CITY GARBAGE PICKUP ?

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The Brackettville City Council met Monday, 10 May, to discuss, consider and act upon all agenda items. A Brackettville garbage service was proposed and accepted by Council under the following conditions: A Public Hearing will be held to determine the desires of the Citizens and when and if the minimum of 200 residents sign up for said service-garbage pickup in the City of Brackettville will proceed as outlined and become a reality.

The following proposal was submitted to the Council for consideration.

- 1) The primary goal of any Municipal Government is to provide service to its residents. The people of Brackettville voted in 1981 in favor of the then proposed garbage service to be inaugurated at \$6.00 per residence on a mandatory basis.
- 2) The City Staff hereby proposes this council a much needed and desired service to our citizens of a garbage pickup service on a non-mandatory basis at one half the charge, ie \$3.00 per participating residence. Persons signing up for the said service will be billed through the utility computer service.
- 3) To initiate the service we will need a minimum of 200 households at \$3.00 each for an income of \$600.00 monthly. We would start off the service utilizing presently employed personnel 32 total hours weekly @ \$3.50 per hour or \$448.00 salary cost per month. This would leave the City a minimum maintenance fund of \$152.00 for Gas, Oil, etc....
- 4) It is anticipated we would

BRING GARDEN COLOR INDOORS!!

Many types of annual bedding
plants can be potted and en-
joyed in doors in sunny win-
dows. Impatiens, browalia,
petunias, coleus and caladiums
all perform nicely indoors.

Impatiens bloom almost con-
tinually, and have blooms of
many colors. They prefer cool
temperatures and bright sun in-
doors.

Browalia, blue bells, have
dainty flowers and are good

candidates for hanging pots.

Caladiums are very de-
corative and colorful for
their foliage. Insignificant
flower spikes are produced,
and should be removed from the
plant.

Coleus are also noted for
their colorful foliage. These
are easily grown from seed,
and easy to propagate by cut-
tings.

 have two truck routes. On Monday we would pickup garbage on North to South route while on Tuesday we would cover the East to West Streets. As the program expands, additional days would be added to collection effort to an anticipated 600 customers. With 600 customers we could hire two employees on a full time basis with a projected income of \$1,800. monthly, thus leaving \$1,120. for salaries and \$680. for maintenance and vehicle replacement cost.
 5) The garbage service concept is based on low cost-thus citizen cooperation and participation. We would require citizens to place garbage in trash cans or bags in front of their house next to the street. Vehicles would go down the street picking up garbage at those participating customers-no-brush; no-junk or objects not in garbage cans or trash bags.
 6) Initially no commercial or trash/brush pickups are foreseen. This service is now provided by commercial haulers. It has been our experience that enough trash hauling requirements exists that a garbage pickup service for the citizens of Brackettville should not seriously interfere with or eliminate private enterprise.
 7) It is requested that \$5,000 presently available in Revenue Sharing Funds be authorized to purchase a suitable garbage truck. We presently have bids on 1977 & 78 trucks for \$5,000 Upon further research, evalu-

ation and inspection by the Mayor, it is requested authorization be granted to purchase a suitable garbage truck and authority be granted to proceed to initiate this much desired and needed service to our citizens.

Requested forms for garbage service as stated will be sent to all utility customers with their May/June utility bills. A public hearing will be held Monday evening 24 May at 7:30 p.m. at the City Hall Complex. Those persons either pro or con for the above services will be warmly welcomed. Request for service forms will also be available to all residents at the Utility Collection Desk at City Hall during normal working hours. If we receive the support we need you will get the support you deserve.

The San Antonio Food Bank is presently distributing 27,000 pounds of USDA cheese to 82 social service agencies and churches in Bexar and ten surrounding counties.

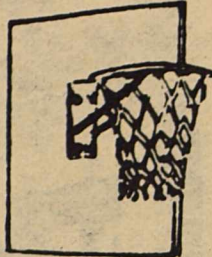
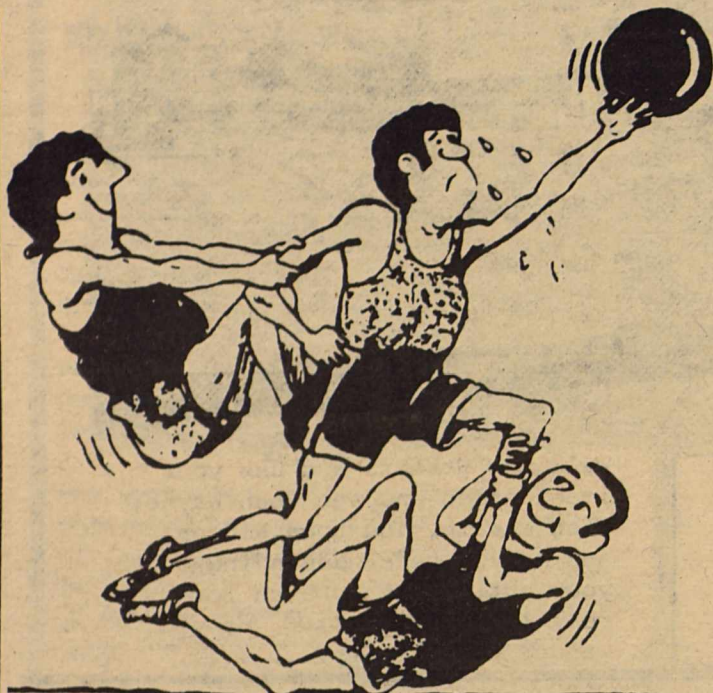

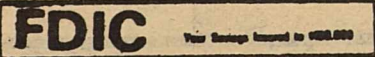

HELP CHILDREN WITH ASTHMA

Children with asthma lose more days from school than otherwise healthy youngsters, are sometimes limited in sports activities, and may suffer a wheezing episode while at school. All of these occurrences are noticed by classmates, and as a result, the asthmatic child frequently feels rejection, says the American Lung Association of Texas.

Children with asthma want to feel like "one of the gang." They do not want to be singled out by their classmates as "different." Teachers' attitudes of acceptance and calmness can help classmates understand asthma. They also can help the child with asthma feel fully intergrated into school activities as "one of the gang."

Teachers and school nurses should be informed if a child has asthma says the Lung Association. Parents---even the child's physician---can explain the extent of the impairment, if there is one. They should also explain what action is required and the treatment advised if wheezing occurs.

Asthma is one of the lung diseases that the "Christmas Seal" People combat. To help children and their parents learn self-help skills for dealing with asthma, the Lung Association has developed the family asthma program. While emphasizing self-confidence and fun, the seven week program teaches breathing techniques, improves general body condition and improves the knowledge and under-

standing of the disease.

CHILD ABUSE

Texans who want to do more to prevent child abuse and neglect usually find that an effective approach is to serve as a volunteer, or involved citizen, by working with the Department of Human Resources, the county child welfare board, or through a church or civic group.

Ways to get involved:

- 1) Most importantly, report suspected instances of child abuse, neglect, or exploitation by calling the toll-free Child Abuse Hotline at 1-800-252-5400. It's answered day and night seven days a week, and callers are not required to give their names.
- 2) Join an organization that offers caring attention to family groups suffering from frustration and isolation.
- 3) Increase your knowledge and understanding of child maltreatment, its causes and cures. Local libraries carry books and professional journals that discuss the subject.
- 4) Contact a local government agency that deals with child abuse and offer your help as a volunteer.
- 5) Guide a group in which you are active, such as an athletic team, neighborhood group, or church assembly, into doing something to help stem the incidence of child maltreatment in your community.
- 6) Assist your schools and churches in developing programs and audiences for basic education about child rearing, parent training and subjects dealing with human development.
- 7) Volunteer your time to troubled parents, "adopt" a family in trouble become a parent aide to mothers who are young and inexperienced in raising children, help recruit foster parents and adoptive parents, and reach out to neighbors having problems.

How to get involved: Contact a member of you county's Child Welfare Board or the Citizen Involvement Office in the nearest DHR Office.

Brackettville's Child Welfare Board members are Lucy Shipman, Sandy Herman, Karen Crowder, Elsa O'Rourke, Charles Spain, Pat Gas and Florrie Wills.

BACKGROUND ON CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

At least 110 children died of abuse or neglect in Texas in the year ending August 31, 1981. The Texas Department of Human Resources received 47,340 reports of suspected abuse or neglect involving nearly 69,000 children from September 1980 through August 1981.

Being a parent is not as easy as having a child. Mothers are especially exposed to a complete change in life style and to situations demand-

ing much of their time and attention, often without apparent reward. The results can be depression, anger, tension, and stress.

Child abuse is a complex human problem. Factors related to child abuse are:

- 1) Stress, such as that caused by unemployment and financial difficulties.
- 2) Lack of skills in coping with life.
- 3) Lack of training in child care, including unrealistic expectations of children.
- 4) Absence of one parent from the home, which places stress on the remaining parent.
- 5) Isolation from family, neighbors, or other caring people, and lack of access to community services which might be helpful.
- 6) Alcohol abuse, drug abuse, legal problems, and overcrowded or inadequate housing.
- 7) Children with handicaps, illness in infancy, and premature or low birth weight infants, which can prevent the formation of a nurturing loving bond between some parents and the child.
- 8) Parents who themselves were abused or neglected as children.

BOOTLEG DIESEL FUEL SLOWED

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced today that the importation of untaxed bootleg diesel fuel from Mexico has been slowed to a trickle.

"We haven't dried it up entirely yet," Bullock said. "But we've turned off the tap for the time being.

Bullock made his announcement at the end of a month-long investigation involving Comptroller agents, local law enforcement officers, U.S. Customs and representatives of the Mexican national oil company (PEMEX).

"The price of diesel is subsidized by the Mexican government and every time a gallon of diesel leaves that country, they are losing money.

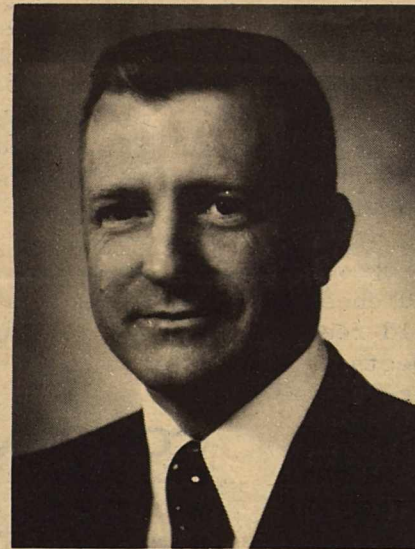
And every gallon of diesel that goes untaxed in Texas is costing the state 6½ cents. If it was once estimated that smuggled diesel fuel was costing Texas up to \$100 million a year in lost taxes. It's nowhere near that now."

Comptroller employees charged 46 defendants with illegally transporting and selling diesel fuel April 20 in El Paso. The El Paso Fire Marshal issued 141 citations for fire code violations. All pleaded guilty to the Comptroller's charges and paid \$50 to \$100 fines.
