### VOTER'S REGISTRATION DRIVE

On August 11, 1982, Governor Clements proclaimed the period August 11, 1982 through October 3, 1982 as the official period for a statewide "Voter Registration Drive". Based on the fact that only two out of every three eligible voters in Texas are registered to vote, eligible voters not currently registered to vote must be encouraged to do so by October 3, 1982--the date by which Texans must be registered to vote in the State's November 2, 1982 general election.

In conjunction with the Governors Proclamation, the Secretary of State's Office has initiated an extensive voter registration Drive. Organizations across the State and the media are being asked to participate in this effort. In addition, an effort will again be made to contact eligible high school students to urge them to register to vote.  
**QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTING:**

1. You must be a citizen of the United States.
2. You must be at least 18 years of age on the day of the election.
3. You must be a resident of the county, or political subdivision conducting the election.
4. You must be registered to vote.

#### PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE:

1. Those convicted of a felony whose full rights of citizenship have not been restored.
2. Those persons found mentally incompetent by a court of law.

#### HOW TO REGISTER TO VOTE:

1. Complete a post card application for voter registration and mail it postage-free or present it in person to the voter registrar in your county.
2. You may register to vote at any time, but your application must be received by your county Voter Registrar by October 3, 1982 in order to vote in the November 2, 1982, general election. Because October 3, 1982 falls on a Sunday, persons wishing to register in person at the voter registrar's office by the October 3rd deadline must go so no later than the close of business, Friday, October 1, 1982.
3. You may register to vote if you are at least 17 years and 10 months of age, but you may not vote until you are 18 years of age.

## \*\*\*\*\* Strake Talk

### TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long--or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."

My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need

to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our highways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms--eight years. That is enough time for anyone. Too great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

FISH POND STOCKING

Fish Pond Stocking Program Initiated...

Several years ago, Federal and State agencies ceased supplying fish for stocking private waters. Since that time it has been up to the individual landowners to find sources of fish to purchase and transport to their individual farms and ranches. The Directors of the Nueces-Frio-Sabinal Soil and Water Conservation District have agreed to serve as a clearing house for these orders and arrange for a systematic delivery program.

Fish delivery will be Saturday, October 30, 1982, beginning at 1:30 pm in the parking lot of the Civic Center in Uvalde. The District will offer 4-6 inch channel cat at 30¢ each, 6-8 inch channel catfish at 45¢ each, 3-4 inch native bass at 55¢, 2-3 inch bluegill at 35¢, each and fathead

minnows at 7.00 per pound. Plastic bags necessary for transportation will be furnished. It is suggested that you bring ice chests to carry the bags of fish.

Application forms are available from the District Office at 1022 Garner Field Road (SCS Office), in Uvalde. Orders must be received by October 15, 1982. For further information, call the Soil Conservation Service Office in Uvalde at 278-2014.

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STATE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

With the opening of schools, Texas drivers are strongly cautioned to be alert for students on their way to and from schools.

Motorists must exercise extreme care in school areas and along school bus routes. Texas law requires motorists STOP FOR ANY SCHOOL BUS LOADING AND UNLOADING PASSENGERS. To warn drivers

such buses have alternately flashing RED LIGHTS on the front and rear. Motorists must remain stopped while these red lights are flashing.

The Texas Department of Public Safety statistics for 1981 showed there were 17 deaths and 925 injuries in 1,698 school bus-related accidents

Safety officials say that drivers should also be alert at railroad crossings since school buses are required to stop, look and listen before crossing the tracks.

To remind drivers that special alertness is needed around the schools and school buses, most cities will increase police surveillance.

The State of Texas and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation have won a major legal decision concerning discriminatory employment practices. Federal Judge Lucius Bunton of the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas, Pecos, dismissed all charges against the highway department after a lengthy trial proved the department's employment practices were sound.

Judge Bunton also ruled that the department and the state of Texas should be reimbursed by the Justice Department for all costs expended by the defense.

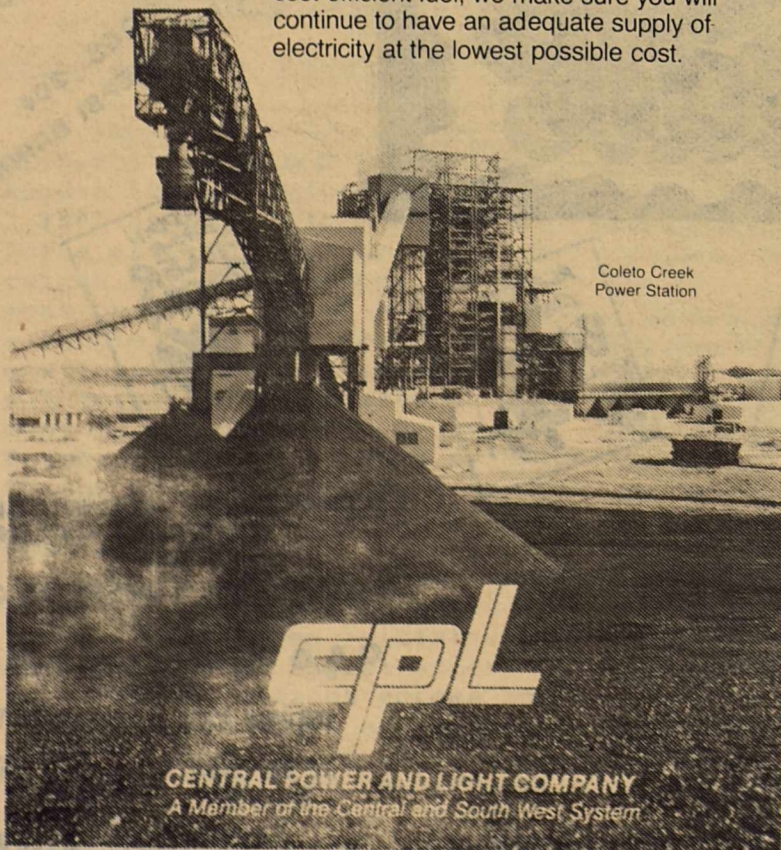

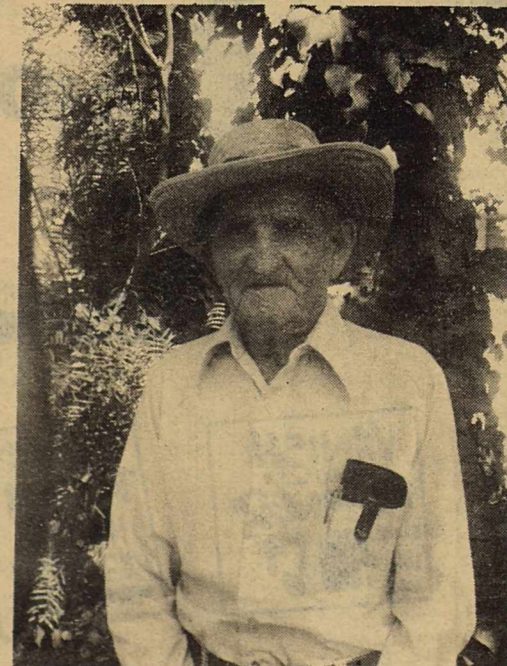

General's Office, who was in charge of the state's defense, said, "The department didn't feel we were guilty. We responded to the initial charges that we investigated discrimination charges more diligently and speedily than did the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. The findings of the court after such a lengthy trail proves that the state agency was correct." Arnold was assisted in the state's defense by Dudley Fowler and Steven Greenberg also of the Attorney's Generals' Office.

SDH&PT Engineer-Director Mark Goode said the charges of discrimination filed against the department "were filed by almost every possible charging party, and after our investigation, we determined that only three had even dubious validity. Although this ruling vindicates our belief that we do not discriminate in hiring, we will continue the same efforts we have in the past to constantly improve all areas of personnel management, including hiring, which has always been our goal."

The department's response to the federal agency's charges at the beginning noted that the federal suit was unfairly trying to show that disproportionate numbers of blacks, women and Hispanics were the result of discrimination instead of factors beyond the department's control.

The court order, issued Aug. 17, read, "It is ordered, adjudged and decreed that the Plaintiff, United States of America, take nothing by its suit, the cause is dismissed on its merits, and the Defendants, the State of Texas and State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, which is an agency of said state, shall recover their costs in this behalf expended."

Judge Bunton's order came almost a year to the day after the conclusion of the trail held in Pecos. The four-day trail saw more than 200 exhibits weighing about 500 pounds entered.

NOVEMBER 2, 1982

**PROPOSITION NO. 1  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3  
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 5  
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

**PROPOSITION NO. 6  
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land

Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

La enmienda establecería el límite de gastos de asistencia pública estatal a \$160,000,000 para el bienio 1982-1983.

Además la enmienda provee que para cada bienio subsiguiente la cantidad máxima que se pueda gastar en asistencia pública no será en exceso de 1% del presupuesto estatal.

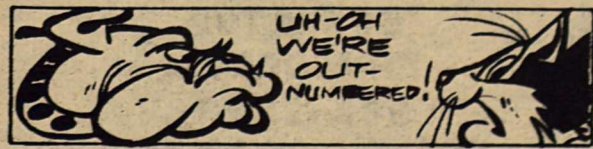

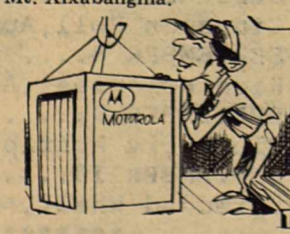
