FIREHOUSE RECEIVES \$5,000 GRANT FORM RAYMOND DICKSON FOUNDATION

JOB TRAINING PROGRAMS ARE STILL IN OPERATIONS

The Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) announced today that programs are still in operation for job training to meet the needs of private businesses and industries.

Under the authority of new federal legislation entitled the Job Training Partnership Act and sponsorship of TDCA, Local employment and training contraactors serve 122 counties in Texas. These counties are in such regions as the Panhandle, South Plains, Texoma, North Central Texas, North East Texas, Brazos Valley, Deep East Texas, Concho Valley, Upper and Middle Rio Grande Valley and the Golden Crescent area of Victoria.

The Job Training Partnership Act provides a one-year transition period toput the new program into effect by October 1,1983. Funding for job training and employment will continue at the present level until final appropriation for the new programs are made by Congress prior to that date.

The Job Training Partnership Act was signed by President Reagan in October of this year. Job training will continue to be provided under existing CETA regulations through September 30,1983.

The new act relies heavily on business an dindustry—which represent the majority of available jobs—and education to help meet unemployment and underemployment needs. Programs under the new acta will be developed by business leaders, educators and government officials to meet state and local job training needs. Emphasis is placed on developing programs and plans at the local level.

For the past year, the current job training and employment program (CETA) has emphasized involvement by the private sector. Using the theme of "Texas Working Patnership," the Texas Department of Community Affairs and local job training contractors have encouraged business and industry to hire and train eligible workers in fifteen geographic areas throughout the state. The program and funding are administered locally in all areas under TDCA sponsorship, comprising towns and counties of less that 100,00 population.

Under current guidelines, if a worker qualifies for the existing job training program, the employer can be reimbursed up to fifty percent of the workers' wages for training costs. In addition, if the employee qualifies under one of seven specially targeted groups, such as

Vietnam veterans or the handicapped the business could be eligible for additional tax credits.

WORD PROCESSING AND TECHNICAL DRAFTING COURSES OFFERED

Two completely new courses are listed in the Spring 1983 Southwest Texas Junior College Class Schedule, which is now available in the SWTJC Registrar's Office, Del RioCenter and Eagle Pass Center.

The new course, principles of word processing and technical drafting will be offered on the Uvalde Campus and have never before been available at SWTJC.

Principles of word prcessing, listed as B.A. (business administration) 136, represents a sizable financial investment and is the first course in a new program designed to train personnel for "the electronic office of the 80's," according to business division chair Adolph Gottschalk.

"With the energence of sophisticated, computerized office machinery the role of the general and professional office clerk has changed considerably," Gottschalk said. "This new program will provide training in operating and managing these new systems."

The new word processing course, offered on Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays from 10 am. to noon and Monday evenings from 5:30 to 10:30 is designed to familiarize students with word processing's development equipment, procedures and effect on tradional office operations.

Two more course will be added in the fall of 1983, and combined with existing to courses to form the new Business Office Occupations Programs, whihe will have one and two year options.

The other new course offered at SWTJC in the spring of 1983 is sponsored by the college's science and math division. In fact, the course, technical drafting, will be taught by the division chiarman, Harold Farris.

Farris, who was at one time an aircraft draftsman, said of the course, "It wil be designed to teach basic drafting skills. Students willa lso be given then opportunity

to branch into more complex areas of the field."

After thereview of the basics, Farris plans to give each student the opporunity todesign his own project in regulat drafting, mechanical drafting or electric circuitry.

"One of our flight instructors, for example, will take the course ad design an airplane for this project, "Farris continued.

student completing the course will have the expertise necessary to land a job as a beginning draftsman, or to use thier skills on their own projects.

SWIJC, as always, is also offering the traditionally required academic transfer classes, a number of vocational/technical programs, and a selection of special interest classes.

other construction activities. Soil, air, and water samples verify that the waste contains benzene, styrene, toluene, and other chemicals.

Similar studies at five other abandoned hazardous waste sites in Texas are being funded under the "superfund" program. these sites are Bio-Ecology at Grand Prairie, the MOTCO (Texas City Wye") at LaMarque; the French limited site and the Sikes Disposal Pits in Crosby and the Highlands Acid Pit Site in Highlands.

In addition, emergency clean-up actions have been undertaken by EPA at TDWR's request at several problem sites in the state. Emergency actions include removal and safe disposal of hazardous drums from the Triangle Chemical Company at Bridge City, traetment and reduction of contaminated stormwaters at MOTCO to prevent the discharge ofpolluants to a sen sitive marsh area, and removal of arsenic-contaminated stormwaters and subsequent clay "capping" of the site at the Crystal Chemical Company's facility to prevent the discharge of arsenic-contaminated waters into area ditches..

Requests for proposals for the studies at the Crystal Chemical Site and the Harris Site will be published in the Texas Register around the first of the year.

FIREWORKS AND THE LAW

The following article is a public service by the Kinney CAVALRYMAN through the cooperation of Tully Shahan, County Attorney, and the Prosecutor Council. Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of this Kinney and how we can work together to alleviate some of society's problems.

FIREWORKS AND THELAW

Needless to say, everyone wants to have a safe and happy Christmas and New Years. However, in the past the fun of exploding certain types of dangerous fireworks resulted in the tragedy of loss of a finger or loss of eyesight. In order to try and better protect the public the legislature has regulated the type of fireworks that can be sold at retail or possessed by individual in the State of Texas.

It is unlawful to offer for sale or to sell fireworks to children under 10 years old or to intoxicated or irresponsible persons. further, it is illegal to explode or ignite freworks within 600 feet of any church, hospital asylum, public school and within 100 feet of where fireworks are stored, sold or offered for sale. It is also illegal to ignite or discharge fireworks within a car or to throw them from a car. Violations of the state fireworks law can result in a fine of not more than \$1,000 and imprisonment for not more than one year or both.

Persons selling or manufacturing fireworks are required to obtain a license from the State Fire Marshall. A license from the State Fire Marshall is also required for each public display of fireworks. No fireworks may be sold before December 20 or after January 1 during the Christmas/New Year holiday period. The State Fire Marshall is a division of the STate Board of Insurance and, for licensing information, their Austin telephone number is (512) 475-4203.

Permissible fireworks in the State of Texas are as follows: (1) Ten ball roman candles, not to exceed 20 grams; (2) Helicopter type rockets, not to exceed 20 grams; (3) Cylindrical fountains, not to exceed 75 grams with an inside tube diameter not to exceed 3/4 inch; (4) Come fountains (volcanos), not to exceed 50 grams in weight; (5) Wheels, not to exceed 60 grams in weight, but there may be any number of drivers on any one wheel; (6) Illuminating torches and colored fire in any form, not to exceed 100 grams each;

(7) Sparklers and dipped sticks, not to exceed 100 grams each;

(8) Mines and shells of which the morter is an integral part, except those designed to produce a noise, not to exceed 40 grams each;

(9) Firecrackers and salutes which do not exceed 1 1/2 inches in length or 1/4 inch in diameter and do not exceed 2 grains each in weight; (10) Whistles without report, not to exceed 40 grams each in weight; (11) Skyrockets with sticks of not more than 20 grams each with a

-(11) Skyrockets with sticks of not more than 20 grams each with a casing at least 2 7/8 inches and an overall length including the stick of not less than 15 inches.

These fireworks are required to be within the classification known as "ICC Class C Common Fireworks" and that certification is required to be on all shipping cases and on retail containers. BOTTLE ROCKETS WITH STICKS ARE NOT PERMISSIBLE FIREWORKS.

In additon to the state law, your city or town may have enacted local ordinances prohibiting or imposing further regulations on fireworks. For example, local laws may regulate the noise and locations for exploding fireworks, or possible ban the explosion of all fireworks within the City or Town limits. Check with your prosecutor forpossible local ordinances governing the legal use of fireworks.

ORDINANCE #28

FIRE ARMS, ETC.: Vol.I,pg 28

SECTION NO.1. That if any person shall discharge any gun, pistol, or firearms of any description, or shall discharge any cannon cracker or torpedo on or across any public street or alley within the city or within one hundred yards of any business house with in this city, he sahll be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100.00 (one Hundred Dollars).

"cannon Crackers" and "Torpedo" are meant any fire cracker or other combustible package more than two inches in circumference.

During the plant operations, both raw and finished containerized materials were stored in the open, on the ground. These materials subsequently spilled/leaked into the surface soils. In addition, the spread of aresenic materials outside the process areas occurred in June, 1976, when heavy rainfall caused wastewater ponds to overflow the plant site. Crystal declared bankruptcy in October of 1981.

The Harris or Farley street Site is an abandoned landfill of tars and sludges ocated 1000 feet south of intersection of Farley Street and Genoa-Red Bluff Road in Houston. Evidence has been collected which shows that a transporter leased the site in 1958 and disposed of more than 1,000 tons of hazardous waste. Following complaints about the site, some soil was placed over the disposal area. Subsequent owners discovered the waste when it migrated into a swimming pool and as it appeared in

TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF WATER RESOURCES

Studies at the Crystal Chemical Site and Harris Site, both waste disposal pits in Harris County, will be funded jointly by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the State of Texas under the national "superfund" program. At the Crytal Site EPA will provide \$369,900 under the federal act and the Texas Department of Water Resources(TDWR) will provide \$41,101 from the Texas Disposal Facility Response Fund. At the Harris Site EPA will provide \$325,563 and TDWR will furnish \$36,174.

The studies are to determine if wastes are migrating from the sites and if sok the rate and direction of the migration, and to determine geological conditions, waste characterists and cleanup alternatives.

SHOP FOR SAFE TOYS Cautions Prevent Blindness Soc.

The day after Thanksgiving marks the traditional opening of the Christmas shopping season. Many shoppers will be searching for just the right toys that they hope will light up the eyes fo their youngsters on Christmas morning. The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness urges shoppers to use common sense in selecting gifts for the special children in their

lives.

lives. Some types of toys can pose serious injury hazards to children, and particularly to they young eyes thay are intended to light up.

Prevent Blindness reports that over 4,200 Americans ended up in hospital emergency rooms last year as a result of toy-related eye injuries and that nearly 70% of the victims were under the age of fifteen.

"Most of these injuries were caused by commonly available toys," said R.E.Margo, M.D., state medical chirman for the Society." These include toy guns, projectile toys, self-propelled and flying toys, slingshots, and even such relatively 'safe' toys as dolls and stuffed animals.

Particularly alarming, according to Margo, is the the fact that over half of these injuries were caused by bows and arrows, BB guns, pellet guns, and other air, gas, or spring operated guns. "Weapons such as these, when handled as toys, can boviously be extremely dangerous," Margo said.

"There are two prime safety factors that should be considered in selecting toys," Margo continued.
"First, is the toy appropriate for the child's age. And second, how much adult supervision will be required, and available, when the child uses the toy. It is also very important that a child be instructed on how to use the toy properly and safely."

Prevent Blindness offers the following suggestions to help shoppers choose safe toys for their youngsters this holiday season:

--Look for toys made from shatter proof and flame resistant material..

--Avoid toys with sharp edges, points nails, or screws that are exposed or can be easily exposed.

--Check for rigid interior frames

or springs that can easily puncture soft outside fabric or plastic coverings.

--Remember that all projectile, flying, and self-propelled toys can be dangerous.

--Be sure to consider the child's age and physical coordination when selecting toys.

Margo concluded by saying, "A little forethought and good judgement can help make this a safer and happier holiday for all our young Texans."

A bridge City, Louisana woman has been sentenced to a year in prison after pleading guilty to federal charges of defrauding the Socail Security Administration.

Accoring to Miss Elvia F. Fuentes
Manager of the Eagle Pass Social
Security office, Georgette Simmons
Miles of 217 Marrero Street in
Bridge City admitted she willfully
concealed and failed to report the
fact she was no longer a full-time
student in order to continue to get
Social Security Student benefits
paid on the record of her deceased
mother.

Sentencing was imposed in the New Orleans Federal District Court by U.S.Magistrate Ingard Johannesen, Miss Fuentes said.

Two Louisana men have been sentenced in the Alexandria Federal District Court for defrauding the Social Security Administration. Both men recently pled guilty to charges they willfully failed to report they were working while receiving Social Security Disability benefits.

According to Miss Elvia Fuentes, Manager of th Eagle Pass Social Security Office, Harold Zack Cain, of Vidalia, Louisana and James Maffett of 6027 Lafayette in New Orleans were both given suspended sentences and were placed on five years probation.

Cain was also ordered to refund \$14,200 to the Social Security Administration, Miss fuentes said, and Moffett was required to repay \$3,559.70 as a condition of probation.

TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT NEWS

Texas highway roadsides may not be trimmed as closely next year but a new system should trim a \$30 million annual mowing bill.

The vegetation managment system, being studied by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT), will still provide for motorists' safety, protect the road suface—and save money.

"The department spent \$30 million last year in mowing costs," DHT chief landscape architect Craig Steffens said, "but we still got some irate calls when we let our rights-of-way get a little shaggy."

He added that savings from that \$30 million will go to a safeguard the state's multibillion investment in its highways.

Steffens said the goal of the vegetation management system is to develop the most cost effective, practical methods and concepts for managing roadside vegetation. "The
