#### COUNCIL SUSPENDS CPL RATE HIKE

At the regular monthly meeting of the Brackettville City Council, the highlights of the Council decisions included a public hearing on the CPL Rate increase for the City of Brackettville which amounted to adjusted revenue of an increase of \$93,664.00.

Four course of action were available to the City, i.e. Denial Approval, Suspended for 120 days

while other action is taken or defer the decision to the public utilities commission. The Council decided to fight the rate increase for 120 days and join other cities in region 5 and 7 stretching from Eagle Pass to Sinton, Texas, in cooperative effort to challenge the request and present a combined regional cooperative intervention to the public Utility Commission.

Considerations presented to the Council were the fact that the projected requested raise of \$93,664.00 is 130% of the annual City's Ad Valorum tax revenue. The closing of the local office and ultimate subjugation of the will of people in regard to timely service and

support was discussed and considered in the ultimate decision

COUNCIL ACCEPTS RESIGNATION OF ROBERT GARZA AND APPOINTS MR. DON WOODSON TO SERVE AS COUNCIL MEMBER FOR UNEXPIRED TERM.

One of the first official acts of the newly elected Mayor and City Council was to accept the resignation of Robert Garza from the Council to clear the way for his appointment as the City Lawyer for the City of Del Rio. Upon receipt of nominations from the Council members, the Mayor called for a vote and Mr. Don Woodson, a local businessman, was appointed to fill the unexpired term until the next City general election, the first Saturday in April, 1983. Mr. Woodson will join the council at the next regular scheduled meeting of the Council on Monday 10 May 1982.

### FORT CLARK HISTORICAL TOUR OF OPEN HOUSES

There will be five open  
houses on the Fort Clark Historical  
District tour April 18th  
from 1 pm to 4 pm. Tickets are  
available for \$2 each with a  
map, at the Adult Center and  
the Screendoor in Brackettville.

These homeowners have  
graciously agreed to open their  
homes for this occasion:

1) Luigi and Maria Cursio  
who's home is across from the  
museum and was originally the  
Supply Building. this is the  
only building that has keystone  
arches in all windows.

2) Edna Black home was one  
of the Enlisted Men's Barracks  
and still has an insignia on the  
wall "E Pluribus unum" with the  
Eagle-Olive Branch and arrows  
with 13 stars. Ask her about Capt.  
Lee McNelly.

3) Walter and Margie Moore  
home was also an Enlisted Men's  
Barracks and housed Troop "E"  
of the 5th Cavalry. It's interest-  
ing to see how differently the  
two similar buildings have been  
finished.

4) Hobart Key home was a  
Commissioned Officer's Quarters  
and is a typical example of the  
two stories buildings around the  
quadrangle that housed the Com-  
missioned Officers.

5) Dr. Moore's place,  
known as the Wainwright House will  
be open unfurnished. Brig. Gen.  
Matthew Wainwright was stationed  
at Fort Clark prior to WWII and  
sometimes reviewed his troops  
with coffee in hand from his  
front porch.

In 1862 Brevet Brig. Gen.  
R.S. MacKenzie came to Fort Clark.

From this year until 1882 the  
Fort went through its most sign-  
ificant period of growth. All  
of the buildings being shown  
his year were built by the  
enlisted men sometimes super-  
vised by skilled workmen and  
were circa 1870.

The Summer Accident season  
is nearing and the south Texas  
areas needs vase reserves of  
blood to fill the needs of the  
hospitals in our area. At present

the Del Rio area replaces only  
11% of the blood it uses. We  
use a total of 22% per year.

Donations may be given as  
a gift in another's name, cover-  
ing only that person for one  
years' blood needs at reduced  
cost. There are certain exclu-  
sions. Donations made in the  
donor's name entitles the  
donor and immediate family to  
one year's coverage of blood  
needs at reduced cost.

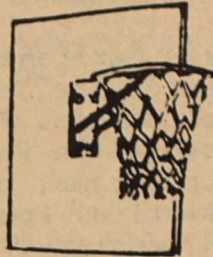
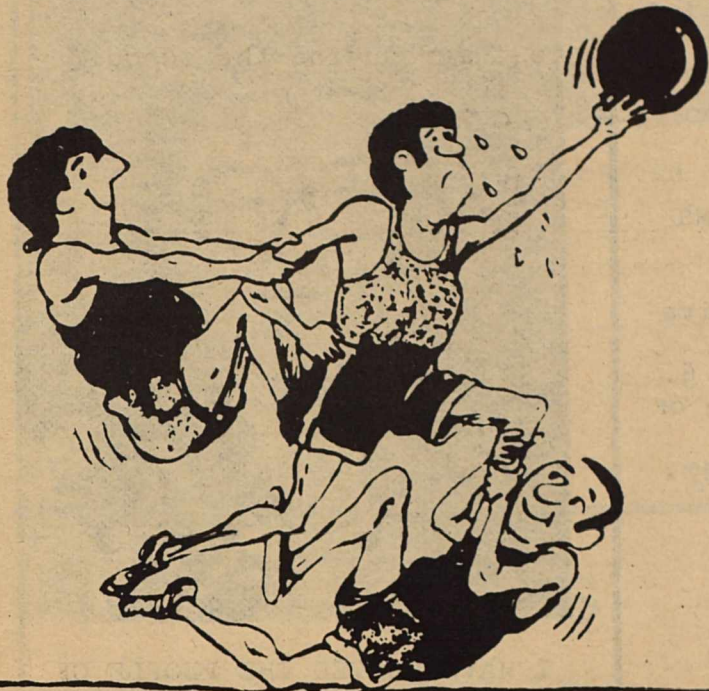

ANNUAL FLOWERING VINES

Sweet Peas and Morning Glories come to mind when thinking of a fast growing vines. Other possibilities to be tried are cypress vine, blackeyed Susan, and vining nasturtiums.

All of these plants have climbing or twisting habits, and beautiful flower displays in summer and autumn. They grow fast from seed, making these prime choices when you want a quick effect.

In mild climates, many of these vines do come back year after year, but are usually treated as annuals. All are natives of the tropics, from Africa, South America and Mexico.

Black-eyed susan vine (Thunbergia alata) is from tropical Africa. It reaches about 5 feet by autumn after a spring planting. Though not as tall as other vines, it is smothered in dense foliage with flaring tubular flowers. Yellow-orange flowers with dark centers are the most common type. Other flower colors are white, yellow, and orange, all with darker centers. The twining and trailing growth habit displays nicely in window boxes and hanging baskets.

Nasturtiums thrive in poor soil with little fertilizer, and are not demanding plants. They flower more abundantly if not pampered. They prefer a drier soil, and if you are using good garden soil, they would be happy without any fertilizer. Climbing nasturtiums flower in many colors, including salmon, gold, orange, and scarlet. These flowers are native to South America. They perform best in partial shade out doors, and in full sun as a houseplant indoors.

SAN JACINTO DAY CELEBRATION SLATED

The annual San Jacinto Day celebration will be held Saturday, April 24, at the San Jacinto Monument, southeast of Houston. San Jacinto Day, April 21, is a Texas Heritage Day which commemorates the Battle of San Jacinto fought in 1836.

A bargeque will begin at 11:30 a.m. on the park grounds followed by formal ceremonies with keynote speaker, U.S. Congressman Jack Fields. The pro-

gram is sponsored by the Sons and Daughters of the Republic of Texas and the Texas Heritage Project.

The skirmish at San Jacinto considered one of the most decisive battles of the world, was the concluding military event of the Texas Revolution. The freedom from Mexico the Texans won in this 18 minut battle assured the establishment of the Republic.

TEEN ALCOHOL AND DRUG PROBLEMS

CORPUS CHRISTI--The second in a series of statewide legislative hearings on teen alcohol and drug problems was held April 6.

The House Subcommittee on Alcohol and Drug Abuse Among Texas Youth will meet at 10 am. that day at the Coastal Bend Council of Governments, 4455 South Padre Island Drive.

"The fact that people are becoming concerned about alcohol abuse among teenagers is going to have an effect on Legislation," Rep. Arnold Gonzales (D-Corpus Christi).

Gonzales said he was shocked at the subcommittee's first hearing by an Austin police officer's testimony that 80 percent of students at two Austin high schools use alcohol. Nationally, 70, percent of adults are estimated to be alcohol user.

He also noted testimony correlating alcohom abuxe with low academic achievement and expressed concern that substance abuse might accelerate in a ceclining economy.

At the hearing in Austin witnesses also called for alcohol and drug education in schools, raising the drinking age, testing for blood alcohol content of traffic fatalities, prohibiting open containers of alcoholic beverages in the passenger compartment of automobile and speical programs for children of alcoholics.

Use of false identification and inhalent abuse were also discussed.

Rep. Frank Madla (D-San Antonio) chairs the subcommittee. Other members are Gonzales and Rep. Bennie Bock (D-New Braunfels).

The Literature Fair included a reading by three widely-published poets from San Antonio and a display and sale of books and magazines by Texas publishers. The fair was co-sponsored by the college, Texas Commission on the Arts and Texas Circuit a cooperative of writers and publishers.

"There were so many people viewing the display that anyone who wanted to buy a book had a difficult time," said David Gene Fowler of Austin, the Texas Circuit representative at the event. "If anyone saw a publication they'd like to have we do have a mail order service and a catalog available."

"I've traveled all over the world giving readings and performances, and I've never seen anything like this before," said Nephtali DeLeon, one of the

poets and the author of nine books.

"All three of us feel a sense of community and togetherness here that is very rare and precious," said Rosemary Catalos, another of the featured poets, as she began her reading.

Naomi Shihab Nye, who has won the Voertman Poetry Award from the Texas Institute of Letters, drew applause after each of her poems. The poems she read all were emotional in content and response.

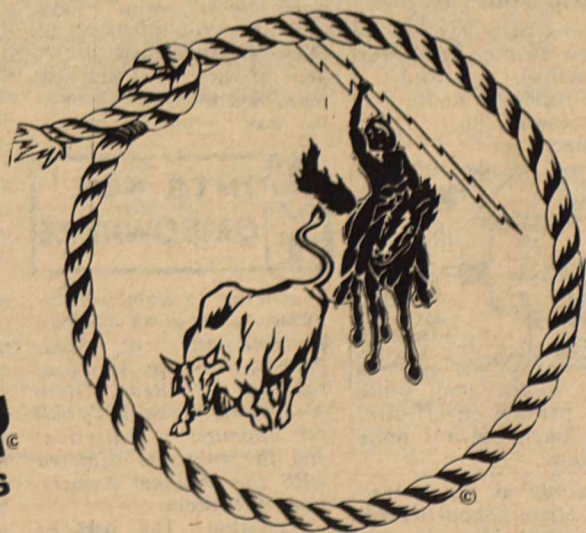

**ELIMINATE YOUR ELIMINATION WORRIES**

Don't be shy about constipation.

As your physician might tell you, "regularity" is an individual thing. It should not be a hang-up for you. If you have only one or more than one daily bowel movement, or if the frequency is every other day, relax. What really matters is that the digestive process works smoothly and without distress.

If you have access to a dietitian, an extension home economist or a nurse who has sound training in nutrition, ask for professional guidance in planning meals and food selection. With this dietary advice, you can pretty well expect to eliminate the elimination fears that many older people seem to worry about.

One reassuring fact that may surprise you is: Constipation is scarcely more common for people over 65 than it is for those under 65. It can become a problem, however, if you let it, so here are some tips that may help you:

- First of all, don't be obsessed with regularity. A more relaxed attitude will do wonders for easing the physical tension that can bind you.
- Keep up a routine of exercise, stay active and keep busy.
- Take it easy on laxatives. Ask your doctor if you can cut them out entirely. They should only be used to overcome specific conditions, not for "maintenance."
- Tell your doctor about any diet supplements (pills or tonics) you've been taking on your own; they could affect your digestion.
- Be skeptical about products that promise miracles.
- Eat properly. Chew your food thoroughly. Take the time to eat slowly. Avoid foods that your own experience tells you cause distress. Don't "stuff" yourself, but don't starve yourself, either; your body needs nourishment and you need bulk for proper digestion.
- Make sure your diet



includes plenty of the following:

- Water—it's a natural lubricant.
- Fluids such as juice or milk, coffee or tea, soup, hot chocolate, soft drinks, even an occasional glass of beer or wine.
- Fruit of all sorts, especially fresh fruit, but canned, frozen, stewed, dried or baked fruits, too.
- Whole grain cereals or breads; or cereals, bread and muffins that have fiber added in one form or another. (More about fiber later.)
- Vegetables and beans or legumes (but don't overcook them). If they taste good raw, eat them raw.
- Balance these foods with meats, poultry, fish and dairy products.

**Dietary Fiber**

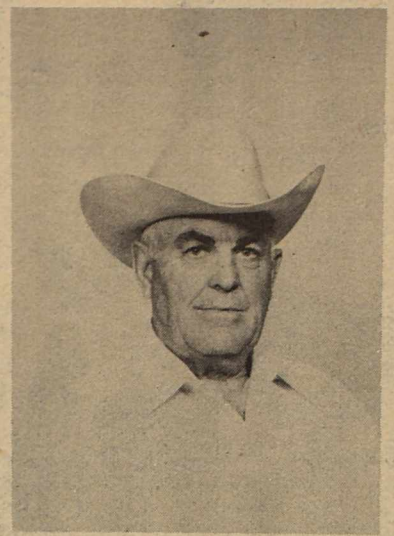
What about fiber? A lot has been written about fiber recently. Unfortunately, not all of the health claims have proven to be true.

Generally speaking, there is dietary fiber in any foodstuff grown, whether it's a peanut or potato, tomato or grape, spinach or strawberry, rice or wheat, orange or apple. There is no fiber in poultry, meat or fish, and none in milk, eggs or cheese.

While the consumption of meat, refined cereals and flour has increased in the past century, consumption of dietary fiber has declined. Some experts say this has led to an increase in digestive diseases and disorders. Therefore, more fiber in the diet is seen as a possible way to prevent such ailments.

It is widely agreed that by increasing the fiber or bulk in the diet, the digestive process is improved. However, increasing fiber should be gradual, and in moderate amounts. In cases of severe distress, or if you are being treated for digestive problems, any changes should first be discussed with your physician.

**Your Plants May Help Your Health**

Your garden may be helping you in more ways than you realize. It provides a sound barrier to noises that may cause high blood pressure.



Trees, shrubs and other plants provide an effective sound barrier against noise pollution.

A study at the University of Miami School of Medicine suggests that our continuous exposure to the noise pollution which exists in our everyday world may cause high blood pressure, which in turn can contribute to heart attack and stroke.

The study compared two pairs of monkeys—one pair in a quiet environment, the other pair exposed to all types of everyday noise. All four monkeys had the same blood pressure level at the beginning of the experiment. But before long the

blood pressure of the monkeys surrounded by noise climbed 25 percent above the others.

The tests have not been conducted with humans yet, but the lesson seems to be clear: we should not "monkey" around with excessive noise—for our health's sake.

Experts believe that homeowners who have created a "quiet place" in their back yards with the help of their local nurseryman, have provided a beautiful way to protect health.

Answer to homeowners' questions are given by John D. Dorchester, Jr., MAI, President of the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers, the nation's oldest appraisal organization, and the only one affiliated with the National Association of Realtors.

Question: The part of town I live in is being considered for landmark status. Will this make it harder for me to sell my house or will it automatically add to its value?

Answer: The picture is mixed. In an historical district, you have the right to donate a "preservation easement" to the organization responsible for the district or some other properly

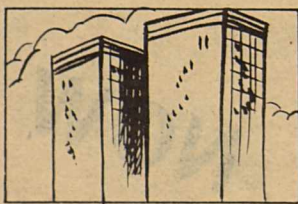

qualified landmark trust. You give up the right to alter the exterior or demolish the building. You must also maintain it according to the wishes of the district. The donation is permanent and must be honored by future buyers. The tax write-off can only be taken once in the life of the property.

You receive a tax write-off equal to the value of the easement. This is determined through two appraisals: one which values the property before easement and one after. The difference in the two value estimates is the value of the easement and generally the amount that you can write off. The appraisal fee that you pay is also deductible.

Your easement can add value to the building in the following ways: you can take the tax write-off yourself or you can sell the building to a buyer who wants to donate the easement and get the write-off. On the negative side, if you have already taken the write-off, potential buyers don't benefit from it, but must adhere to the rules of the district.

### newsworthy trends

There's been a growing trend in America toward a different kind of care for the terminally ill: hospice care. This comprehensive, inpatient home and bereavement care program has become an increasingly popular alternative to traditional forms of treatment for thousands of Americans suffering from terminal illnesses. Although fewer than eight years have passed since the opening of the first program of hospice care in the United States, today there are hospice programs in every state and the total number will soon surpass 400.



Hospice care—professional care for the very ill at home—is on the increase in America today.

However, the national health care reimbursement system does not recognize hospice as a unique alternative health care service.

Such concerned firms as Warner Lambert, a major health care company, have added hospice to their employee medical benefits package. The company also supports a movement in Congress to allow Medicare coverage to extend to hospice care. Studies show hospice care is about a quarter to a fifth the cost per patient per day compared to hospital care. That saves taxes. Many people concerned about both the monetary and humanitarian aspects of this issue are asking their legislators to support the hospice bills: H.R. 5180 in the House and S. 1958 in the Senate. They are writing to the House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515 and the Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510.
