TREASURER HARDING DISTRIBUTES \$25 MILLION COUNTY ROAD FUND

State Treasurer Warren G. Harding announced today that early next week \$25,770,675.15 will be distributed to the 254 Texas counties. These funds are the Lateral Road Fund administered by the State Treasurer's office as allocated by the sixty-seventh legislature.

The Kinney County allocation is \$39,635.48, and the funds will be used for the construction and improvement of county roads. The lateral road fund is comprised of monies derived from gasoline taxes collected at the pump. The county allocations are based on the county square mile area, the rural population, and the county lateral road mileage. Expenditures of the funds are reported by the counties to the State Treasurer.

Treasurer Harding stated that the distribution includes money appropriated for fiscal years 1980, 1981, and 1982, as well as interest earned on these funds. The 1982 funds are being distributed now rather than at the completion of the fiscal year.

SHEEP DOGS COMPETE FRIDAY IN DEL RIO

Del Rio--The Del Rio Sheep Dog Trials, a test of the nation's best sheep gathering canines, will be held Friday, October 23, at the Val Verde County Fairgrounds.

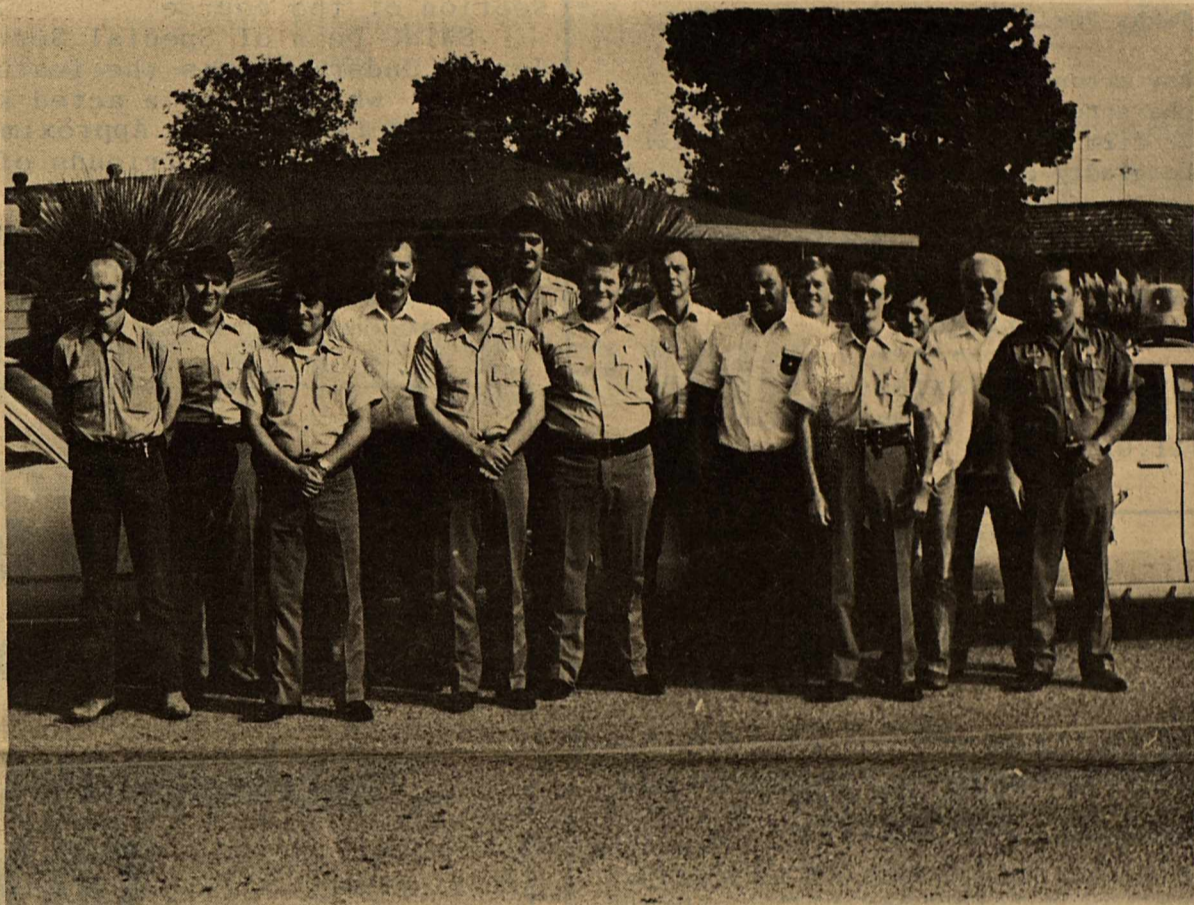
Trail eliminations begin at 8 a.m. and finals commence at 4 p.m., according to Val Verde County Extension Agent Rex Stultz.

Stultz said about 70 entries have been received from across Texas as well as Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Canada for the Class A trial competition which features \$1,000 added prize money.

Competition will be in three classes: ranch, open ranch and open class. Stultz said there is no deadline for dogs entering competition. A \$10 per dog entry fee will be charged.

"Anyone who has never seen sheep dogs work a herd of sheep is in for a real treat," said Stultz. "This is a real exciting spectator event."

The activity is being conducted by the Texas Sheep Dog Handlers Association with local sponsorship by the Val Verde 4-H Club.

Polanski's other film credits include "Tess", "Rosemary's Baby", "Repulsion" and "The Fearless Vampire Killers."

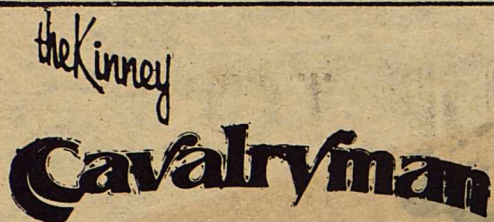

**LAW ENFORCEMENT
GRADS**

Nearly a full house of high ranking law enforcement officials and special guests watched the twelve most recent graduates of the Middle Rio Grande Law Enforcement Academy receive certificates last Friday, October 2, 1981, in the Tate Auditorium at Southwest Texas Junior College.

"This is the second class to graduate under the certification program that was extended from 240 hours of training to 320 hours," said Bill Madison, director of the academy. "These officers will greatly benefit from the extension, and I would really use 80 more hours to cover the many different aspects of the profession."

The Texas legislature and the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officers (TCLEO) changed the requirements from 240 to 320 hours, requiring extended instruction in criminal and accident investigation, penal code and code of criminal procedures.

Madison responded by meeting that stipulation and making some additions himself. Under the director's plan, students also receive instruction in law enforcement physical education, night firing, combat shooting and police combat procedures.

Graduates also receive instruction in the structure of government and the criminal justice system, general patrol procedures, motor vehicle laws, human relations, report writing, narcotics control, first aid and firearms care and use. Madison and guest instructors, particular

ly Department of Public Safety trooper Ken Stafford this session conduct the classes.

Special guests at the graduation were Chief Vance Chism, Lt. Howard Edwards and Detective Robert Hensarling of the Uvalde Police Department; Chief Norman Hooten of Brackettville; Sheriff Garza and Judge Ronald Carr of Zavala County; Lt. Andratti, Lt. Fleckenstein and Fire Chief Howard Bachman of Del Rio; DPS Trooper Leonard Vaughn; and Sheriff Roger Magee of LaSalle County.

SWTJC administrators present for the ceremony included President Wayne Matthews, President-elect Dr. Jimmy Goodson, Dean of Instruction Dardus Elrod and Chief of Security Frank Cimental who taught the physical education section of the course.

SWTJC Dean of Special Service Jerald Underwood was the featured speaker, while Madison acted as Master of Ceremonies. Approximately 75 relatives and friends of the graduates also attended.

Madison presented several awards and class president Tim Floss spoke for the graduates and their accomplishments.

Carson B. Wells of the Uvalde County Sheriff's Office received a trophy for finishing first in the academic competition. Roger E. Meister of the Zavala County Sheriff's Office was first in day shooting, and Keith D. Cox Sr. of the Uvalde County Sheriff's Office won the night firing contest.

Other graduates are Donald I. Nance, Jr., of the Brackettville Police Department; Arnaldo Ramos of the Del Rio Police Department; Robert C. Ynclan of the LaSalle County Sheriff's Office; Tim Foss of the Sabinal Police Department; Micheal A. Anderson, Carl Braker, Frankie Nayola, Jr. and Juan S. Ramirex of the Uvalde Police Department; Bryon B. Vick of the Val Verde County Sheriff's Office.

In a light moment during the ceremony, Madison ripped a piece of paper that was supposed to be Ynclan's diploma, giving the graduate a momentary shock and the audience an opportunity to laugh.

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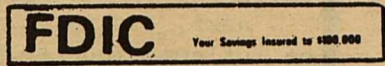

Open house in the recently renovated Will C. Miller Memorial Library and the Sterling H. Fly Sr. Memorial Building and an address by Texas State Senator W. E. Snelson will be the featured events at the dedication of the library, to be held at the building's entrance, on Friday, October 16th, at 10:15 a.m. at Southwest Texas Junior College.

Funds from the estate of Mr. Will C. Miller, a Houston businessman and Real County rancher, were willed to the college to use in improving facilities.

According to SWTJC President Wayne Matthews, Miller's association with the college originated as a result of his interest in Leakey High School students who raised show animal's in association with their Future Farmer's of America (FFA) organization.

"At an FFA show, Mr. Miller asked Otto Tanke, a former SWTJC board member, if the college would be interested in funds for a scholarship for students coming to SWTJC from Leakey," Matthews said. "Of course we were interested, and that began a long association between Mr. Miller and the college."

Matthews and Miller eventually became close friends, particularly when Miller permanently relocated to his ranch in Real County, but everyone was surprised when, after Miller's recent passing, it was discovered that a significant portion of his estate was left to the college.

Since a new building was not needed at the time of the reading of the will, the trustees of the Miller estate agreed that the money should be used to remodel and update SWTJC facilities.

The bequest was used to totally remodel the interior of the college library, subsequently named in Honor of Miller's generosity, to renovate the Richarz Administration Complex, to convert the Sterling H. Fly Sr. Friendship Center to the college business office and special service/upward bound division, to install sprinkling systems on the college ground to brace and brick the exterior of the Miller Building (mechanical programs center), and to brick the columns of several other buildings on the college campus.

The former friendship center was renamed the Sterling H. Fly, Sr. Memorial Building and was completely modernized inside and out. Mrs. Sterling H. Fly,

Parks reported that Charlie Ward is composing a second letter to be sent to those absentee landholders who need a second chance to contribute to the "Friends" Labor Fund.

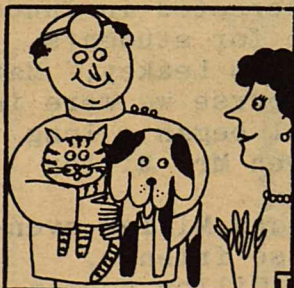

If you're feeling depressed, lonely or out-of-sorts, the answer to feeling good may be as simple as getting a pet.

Dr. Michael McCulloch, a Portland psychiatrist, recently surveyed 50 patients with various disorders and found that pets increase an ailing owner's sense of self-esteem, which may result in positive medical benefits.



Ninety-four percent of the patients said their pets made them laugh, helping them to overcome adversity. About 70 percent said the feelings of insecurity stemming from their illness tend-

ed to decrease in the presence of accepting pets.

But then, pets have been used in therapy for centuries. Even Sigmund Freud had a dog present in therapy sessions!

In a recent study of psychotherapists in New York State done by psychologist Dr. Boris Levinson, 51 percent had recommended pets to their clients for home use, and 39 percent reported familiarity with "pet-facilitated" therapy.

According to many researchers, the day may come when an increasing number of doctors prescribe pets instead of pills.

GIVE YOUR DOG A HOME HEALTH EXAMINATION

Many diseases that are threatening a dog's life, such as rabies, parvovirus and heartworm, occur more frequently in the warmer months. With warm days dwindling, pet-owners may believe that it's all right to stop worrying about the health of their family's canine friend. This is not wise.

"Many problems that are not readily apparent, but which could later affect the good health of your dog, can be prevented," said Dr. Ben Johnston, president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association.

Taking 10 minutes or so to give your pet a home health examination can be the best insurance to keeping him healthy, said Johnston.

First, stand back and look at your dog from head to tail. His coat should be shiny and there should be no indication of hair loss.

Next, look at his eyes for any sign of inflammation, soreness or growths. The eyes should be clear, showing no evidence of mucous build-up or matting.

Look into his mouth, paying particular attention to the lips, gums and teeth. The lips and gums should be pink and the teeth should be checked for odor or tartar--look for dark staining or mineral deposits on his teeth.

Next, look into your dog's ears. Are there any scratches, bruises or rashes? also pay attention if there is any odor from his ears.

Even though a dog's coat, is a protective covering, his skin should also be examined for growths, or external parasites such as fleas or ticks. In olders dogs especially, it is important to feel the skin for growths or small wart-like tumors.

Other items that should be considered in your dog's home health exam is whether or not he is eating regularly. Has there been any vomiting or any loss of appetite? Also check your pet's stool for any blood or diarrhea.

If you detect any problems or abnormality as you give your family's canine friend his home health examination, be sure to check with your veterinarian.

Your pet may indeed be healthy, but don't take a chance on it.

Pets, just like people, need regular annual check-ups; but if you know the warning signs to watch for in your dog, you can prevent possible complications that might threaten his well-being.

Remember that it's easier to prevent problems than to correct them, advises Johnston.

Exercise To Keep Fido Fit

Jogging dogs? Why not? Dogs need exercise as much as people.

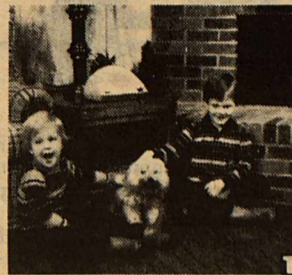

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NEWS OF TRAVEL

BLACK AMERICANS HELPED SHAPE THE NATION

Belatedly, yet proudly, our country has come to realize the important role of black Americans in our nation's history. This pride is especially evident in the state of Virginia—which today boasts native sons ranging from humanitarian Booker T. Washington to tennis superstar Arthur Ashe.

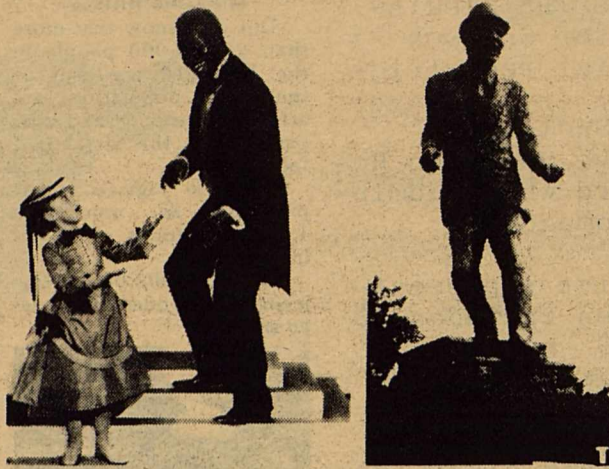
In northern Virginia, the Alexandria Society for the Preservation of Black Heritage has identified several important landmarks. In the course of a short walking tour, visitors can see the city's earliest black churches, the Alexandria slave pen, and a group of buildings designed by black architect George Seaton.

Black roots go deep in Richmond, the capital of the Commonwealth. Here many black lawyers, bankers, performers and educators got their start in Jackson Ward, the oldest black neighborhood in America. Today some Jackson Ward homes have been renovated, including the Maggie Walker House, now a National Historic Landmark.

Maggie Walker was prominent in the business and charitable activities of the Richmond black community at the turn of the century. A founder and guiding force in many organizations, she is believed to have been the first woman bank president in the United States. Her two-story, Victorian house has been preserved essentially as it was when she died, complete with all of its furnishings and many of her personal effects.

Not far away is Second Street, known as the Wall Street of Black America. Here you can see The Consolidated Bank and Trust Company, formed from four black-operated banks, including the one founded by Maggie Walker.

Downtown Richmond was

also the old neighborhood of "Bojangles" Bill Robinson, the legendary tap dancer. Today a handsome statue stands at the corner of Adams and Leigh Streets in his honor.

Yet another black Virginian—a slave named James Armistead—gained recognition as a valuable spy for the American forces under General Lafayette. Armistead was granted his freedom after the Revolution, and today his portrait hangs in Richmond's Valentine Museum.

Located in southeast Virginia is Hampton Institute, one of the earliest and most distinguished educational institutions for blacks in the United States. The school had its beginnings in 1868 on a farm where the Federal Government ran a hospital during the Civil War. The school's goal was to train selected young blacks "who should go out and teach and lead their people, first by example..." Booker T. Washington was a Hampton alumnus.

Interested visitors can tour Washington's birthplace, the Burroughs Planta-

tion, near Rocky Mount. Today the site consists of a Visitor Center, plus reconstructed slave cabin, blacksmith shed, and barns for tobacco and horses. Booker T. Washington lived here as a slave for 9 years and often referred to the experience in later life.

Black history is also much in evidence at Hampton's Fort Monroe. Here abolitionist Harriet Tubman served as a nurse. Here also General Butler issued his famous "contraband-of-war" dictum, which resulted in the liberation of thousands of blacks over a year before Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation. Then, in the summer of 1861, the first black men were enlisted in the Union Navy at Fort Monroe. Today a permanent exhibit on black history is on view in the fort's Casemate Museum.

Our National Heritage

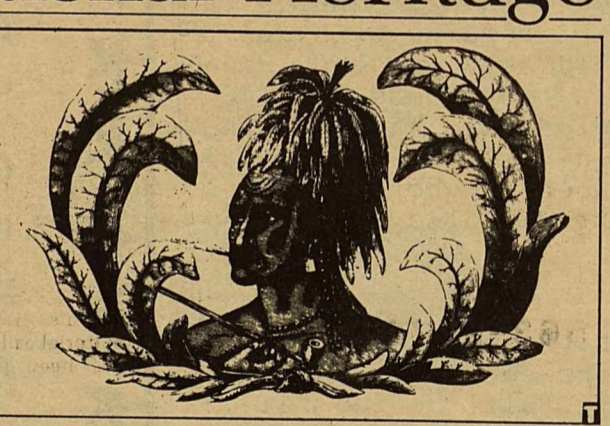
Americans smoke more cigarettes per adult than the people of any other country, yet if you're like most people you probably don't know very much about tobacco and the part it's played in American history.

The first Europeans to see tobacco were probably Columbus' sailors. In November, 1492, two of them reported to their captain that they had seen people in Cuba perfuming themselves with the smoke of fragrant leaves. The Indians lighted the leaves with glowing coals, held them to their mouths and then inhaled the smoke.

Spaniards established tobacco plants in the West Indies in the 16th century, and in the early 17th century tobacco helped keep colonists in what is now the United States, alive economically.

John Rolfe of Jamestown, Virginia, introduced tobacco as a commercial crop in 1612 and shipped some to England. The trade that grew up was vital to those early colonists.

Exporting tobacco is still an important part of our

economy today. Every year we send about \$2 billion worth of tobacco and tobacco products to other countries.

Increasing in popularity here in the U.S. are low tar cigarettes. Experts at cigarette manufacturing companies predict the present trend toward low tar cigarettes will continue to grow. One of the cigarette brands that reflects that trend is the one that's lowest in tar: Carlton Box with less than 0.01 mg. tar, 0.002 mg. nicotine. Many new brands

have been introduced as "ultra low tars," some too recently to be tested by the FTC. In the 17 most recent FTC reports, however, no cigarette has been reported to be lower in tar than Carlton. And today's Carlton is even lower than the version tested for the most recent government report.

From the first ancient Indians who liked the flavor of tobacco leaves, to the people who smoke over 650 billion cigarettes today, tobacco has been a part of American life.

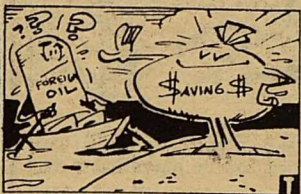

When sewage sludge is disposed of in any one of several conventional ways—dumped in waterways or buried in landfills—the taxpayer foots the bill. Tax dollars must pay for the fuel to run ships or trucks to the disposal site.

The city of Green Bay, Wisc., for example, recently was able to take the heat off the taxpayers—to the tune of more than \$200,000—by burning sludge to heat municipal buildings. That's how much they figure the cost of the 260,000 gallons of oil saved would have cost.

Valuable land, that could be earning tax dollars if developed for housing and industrial complexes, is being wasted as landfills which bring down the property value of surrounding areas. There is another solution. Proponents of incineration—such as Dorr-Oliver, Inc.—say that combustion in a fluid bed type incinerator is not only environmentally safe, but also uses the heat value of the sludge to burn and destroy—at 1500°F—all organic chemicals, harmful and otherwise. The hot gases are then used in a waste heat boiler to make steam, which can be used in a turbo-generator to produce electricity...and lessen our dependence on foreign oil, thus reducing municipal fuel bills.

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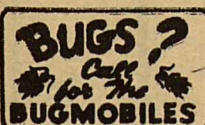

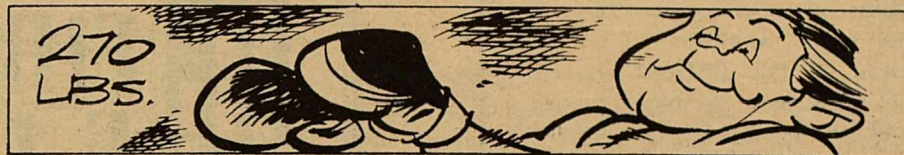

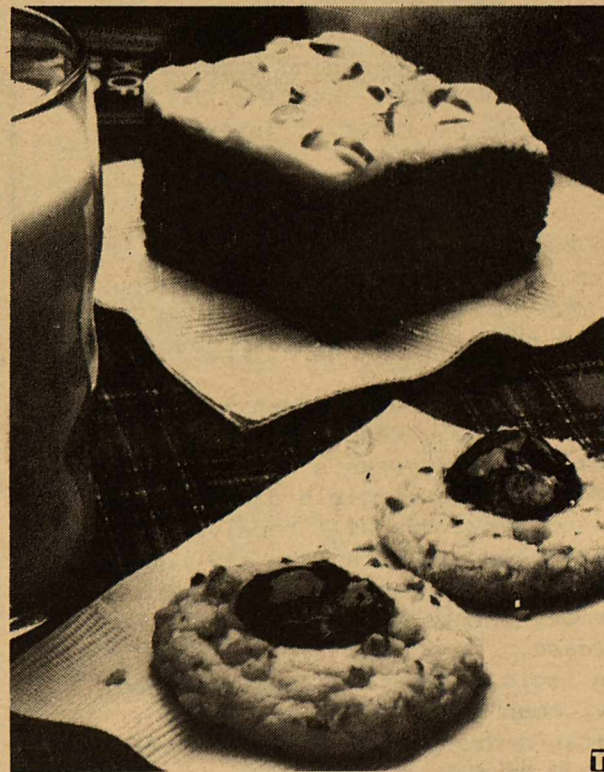

KAZEN

We were all saddened to learn of the death of President Anwar Sadat, of Egypt, the dedicated, steady force behind hopes for a lasting peace in the Mideast.

It had been my privilege to have met with President Sadat both in Cairo and in Washington and to have known him as a person and as a statesman. There is no doubt that the United States has lost a patient and understanding friend.

It is too early to speculate on the ramifications of the tragedy other than to say that the loss of such a key figure in international affairs will obviously bring changes. It is my hope that the strength and dedication of Anwar Sadat will serve as an example for all nations in the weeks and months ahead.

The shocking murder was a stunning blow to the people of Egypt, the United States and to all peace-loving people of the world.

Until the mid-70's, Egypt was tied closely with the Soviet Union. After Sadat became president, he expelled several thousand Soviet advisors and welcomed the first United States president into his country. President Sadat cooperated with U.S.-led peace initiatives and, in recent years, he was responsible for increased military cooperation between our two countries.

There have been many high-level visits between officials of the United States and Egypt since 1974 and we have taken common positions on a variety of world issues. President Sadat had been outspoken in his support for the Afghan rebels and supported anti-soviet forces in Somalia and factions opposed to the Libyan-backed government in Chad.

During his last visit to the United States, President Sadat expressed his concern over threats to Egypt's weaker neighbor, Sudan, from Libya under the leadership of Colonel Qaddafi.

A recent study by the Library of Congress reminded us that the prospects of another Arab-Israeli war are reduced any time Egypt is involved in peace negotiations because any combination of Arab forces excluding Egypt would be a disadvantage, shifting the balance of strength in favor of Israel.

VETERANS LEGISLATION

An estimated 2.3 million disabled veterans and 324,000 surviving spouses and dependents will benefit from legislation recently approved by Congress.

Representative G.V. (Sonny) Montgomery of Mississippi, Chairman of the House Committee on Veteran's Affairs, has informed me that eligible disabled veterans and survivors will receive a separate check covering the new rate retroactive to October 1, 1981, and the November checks will include the rate increase.

The legislation also increases the Servicemen's Group Insurance and Veteran's Group Life Insurance from \$20,000 to \$35,000, marking the first increase since 1974.

I have received calls from South Texas veterans requesting information about the new monthly disability rates. This chart gives an example of some of the increases:

Disability rating	Current Law	New Leg.
10 percent	\$ 54	\$ 58
30 percent	150	162
50 percent	291	328
80 percent	503	604
100 percent	1,016	1,130

The increases in disability payments was included in a package of legislation aimed at recognizing our debts to the men and women who have served in our armed forces. I believe that adequate benefits for these individuals deserve our highest priority, and I was pleased to support the legislation.

Tips For More Safety, Economy, Convenience

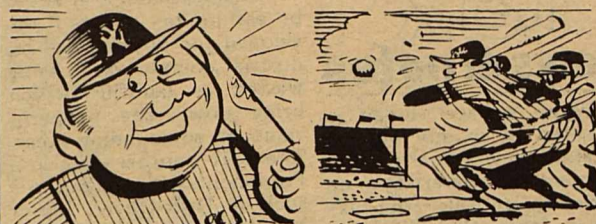
It happens to the most careful of drivers. You suddenly realize you've run out of gas. What to do? There are ways to squeeze a few extra miles out of that "empty" tank. Some suggestions on what to do in this emergency situation are offered in a new car care manual.

First, pull onto the shoulder or slow lane of a multi-lane highway and switch on your emergency flashers. Gently accelerate to 30 mph if you have an automatic

transmission, then shift into neutral and let the car coast until it slows to ten mph, then gently accelerate back to 30 mph. If you have a stick shift, coast downhill whenever possible, but do not let the car slow so much that you are forced to shift out of high gear.

If the road is clear of other traffic, wiggle the steering wheel to slosh extra fuel toward the pickup inside the fuel tank. Do not shut the engine off when coasting. It may be difficult to restart. 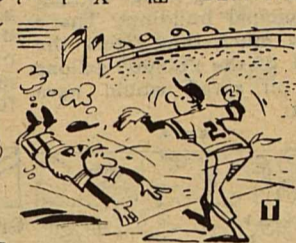

SECTION 2: That the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the polling place shall be the Homemaking Cottage, High School Campus, Brackettville, Texas. The persons hereby appointed to serve as officers of this election at said polling place are as follows:

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than two (2) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7 P.M.

EMMA SWAIN is hereby appointed the Clerk and ANNE ROSE as the Deputy Slerk for absentee voting for said election and the School Administration Office, Brackettville, Texas (Mailing address: P.O.Box 586, Brackettville, Texas 78832) in said District, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election, For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and Official State Holidays.

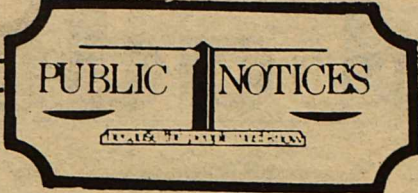

Want to buy a car in Arizona? Get ready. A few unlucky souls out there are paying as high as 45% interest on loans to buy an automobile because under their state law there is no ceiling on what banks and other lenders can charge the consumer in interest. Without a ceiling on interest rates, you are charged whatever interest the "market will bear," and that can sometimes be pretty high. Texas used to have an interest rate ceiling of 18% until the Legislature raised that ceiling to 24% during the last session. Even though the lenders' lobby assured lawmakers that interest rates wouldn't hit that limit, many banks in Houston are even now charging 24% for a car loan — and that's right there at the top. Sears and Montgomery Wards 1406. It's a pretty name for a pretty stark plan — no more interest rate ceilings period, any-

where. Under this proposed law, the federal government would preempt all state interest rate limits and throw out all state laws on interest-related fees and charges. This means that there would be no state imposed controls at all on what interest rates you could be charged for your loans — loans to buy a washing machine, to purchase a new car, or to make ends meet when there's a crisis in your family — in fact, there wouldn't be a limit at all to the interest the creditor could charge you. Banks say they need this law for the flexibility it provides, so that when their cost of money increases, they can pass it along to consumers by raising the interest rates they charge, thereby guaranteeing themselves a profit. Wait a minute, say opponents. The profit margin for large bank holding companies is already above the national median for most large businesses. How much profit do they want to make at our expense? But, say lenders, consumers suffer in state with low interest rates, because banks and other lenders refuse loans to local people if money can be loaned in

ENERGY SAVING WAYS

With RANGES

Using the surface units of a range can be a very energy-efficient way of preparing food. However, surface units can also be high energy wasters if proper utensils and cooking techniques are not used.

• Pots and pans should have flat bottoms to make the best contact with the surface unit. A warped, uneven-bottomed pan will waste energy.

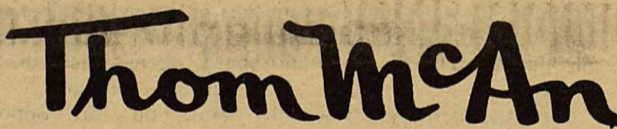
