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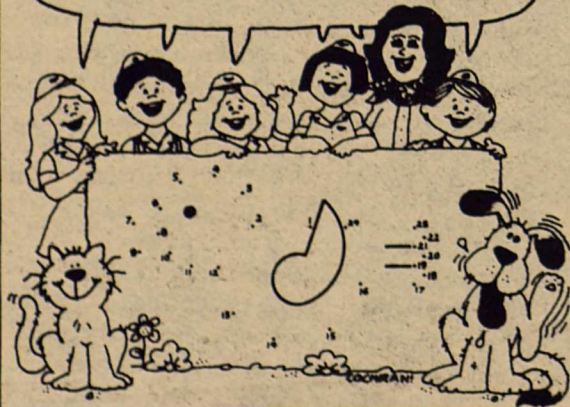

American Employers Teaming Up For Productivity

Many factors contribute to productivity: designs, superior tools, clever processes, minimal regulations.

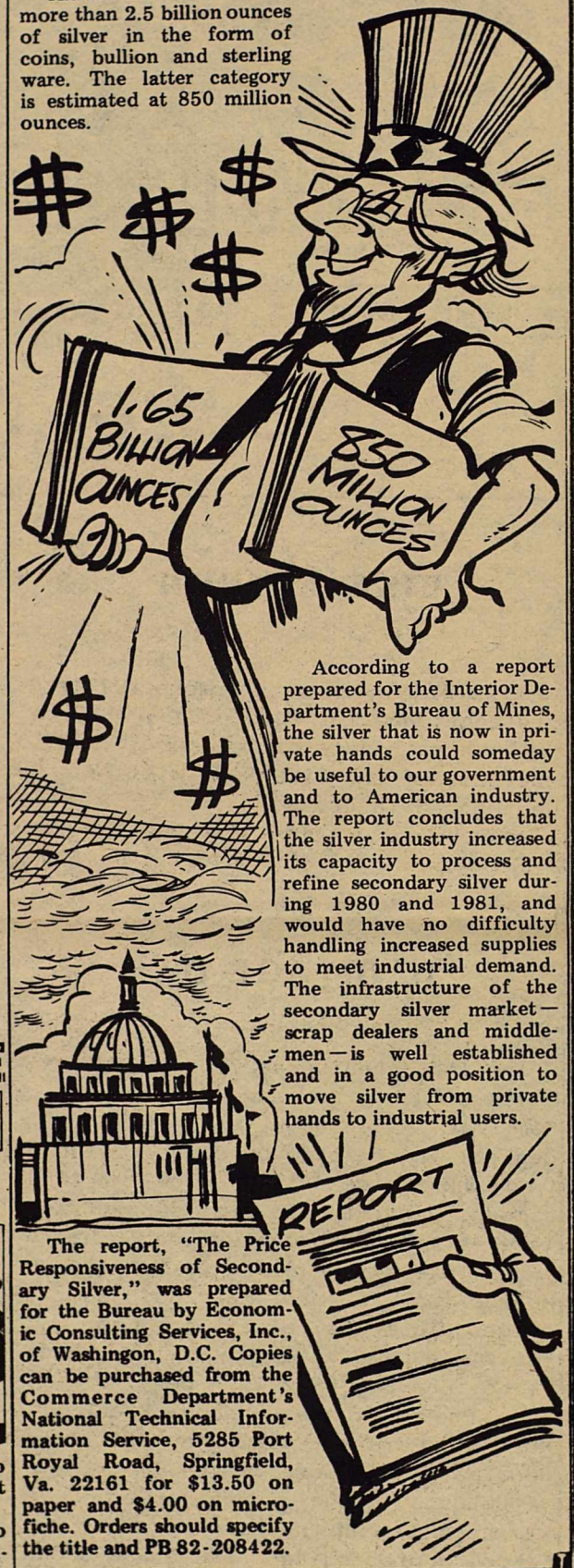

DID YOU KNOW?

Americans now hold more than 2.5 billion ounces of silver in the form of coins, bullion and sterling ware. The latter category is estimated at 850 million ounces.



According to a report prepared for the Interior Department's Bureau of Mines, the silver that is now in private hands could someday be useful to our government and to American industry. The report concludes that the silver industry increased its capacity to process and refine secondary silver during 1980 and 1981, and would have no difficulty handling increased supplies to meet industrial demand. The infrastructure of the secondary silver market—scrap dealers and middlemen—is well established and in a good position to move silver from private hands to industrial users.

The report, "The Price Responsiveness of Secondary Silver," was prepared for the Bureau by Economic Consulting Services, Inc., of Washington, D.C. TIPS ON MOVING

Of the 22 million Americans who move their household each year, 84 percent choose do-it-yourself methods. Why? They're opting for the lower costs, the personal care they can give their goods, and the convenience of leaving and arriving on the dates they choose.

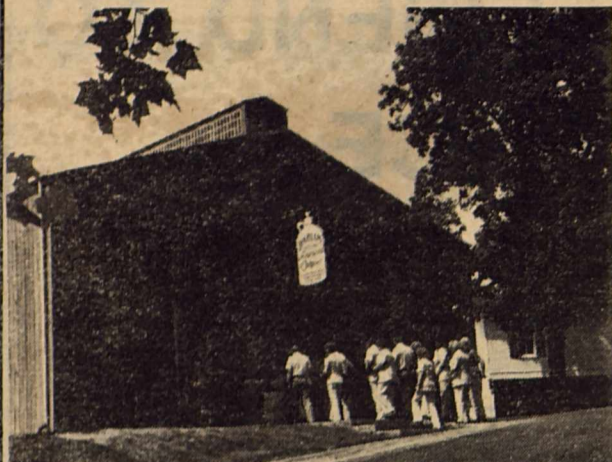

Kentucky: A Barrel Of Fun



In the heart of the bourbon country, visitors find a free-admission tourist center which offers a bit of Kentucky history.

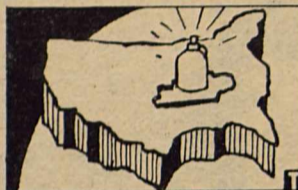
More and more visitors are discovering an historic town in Kentucky to be a barrel of fun.

One thing which may have to do with that is that Clermont, Kentucky, is the home of the Jim Beam bourbon distillery, which was founded in 1795. The latest addition to the property is a year round, free-admission tourist attraction called Jim Beam's American Outpost.

The company has built a Visitor's Center in the style of an old tobacco barn. The Center is reminiscent, too, of the bourbon-aging warehouse behind it, one of 51 on the site. From here tourists can see some of the thousands of barrels of the product that makes Jim Beam Bourbon the largest selling bourbon in the world.

Happily, the house where the Beam family lived is being restored as a living museum of Kentucky history. But even now, sixth generation master distiller Booker Noe often returns to greet guests.

"Jim Beam's American Outpost," said Don Calhoun,



vice-president and general manager, "is essentially a response to the thousands of tourists who yearly visit Kentucky bourbon country and ask us for tours. In the Jim Beam Theatre, we show a film that tours the distillery and shows how bourbon is made. Then we take folks out to the warehouse to see the barrels aging."

Included among the attractions are a collection of Regal China decanters, some worth thousands of dollars to collectors, a fine gazebo where guests are invited to enjoy a delightful, non-alcoholic refreshment, and some traditional Kentucky crafts. Jim Beam's American Outpost is in the heart of the bourbon-making country, just 22 miles south of Louisville, 15 miles west of Bardstown, just off Highway 245.

Facts From The U.S. Food and Drug Administration

Taking Medicine: When, How, What To Watch For

You've just been handed a prescription. You look forward to better health. But what do you know about that drug? Do you understand what it is meant to do? Do you know how to take it? Medicines can have some side effects, and they have to be taken correctly. So be sure to read instructions carefully, and don't hesitate to ask your doctor about:

- *When to take the medicine.* Some drugs should be taken on full stomachs, some on empty stomachs, some in the morning, some before going to bed. Also be sure to find out how many times a day the medicine should be taken.

- *How to take the medicine and how much.* Should the medication be taken with water, with milk, or without anything? Should the dose be one or two spoonfuls?

- *Can the least expensive form of the medicine be prescribed?* Often the doctor can write the prescription using the "generic" or official name of the medicine.

- *What not to take with the medicine.* Some medicines don't mix with alcohol, others shouldn't be mixed with other drugs. Be sure to let the doctor know what other medications you're taking.

- *What side effects the*



Ask your doctor when you should take your prescription medicine. Some drugs should be taken after meals, others before.

drugs can cause. Medicines may produce a variety of other reactions, including drowsiness, dizziness or nausea. Should an unexpected reaction occur, consult your doctor as soon as possible.

- *Can the prescription be refilled if you must take it frequently? And should you take all the medicine?* Usually, you should continue taking the drug for the entire time ordered by your doctor, even if you're feeling better.

Here are a few tips for over-the-counter drugs. These medicines are not meant to—and do not—cure disease. They should be used for temporary relief of minor symptoms. Read the label carefully. It will tell you how long to take the medicine and what the side effects may be.

NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL WEEK

JOIN BRACKETTVILLE HIGH SCHOOL in Celebration of National High School Activities Week.

Salute the thousands of local high school students involved in extracurricular activities during National High School Activities Week, beginning October 17.

Former President Gerald Ford, chairman of this year's National Activities Week, is urging everyone to support and participate in local activities that draw attention to this cause because "interscholastic programs, from football to debate, are an integral part of school curriculums.

"These activities offer experience in human relations as well as physical and emotional development. They are paramount to youths' total education, yet consume less than one per cent of the school's total budget," Ford said.

Independent studies by the American College Testing Service (ACT) and Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) have revealed that participation in self-motivating school activities help youth become successful adults.

"A student's success in extracurricular activities is a better predictor of adult success than pre-college test scores or academic grades," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, director of the University Interscholastic League. "There also is evidence that students involved in extracurricular activities are less likely to be absent from class. The activities program is a tool to keep students in school and interested."

Initiated by the National Federation of State High School Assn., of which the UIL is a member, the week's goal is to encourage student participation in and community support of extracurricular activities in all schools.

Treat Your Tools With Care

Are your tools in shape? As most home handy-persons know, even the best tools can do their best only if they've been kept in mint condition. Here are some tips that may help you give your tools better care, for better repairs, and longer life.

- Protect tools from rust. Apply a light oil or silicone spray coating.

- Remove nicks from screwdriver tips with a file.

- Keep files in a plastic case or wrapped to avoid damage to teeth.

- Keep all tools clean and cutting edges sharpened. Use a hand file, or grind on a whetstone or grindstone.

- Keep the striking surface of a hammer clean and never put it away when it is wet.

- Don't abuse screwdrivers with heavy work that they were not meant to do. Don't ever try to open paint cans with a screwdriver.

Helpful Information From The U.S. Metric Board

Q. Will "thinking metric" be difficult?



A. Not really. Most of us will need to know the terms meter, kilogram, liter and degrees Celsius. Even then, few people will have to use these with great precision on an everyday basis. For example, "thinking metric" means associating 20 degrees Celsius with room temperature or 37° C with body temperature.

The U.S. Metric Board is a government agency which does planning, research and coordination in connection with voluntary usage of the metric system.

RANCHERS ROUND-UP

PLANNED

UVALDE - An overwhelming majority of the 631 ranchers who attended the International Ranchers Roundup (IRR) favor its continuation as a multi-purpose educational program for the ranching industry, according to a survey tabulated by IRR coordinators.

The study indicated that 99 percent of those attending the three-day rancher parlay from the 25 states represented would recommend future IRR participation to their friends and neighbors engaged in ranching enterprises.

In addition, 80 percent found any of the six concurrent educational sessions highly beneficial to their operations in planning cost-cutting or income-producing alternatives during the current economic slump. The remainder indicated they were able to utilize most of the information presented.

Held in mid-August in Del Rio, the second IRR featured a "faculty" of some 100 ranching experts from Australia, Mexico, South Africa and the U.S. who led discussions in beef cattle, sheep and Angora goats, meat goat productions, wildlife management and brush control plus a first-ever program for women involved in the ranching business. It was the largest, most comprehensive such event ever held in the Southwest.

"We believe we're on the right track in providing the kind of information ranchers need and must have to more effectively manage their operations," commented IRR coordinators, Dr. Larry White and Dr. LeRoy Hoermann, Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists based at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Uvalde.

But an event as complex as the IRR is not without problems. One of the main complaints registered in the survey and often stated by participants during the conferences was the extremely busy concurrent session schedule which saw producers choosing from six talks occurring at once.

"That may have been a problem for some participants although the scheduling was done for everyone's benefit," the coordinators explained. "Sessions were scheduled that way to give participants the most for their time and money and to encourage participation of wives, ranch foremen or managers so information could be pooled."

Perhaps one of the more popular products of the conference is the 472-page proceedings book containing most of the talks presented. This bound book is currently available

at cost for \$25. Inquiries should be addressed to IRR Proceedings, P.O. Drawer 1849, Uvalde, Texas 78801. Rancher surveys indicate the book is a valuable source of practical management information.

The coordinators said a third IRR is being planned for August 1983, although site selection has not been determined.

"We've been very impressed with the IRR's reception in Del Rio the past two years," they emphasized. "The Chamber of Commerce and Del Rio business community have been extremely supportive and are key factors in the IRR's continued success. Yet, the possibility does exist that the IRR may be rotated between Del Rio and another prominent ranching city---possibly San Angelo---making it convenient for ranchers in other areas to attend."

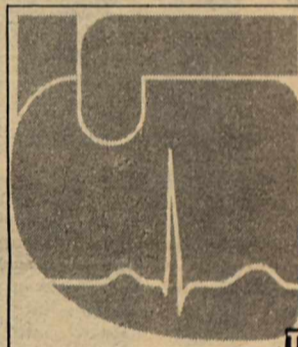

Electrical Failure Of The Heart: Often Preventable

The heart, according to cardiologists, can be thought of as a battery that electrically discharges more than once every second, 100,000 times every day, 37 million times per year, and some 2.5 billion times over the course of an average lifetime. In fact, the heart never takes more than a second's rest, even during sleep.

Disturbances in the heart's delicate electrical system are being increasingly blamed by health officials as a leading cause of sudden cardiac death, the number one killer of people between the ages of 20 and 64. The electrical disturbance is called an arrhythmia, or irregular heartbeat, of which there are several types. They can be as harmless as a skipped heartbeat which is prevalent in much of the population, or as severe as ventricular fibrillation, the arrhythmia often responsible for death.

Ventricular fibrillation can be brought on by chemical, emotional, or other factors. Whatever the reason, the result is always the same. When ventricular fibrillation begins, the heart's electrical activity becomes erratic and the muscle fails to beat in a coordinated way. A series of chaotic twitching movements occur, and the heart loses its ability to pump blood effectively. Vital organs are deprived of their normal blood sup-



ply and begin to suffer. Within a few minutes, the heart stops beating, the victim stops breathing, and dies.

Deaths of this nature are often unnecessary. They can be prevented through cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) or electrical tools called defibrillators, that can shock a stopped heart back into action, or return a fluttering one to a normal pumping rhythm.

There are conditions that may make a person vulnerable to sudden death due to electrical failure of the heart.

Patients identified by physicians as being susceptible to sudden cardiac death can often be treated with antiarrhythmic drugs, which can possibly help prevent arrhythmias such as ventricular fibrillation. Therefore, it is advisable to see a doctor for a complete medical check-up.

ACUPUNCTURE

Texas law included acupuncture under the definition of the practice of medicine. This means only a licensed physician or a trained acupuncturist under the physician's supervision can legally perform this ancient Chinese therapeutic technique. The non-physician acupuncturist must obtain permission to practice from the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners, to practice from the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners, the agency that primarily regulates physicians. The board's guidelines stipulate that an acupuncturist must have at least two years of acupuncture training from a board-approved institute.

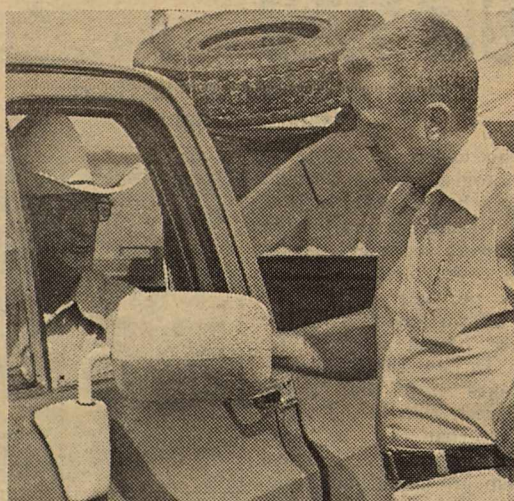
WOOL CONTEST

The contest is designed to focus attention on the beauty and versatility of wool and mohair. Age categories are Pre-teen, Junior, Senior, and Adult. Garments must be made by the contestants of fabric containing at least 60% wool. Contestants may enter any one of the seven district contests to be held at different locations in Texas during November, 1982.

Texas contests are sponsored by the American Sheep Producers Council, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Assn. and Auxiliary and sheep and goat producers and associated firms. Prizes include a sewing machine for the senior state winner, scholarships, sewing supplies, fabrics and trips.

State Director is Mrs. Joe Jackson of Ranger, Texas. She will be in charge of the state finals in Denton at Texas Womens University on Dec. 3 and 4. One senior winner and one junior winner will advance to the National competition in Oklahoma in January, 1983.

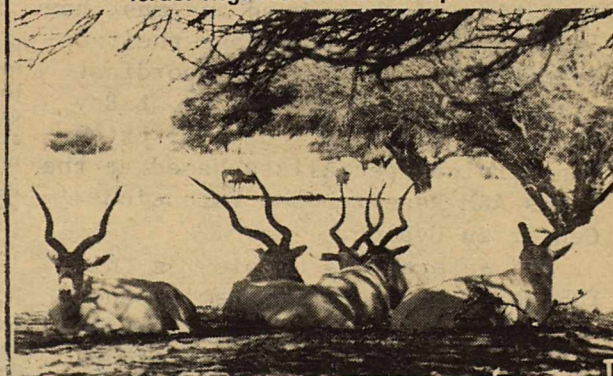

NEWS Of Animals

Israel Ingathers Ancient Species



Descendants of exotic animals who roamed the Holy Land in the days of the Bible are wandering again in their natural habitat. Their new home is the Hai-Bar ("Wildlife") Nature Reserve, a desert setting north of the Red Seaport of Eilat, in Israel. The ingathering began in the 1960s. Ostriches, which perplexed Job with their curious behavior, were brought from Ethiopia's Danakil Desert. Asiatic wild asses (the animal Jesus is said to have ridden from the Mount of Olives into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday) were chased from European zoos...

Oryx antelopes, proto-types of the "unicorn" mentioned in the King James Version of the Bible, were found in a Danish zoo. Addax antelopes, the rare *dishon* of the Bible, were discovered in a New York animal park. Other animals were flown from Africa, Europe, Asia and America. The Nubian Ibex, the mountain goats of the Judean wilderness, were collected by Bedouin trackers for Hai-Bar. Today, the animals live amid the tamarisk, palm and acacia trees of the 12,000 acre reserve. Free to move about, they are secure within a 12-mile predator-proof fence. More than 300 wild animals are doing precisely what's expected of them... re-adapting to the land of their ancestors.


