HAVE A SAFE HALLOWEEN, TEXAS SAFETY ASSOCIATION ADVISES

Traditional Halloween festivities can be fun and safe for children if parents and motorists take proper safety precautions, the Texas Safety Association says.

Children are vulnerable to accidents, particularly on Halloween, because of the happy but careless manner in which they "trick or treat."

The Texas Safety Association recommends that parents consider the following safety tips:

1. When young children go "trick or treating," they should be accompanied by

parents, older brothers or sisters, or other responsible adults.

2. Halloween visits for very small children should be confined to the neighborhood and should be made during afternoon and early evening hours.

3. Costumes should be made of light-colored or reflectorized, flame-retardant material that is short enough to avoid tripping the child.

4. Make-up rather than commercial masks should be used to decorate a child's face. Masks may often have eye holes that obstruct the vision of a youngster. The Texas Safety Association says

that a painted face and a decorative hat are the best safety measure for a child's clear vision.

5. Parents should warn their children to cross the street only at cross walks, never between parked cars, and to pause and carefully look both ways before crossing.

In addition, Texas Safety Association recommends that motorists consider the following safety tips on this enchanted evening:

1. Motorists should drive slowly and with extreme caution through neighborhood streets. At any moment, a carefree youngster can dart out into the street.

2. Be careful when backing cars out of driveways or turning into streets in residential areas.

Halloween can be a most enjoyable time for the nation's children if parents and motorists take proper safety measures.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Social security fraud investigators in the five-state southwestern region, headquartered in Dallas, have been busy, according to Miss Elvia F. Fuentes, Manager of the Eagle Pass Social Security Office.

Miss Fuentes cited as results of there activities nine recent convictions in Federal District Courts throughout the region relating to the illegal receipt of Social Security and Supplemental Security Income benefits.

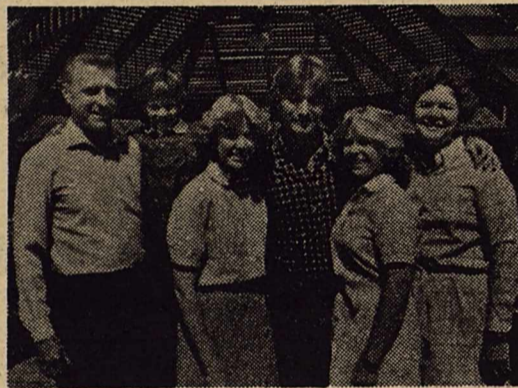
Most of the cases involved students beneficiaries, 18 or older, who failed to report marriage, or submitted false statements alleging they were attending school full time, when they were not.

Vanessa Ownes and Bently Palez, Jr., both of Dallas, and Georgette Louise Simmons Miles of Bridge City, Louisiana recently pled guilty to Federal charges of failing to report to the Social Security Administration that they had stopped attending school, so that monthly checks paid on the record of deceased parents would continue.

Ownes was placed on five years' probation and was ordered to repay \$4,776 which she illegally received. Palez, who had already refunded over \$4000 to SSA, was fined \$1000 and placed on a

Unemployment.

"There is a lack of accountability in our public schools. We need to focus on getting more for the money we're spending on education. The classroom teacher is the cornerstone of the education system."

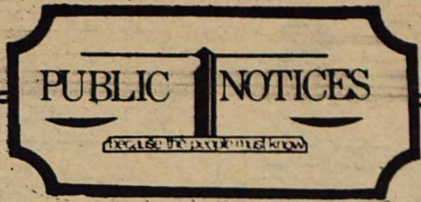
"I support increased emphasis on teaching basic skills, with more competency testing to monitor students' progress. I support legislation providing more freedom for teachers to discipline unruly students."

three years' probation. Miles will be sentenced on November 8 in New Orleans.

Kenneth S. Udin of Metairie, Louisiana was ordered to refund over \$1,100 to SSA and was placed on three years' probation for forging a school attendance report from Jefferson Parish Vocational School. Ellery Washington of Houston, currently in Huntsville Prison on an unrelated state conviction, recently pled guilty to charges of stating he was attending school full time, when he had actually dropped out. He will be sentenced later this month on the Federal Fraud charge. Miss Fuentes also cited the case of Alberto Gomez, Jr. of 5770 Brand Court in El Paso, who was ordered by U. S. Magistrate Janet Ruesch to repay \$3,616.60 to SSA and was placed on five years' probation after admitting he falsely stated he was single when he actually had been married for two years and continued to cash social security student benefit checks.

Two other recent convictions involved concealment of earnings by federal public assistance recipients. Miss Fuentes explained that SSA also administers the Supplemental Security (SSI) Program which provides a minimum monthly income for low income persons who are either 65 or older, or blind, or severely disabled. SSI benefits are paid out of general revenue funds, not social security taxes, Miss Fuentes said.

A New Orleans man, James Moffett of 6027 Lafayette, is awaiting sentencing after pleading guilty in the Alexandria Federal District Court to similar income concealment charges.

Miss Fuentes said Social Security and SSI recipients are frequently reminded of their reporting responsibilities and there is rarely a legitimate excuse for failing to notify Social Security of changes relating to entitlement to benefits. She said her agency is committed to preventing and detecting fraud and recovering any money that should not have been paid.
