issues. I feel you are entitled to know that before you make your decision in the November election. Additionally, I hope you will let me know your views. They are important to me.

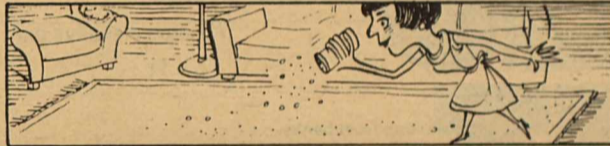

The House of Representatives last week began debate over a Department of Defense Authorization Act which I believe represents a strong effort to correct some severe defense problems while living up to the stern demands of budgetary restraints.

Nothing in government is more difficult than attempting to locate that delicate balance between the defense needs of the future and the growing movement to get spending under control, a goal I have long supported through amendments to balance the federal budget.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee where the Defense legislation originated, I know firsthand that this is a complicated, painstaking process. Fortunately, most of us on the committee have always considered defense to be a non-partisan issue too important for anything other than the most serious study in consultation with our nation's defense experts.

NEED FOR STRENGTH

Briefly, this was the situation when we sat down to write the legislation: We knew that the buildup, begun in 1980, in strategic and conventional strength must be continued. Following the Vietnam Conflict, this country has allowed its forces to wane--against the warnings of many of us. At the same time, the Soviet Union embarked on a dedicated effort to achieve military superiority, and our intelligence briefings had provided us with the alarming statistics of Soviet defense production.

Against the backdrop of nationwide calls for budgetary restraint, we went to work to counter the Soviet threat with a strong defense tailored to meet the overall strategy of our own country.

What we came up with was a Defense bill which would have authorized appropriations totaling \$180.3 billion for Fiscal Year 1983. What our committee had done, during long sessions of cuts and additions to the Administration's proposal was to prepare an authorization bill \$3.2 billion below the amount requested by the President--but also a full \$46 billion higher than last year's.

authorization and representing the largest increase in peacetime history.

WATCHING THE BUDGET

Before the Defense Authorization Act was considered, however, Congress approved the first budget resolution which, in effect, placed a cap on spending and mandated an additional \$3.2 billion reduction in the authorization bill. Responding to the extraordinary economic situation facing the nation, we on the Armed Services Committee went back to work to propose our own bipartisan amendments to cut authorizations by \$3.2 billion rather than leave the issue open to the possibility of dangerous, wholesale cuts which might be offered by individual members.

What we did in the Committee amendments was to make every effort to see that these new cuts did as little damage as possible to critical defense programs by spreading the impact over a great number of areas. The House of Representatives agreed, approving our Committee amendments by overwhelming margins.

At that point, after supporting reductions in authorizations totaling \$6.4 billion since we first looked at the Administration proposals--and after we reached the level called for

in ~~the budget~~ resolution--I said I would oppose further cuts proposed by members during floor debate. At this writing, more than 50 amendments, some of them cutting to the bone and muscle of our defense system, have been suggested.

We simply cannot afford further cuts if we are to remain the strong arm of the free world. I hope and pray that we can reach an understanding with the Soviet Union on a mutual, bilateral limitation of arms, but until we do we must maintain a military force powerful enough to deter aggression.

"The alternative," said former Defense Secretary Harold Brown, "is to let ourselves slip into inferiority, into a position of weakness in a harsh world where principles unsupported by power are victimized, and to become a nation with more of a past than a future."

This is a strong statement, well worth remembering. As we continue to debate the defense needs of our country, it will serve us well to consider the ramifications of a "position of weakness in a a harsh world" and guard against them.

From my position in teh House Armed Services Committee, I pledge to continue to do exactly that.

Dates, livestock judges, and entertainment for the 114th Washington County Fair have been released according to President Donal Ray Ahrens.

The Washington County Fair first in Texas, established in 1868, will run from September 22-25 in Brenham.

Judging activities will begin September 22 with the Breeding Sheep and Swine shows judged by Jack Groff of Kerrville and Jim McManaigal of Happy, respectively.

Brand new this year will be a breeding poultry show judged by a sanctioned APA and ABA judge on Wednesday.

September 23 schedule includes the SGBI approved Santa Gertrudis show judged by Bobby Scroggins of Thorndale and the ABBA approved Brahman show judged by Dr. Jim Sanders of College Station. The Bluebonnet Brahman Breeders Association will sponsor a sale at 1:30 pm

Judging on September 24 wil include the Hereford, Red Poll, and Simmentals by Dr. John Maurer of College Station and the Brangus, Charolais, and Polled Hereford by Jim Williams of Hungerford. Williams will

also judge the first approved Sales show in the state of Texas on Friday.

September 25 activities will include the 4-H/FFA Livestock and Dairy Judging Contests, Dairy Goat show judged by Rev. Paul Ashbrook of Portage, Wisconsin, and the Junior Daity Shows (Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, and Jersey) judged by A.M.Meekma of Bryan. Also, the Junior Beef Heifer shows and judges are Red Brangus, Hereford, Simmental and Red Poll by Jim Williams of Hungerford; Angus, Brangus, Polled Hereford and Charolais by Dr. John Maurer of College Station; and Brahman

and Santa Gertrudis by Sloan Williams of Hungerford.

Entries for all the livestock shows are due September 1. A new rule has been added for junior exhibitors to check in Thursday evening and miss only one day of school.

Excellent entertainment is scheduled each night--Gene Watson on Wednesday night, Texas Pride Thursday night, Fiddlin' Frechie Burke and Dottsy Friday night and Johnny Duncan and Barbara Fairchild on Saturday night.

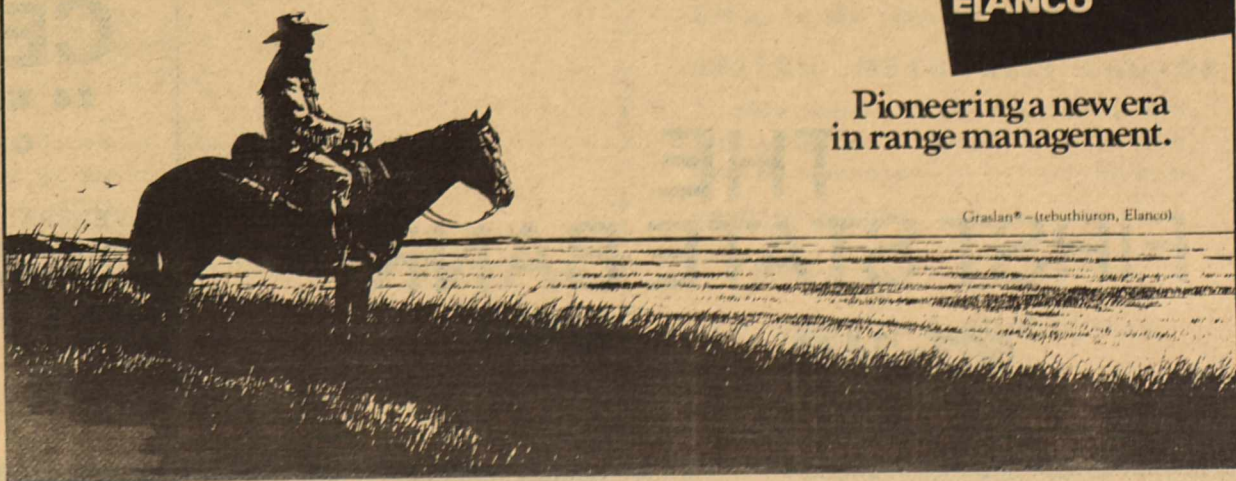

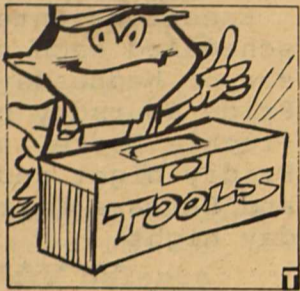

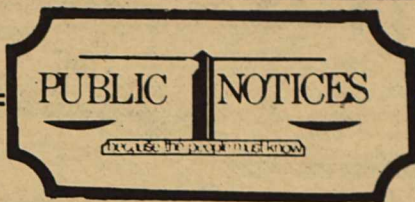
