CITY BUDGET APPROVED

On Monday 17 May 1982 the Brackettville City Council Met, discussed and passed the 1982/83 Annual Budget during a public hearing and called Special Council meeting. A record \$422,682.00 budget was passed with no increase in the Tax Rate.

The tax rate set at \$.60 per \$100 of market value remains at same level as 1981/82 fiscal year rate. The City Council is authorized by State Law to set a rate two and one-half times larger--\$1.50 per \$100 market value but strongly felt no increase in the tax rate was required not warranted at this time.

Continued improved collection efforts for delinquent taxes and utility bills along with improving business practice in all areas will enhance our capabilities of increased services offered to all of our citizens.

The City budget for fiscal year 1982/83 is available for your inspection in the City Manger's Office at City Hall.

These residents desiring garbage service please stop by the City Hall and sign up. A public hearing will be held Monday 24 May, at City Hall, at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the proposed garbage pickup service.

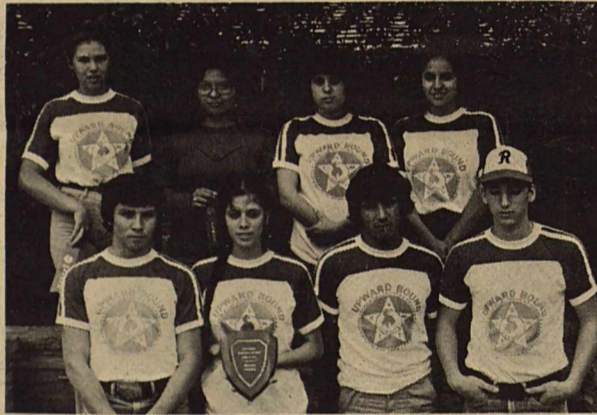

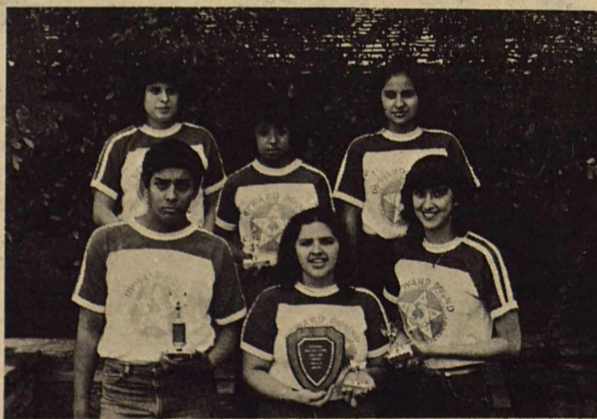

MAY 27 UVALDE A&M CENTER FIELD
 DAY CANCELLED

UVALDE--The Crops Field Day scheduled for may 27 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research & Extension Center has been cancelled.

Dr. Frank Dainello, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research horticulturist and Field Day Chairman, said the decision was made shortly after inspecting damage inflicted upon experimental crops from a hail storm which caused significant damage in the Uvalde area on May 11.

"Our crops have been flattened by hail and wind damage which has forced us to cancel the field day," said Dainello. "We certainly regret having to take such action, but we are left with no choice. A lot of effort has gone into the planning and execution of this field day by both Research and Extension staff members headquartered at this center."

Dainello said no plans have been made to reschedule the field day.

Eagle Pass registration will be on Monday, May 31, at the SWTJC Eagle Pass Center at 6 p.m.

Del Rio registration will be on the same day from 10 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m. at Laughlin Air Force Base, Building 368; and the SWTJC Del Rio Center at 6:30 p.m.

Most courses offered in Uvalde, Eagle Pass and Del Rio are traditionally required courses in most degree programs with some special interest course also available.

MCBEE SPEAKS OUT

AUSTIN--Texas State Representative Susan McBee of Del Rio today charged former Secretary of State George Strake and candidate for Lieutenant Governor as being primarily responsible for the problems experienced in the May Primary Elections and for the problems in the upcoming runoff elections.

As a member of the House Committee on Elections Subcommittee on Budget and Oversight, McBee stated, "During his appearance before the subcommittee Mr. George Strake repeatedly assured the subcommittee that his appropria-

tion request for the Office of Secretary of State was adequate. He testified on February 10, 1931, 'there is no fat in this budget and I can equally assure you it includes adequate funds for the Secretary of State's Office to do everything expected of us and to do it well.'

McBee added, "As Secretary of State Mr. Strake was responsible for monitoring legislation which would affect his office's duties and responsibilities. Any agency administrator understands that you not only watch your own legislation but monitor constantly any legislation which affects your agency or office."

"George Strake's failure to monitor legislation affecting the Secretary of State's Office resulted in the \$350,000 shortfall for the funding of the Primary Elections. This illustrates to me his lack of understanding the legislative process and failure to have met his duties as Chief Elections Officer. It is inexcusable to have jeopardized the basic foundation of Texas government, that being the right of each Texan to vote," concluded Representative McBee.

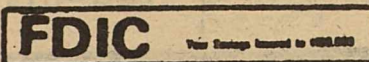

The Texas Commission on the Arts is searching for talented, experienced artist interested in bringing first-hand experience with the arts of Texas young people, announced Executive Director Allan Longacre today. Application forms for Artists-in-Education residencies are available now, as a list of residency locations for the 1982-83 school year. Artists interested in requesting further information may call TCA at 512/475-6593 or call toll free 1-800-252-9415, or write Education Program, Texas Commission on the Arts Box 13406 Capitol Station, Austin, Tx 78711. The deadline for receipt of applications is June 1, 1982.

TCA's Artists-in-Education program jointly sponsored by the Texas Commission on the Arts, the National Endowment for the Arts, and local sponsors, places professional artists in learning environments for direct and prolonged contact with students, teachers, parents and the community. Increasing the aesthetic awareness and self-expression of all participants is a major program goal.

In the past year, artists have been placed in 50 residencies throughout the state. Residencies for the 1982-83 school year, ranging from one week to nine months, will be available in the following discipline areas: creative writing, music, theatre, and visual arts. Artists may be scheduled for up to 20 hours of direct services per week including work with students in workshops, lectures and demonstration work with teachers in workshop and in-service sessions, and involvement with community projects.

Applicants will be screened by the Commission and the local sponsors, based on the following criteria: artistic quality, professional experience, and proven ability to work successfully with young people school personnel, and community members. Interviews are held in Austin and are tentatively set for the month of June.

CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT DIVISION ESTABLISHED

Bexar County Judge Albert Bustamante and Sheriff Joe Neaves announced today that Bexar County has entered into a contract with the Texas Department of Human Resources, Child Support Enforcement Division which will greatly enhance the serving of notice of contempt actions and the arrest of persons who fail to pay child support for children who are receiving Welfare. Under the terms of the agreement the Department of Human Resources will provide additional funding for the hiring

of two deputies to handle serving and the picking up of parents who are not paying child support and whose children are receiving Aid to Families of Dependent Children (AFDC).

Sheriff Neaves stated that the creation of these new positions and assigning of all Welfare cases to two deputies should strengthen the Sheriff's Department efforts to provide needed services.

Homero Rodriguez, Regional Administrator of Texas Department of Human Resources Region 9, which includes Bexar County said "this agreement will really be helpful in our bringing more cases before the Court and in shifting the burden of support for AFDC children to the parents instead of the taxpayers of the State."

On a related matter, Sheriff Neaves announced that effective today attachment orders issued by the Bexar County Courts requiring the arrest of parents who are not paying child support will be registered on the County's Criminal Justice System Computer files. Sheriff Neaves stated that now if these persons were stopped for a license check or traffic violation the computer would show an outstanding warrant and the person would be taken into custody.

AUSTIN--Jimmy Cavender of San Antonio and Robert J. "Bob" Hayes of Dallas are the new leaders of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association for 1982-83.

STATE'S FIRST MAILED TAX REFUND CHECKS

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday mailed the state's first tax refund checks paying taxpayers the same rate of interest as the state charges for delinquent taxes.

"For the first time, the state and the taxpayer get the same interest on overpayments and delinquent taxes--10 percent," Bullock said.

Before the Legislature set the 10 percent rate last year, taxpayers were charged 7 percent on delinquent taxes but received only 6 percent on

protested payments and no interest on overpayments, Bullock explained.

The higher interest rate on overpayments will cause an estimated \$28 million to be paid taxpayers over the next four fiscal years, Bullock said. Estimates attached to Senate Bill 196, which raised both delinquent and overpayment interest rates, projected \$694,000 will be paid taxpayers in interest during the current state fiscal year; \$3.8 million in fiscal 1983; \$6.3 million in 1985 and \$9.4 million in 1986.

The warrants mailed Monday represented nearly \$60,000 in refunds and interest on motor vehicle, motor fuel and sales taxes overpaid by 24 Texas taxpayers in January.

Future refund payments will be processed and mailed daily by the Comptroller.

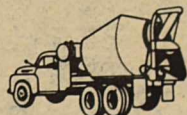
