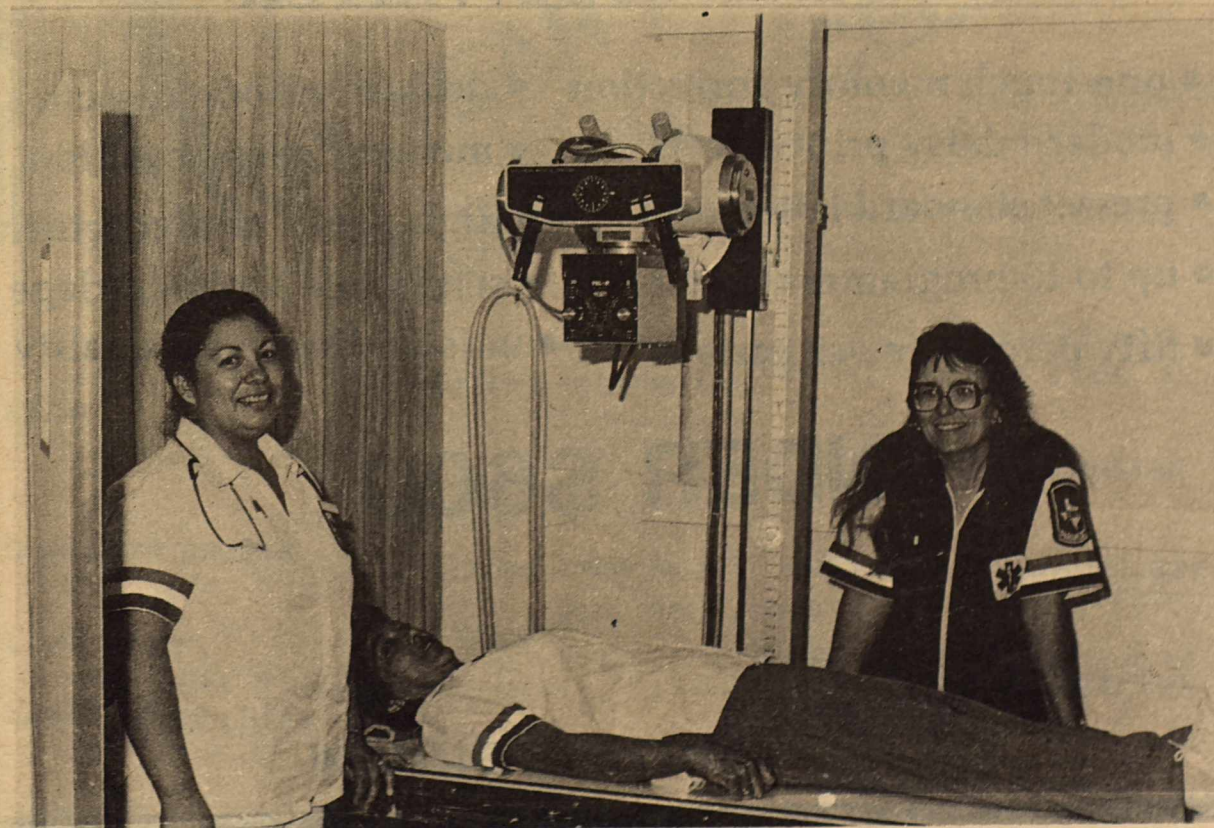
Brackettville has needed this machine for a very long time. If we would have had it in the past, maybe some of our friends or family members might be alive today..

## FRAMING AND ADOPTING THE CONSTITUTION

Congress adopted a re-  
solution on February 21, 1787, calling  
upon all states to send delegates to  
Philadelphia, to meet on the second  
Monday in May,

"for the sole and express pur-  
pose of revising the Articles  
of Confederation and reporting  
to Congress and the several legi-  
slatures such alterations and  
provisions therein as shall when  
agreed to in Congress and con-  
firmed by the states render the  
federal constitution adequate to  
the exigencies of government  
and the preservation of the Union."

Delegates were appointed in eleven  
states...New Hampshire was favorable  
to the meeting but failed to act until  
the Convention was started. Rhode  
Island refused to send delegates--it  
feared further centralization of power.

Seventy-four delegates were appoint-  
ed; fifty-five appeared at one time  
or another. The average session con-

tained thirty. Thirty-nine signed the  
completed document.

Thomas Jefferson and John Adams  
were in Europe or they surely would  
have been appointed. Patrick Henry  
was appointed but refused to attend.  
Richard Henry Lee declined appoint-  
ment because he was a member of Con-  
gress. John Hay was asked to be a de-  
legate but declined. Samuel Adams  
and John Hancock were not appointed,  
and Thomas Paine had gone to Europe.  
Other than these, all the important  
leaders of the country were designated  
to attend the convention.

Most distinguished delegate  
was George Washington. The average  
age of delegates was 42--most came  
from the educated and professional  
classes. Twenty-five were college  
men and thirty-three were lawyers  
or had studied law. They had wide  
experience in public affairs; forty-  
six had served in the colonial or  
state legislatures; ten had attended  
state conventional conventions; se-  
ven had been state governors; forty-  
two had been delegates to the Con-  
tinental Congress; eight were signers  
of the Declaration of Independence;  
six were signers of the Articles of  
confederation; seven had attended  
the Annapolis Convention; and three  
had been executive officers under  
the Continental Congress.

Considering the backgrounds  
of the delegates it can be understood  
why the document they put together  
seems cautious and conservative. We  
need to remember that it provided  
for a more popular style of govern-  
ment than existed at any time in any  
other important country in the world.  
We should remember that in addition

to provisions guaranteeing property  
rights, there were provisions guaran-  
teeing civil and political liberties  
as well. Most significant has been  
its flexibility whereby control has  
been shifted from a small wealthy  
class to the masses without blood-  
shed.

The second Monday in May, 1787  
fell on the 14th, and the delegates  
gathered in Independence Hall in  
Philadelphia. It was May 25 before  
a quorum was present.

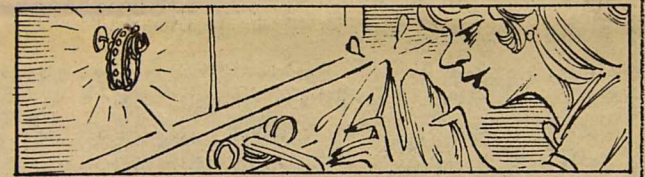
The Convention organized immedi-  
ately--Benjamin Franklin was the  
logical choice for President, but  
he withdrew himself from consideration.  
Washington was then elected by unani-  
mous vote. Major William Jackson,  
former Assistant Secretary of War,  
was chosen secretary.

The following rules were adopted:  
each state delegation should have  
one vote; a majority of states would  
constitute a quorum; and the proceed-  
ings should be kept secret.

During meetings sentries were  
posted at the doors.

Official records were kept by  
Jackson, but were bare minutes of  
meetings, records of votes, etc., and  
told nothing of the debates.

Fortunately James Madison had  
kept a rather complete set of notes  
which were published in 1840 after  
his death.

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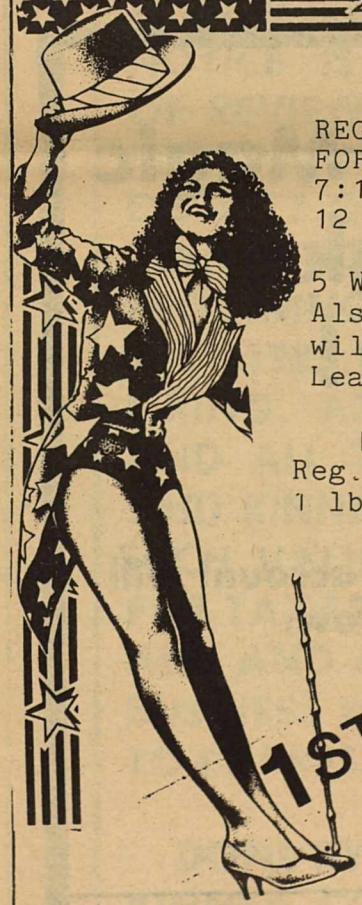

SEARCH UNDERTAKEN TO LOCATE WPA ARTWORKS IN TEXAS

The Austin---The Texas Commission on the Arts is aiding the Federal Governemnt in locating works of art created between 1933-43 under the sponsorship of three federal work-relief art programs.

The three programs--Public Works of Art Project (PWAP), the Federal Art Project of the Works Progress Administration (FAP/WPA), and the Art Program of the Works Project Administration provided opportunities for several thousand unemployed artists to work at their craft, producing over a million artworks in several mediums. The largest percentage of the paintings, prints and sculptures were allocated on a long term basis to non-Federal public agencies or institutions at the local level

These included schools, libraries, universities, museums, municipal buildings, jails, and hospitals.

Over the years, however, the General Services Administration

reports that many of their records concerning the location of these works have either been lost or are incomplete. In order to bring their records up-to-date and create a National Fine Arts Inventory of all artworks commissioned by the Federal Government, the cooperation of TCA has been enlisted to locate surviving artworks in Texas. The Federal Government does not wish to retrieve any of the works, unless the present custodians no longer wish to continue responsibility for them. They do plan to offer conservation assistance, where needed.

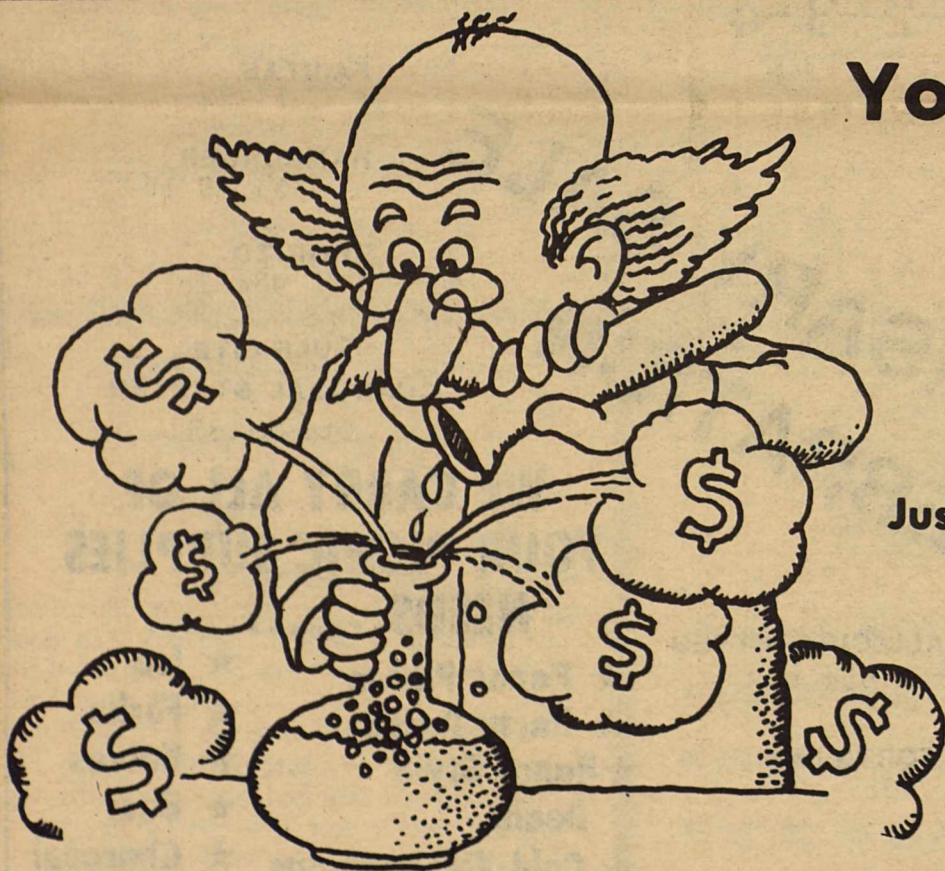

### ST. JOHN'S REUNION

St. John's Catholic School, Hondo, is having its first reunion since opening in 1893 and the last graduating class is celebrating its 50th Anniversary on Sunday, July 18, in conjunction with St. John's Parish Festival at the Hondo City Park, (40 miles west of San Antonio on Highway 90.)

The reunion will begin with a Field Mass celebrated by Bishop Richardo Ramirez at 10:00 a.m., at the City Park.

Those attending the reunion are urged to bring memorabilia or copies of such things reminiscent of their years at the school. There will be a special display of school mementos, after which everyone will be able to participate in the Festival activities.

A search has begun to find as many ex-students, teachers, and clergy as possible. Anyone knowing of someone who attended or taught at St. John's School is especially invited to come out and share their fond memories and souvenirs with all.

The school's history spans 79 years, closing in 1972. The school began with two Sisters of Divine Providence from Castroville teaching the classes. The site was just North of the old church (now the parish hall)

Closed in 1894 after a severe epidemic of diphtheria, the school was not re-opened until 1920.

The present school was opened in November of 1926 just West of the Church.

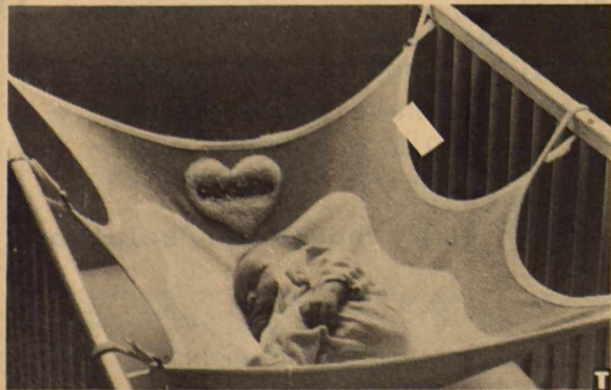
After 1932, the school dropped the 9th thru 12th grades due to lack of students. Then in 1964 the school only went through the 6th grade until it closed in 1972.

The school building is now used for religion classes and meetings.

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## That's a Good Idea!



A newborn infant naps contentedly in a snug, soft womb-like surface. The sound of a heartbeat, rocking movement and swaddling effect add comfort and security, so important during the first months of life.

The birth of an infant and the months immediately following are the most important times of life in terms of development. This is the period when the infant learns to perceive space and relate to the world through responses to experience. Doctors call the early learning process "sensory integration."

Recent studies indicate how important stimulation of the senses is to normal development. The elements of sound, touch, movement and space all affect the contentedness of newborns. Clinical tests in intensive care nurseries have revealed

movement or motion gives and learn about their new environment while easing the trauma of birth, a transitional sleeping system has been developed. It stimulates the primary senses that baby experienced in the womb.

It imitates the comfort of the womb with a form-fitting hammock made of stretch terry cloth and a soft plush pile sleeping surface. A battery-operated device called "CuddleHeart", inserted in a pocket on the hammock, produces the sensation of the mother's heart

that groups of newborns exposed to the sound of a normal adult heartbeat (like the sound of the mother's heartbeat to the infant still in the womb) cried less often. They also showed greater weight gain than a similar group which was fed the same but did not have this sound stimulation.

The sense of touch has been shown to be a key in the development of emotional security and the nervous system. Sensory integration of the part of the brain that detects change in

and can be heard and felt all over the surface of the hammock.

The product is called CribCuddle. It can be found at baby specialty stores and department stores for about \$40. It's an item that's likely to produce contented babies and more confident, calmer mothers.

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## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective July 27, 1982, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 13.4 percent increase in the company's intrastate revenues.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

### Notice to El Paso Area Customers

Effective January 1, 1982, Southwestern Bell adopted the Mountain States tariffs in effect for El Paso County. Southwestern Bell proposes to merge the separate El Paso tariffs with its tariffs applicable to the rest of Texas. The resulting new rate schedule is on file with the PUC and the El Paso area municipalities served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection at our El Paso business office.

### Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

The filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for interexchange private line and foreign exchange (FX) service. 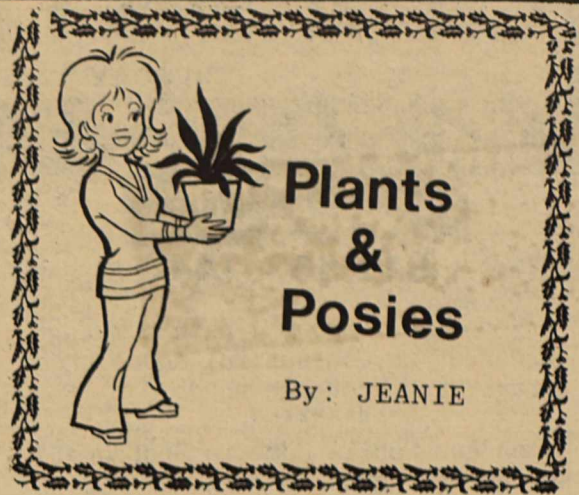

COLEUS

This is a multi-colored plant originating in Africa and Asia. There are more than 200 species of coleus, some cultivated for foliage, others for flowers.

The more common coleus is noted for its colorful foliage and interesting leaf shapes. To maintain the bright colorations, always give your coleus plenty of light. Too little light results in pale colors, or even reverting back to green. During Winter, continue to give as much light as possible, and keep in a warm room.

Coleus benefits from pruning. Leggy plants with little or no leaves at the bottom of the stems will be fuller if pruned often.

These plants are water lovers. Keep slightly damp, never let the root ball dry out. Your coleus will root easily in soil or water, be sure to use healthy tip cuttings.
