





### MICROWAVE USE CENTERS ON OVENS

They detect speeding cars, provide warnings against burglars, send telephone and television communications, and provide deep heat for treating sore muscles. But the most familiar use of microwaves is to cook food.

Despite their widespread use, research on whether low levels of

radiation from microwaves pose any health hazard is inconclusive, says the Texas Medical Association. But microwave ovens are considered safe if approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and used properly.

Three characteristics allow microwaves to be used in cooking; They pass through glass, paper, plastic and similar materials; foods absorb

them; and metals reflect them.

Inside the oven, an electron tube called a magnetron produces microwaves. They bounce off the oven's metal walls until absorbed by the food. The microwaves cause the water molecules in the food to vibrate, producing heat that cooks the foods. For this reason, foods with a high water content, like fresh vegetables cook more quickly than others.

These ovens cannot make food radioactive because microwave energy is converted to heat as soon as the food absorbs the waves. The concern is over radiation leaking from ovens. But FDA standards limit allowable microwave leakage during an oven's lifetime to a level far below that known to harm people. In addition, the measurements are taken two inches from the oven's surface, and the level of leaking radiation that might reach a person decreases dramatically as he moves away from the oven.

Here are some tips for operating a microwave oven safely:

- Follow the manufacturer's instruction manual.
- Don't operate the oven if the door closes improperly.
- Never operate the oven if you have reason to believe it will continue to operate with the door open.
- Don't stand directly against the oven for long periods while it is on.

## CREEPING NEGLECT CAN BE COSTLY

Everyone feels a bit remiss from time to time when neglecting such duties as dental checkups, dripping faucets or overdue shoe repairs. Basic preventive

maintenance on our cars is another responsibility which deserves attention.

Engine tune-up, for example, is among the automotive services which, if ignored too long, can penalize the car owner in terms of wasted gasoline, inconvenience and delays.



Statistics are working against us, according to Car Care Council. The average car age is increasing while the size of the vehicle engine is decreasing. The negligent motorist, therefore, becomes more vulnerable to car trouble. When one spark plug in a four-cylinder engine stops firing, the performance drops off much more noticeably than it would in the case of a larger engine.


How do you know when your engine needs a tune-up? The Council lists the

following symptoms:

1. A noticeable increase in fuel consumption. Keep a running record of fuel consumed versus mileage driven to be aware of increasing consumption.
2. Rough idling or roughness on acceleration.
3. Hard starting.
4. Dieseling or "run-on", where the engine continues to run a few seconds after the ignition is turned off.
5. Knocking or pinging, especially under load.
6. Noticeable drop in


power or performance.

The Southwest Texas Junior College library will be open on selected Saturdays this fall for students who find it difficult to complete their research assignments during the week.

The college offers a substantial off-campus and evening program, usually enrolling a sizeable number of adults who work full-time during the week and do their studying on the weekends.

"Every year we have requests for weekend hours from people who are busy during the week," said Billie Noguess, director of the SWTJC library. "we will be open from 9 am to 3 pm on four Saturdays this semester to help these students complete their work."

The library will be open those six hours on October 2, 9, and 16; and on November 6.

According to Noguess, experiments and studies conducted by her staff

indicate that there is not a large enough need to justify the opening of the library on every Saturday.

"I'd like to encourage those who would like to see more weekend hours or at least the continuation of our present weekend policy, to take advantage of the Saturdays we'll open this semester," Noguess said.

A large turnout will justify staying open on some Saturdays," she continued.

*Elections Update*

The Secretary of State's Office will undertake vote tabulation in primary and general elections beginning with the November 2 general election. The Texas Election Bureau (TEB) has unanimously voted not to tabulate results for the upcoming general election and instead supports a merger of experience and expertise with the Secretary of State's Office.

The TEB, a non-profit corporation formed in 1934, is to be commended for filling a major void left by the State, however, the time has clearly come for the State to take on the statewide vote tabulation process. The proposal is supported by Governor Clements, Lt. Governor Hobby, Speaker Clayton, and State Representative Gib Lewis. In addition, Representative Lewis has agreed to be the House sponsor of legislation to institutionalize the vote tabulation process in the Secretary of State's Office.

As the Chief Election Officer of the State, responsibility for ensuring uniform administration of Texas' elections and election laws is vested with the Secretary of State's Office, and to that end, prompt statewide election returns in a quasi official manner will reduce the opportunity for election fraud and post-election electioneering. I am confident that with the support of the Texas news media, the support of the Texas Election Bureau's Board of Directors, and the state's county clerks, the state-sponsored vote tabulation project beginning with the November 2 general election will be a successful undertaking and serve to ensure that opportunities for election fraud are minimized while information flow to the voters, candidates, and news media is maximized. Clearly, Texas voters and candidates must have full confidence that their votes will be properly counted and officially reported in the most timely manner possible.

The current membership of the Board of Directors of the Texas Election Bureau and three additional representatives of the news media have been asked to serve in an advisory capacity to the Secretary of State's Office in this project with particular emphasis on developing the format of the election returns to be reported on November 2, 1982. The expertise and experience of the TEB Board members will ensure that the needs of the Texas media are well served and represented. Considerations for expanded and specialized services to the news media such as coverage of Texas House and Senate races and regional breakdowns of statewide races are being fully assessed and analyzed for implementation. The Task Force will be convened in Austin on September 8, 1982 to review and take action on a Secretary of State Election Central operation manual.

The County Clerks of Texas have also been asked to assist the Secretary of State's Office by reporting county vote totals to the Secretary of State's Office on election night. Clearly, the support of these officials is essential to the success of the project. In addition, volunteers from the Secretary of State's Volunteer Inspector program will be utilized to report vote totals to the Secretary of State Election Central.

All Texans not currently registered to vote are encouraged to do so by October 3, 1982, in order to vote in the November 2 general election. To obtain a voter registration card, contact your county Voter Registrar or call the Secretary of State's Office toll-free at 1-800-252-9602.

**\$24,000 SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM  
ANNOUNCED BY PIONEER HI-BRED**

Beginning in the fall of 1983, the Southwestern Division of Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., will initiate a new scholarship program to benefit farm youth in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Through the scholarship program, Pioneer will award six four-year scholarships annually to FFA and 4-H Members in

the three states.

High School seniors who receive the \$4,000 scholarships will be awarded \$1,000 each year for the four years they attend college. By the fall of 1986, when the scholarship program is fully implemented, the Southwestern Division of Pioneer will be awarding \$24,000 annually toward College educations for outstanding FFA and 4-H Members.

The announcement of the new scholarship program was made by Jim Lindsay, president of the Southwestern Division of Pioneer.

"We hope the announcement of these scholarships emphasizes how strongly Pioneer believes in the job being done by the FFA and 4-H organizations of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico," Lindsey said. "We regard the FFA and 4-H as two of the finest youth organizations in the world."

"When Pioneer was established 56 years ago, one of the founding principles was to provide a better life for farmers and their families. Through the years, better hybrids and varieties, combined with sound improvements in crop management, have kept this principle intact.

"Today, these scholarships allow us to go one step further. Not only will they help relieve some of the financial burden from farm families who have a son or daughter attending college, they will also help insure a better life for future generations," Lindsey said.

Each year, one FFA and one 4-H member in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico will be awarded a scholarship from Pioneer. To qualify for the Pioneer scholarship, the applicant must be a graduating senior in the upper 25 percent of his or her class. They must also be planning to pursue a degree in agriculture, home economics or a related field at an accredited college or university in the state where the scholarship is awarded.

Selection of the scholarship winners will be made by the representative FFA or 4-H scholarship committees in each state. The criteria they will use to select the scholarship recipient will include accomplishments while in FFA or 4-H, scholastic ability, financial need, leadership ability and citizenship.

The winners of the scholarships will be awarded \$1,000 annually for four years provided they remain enrolled in an approved college and maintain a 2.0 or higher grade point average on a 4.0 grade scale. Students may apply for the scholarship through their local chapter of FFA or 4-H Club.

- 1 can (8-1/4 oz.) Dole Sliced Pineapple in Syrup
- 2 to 3 cups Bud of California Shredded Lettuce
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced zucchini or jicama
- 1/4 cup sliced green onion
- 1 cooked whole chicken breast, cubed
- 1/2 cup Jack or Cheddar cheese strips
- 1 small tomato, sliced
- 1 small avocado, sliced
- Chili Dressing
- Corn chips
- Pumpkin seeds, shelled & toasted

Drain pineapple, reserving 1/4 cup syrup. Combine lettuce, zucchini and onion; spoon into 2 salad bowls. Top with chicken, pineapple, cheese, tomato and avocado slices. Serve with Chili Dressing. Sprinkle with corn chips and pumpkin seeds. Makes 2 generous servings.

How To Close The Door On An Unwelcome Visitor

An extremely sociable but very unwelcome visitor in millions of American homes may find the door firmly closed in its face this fall.

The visitor is the head louse, which comes calling primarily through the heads of younger children. They bring the lice (and their eggs) home from school. The lice can infest the entire family and much of the immediate community.

Now there's an answer to this pesty problem. There's a new pleasant-smelling lotion that shows great promise in diminishing the rising incidence of head lice and their ova infestations.

The lotion is called Prioderm and it recently received approval from the Food and Drug Administration for treatment and eradication of head lice and egg infestation in humans.

The company that developed the lotion, Purdue Frederick, reports that recent studies done by the University of Miami Medical School were published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Work-

ing with Public Health officials in the Republic of Panama, the researchers studied the "kill power" of the new product. The project concluded that this such as Ivory or one of the power proved 100 percent effective for 24 hours after shampooing and diminished to only 95 percent after seven days.

The study pointed out that the problem of treating and eradicating head lice is twofold--both the adult lice and their eggs must be eradicated. "In addition," researchers said, "a reinfestation preventive program is an important therapeutic asset toward treating and eradicating this readily transmitted health nuisance."




## GUNOWNERS & THE LAW

### SHOOT WITHOUT WARNING?

**Q: If I am awakened by an intruder in my home some night, do I have to be in fear of my life before I have the legal right to shoot the intruder? And, must I warn the intruder before I shoot?**

**A: NO.** Under Texas law you do not have to be in fear of death or serious bodily injury before you resort to deadly force against the intruder in your home. You are not legally required to warn the intruder of your intent to use deadly force before you do so.

**Q: I have been told that it is against the law for me to cut off the barrel of my shotgun. Is this true?**

**A: NO.** You have the legal right to cut off the barrel (as well as the stock) of your own shotgun. Make certain that after the modifications that the barrel length is more than eighteen (18) inches and the overall length of the shotgun is more than twenty-six (26) inches.

**Q: If I buy a handgun at a gun show, do I have to register it in Texas?**

**A: NO.** There is no firearm registration law in Texas.

The popularity of the all-season radial tires is steadily increasing, but can they be mounted on the same car with regular "highway-rub" tires?



"Yes," says an expert, "as long as they are the same construction and same size."

Bill Woehrle, manager of industry standards of the Uniroyal Tire Company, says there are four rules to follow when mixing tires:

1. Radial and bias ply tires should never be mounted on the same axle.

2. If they have to be mixed on the same vehicle, the radials are always mounted in the rear and the bias plys on the front axle.

3. This arrangement should never be rotated front to back.

4. These same rules apply to front-wheel drive vehicles.

Woehrle notes that some states have adopted regulations prohibiting mixing radial and bias-ply tires on the same vehicle, in any combination. "State rules should always be observed," he says. Your tire dealer can advise you on regulations in your state.

### Increased Success In Treating High Blood Pressure

High blood pressure can occur more often in minority group Americans than in whites. Fortunately, there are now more remedies available to help combat this widespread disease.

Although about 60 million Americans suffer from high blood pressure, some 17 percent of all Americans between the ages of 25 and 74 are estimated to be suffering from mild high blood pressure. Today, there's a new understanding of the benefits of treating even mild high blood pressure (a diastolic pressure between 90 and 104).

Effective management of mild high blood pressure can reduce the death rate from diseases related to high blood pressure by as much as 20 percent.

Initial treatment of this health problem generally involves the use of a diuretic, but potassium loss, or hypokalemia, is a well-known and potentially troublesome adverse effect of many diuretic medications for high blood pressure. Low blood levels of this mineral can cause muscle cramps, weakness and lethargy and more severe problems.

To deal with this problem, potassium-sparing diuretics — combination drugs containing a diuretic and an agent to help maintain safe blood levels of the mineral — are prescribed for appropriate patients.

One such treatment now available is a new drug called Moduretic. It is high-



ly effective in reducing blood pressure while helping to prevent loss of the vital mineral potassium. Recently introduced by Merck Sharp & Dohme, the drug is used for treating people with high blood pressure or congestive heart failure who developed hypokalemia while being treated with other diuretics or those in whom maintaining normal potassium levels is important.

The once-a-day dosage regimen of Moduretic also represents a significant advance in terms of patient acceptance and compliance with therapy.

Among those patients who should not take the drug are those who are hypersensitive to it or to other sulfonamide-derived drugs, have high potassium levels, are using other potassium-conserving agents, or are on a potassium-rich diet. The use of potassium-conserving agents is often unnecessary in patients receiving diuretics for uncomplicated essential hypertension when such patients have a normal diet.

To find out if you have high blood pressure or low potassium levels, you should arrange to see a doctor soon.



### Now's The Time To Take Down Screens

Answers to some important questions on saving energy by June G. Fitzgerald, Executive Secretary, Screen Manufacturers Association.

**Q.** To save on fuel bills, when is the best time to take down my summer screens?

**A.** The best time to take down screens and put up storm windows is when you feel cold. If you're hardy enough not to notice the chill well into November, put

up the storm windows anyway, so you won't have to heat the house in a hurry on that first really raw day.

Once the screens are down, check for needed repairs. Look in the Yellow Pages for a screen dealer and tell them June Fitzgerald said to call.

This is the time, too, to give the storm windows a once-over for leaks. Even small cracks can cause cold air to leak in and expensive warm air to leak out. As much as 15 to 30 percent of the average fuel dollar can be lost out the window. Hold a lighted candle near windows (away from drapes or shades) to pinpoint cracks. The flame will flicker or even go out.

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

PRE-ENTRANCE EXAMS FOR SPRING VOCATIONAL NURSING CLASSES

Dates for pre-entrance examinations for a new spring class which is being offered for the first time this year, in the School of Vocational Nursing at Southwest Texas Junior College were announced this week.

"The job market for vocational nurses is excellent right now," said June Hollier, SWTJC director of vocational nursing. "To keep up with the market, we're beginning a new class in the spring this year, while the students that started in the fall are still in session."

Testing dates for individuals interested in being considered for the class are on the first Wednesday of the next three months, October 6, November 3, and December 1.

The \$15 registration fee may be paid in advance to Mr. Rudy Gonzales, by mail or in person, c/o SWTJC Business Office, Uvalde, Texas 78801 or at 8 am just before the test is administered in the nursing classroom in the Essie P. Richarz Health Center on the SWTJC campus.

The pre-entrance test lasts 3 hours and consists of four parts, including verbal (word meanings,) reading, arithmetic and basic science concepts.

The vocational nursing program consists of 1700 hours, including 600 hours of classroom study and 1100 hours of practical clinical experience, spread over a full year.

Clinical experiences are scheduled at Memorial Hospital in Uvalde, the base hospital for the program, as well as other hospitals in the Southwest Texas area schools, nursing home, the public health department, the burn center in San Antonio and other health facilities

Besides certification as a vocational nurse, graduates will receive C.P.R. certification from the American Heart Association and First Aid certification from the American Red Cross.

The SWTJC school of Vocational Nursing has achieved considerable prestige recently by producing graduates that score well above the norm on the state vocational nursing examination. Registration for the new class will be January 12, 1983.

"We are anxious to get another good group of students," Hollier said "We will even schedule an alternate testing date for individuals who have problems with the existing schedule upon request."
