FLY AND MOSQUITO CONTROL

Effective fly and mosquito control in our Community is essential. In the past the high expense, hazard and oft times the ineffectiveness of outmoded fogging techniques led some of us to believe that effective control of flies and mosquitos was next to impossible.

During May of this year the City purchased a ultra low volume aresol generator which employs a technique which applies undiluted insecticide in very low quantities as an aresol. Two or three ounces will cover a full acre as each ounce is converted to over 19 billion drop-lets.

The insecticide will be used
in concentrated form--no mixing with
diesel--thus a savings in desel fuel
costs, and, we will not create a dense
fog to obscure vision on streets and
roads. So when you see the City Spray
Truck go by do not expect to see the
heavy diesel cloud as in years past.
The new concept provides more cover-
age at less cost but again you will
not see a cloud of diesel.

We have sprayed the creek beds
and canals along with a general City
Coverage. We intend to continue this
program throughout the summer months--
late in the evenings.

COMMISSIONERS' COURT

At their regular meeting, June
13, the Kinney County Commissioners'
Court decided to approve the recom-
mendation of the State Parks and
Wildlife Department to allow the
taking of 2 bucks and 1 doe in Kinney
County during the up-coming season.
A member of the Mexican

Council appeared and asked for the
refund of approximately \$180.00
supposedly taken from an illegal
alien in the jail.

The Commissioners discussed
the up-coming budget.

The request from Dennis
Slubar's Attorney for back pay and
re-instating to the Kinney County
Sheriff's Department, was turned over
to County Attorney Tully Shahan.

Sheriff J.A. Sheedy requested
\$1,000.00 for auto repairs on the
Sheriff's car and \$1,500.00 for jail
supplies.

Recommendations for "Purchase
Order" system be instigated in the
County for accounting purposes was
tabled after Commissioner Sheedy
expressed the view that it would delay
emergency repairs.

An investigation is underway
on the loss of a gun valued at \$588.
purchased by the Sheriff's Department
several months ago.

WILL WE REMAIN A BEAUTIFUL TOWN
OR BECOME THE COUNTY'S TRASH
DUMP?

Several weeks ago, the City
Council came up with a very reason-
able solution to Brackett's trash
and garbage pick-up....If 200 re-
sidents of our over 600 residents
would sign up for a voluntary, non-
mandatory garbage pick-up, the City
would instigate such a program and
it would be placed on the partici-
pating persons City Utility bill.

As of this time 82 of the
600 plus residents have signed up
for this program, ABOUT 15%!! The
subject of Trash Pickup has been
delayed until July 13, according
to City Manager William Thurber.

LET US ANALYZE THE SITUATION...

If you went to the dump once
a week and made the 10 mile round
trip, that is forty miles, there is
no way anyone can drive a motor scooter
for that price.....\$3.00 per month!

Of course, you can dump your
trash and garbage on another person's
lot here in Brackett, like many people
do...the chance of you getting caught
are very slim....and even if you get
caught who will do anything about it?
After all we have a trash burning
ordinance, yet the county employees
burned trash at the county park for
two days in a row, stinking up the
whole town, just after the ordinance
was announced!

Even if the 200 signatures
were obtained, THE PEOPLE THAT ARE
DUMPING TRASH ON PRIVATE LOTS WOULD

STILL DO SO TO SAVE THAT TRIP TO THE
DUMP!

Another thing that I believe
is wrong with the City's proposal, is
that refuse can be placed on the
street for pickup in trash bags. Now
lets face it, with all the stray
dogs and cats in Brackettville, HOW
LONG DO YOU THINK IT WOULD TAKE TO
TURN OUR STREETS INTO A REAL TRASH
DUMP WITH THE DOGS AND CATS TEARING
THE BAGS APART. EVERY PLACE ELSE I
KNOW OF REQUIRES CLOSED CONTAINERS.
But in Brackettville these precious
little pets can damn near disintegrate
a 55 gallon oil drum, unless it is
tied down.

San Antonio, Uvalde, Del Rio
and even Fort Clark Springs.....
every other respectable community has
trash pick-up and they charge for it
...several times our proposed \$3.00
per month. This service would not
only provide a sanitary necessity
to our community but supply jobs. City
Manager William Thurber pointed out
this fact that I had not even thought
of.

The previous City Council
voted for a MANDATORY pick-up!

It is time that our present
City Council act on this, NOW! I have
heard the cries, "Poor people can
not afford this!". Poor people generate
garbage, too! ARE THERE ONLY 82
PEOPLE IN BRACKETT THAT CAN AFFORD
\$3.00 PER MONTH? HORSE HOCKEY!!

We elected our Councilmen to
represent the best interests of our
community...If they wish to turn it
into a trash dump, this is their
decision. They have completely dis-
regarded the previous councils'
actions. Lets see if they have the

OFFERED DURING SUMMER

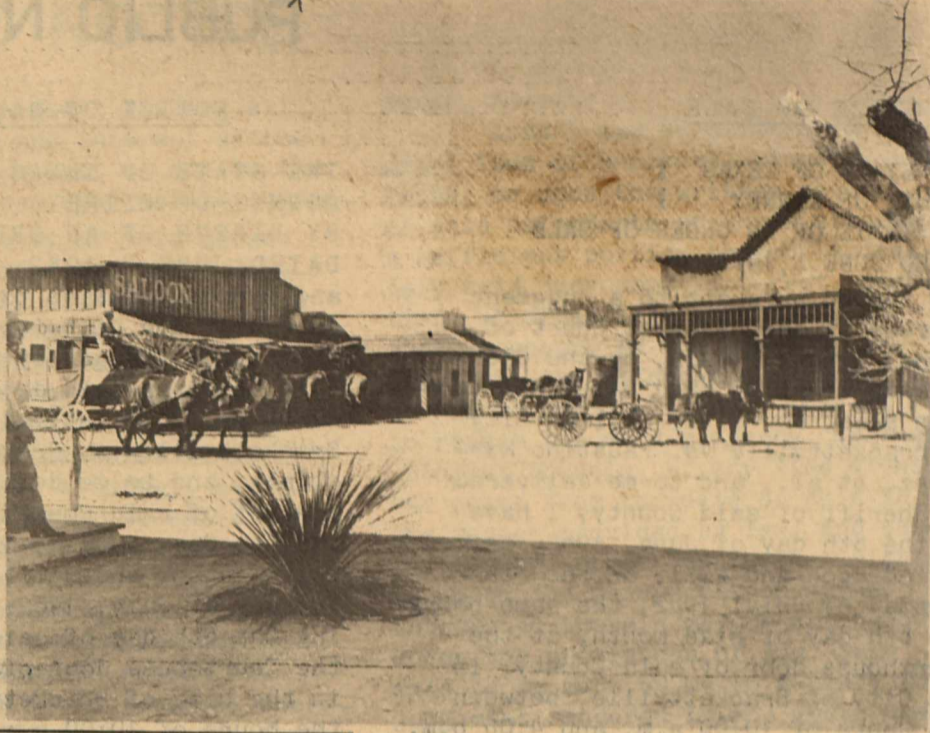
Teachers in grades one through

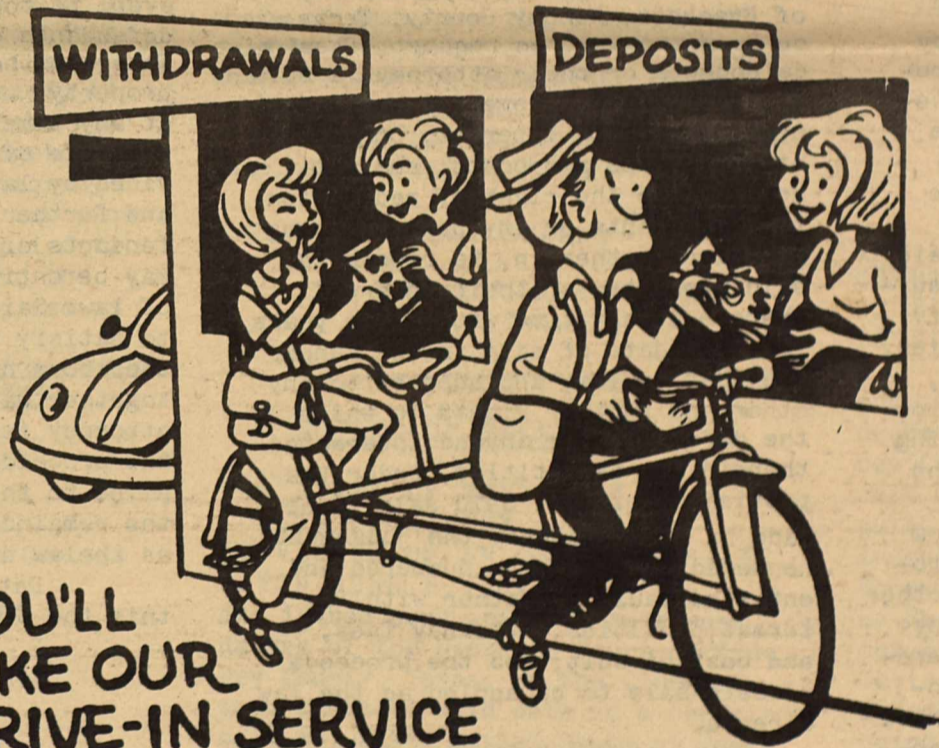

NOTES FROM THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

AUSTIN--Among out-of-state auto visitors who came to Texas during 1981, Dallas, San Antonio, and Houston proved to be the states' most popular destinations according to a profile of auto travelers released today by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"That may be no surprise," said Tom H. Taylor, director of the department's Travel and Information Division, "because cities are always among the top visitor destinations in Texas. But where last years' highway travelers came from was a bit of surprise.

"While it's logical that neighboring Oklahoma was our number-one supplier of auto visitors," said Taylor, "Our figures show that distant California and Illinois were tight runners-ups.

"We thought cross-country auto travel might have faded after the shocks of oil embargoes and dollar-a-gallon gasoline," Taylor explained. "But at least for 1981, the long distance drivers were back on the highways."

Auto visitors from other states who spent less than 30 days in Texas drove an average of 1,046 miles; those who stayed in the state longer than 30 days drove 2,624 miles. Those short-term visitors stayed 84.51 days in Texas.

The variation between the long- and short-term visitors was as wide in average expenditures as in the length of stay. Short term expenditure per person per day was \$26.67; long-termers spent \$11.96 per day per person.

Data for the report are from survey cards distributed at the Department's 12 tourist bureaus that served more than two and a-half million travelers last year.

To give a clearer picture of the visitor to Texas, the profile also gives data on the accommodations used, the size of the group, purposes of the trip, visitor age groups, income, and how they spent their travel dollars. Although no totals are given in the report, the percentage figures provide a representative profile of the state's highway visitors.

"The more we know about our visitors," Taylor said, "The better job those who serve tourists can do."

CHRONIC BRONCHITIS

Summer is right around the corner, but you've already caught one of those "summer colds". You spit. You just can't shake its lingering effects. If you're also a heavy smoker, it could be chronic bronchitis.

Chronic Bronchitis is nearly always associated with heavy cigarette smoking. It's likely to start in middle age and get worse as the years go on unless you seek help from a doctor early. About three times as many men get chronic bronchitis as women. People with chronic bronchitis often live in cities where air pollution is a problem.

The American Lung Association of Texas says that because people don't consider chronic bronchitis a killing disease, it is often neglected until it is in an advanced stage and there is serious damage to the lungs. But in 1981, about 7.1 million people suffered from chronic bronchitis. It brought death to about 3,900. Physicians report more than 330,000 new patients with chronic bronchitis every year. The Social Security Administration grants disability benefits to about 1,500 victims a year. Undoubtedly, chronic bronchitis is one of the nation's costliest diseases in terms of manpower, money and misery.

Since people who get chronic bronchitis are nearly always smoking, the cough is usually dismissed as only "smoker's cough." As time goes on, though, colds become more damaging. Coughing and spitting last longer after each cold. Soon they're with the victim all the time--before colds during colds, after colds. Generally the cough is worse in the morning and evening and in cold, damp weather.

If your summer cold lingers, see your doctor. He or she can help you enjoy the summer months.

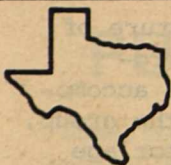

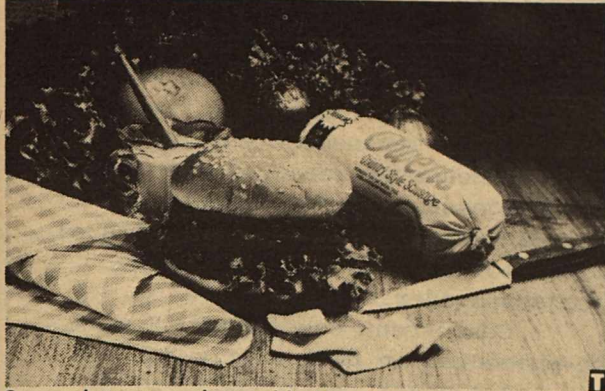

OUTDOOR COOKING TIPS MAKE PICNICS EASIER

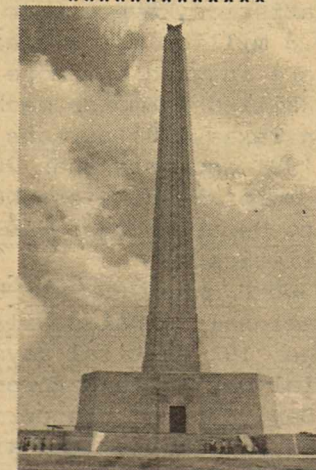

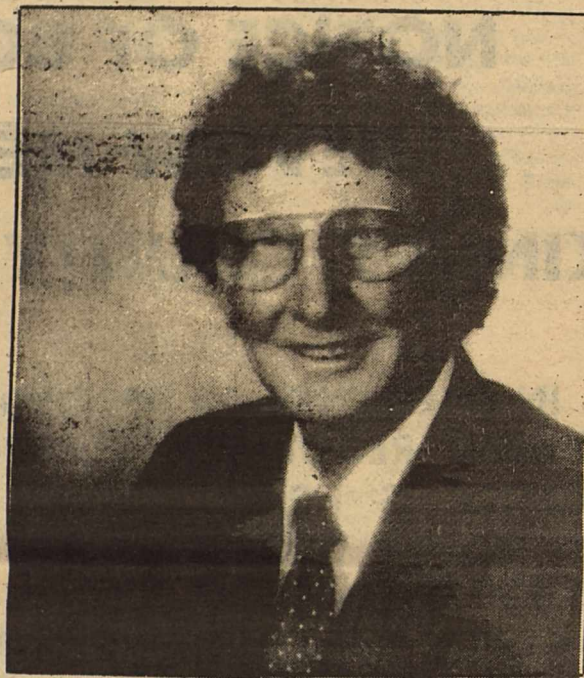

INDEPENDENT CATTLEMEN'S ASS'N

Independent Cattlemen's Association President Roy Wheeler today contacted members of the Texas congressional delegation asking that they not support pending legislation levying stiff fines on employers hiring illegal aliens. The legislation sponsored by Senator Alan Simpson of Wyoming and Rep. Ronald Mazoli of Kentucky was recently reported out of committee and will soon be considered by Congress.

Wheeler explained the legislation requires an employer establish the citizenship of all his workers including temporary employees, before hiring. If illegals are hired, the employer could face stiff fines of up to \$2,000.

"Such requirements would be resented by workers, encourage discrimination and lend themselves to fraud," Wheeler insisted. He suggested that a far better process of combatting employment problems would be to arrange a federal bracero program, strengthen funding for the border patrol or tighten visa eligibility. Wheeler concluded that it's difficult to believe that the government is placing immigration liability on employers when they have refused to properly consider a bracero program and hire more people to police Capitol Hill than they hire to police the entire U.S. borders.

IRR SPEAKERS TO ADDRESS KEY BEEF CATTLE PROBLEMS

DEL RIO Using crossbreeding systems to improve profit, a reasonable way to supplement cows, how computers can help manage a cow-calf operation and practical ways to cut costs are a sample of topics for discussion during beef cattle concurrent sessions at the International Ranchers Roundup here August 10-12.

About a dozen speakers representing prominent southwestern ranchers and universities will appear on the broadbased program. Over 100 noted ranching experts, industry leaders and policy makers will address problems confronting brush management, sheep and Angora goats, meat goats, wildlife and this year's special program for female participants, "Women in Ranching."

"Chip" Merrill, coordinator of the Ranch Management Training program at Texas Christian University; and Allan Savory, partner in Savory Grazing Method, Range Consultants, New Mexico.

In addition to the general and concurrent educational sessions, two ranch tours in Southwest Texas (Aug. 9) and Mexico (Aug. 13) are being offered.
