EUCALYPTUS..... (Myrtaceae)

Species of the genus Eucalytus (gumtree, iron bark, or stringy bark) are fast-growing trees ans shrubs that make decorative foliage plants indoors, but only temporarily, since they grow very tall. Most have two distinctive types of foliage: Immature (juvenile) leaves, and mature ones, only the juvenile stage, when no flowers are produced, is normally reached in the home. PROPER CARE:

Light: Eucalyptus needs full sunlight in order to maintain good leaf color.

Temperature; These plants grow equally well in warm or cool rooms.

Watering: Water moderately enough to moisten the potting mixture. thoroughly. Allow the top third of the mixture to dry out between watering.

Feeding: Apply standard liquid fertilizer once every ten days. But only when plant is in active growth. *******

In accordance with a new federal law barring social security disability payments to convicted felons in prison, the administration has suspended disability benefits to about 2,400 prisoners since last October wihen the law

became effective and is taking action to halt checks to about 600 other disabled felons.

The law banning disability pay ments to felons in prisons allows the prisoners' spouses and children to continue getting their benefits. The prisoners' payments could resume once they are re-

This new law also bans benefits in three other situations where the felony occurs after October 19,1980.

*Students benefits while a prisoners,

*Disability benefits to individuals who became disable during the course of their crimes, and

*Disability benefits while a prisoner where the individual becomes disabled during imprisonment.

Unlike the disability payment that is banned because the felon is in prison, payments to the spouses and children are also banned in these situations.

Genoveva Duran, in the U.S. illegally, was arrested on August 25 after a sealed five count indictment was returned by a Federal Grand Jury, according to Miss Elvas F. Fuentes, Manager of the Eagle Pass Social Security Office.

Ms. Duran allegedly made false statements andpresented false identity documents to the Social Security Administration in order to qualify for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments as a low-income disabled U.S. citizen Miss Fuentes said. Miss Fuentes explained that SSI payments leased if they are still disabled. are intended for low-income U.S. citizens or aliens lawfully admitted for permanent residence. Recipients must be at least 65, or severly disabled, or blind. The program is financed with general tax revenues, not social security taxes, Miss Fuentes said.

Ms. Duran waivered her rights to a jury trial and will be tried by a U.S. Magistrate. If found guilty, she faces a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine, five year imprisonment, or both on each

Miss Fuentes empasized that the indictment is only a formal charge and does not constitute evidence or guilt. "The defendant is entitled to fair trial in which it will be the government's bur-******

Since the meeting of the Friends of the Library, the committee of inquiry appointed by Pres. Don Parks to look into the repeated edlays in the trial case, met determined to persue this cause and to deligently dig out the hidden reasons for the inefficiencies of the last four years from the inception of EDA grant for a new library building (12-23-77) through the ceasation of construction at the half way mark (9-17-78) to the present push by the "Friends" through fund raising and volunteer help in getting the building enclosed. The committee solicited the help of County Attorney, Tully Shahan, to build a case for conviction to go before the Grand Jury--and Tully agreed to do this.

At the Commissioner's Court meeting Monday the "Friends" were there in mass to support the library action. Charlie Ward Prsident of the Library Board, requested of the Commissioners the Mr. Shahan be appointed to research the case violations and Judge Postell was asked to set a date within the next 10 days for an open meeting when the attorneys in the case would be present to answer our questions -- and there are many -- Are the attorneys being paid on a continuing basis? If so can this be changed in name of ecpediency? Is a Criminal case being disgusted as a Civil offence, hence, being delayed perhaps indefinitely to protect

the guilty parties at our expense with the political philosophy, "you cratch my back and I will scratch yours?" Or is this just an exagerated example of delayed litigation that is so prevalent

in our courts today, and if so, is not this, in itself a crime upon the community by default?

The above mentioned meeting will be opened to the community; watch for the date to be announced and plan to be there with your questions. President Parks pledged the "Friends" help and support all the way.

According to Miss Fuentes, Manager of the Eagle Pass Social Security Office, Charlie Brister of 1409 Allendale Street in Shreveport was ordered to repay \$6,000 to the Social Security Administration as a contition of his five-year probation after receiving a suspended sentence for defrauding the agancy.

Brister pled guilty to federal charges of concelaing that he was working in order to continue social security and supplemental security income disability bene-

fits.

Social Security has stepped up its review of disability cases, and those who fail to report medical improvement of work abilities face fines, imprisonment and repayment of all amounts not due, Miss Fuentes said.

A Delaware, Oklahoma woman has pled guilty to federal charges of making false statements to the Social Security Administration and concealing information from

the agency. According to Miss Alvia F. Fuentes, Manager of the Eagle Pass Social Security Office, Carrie Stone Hyman admitted in the Tulsa U.S. District Court that she had willfully concealed her marriage and her husband's income in order to continue to receiving Supplemental Security Income payments.

payments are intended for lowincome individuals who are at least 65, or severly disabled or blind. The SSI program is financed with general tax revenue not social security taxes, Miss Fuentes said, and the payrment amount depends on how much other income is available to a person

The concern over high interest rates and a sluggish economy was the repeated theme of many conversations with South Texans during my travels around our District last month.

When I returned to Washington on recommendations. I was disturbed to learn that even the much-needed upgrading of our national defense may have the final decisions will tilt tohit the stumbling block of governward the suggestions of the OMB ment economists and to her arm-

chair experts.

With some programs already cut to the bone and others have become the primary target of some non-military budget plan-recent years. ners. Although much of the defense debate is being conducted behind closed doors, we understand that therehas been consider no opposition to my own belief and the Defense Department over a proposal to cut as much as \$50 billion from the five year defense increase.

Unfortuneately, this comes at a time when critical defense decisions must be made, making it difficult to determine whether the fates of important new weapons systems such as the MX Missile and the B-1 Bomber are hinged on military strategy or OMB economics.

One of the first negative effects of the Administration budafter receiving a suspended sen- get reconsiderations was to delay the Department of Defense Appropriations Bill for Fiscal Year 1982, which beins October 1. Obviously, the Appropriations Committee cannot draft a proper bill until military witnesses testify on military needs--and these witnesses cannot testify until the Defense Department has clearorder to recieve Social Security ed its program through the Administration.

> Defense Appropriations Subcommittee Chairman Joseph P. Addabbo recently explained why the bill is in limbo until the Administration acts: "At a time when we are being asked to cut back on many essential people programs, it would be extremely unwise to approriate money in Fiscal Year '1982 for defense programs which the Administration plans to cancel in Fiscal Year 1983 or 1984."

In the meantime, the Defense Department faces being left on dead center, funded under a continuing resolution at about the same pace as Fiscal Year 1981 until the Administration agrees

I had occasion last week to talk with Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger and he indicated ble disagreement between the OMB that our defense must be bolstered in critical areas. As I said to the Secretary, we must invest in recruiting a sufficient number of properly-trained personnel to operate our sophisticated weapons systems, we must provide the incentatives to keep our experienced people from leaving for private dindustry and we must spend more on operation and maintenance to keep our equipment working. there are not enough spare parts to keep our aircraft flying, for example, the problem must be corrected at once without applying first to the OMB.

I was pleased that Secretary Weinberger seemed in agreement and willing to do his part to put the muscle back in our defense

From my experience on the Armed Services committee, I believe that the majority of the Members of Congress recognize this need and will work with the administration in a long-range program. What we want, and what I believe the public demands, is an orderly program of defense progress based on the sound judgement of our military experts. Anything less, whether from the Office of Manage ment and Budget or elsewhere, is grounds for a fight.

Like most South Texans, I believe the cure for our economic problems is to balance the federal budget. Keep in mind that inflation and high interst rates affect not only our domestic economy, but our ational defense as well.

I am optimistic that this will be worked out, but in the meantime it is obvious to all of us that our national defense is too important to the security of the United States and to the free world
