THE UNSUNG-UNPAID HEROES OF OUR COMMUNITY---THAT PAY TO SERVE YOU!!

It was a dark, cold night a couple of weeks ago, when an apparent head on collision occurred on Highway 90, 3 miles

west of Brackettville, in front of the Longhorn Restaruant. The re-sounding crash terrified me and several of the other patrons of the Longhorn.

The concern group that were there rushed out to find that four people were injured. Several in the group immediately started warning approaching traffic with their flashlights, while empolyees of the Longhorn secured blankets. I immediately called the Sheriff's Department to inform them that we needed the ambulance, a wrecker, and Law enforcement.

As I hung up the phone, I glanced at my watch. Within one minute, a member of the Kinney County Volunteer Ambulance crew who was returning from Del Rio in her private car, stopped to render aid! FIVE MINUTES AND FIFTEEN SECONDS AFTER I PLACED THE CALL TO THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE THAT AMBULANCE ARRIVED! NOT NLY THAT TWO MINUTES BEFORE THAT, TWO OF THE AMBULANCE CREW MEMBERS ARRIVED IN THEIR PRIVATE CARS! Yet I heard domments from bystanders such as , "Where is that damn ambulance it has been over a half hour."

Considering that the crew to be contacted, drive to the ambulance, and drive at least 3 miles to the scene, I doubt if many paid professional groups could have done this well. People in a panic and that have concern for the victims in a situation like this have a tendency to lose track of realistic time. I have witnessed three seperate incidents that our ambulance

crew have been accused of taking forever--in ALL three cases THEY WERE VERY PROMPT--THAT'S WHY I TIMED THIS ONE!

One other situation that was common to the three previous emergencies--WELL MEANING BY-STANDERS INTERFERED WITH THE TRAINED MEDICAL PERSONNEL BY BEING IN THE WAY--IF YOUR ASSISTANCE IS NEEDED THE CREW WILL ASK FOR YOUR HELP--IF THEY DO NOT--BACK OFF AND LET THEM DO THE JOB THEY ARE WELL TRAINED FOR!

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OUR AMBULANCE SERVICE

Shortly after Judy and I started the CAVALRYMAN (about 8 years ago), we noted that Barckett did not have an ambulance (much less a doctor).

We found there was an ambulance parked behind the clinic Dirty, With Four Flat Tires. The Clinic was not in operation at that time. We ran several stories with front page pictures of the "por Ole Ambulance" on the front page.

This stirred several of our Clinic minded citizens into trying to get the old Cadillac ambulance back in service. When these "workers started checking" reportedly one high County Official had made an agreement to sell the "ole Ambulance" for \$75.00 even though it did not belong to him! Well, no paper work had transpired, (fortunately for him and the community). Volunteers pumped up the tires, made repairs and got the "Poor ole Ambulance" in operation! Volunteers began training and

Kinney County had an ambulance.

The big break came when Nat Mendelsohn of North American Towns of Texas (Fort Clark) donated the money to purchase our present moder ambulance.

YOUR AMBULANCE CREW

At the present time the Kinney County Volunteer Ambulance Crew consists of fifteen trained and certified members.

Rose Mary Slubar and Kay Smith are both certified Emergency Medical Technicians with Special Skills Certification. BOTH OF THESE VOLUNTEERS WILL BE CERTIFIED AS FULL PARAMEDICS WITHIN THE NEXT 30 DAYS!!

Certified Emergency Medical Technicians are: Rosa Baker, Doreen Tollett, Delia Longoria, James Bitter, Theresa Hargis, Janet Seargeant, and David Sprott
Emergency Care Attendants: are: Louis Starzel, Sandy Herman Darrell Paul Franks, Sherri Scott, Smiley Goodloe and Norma Perez.

Some of the Courses to qualify for these ratings approach \$400.00, plus lodging and transportation. These costs have either been paid for by the individuals, money that the organization has raised thru fund raising drives or by donations!

WHO SUPPORT YOUR AMBULANCE

The City of Brackettville supplies absolutely no financial support to the operation of the ambulance. Kinney County really digs deep and supports it to the enormous sum of \$1,000.00 per year. Approximately 50% of the people pay the \$40.00 fee for a run to Del Rio, Eagle Pass, or Uvalde. These fees go to the county who applies them to operation expenses. These VOLUNTEERS ANSWER APPROXIMATELY 30 CALLS PER MONTH! IN REALLY YOUR AMBULANCE CREW SUPPORTS YOUR AMBULANCE!

WHAT DOES THE FUTURE HOLD?

The present ambulance is a 1975 model and will certainly have to be replaced in the near future. The cost in 1975 was somewhere in the neighborhood of \$15,000, I am sure it will be much more in the future. Our County "Dads" have not seen fit to even consider this in their budget planning!

What really bothers me is that so much citizen apathy regarding this service that I know has saved a number of lives in the past few short years. I guess it is one of those services that nobody gives a damn about until they or one of their loved ones need it!

I believe that sometimes people tend to get their values a little mixed up. Our county Library is a wonderful worthwhile project. I have supported it for many years from knocking on doors for donations to donating several hundred dollars of advertising on their fund raising drives. The community needs the service that they supply. They now have a paid Librarian. THERE IS NOT ONE PAID MEMBER ON OUR AMBULANCE CREW THAT IS ON DUTY 24 HOURS A DAY, SEVEN DAYS A WEEK!

As I said, the County Library is a great institution and I am all for it, new building and all.

Well I have seen the Commissioners' Court packed with not even standing room of people pressuring the Commissioners on the Library (and they got their way). I certainly have not seen any such support for our life saving ambulance.

OH WELL, NEXT TIME ONE OF YOU OR YOURS HAS A HEART ATTACK OR A BROKEN LEG--RUN DOWN AND CHECK OUT A BOOK ON FIRST AID!!

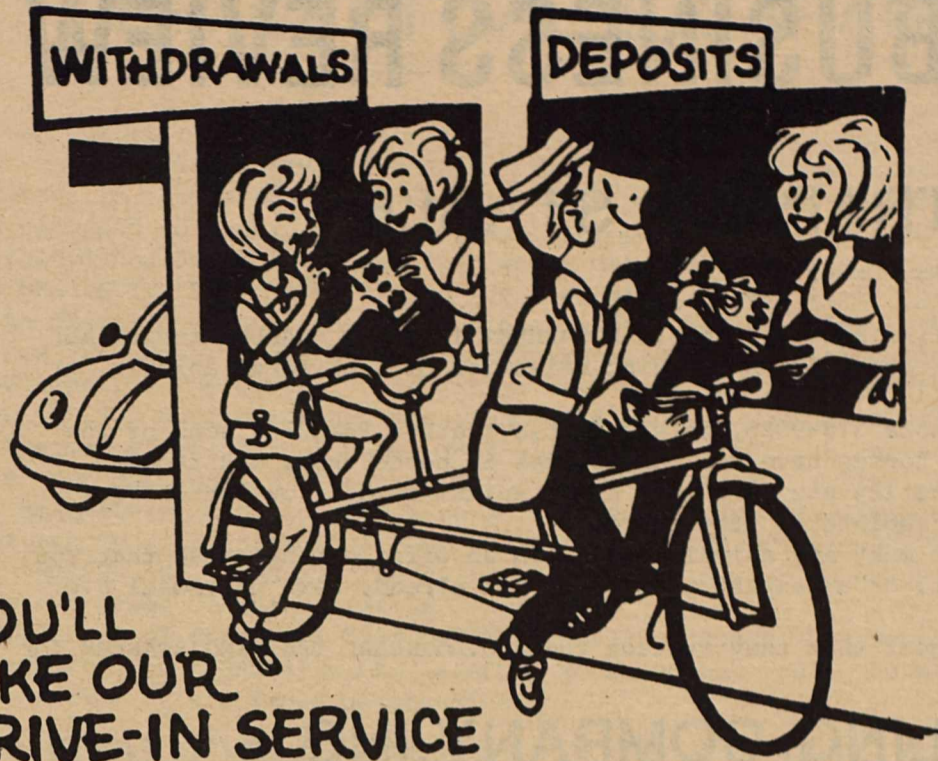
(EDITOR'S REPLY:)

Pork breakfast strips with creamed eggs on corn bread squares, fruit and a beverage make a colorful, flavorful, satisfying brunch menu that is nutritious, too.

BRUNCH SPECIAL

Yield: 4 to 6 servings
 12-ounce package Sizzlean
 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
 1/3 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt

3 cups milk
 1/2 cup sliced celery
 3 tablespoons chopped pimiento
 1/2 cup pitted sliced black olives
 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
 4 hard-cooked eggs, quartered
 Corn bread, cut into squares

Cook Sizzlean according to package directions. Drain. Melt butter in a saucepan; blend in flour and salt. Add milk slowly. Cook and stir until thickened. Add celery, pimiento, olives and mustard. Blend well. Heat 10 minutes. Arrange eggs on corn bread. Spoon cream sauce over all. Serve hot with Sizzlean.

KAZEN IN WASHINGTON

There is evidence that growing concern over record budget deficits may result in a much-needed alternative plan for our economic future.

The White House in recent weeks has at least agreed to take a look at an alternative budget designed to reduce the overwhelming deficit projections for 1982, 1983 and 1984.

I for one appreciate this attitude. I was alarmed, disappointed and surprised when the Administration came out with a proposed budget with a projected deficit in 1983 of at least \$91.5 billion and probably much higher. The President's own position was made clear before he took office, so we would only conclude that someone less dedicated than the President to moving toward a balanced budget had won a major victory which would bring more problems to our economy.

By opening the door to compromise on the budget, the Administration and Congress may be able to cut the deficit projections and decrease the role of the federal government as the dominant figure in the money-borrowing market in competition with small businesses, prospective home-buyers and consumers who are squeezed in the grip of high-interest rates.

ALTERNATIVES

Large deficits, interest rates and unemployment feed on each other. High deficits lead to increased interest rates, which create more unemployment and drive the deficit higher. This will not end simply because we want it to--or because David Stockman of the Office of Management and Budget says it will. We must act together and we must act now.

Alternative recommendations are coming from a wide variety of public and private points of view, from representatives of all political stripes. Those of us who recognize how close we are to a much worse economic situation--with the possibility of even higher interest rates and more unemployment--intend to examine all of these

alternatives, as I believe the Administration must.

We should begin by closing tax loop holes which benefit the multinational corporations at the expense of the smaller businesses and individual taxpayers. And as I have said before we must do away with the ability of these corporate giants to buy and sell tax credits under a new scheme to avoid paying their fair share of taxes.

INTEREST AND UNEMPLOYMENT

here are other proposals in circulation and I do not suggest that we should accept them without a thorough examination of all ramifications. To give you an idea, it has been suggested that one way to lower interest rates might be to place a very high tax on all interest received above 15 percent on any loan, or exempt from taxes the income on the first three percent of a loan with terms less than 10 percent.

Because much of the American economy revolves around homebuilding and the automobile industry, both of which are crippled under current conditions, we must consider ways to decrease unemployment in these vital areas.

Majority Leader Jim Wright of Fort Worth believes we should consider market incentives, possibly giving a tax credit to the purchaser of an energy-efficient American-made automobile or a new home this year. He says that in the case of incentives to purchase automobiles, studies show that the tax loss would almost be made up in one year through taxes paid by employed workers, corporations and dealers and by the savings in unemployment compensation.

I am also concerned about Administration proposals to cut various programs of federal assistance--including Medicare and Medi-caid--which would have far-reaching effects on our people, their medical care and the education of our youngsters. I am hopeful that some plan will be found to offset the need for many of these reductions.

The point is that there are alternatives--good and bad--and it is to the credit of our system of government that we can look at them together in an open forum. We seem to be headed that way--and it is none too soon.

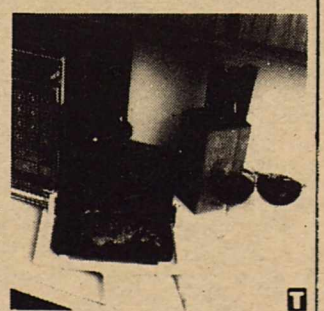

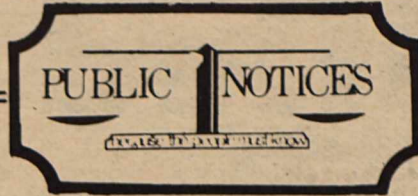
