Saturday afternoon, February 20, is the Annual Kinney County 4-H Food Show. Judging of this years participants will be in the Home Economics Cottage on the High School campus. The awards program will take place in the High School Gym. Judging begins at 12:30 P.M. 4-H'ers are being asked to arrive at noon for registration. The awards program which is open to the public will start at 2:00 p.m.

4-H'ers who have attended Foods and Nutrition project lessons this winter will be entering their favorite dishes. This year over 35 4-H'ers are enrolled in the project including several male chefs.

The food catagory names have changed slightly. They are Breads and Cereals; Fruits and Vegetables; Main Dish, and Nutritions Snacks and Desserts.

Judging is based on the actual food dish, the judges interview and project record scores. These project records are submitted ahead of time along with wopies of the 4-H'ers daily menu and recipe. The seniors this year are also submitting nutrient analysis forms. First place winners at the County level will travel to the District Food Show in March.

SELECTIVE SERVICE SYSTEM NEWS

The Selective Service System is continuing to make available 1981; those born in 1963 were scheduled to be registered during 1981. Men born in 1964 are requir ed to register within 30 days of thier 18th birthday. They may do so at any U.S. Post office.

On Jaunary 7, 1982, President Reagan announced his decision to continue peactime Selective Service Registration. In announcing his decision, the Presidnet declared a grace period during which late registration would be accept ed without penalty. That grace period extends through February 1982.

Anyone who was scheduled to register previously but has not yet done so is encouraged to register immediately at any U.S. Post Office in order to avoid any possible penalty.

The Lists cover registrations processed through September 30, 1981, and include men born in 1960.1961, 1962, 1963.


Local Board assignments are arranged by ZIP Code based upon the registrant's permanent address.


TRY AN AVACADO TREE!

Avacado trees make pretty house plants, and are an easy plant to establish. They are also a good bonus of guacamole salad! Save your avacado seed, wash well, and let it stand for

THE KINNEY CAVALRYMAN

When these two shoots are about 8 inches tall, prune again to force out 4 new shoots. Your avacado will develop into a fuller, bushier plant instead of being tall and leggy if this pruning is done.

Keep your avacado tree in bright light, and water it when the soil surface is dry.

a day or two before planting.

Sprouting your avacado is easy, and usually results are good. Insert 3 or 4 toothpicks around the middle of the seed. Insert broadend down into a water glass or jar, resting the seed on the toothpick to keep the top half of the seed out of the water. Fill with water, and add water as often as necessary to keep the base of the seed submerged.

A fat white taproot will soon emerge. After about 8 weeks, the seed will split and a young shoot will begin growing. Now it is time to pot the seed in soil. Pot carefully in a 6-8 inch pot.

To make a more attractive plant, prune the top shoot when the top of the plant is 6 to 6 inches tall. This will force out 2 shoots instead of one. If you are not now in a pension plan you may qualify for a 1981 IRA NOW. Up to \$1,500 — \$1,750 for spousal accounts.

RANGE BURNING WITH COPTERS DEMO SLATED

EAGLE PASS--Helicopters may soon be used to presecribe burn large acreages of South Texas rangeland.

This nw, inexpensive method employs the Helitorch, a large "Drip Torch" suspended beneath a helicopter which is controlled by the pilot and used to ignite a fire over a larger area than possible by ground methods in the same time frame.

Ranchers and others interested can see this safe, effective concept demonstrated Tuesday, February 16 at the Chittim Ranch, located 13 miles east of Eagle Pass on Highway 277. A 500-acre area will be burned during the





HARRISON VISITS BRACKETTVILLE



Sanderson Businessman/Rancher Dudley Harrison visited, Brackettville this past week to announce his candidacy for the Texas House of Representative The 52-year old grandson of one time Val Verde County Sheriff and Del Rio Mayor John Y. Long is seeking the seat that Representative Susan Gurley McBee plans to vacate.

"While I deeply regret Susan Gurley McBee's decision to retire from public office as our state re-

presentative (she's done such a fantastic job)," Harrison said,"at the same time, I recognize the need for us to have a continuing strong voice in Austin. And I feel there is a definite need atothis time for a business person in Austin."

The son of the lare Wilma Long Harrison and former Del Rioan John D. Harrison, he was born and raised in Terrell Couunty; graduated from Sanderson High School; and attended Sul Ross State University and Texas Tech University.

After four years with the U.S. Postal Service, in 1957 he went into business, operating Dudley's Texaco Service Station as dealer and later consignee and distributor until the business was sold in 1979.

Harrison is owner/operator of the Dudley Motors Ford-Mercury dealer ship in Sanderson; is engaged in the livestock business with his father and his brother, James D. Harrison of Euless, and is part owner of Rio Grande oil and gas distributors.

He served as a trustee for the Terrell County Independent School District for six years, and recently resigned the job of chairman of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Committee to run for the House.

Harrison is currently liaison officer for the Sanderson Canyon Watershed Project; secretary of the Pecos River Soil and Water Conservation District; secretary-treasurer of the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department; director of Sanderson State Bank; a deacon in the First Presbyterian Church; director from the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association; member of Terrell County Appraisal District Review Board and the board of equalization and has served two years as Democratic chairman of his precinct.

He and his wife, the former Doris lee Cooke of Sanderson, have four children. The youngest, Amy, is a student in Angelo State University.

demostration. A discussion of the equipment, firelande, construction, burn prescription and related topics begins at 9 a.m. The demostration should be concluded by 1 p.m.

Many ranchers in South Texas are increasingly interested in using prescribed burning to manage rangelands for livestock and wildlife production As ranchers attempt to use prescribed fire on larger acres, the difficulty of conducting the burn increases especially since desirable prescribed weather conditions are not frequently and many pastures have improper amount of fuel.

According to Dr. Larry White, Texas Agricultural Extension Service range specialist from Uvalde, a gelgas mixture of gasoline and thickener (alum-gel) which is used by the Helitorch gives the necessary consistency to operate effectively as an ignition source in brush without danger to operating personnel.

"The area ignited is controlled by direction, speed and altitude of the helicopter," explains White. "Prescribed burns utilizing the Helitorch employ prescriptions and firelane construction similar to conventional methods. However, patchy fuels can be ignited more effectively, and large acreages can be burned within a shorter time period compared to broadcast burning from ground equipment."

White notes that the Helitorch will also be used to burn a 5,000 acre pasture north of the demonstration site later this month when proper burn prescription conditions are met.

I have received disturbing, although hardy surprising, evidence that the combination of high interst rates and a weakened economy is threatening the stability of the nation's small business community.


The House Committee on Small Business has warned in a recent report that if economic conditions do not improve, we will see a record number of small businesses going bankrupt this year.

Small business is the economic backbone of our country--the firms we depend upon for most of our goods and services, our friends and neighbors in our own hometowns. According to the Committee, business bankruptcy filings in 1981 were the highest since World War II, as more than 47,000 filed their papers an over 17,000 actually closed their doors.

The one year percentage increase in business failures from 1980 to 1981 was exceeded only during the recession of 1921, the Committee warned.

INCOME DOWN

Sole proprietorship business and professional income is extimated down 11.6 percent this year from 1979, while farm proprietorship income is estimated down a full 46 percent over the same period. Literally thousands of small builders, who dominated the home construction industry, have colsed down during the longest-running housing slump since the Great Depression. Housing starts last year alone were down 45 percent from 1978.



nation has since the new proposed budget and deficit figures were made public, I ran across an interesting expenditure the other day. Last year, the United States spent nearly \$80 billion for foreign Oil--that's about \$400 for every man, woman and child in the country.

Here is something else to think about: The Congressional Budget Office has estimated that the loss of Saudi Arabian oil for one year would cost the U.S. \$272 billion, while increasing unemployment by 2 percent and raising inflation by 20 percent.

I mention these figures because we have a tendency to forget about problems if they appear to go away or if we are distracted, as we are now with budget cuts, transfers of programs and

philosophical debates.

A few years ago--while motorists sweated in long lines to but a few gallons of gasoline--the energy crisis was at or near the top if any list of public concerns. It is to our credit that the combination of incentives and conservation, coupled with a bit of good fortune, we have managed to eliminate the gas lines to the point that we are concentrating on other problems but this is not the year to ignore domestic energy production.

The energy crisis is still with us, just below the surface, and we must keep that in mind as we wrestle with the problems of the modern world. We must continue to support and encourage domestic exploration and production, conservation and realistic alternatives fuels if we are to achieve energy inde-. pendence and afford the luxury of concentrating on other pressing issues. From time to time, Speaker O'Neall asks me to chair proceedings of the House during his absence from the chamber, but rarely have I been m ore pleased and honored than I was last week.

government and its' crack, anti-terrorist police forces for the rescue operation, which was accomplished without casualties.

LESSONS LEARNED

Gen. Dozier, a keen observer as well as a brave, disciplined officer, has provided valuable information on the terrorists' organization and mode of operation--vital weapons which have damaged and hopefully will cripple the Red Brigade. In addition, the raid which rescued the General also netted some 20 carloads of documents and a number of terrorists themselves.

We now know--and the terrorists now know that the Red Brigade and similar criminal groups around the world are far from invincible. We are also reminded of the sacrifices and hardships that are always just below the surface for those who serve our country, and how these hardships are met by Americans.

HOMECOMING

It was typical of the spit and polish military professional that one of Gen. Dozier's first acts as a free man was to get himself a shave and a close-cropped haircut. He arrived in Washington the same day I presided over the House conderation of the the resolution, and I was inspired by his remarks thanking family and friends when he arrived at Andrews Air Force Base.

"I can assure you that if you've been on the receiving end of prayer, you know it," he said. "So I'd like to thank all of you who were on the praying end of prayer."

In 1978, the prime interest rate averaged 9.1 percent, with inflation at 7.3 percent--but those were the good old days. Last year, the prime rate averaged 18.9 percent with inflation at 9.2 percent.

ENERGY UPDATE

I had the privilege of being the Speaker Pro Tempore during debate over a concurrent resolution expressing the sense of theCongress regarding the successful rescue of Brig. Gen. James L. Dozier from Italian terrorists.

All Americans were shocked and saddened by the kidnapping of Gen. Dozier on December 17 and, frankly, few of us were confident that he would survive his ordeal at the hands of the Red Brigade.

The solution, which was approved by the House, congratulated the Italian

TAX ON INTEREST

I have cosponsored a resolution of opposition to a proposal by the Administrtation to initiate a 5 percent withholding tax on interst and dividend income. The House rejected the same proposal by an overwhelming vote of 401

to 4 in 1980--when the Carter Administration proposed it -- and it is time to remind the Executive Branch of the problems it would cause.

Just this past year Congress approved several important changes in the federal tax code to encourage personal savings because of the importance of additional savings funds to our economy




