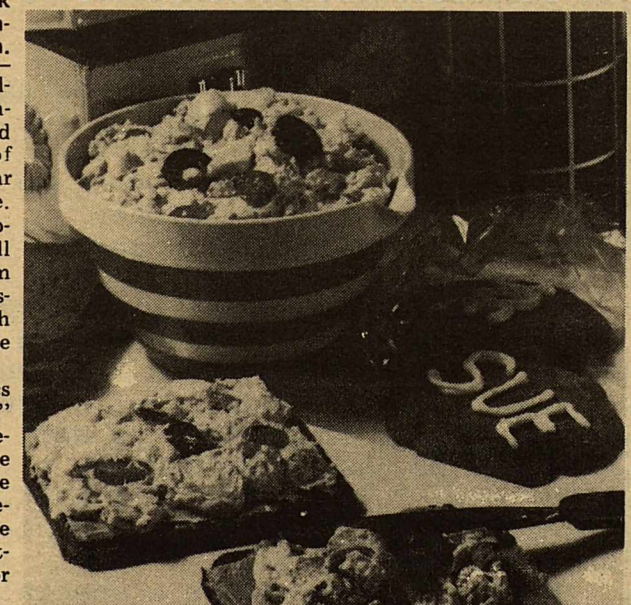

| 3 tablespoons chopped onion       | 1 can (28 ounces) whole tomatoes |
| 3 tablespoons Bisquick baking mix | 2 cups Bisquick baking mix       |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt                 | 2/3 cup shredded Cheddar cheese  |
| 1/4 teaspoon sugar                | 1/2 cup milk                     |

Heat margarine in 10-inch skillet over low heat until melted. Add onion; cook and stir until tender. Blend in 3 tablespoons baking mix. Mix in salt, sugar, pepper and tomatoes with liquid; break up tomatoes with fork. Heat to boiling; reduce heat.

Mix 2 cups baking mix, 2 teaspoons of the cheese and the milk until soft dough forms. Gently smooth dough into ball on floured cloth-covered board. Knead 8 to 10 times. Roll dough about 1/8 inch thick. Cut with floured 3-inch cutter. Place 1 tablespoon cheese on center of each round. Moisten edge with cold water; gather edge and pinch together to seal securely, forming a ball. Drop dumplings onto boiling tomato mixture. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. 6 to 8 servings.

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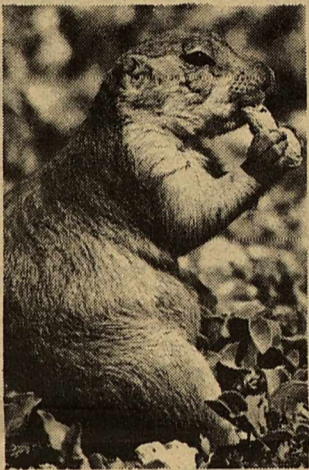
