POOL OPENS

SWIMMING POOL OPENS WEDNESDAY
JUNE 2nd

On Thursday, May 20th, a joint Commissioners' Court and City Council meeting was called to discuss the feasibility of opening the County Swimming Pool for the use of all county residents. It was unanimously declared that the project would be successful with the cooperation of the Governing Bodies and Citizens of Kinney County.

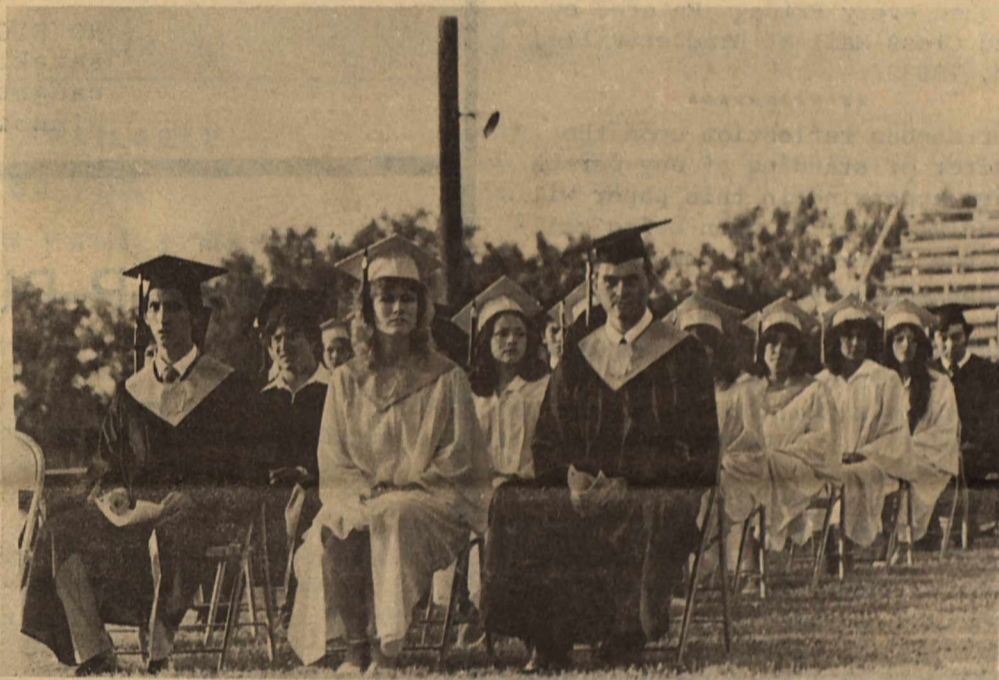
Committees were formed and a joint session called for the following week on Thursday, May 21 at which time the decision was made to open the pool Wednesday, June 2, with the pool remaining open through

August. The hours of the pool were established from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Wednesday through Sunday with the Pool closed on Monday and Tuesday.

To help defray the expenses, committees were formed to sponsor a Swimming Pool Benefit Dance to be held Saturday, June 26, at the Civic Center with 100% of the proceeds to be donated to the swimming pool fund. Individual donations have been received and will continue to be appreciated with all proceeds to be used for the continued maintenance and operation of that beautiful and needed complex. All funds generated will be handled through the County Treasurers Office to insure accountability.

A full time life guard will be in full charge of the swimming pool and it was determined that a small fee of twenty-five (25¢) cents a swimmer would be charged. The City crews will maintain the pumps while County personnel will maintain the building complex.

As the full program moves into high gear the Boy Scouts will provide a concession area serving cold



1983 State Highway Improvement Program

SAN ANGELO--The 1983 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement program will provide improvements to 3,908 miles of highways.

The program includes 656 projects in 198 counties in the state.

Approximately 61 percent of the financing included in the program is on US and State numbered highways, 37 percent is for FM and RM roads and two percents is held in reserve.

The program includes work which will upgrade existing highways to handle larger volumes of traffic than present designs can accommodate efficiently. The work also will enhance safety and will reduce the amount and kind of main-

tenance necessary to protect the public's investment in the highway network.

District Engineer D.R. Watson said the work in this area is part of a continuing effort to modernize and increase the safety characteristics of roads and highways which are worn out or inadequate for today's traffic.

Kinney County projects include: R.M. 674 from R.M. 334, North a distance of 10.1 miles, seal coat at an estimated cost of \$64,700. F.M. 693 from 1.5 miles South of U.S. 90, South a distance of 7.4 miles, seal coat at an estimated cost of \$47,600.

Most of the work on these projects will be done in the summer of 1983. Approval at this time will allow the Department to prepare the plans and award the contracts.

INDEPENDENT CATTLEMEN'S ASSOCIATION

The Independent Cattleman's Association is having its eighth annual convention and trade show in Corpus Christi, June 17-19.

South Texas cattle feeder Leon Miller will be the keynote speaker of the event hosting commercial cattlemen from throughout the state. Ben Baisdon, Director of Marketing for the Texas Department of Agriculture and Hilmar Moore, National Chairman of the Beef Industry Council will also address the assembly.

All meetings and activities will be at the Bayfront Plaza Convention Center. The headquarters hotel is the Sheraton Marina Inn.

"Our theme for the meeting of "Serving and Saving Rural Texas" will be carried through out presentations by our speakers and business proposals,

all in the scenic surroundings of the gulf coast," said ICA President Roy Wheeler of Pleasanton.

Registration for the convention is slated for 2-5 pm at the Sheraton Thursday, June 17. It will continue in the Bayfront Plaza Convention from 6-8 pm.

Those who register are invited to attend a cocktail party on the second floor of the convention center from 6-8 pm. Thursday evening.

Friday, June 18 at 9:30 am. Miller will address the first general session with suggestions on expanding the cattle economy of the U.S. and Mexico. He will be followed by Baisdon, Moore and Becky Terry, president of the Texas Cowbelles.

Becky Dodson, editor of the INDEPENDENT CATTLEMEN, will be the final speaker of the morning. A luncheon is scheduled at 12 noon with nation-wide farm realtor Greg Bamford speaking.

Afternoon sessions Friday will be highlighted by a concentration on ICA service to youth. Tyler Thomas, regional field coordinator for Texans' War on Crime and Drugs, will detail possible ways for ICA to assist in deterring crime since it is increasing in rural areas faster than in urban areas. Erlene Goertz, Bastrop county ICA chapter secretary, will describe her involvement in Thomas' program.

Four leaders of youth organizations will follow at 3 pm with suggestions on how ICA can better serve their groups. These organizations include the FFA, 4-H, FHA and Texas Young Farmers.

Friday will be capped by a dance with music by top rated singer George Strait from 8-12 pm.

Saturday, June 19, the morning general assembly will begin with an update on national issues by Congressman Wes Watkins, ICA political consultant Larry Meyers and Agriculture Coordinator for the office of State-Federal Relations, Ken Jordan.

The ICA House of Delegates will vote on resolutions and the election of new officers the remainder of the morning.

All ICA members and friends are urged to attend.

ATPE PRESIDENT QUESTIONS CLASS SIZE FIGURES

Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE) President Sally Weidemann challenged members of the Select Committee on Public Education to continue to work together to come up with solutions to some of public education's major problems in the Senate Chambers recently.

Citing the problem of overcrowding in Texas classrooms, Wiedemann stated the current 16-to-1 Texas Education Agency pupil-teacher ratio is misleading and does not present an accurate picture of the real classroom situation. Because administrative and other non-classroom personnel are included in the computation, the ratio of pupils to teachers appears much lower than is really the case. Many secondary classroom ratios run 28-to-1 to 40-to-1, while elementary fall into a 25-to-1 to 30-to-1 pattern.

Wiedemann also addressed the lack of teacher education courses dealing with discipline in the classroom. She lamented that often school districts have to offer inservice training in discipline techniques because teachers have not been taught this on the college level.

Wiedemann says ATPE suggests that college instructors and administrators need to be more attuned to the needs of the children when drawing up certification requirements for teachers who are being required to reach classes outside of their current certification.

In regard to salaries, ATPE feels that the prolonged and perennial financial neglect of educators is the major reason behind the experienced Texas teacher leaving the classroom. The association plans to take the initiative to make beginning salaries for teachers competitive with salaries in other degreed professions and will support appropriate increases for the career teacher.

"ATPE's major concern in addressing these areas is not only the overall well-being of the teacher but also that of the child," Wiedemann, whose organization represents approximately 35,000 educators statewide.

Wiedemann teaches high school business courses in Vernon, where she has taught for the last nine years.

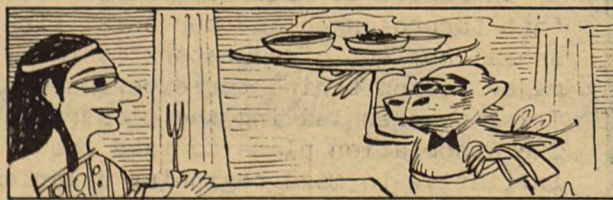
