VOTER'S REGISTRATION DRIVE

On August 11,1982, Governor Clements proclaimed the period August 11,1982 through October 3,1982 as the official period for a statewide "Voter Registration Drive". Based on the fact that only two out of every three eligible voters in Texas are registrated tovote, eligible voters not currently registered to vote must be encouraged to do so by October 3,1982 -- the date by which Texans must be registered to vote in the State's November 2,1982 general election.

Inconjunction with the Governors Proclaimation, theSecaretary of State's Office has initiated an entensive voter registration Drive. Organizations across the State and teh media are being asked to participate in this effort. In addition, an effort will again be made to contact eleigible high school students to urge them toregister to vote. QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTING:

- 1. You must be a citizen of the United States.
- 2. You must be at least 18 years of age on the day of the elec-
- 3. You must be a resident of the county, or political subdivi sion conducting the election.
- You must be registered to vote. PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE:
- !. Those convicted of a felony whose full rights of citizenship have not been restored.
- 2. Those persons found mentally incompetent by a court of law. HOW TO REGISTER TO VOTE:
- 1. Complete a post card application for voter registration and mail ti postage-free or present it in person to the voter registrar in your county.
- 2. You may registrar to vote at any time, but your application must be received by your county Voter Registrar by October 3, 1982 in order to vote in the November 2,1982, general election. Because October 3,1982 falls on a Sunday, persons wishing to register in person at the voter registrar's office by the October 3rd deadline must go so no later than the close of business, Friday, October 1,1982.

3. You may register to vote if you are at laest 17 years and 10 months of age, but you may not vote until you are 18 years of age.



FISH POND STOCKING

Fish Pond Stocking Program Initiated ...

Several years ago, Federal and State agencies ceased supplying fish for stocking private waters. Since that time it has been up to the individual landowners to find sources of fish to purchase and transport to their individual farms and ranches. The Directors of the Nueces-Frio-Sabinal Soil and Water Conservation District have agreed to serve as a clearing house for these orders and arrange for a systematic delivery

With the opening of schools, Texas drivers are strongly cautioned to be alert for students on their way to and from schools.

Motorists must exercise extreme care routes. Texas law requires motorists STOP FOR ANY SCHOOL BUS LOADING AND UNLOADING PASSENGERS. To warn drivers

Safety officials say that drivers should also be alert at reailroad crossings since school buses are required to stop, look and listen before crossing the tracks.

To remind drivers that special alertness is needed around theschools and school buses, most cities will increase police surveillance.

The State of Texas and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation have won a major legal decision concerning discriminatory employment practices. Federal Judge Lucious Bunton of the U.S.District Court for the Western District of Texas, Pecos, dismissed all charges against the highway department after a lengthy trail proved the departmen's employment practices were sound.

Judge Bunton also ruled that the department and the state of Texas should be reimbursed by the Justice Department for all costs expended by the defense. Watson Arnold of the Texas Attorney





General's Office, who was in charge of the state's defense, said, "The department didn't feel we were guilty. We responded to the initial charges that we investigated discrimination charges more diligently and speedily than did the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. The findings of the court after such a lengthy trail proves that the sate agency was correct." Arnold was assisted in the state's defense by Dudley Fowler and Steven Greenberg also of the Attorney's Generals' Office.

SDH&PT Engineer-Director Mark Goode said the charges of discrimination filed against the department "were filed by almost every possible charging party, and after our investigation, we determined that only three had even dubious validity. Although this ruling vindicates our belief that we do not discriminate in hiring, we will continue the same efforts we have in the past to constantly improve all areas of personnel management, including hiring, which has always been our goal."

Teh department's response to the federal agency's charges at the beginning noted that thefederal suit was unfairly trying to show that disproportionate numbers of blacks, women and Hispanics were theresult of discrimination instead of factors beyond the department's control.

The court order, issued Aug. 17, read, "It is ordered, adjudged and decreed that the Plaintiff, United States of America, take nothing by its suit, th cause is dismissed on its merits, and the Defendants, the State of Texas and State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, whihe is an agency of said state, shall recover their costs in this behalf expended."

Judge Bunton's order came almost a year to the day after the conclusion of the trail held in Pecos. The four-day trail saw more than 200 exhibits weighing about 500 pounds entered.

OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educa-tional institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a con-struction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each
subsequent biennium, the
maximum amount spent
for state welfare shall not
exceed one percent of the
state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husband-ry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution
119 proposes a constitutional amendment that
would authorize Tarrant
and Bee counties to hold
county-wide elections to
abolish the county treasurer's office by majority
vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land

Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

PROPOSICION NUMERO 1 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta de

la Cámara de Representantes 1 propone una enmienda constitucional que prohiba cualquier impuesto estatal por avalúo. Los recibos de impuestos estatales por avalúo anteriormente autorizados que son cobrados después de la fecha efectiva de la propuesta enmienda a esta sección serán depositados al crédito del fondo general del condado que cobra los impuestos y pueden ser gastados para los fines del condado. Los impuestos que son cobrados antes de esa fecha serán distribuídos por la Legislatura entre las instituciones educativas que son elegibles para recibir esos fondos bajo ley previa. PROPOSICION NUMERO 2 EN LA BOLETA

La enmienda establecería el límite de gastos de asistencia pública estatal a \$160,000,000 para el bienio 1982-1983. Además la enmienda provee que para cada bienio subsiguiente la cantidad máxima que se pueda gastar en asistencia pública no será en exceso de 1% del presupuesto estatal.

La propuesta enmienda aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

PROPOSICION NUMERO 3 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta del Senado 8 propone una enmienda constitucional que exencione de la imposición de impuestos la maquinaria y el equipo que se usan en la producción de productos agrícolos y ganaderos. No se impondría limites de dólares y la exención se aplicaría a las sociedades anónimas y colectivas tanto como a las familias y los individuos.

PROPOSICION NUMERO 5 EN LA BOLETA

Si se anula el oficio de tesorero del condado, se cederán los deberes, poderes y funciones de dicho oficio al auditor del condado o al sucesor de las funciones del auditor.


