
LOCAL RADIO HAMS TO TEST EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

On the weekend of June 26 & 27 members of the Border Amateur radio Society will participate in the 46th Annual American Radio Relay League Field Day Emergency Preparedness test.

On this weekend, thousands of Amateur Radio operators (hams) in the U.S. and Canada set up

their stations in the open using only emergency power and portable antennas. They contact as many operators as possible in the 24-hour period. These tests are designed to help hams refine operating skills so necessary during disasters and times of emergency when normal channels of communication are disrupted or unavailable.

In recognition of this event, Mayor Jerry Tremblay has pro-





COMPTROLLER'S OFFICERS VISITS FLEA MARKETS ACROSS STATE

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock said today Comptroller enforcement officers are visiting flea markets across the state to amke sure all Texas retailers are treated equally.

"We have received complaints from taxpayers about competitor who don't charge or don't pay sales taxes. The business people who have made these complaints are only asking for what they deserve--to be treated just exactly like their neighbors and their competitors," Bullock said.

Bullock explained the enforce ment officers now visiting flea markets aren't looking for the once-a-year garage sale a family might hold to clean out the overflow from their attic.

"we're looking for people who continually sell merchandise. When you start setting up shop week in and week out, you're not a garage sale anymore, you are a retailer. And the Legislature says retailers must have a permit from theComptroller, post the necessary bond, report and pay their taxes."

Bullock pointed out that businesses who do not pay sales tax gain an unfair advantage over the conscientious taxpayer.

"These operators are also short-changing their neighbors by not paying their local sales taxes," Bullock added.


The statewide canvass of flea markets--due to be finished later this summer--will yield an accurate picture of the number and location of such markets across the state. Using this information, the Comptroller's Office will tailor a program to insure voluntary compliance with the sales tax law in the future.



Since the deadline for tour registration and the \$50 registration fee discount is July 15, prospective participants are urged to send promptly for registration materials. Last year's IRR, the first and largest of its kind ever held in the Southwest Texas, attracted some 700 ranchers and industry leaders to the border area for five days of education al activities. Based on enthusiatic comments from many of those participants throughout the year, plans are being made to accom modate 1,000 registrants this summer.

Producer's comments ranged from "it was like trying to take the entire Texas A&M animal science curriculum in five days....experts in various fields which can make individual management ranching decisions easier to "there were many beneficial activities occurring at once...I didn't know which to attend first."

All general session talks will be presented Tuesday, Aug. 10, in the Del Rio Civic Center. Concurrent sessions geared to more effective management o beef cattle, sheep, and Angora goats, meat goat production range resources and wildlife will be conducted at Del Rid High School Aug. 11 and 12. Some programs such as ranch business management have been incorporated into major commodity discussions. Simultaneous translation will be provided in sessions important to Mexican ranching.

This year a special feature is being added for all female participants. "woman in Ranching" will feature experts from around the country discussing such topics as "Protecting Women's Economic Interest in Ranching" "The Ranch vs. The Family", "Mirco-Computers in the Ranch Home," "Ranch Estate Planning" and "Together We can!"

IRR participants will be treated to a Mexican Fiesta Aug. 10 in Ciudad Acuna hosted by that City's Mayor and a countrywestern dance August 11 following a steak banquet. No evening functions are scheduled August 12, allowing IRR participants to enjoy the many varied entertainment opportunities and dining cuisine available in this border area. IRR is being organized by Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists based at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Uvalde.



FETAL ALCOHOL SYNDROME

No child needs to have it. It's the third most common form of mental retardation. It's totally preventable. Fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) is a pattern of birth defects associated with drinking during preg nancy. It includes retardation and physical deformities. Other problems includes include facial abnormalities, growth deficiencies and malformations of the skeleton , heart and urogential system.

Many drugs have been found to cross the placenta and affect unborn babies. Alcohol is one.

Some drugs cause babies to be forn addicts and suffer withdrawal, after which they recover from their addiction. This is not the case with alcohol. The pattern of birth defects associated with heavy alcohol use is irreversible and permanent. The child with FAS will never recover. Drinking during pregnancy is risky. The safest decision is not to drink during pregnancy. No one really knows at what level of drinking harm to the fetus occurs. Wat is known is that the more a woman drinks during pregnancy the greater the risk to her baby.

Children, born to women who drink may suffer fetal alcohol effect (FAE). These children may not suffer from the full syndome, but may have one or more symptoms associated with maternal alcohol consumption.

Dr. Geraldine Wilson, associate professor of pediatrics and Baylor Medical College in Houston and director of Jefferson Davis Hospital's follow-up clinic, notes that while "a textbook case of FAS is pretty recognizable" it can be more difficult for a physician to spot a chldd with one or two features of the syndrome.

She notes tht FAS children may range from intellectual ability from a dull normal IQ (who may be able to function in regular classrooms with special help) to severly retarded (who can learn some self-care skills.)

A study published in the Journal of Pediatrics found the average IQ of 20 FAS patients to be 65, with a range from 16 to 105. Average intelligence is considered to range from 90 to 110 points. Some researcers have found brain malformations in infants with the syndome.

Microcephaly, a condition of abnormal smallness of the head reflecting deficient brain growth, is often a feature of FAS, according to an article in the New England Journal of Medicine. The same article states

that FAS children are frequently hyperactive.

FAS is caused by prenatal exposure to alcohol--it doesn't matter whether it is beern hard liquor or wine. Not every woman who drinks during pregnancy has an FAS baby.

No woman who abstains from alcohol during pregnancy has an FAS baby.

The Texas Commission on Alcoholism, in cooperation with the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, is conducting a public awareness campaign on the subject of FAS, with awareness messages being disseminated to print and broadcast media.

"It is sad to think that there are children today who are tetarded and who, genetically, had musch greater potential," Ross Newby, TCA executive director, said. "I hope that women who are pregnant or planning to be will heed our slogan, "A Pregnant Woman Never Drinks Alone".


