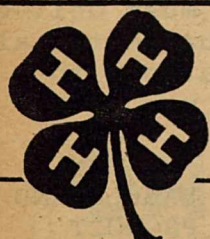

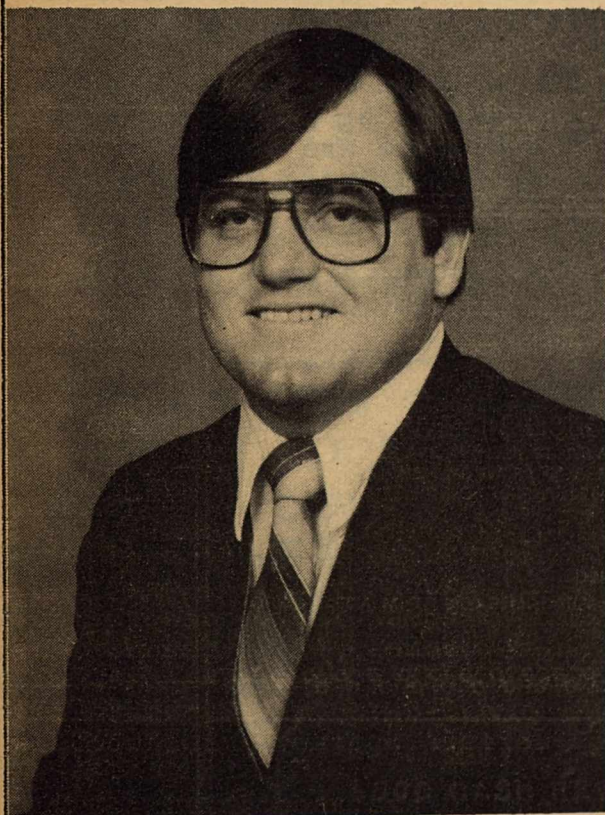
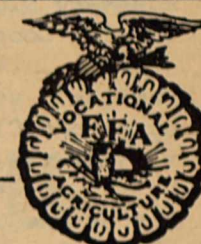

NEW HOURS OPEN TO THE PUBLIC: Mondays through Thursdays- 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. open during lunch & supper hours.

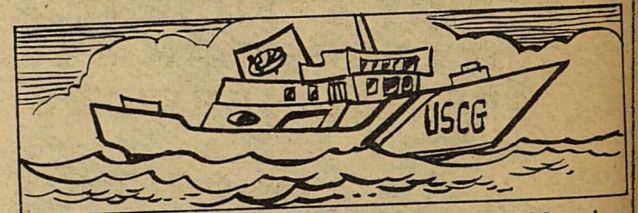

THEN and NOW!

Italian physicist Enrico Fermi voiced an oft-stated dream that the world would find peaceful uses for the atom to benefit mankind.

THEN: It was just 40 years ago that Professor Fermi led a team of scientists which performed the world's first controlled nuclear chain reaction at the University of Chicago.

NOW: Professor Fermi's dream is coming true. A plaque in his memory has been unveiled in the town of Caorso on the River Po in Italy. It is a spot where Fermi played as a little boy visiting his grandfather. It is also the site of Italy's largest operating



nuclear power plant, an 840,000 kilowatt General Electric-design boiling water reactor. Officials estimate that the plant's output will cut 365 million lire a year from Italy's oil import bill.

A similar plant, now under construction in Midland, Michigan, will also bear Fermi's name. The 1,100,000 kilowatt plant is being built by Detroit Edison Company.

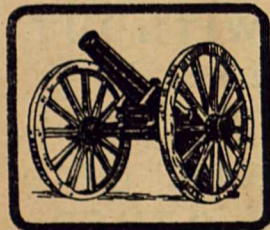

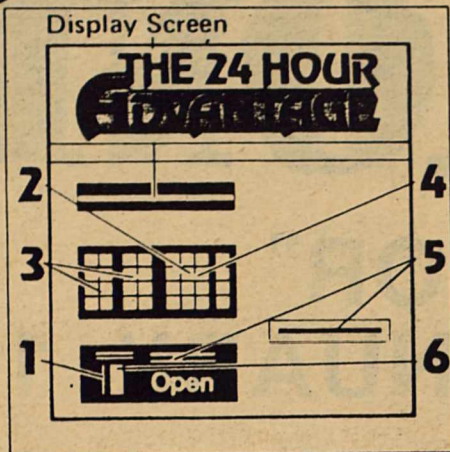

TEXAS HWY DEPT. UPDATE

The remains of the oldest known man in Texas and possibly North America have been discovered by Archeologists at a burial site north of Austin.

Dr. Frank Weir, head of the Archeology Section of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT), is certain the skeletal remains are older than 7,000 B.C. Exact dating for the burial remains will have to await radio-carbon testing which will take about a month.

What is possibly more significant about the site is the abundance of artifacts that have been found to depths of 12 feet or more.

Typical sites in Texas yield 3 to 7 artifacts such as dart points and scrapers but this site, in continuous use for at least 7000 years, has already yielded over 100.

Dr. David Dibble, director of the Texas Archeological Survey based at the University of Texas at Austin, has termed it "the best Plainview site in the Western Hemisphere." Plainview is the term

archeologists give to prehistoric artifacts of a certain type, generally the oldest in North America.

Another significant finding which the unusual quantity of artifacts yielded is that certain cultural groups thought previously to have existed in separate historic periods were found to have inhabited the site at the same time.

Dart points of the Gower and Angostura types were found mixed during an historic period tentatively estimated at 3,000-6,000 B.C.

This finding leads Weir to conclude the site was cohabited by the two groups. There also appears to possibly have been some cultural "borrowing: between the two groups of inhabitants as evidenced by certain dart points that exhibit a combination of techniques.

DHT archeologists are continuing to work at removing the skeletal remains. Since previous North American finds of this period have been of cremated bodies, the fact that the skeletal remains are intact means new data concerning physiological features of early North American man may be found.

Because the vural site is at the bottom of a very large excavation site, DHT's archeological team is working rapidly to remove the skeletal material before new rains flood the site.

TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES

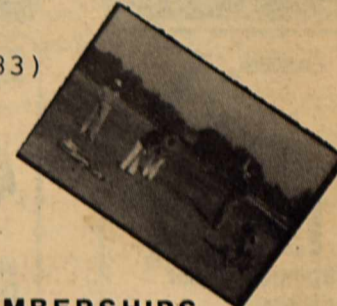
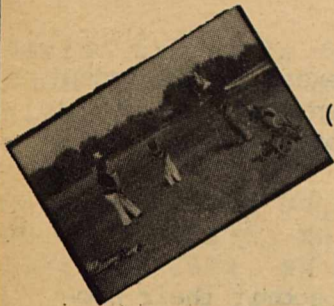

Section 306 of the Veterans and Survivors Pension Improvement Act of 1978.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$334.49 gross income per month. The gross income limit is \$546.49 for a two-person household, \$749.49 for a three-person household, \$926.49 for four person, \$1,092.49 for five and \$1,277.49 for six.

Eligible households must be subject to energy cost increases--because of higher bills or rent due to rising utility costs.

Households are eligible if they live in privately owned or rented housing even if the cost of utilities is included in the rent payment or if the household pays only a portion of its home energy costs.

Johnston said application forms are mailed automatically to households which receive food stamps, AFDC, and SSI/ Households receiving needs-tested Veterans benefits must request an application from DHR in January.

If you have not received an application and think your household may be eligible, contact a local office of the Texas Department of Human Resources, Johnston said.

BOOKS FOR TEXANS

One hundred thousand books by Texans or about Texas for Texas libraries is the goal of Texas Book Month in March set by Wales Madden, III, Amarillo businessman and chairman of Texas Book Month.

Madden's appointment as chairman of the drive was made by Wayne C. Sellers, Palestine Carnegie Library Trustee and chairman of Books for Texans, an organization formed by leaders in statewide library organizations.

Madden will be joined as vice chairman by John F. Sammons, Jr., mayor of Temple.

"Texas has nationally known publishing houses and thousands of published authors many of whom have won international acclaim. In addition, there are Texas authors who have earned distinction in their fields, but whose works are not widely known.

"From history and philosophy to prose and poetry, the books placed on library shelves will cover the full spectrum of learning and literary craftsmanship," Madden said to explain the need for Texas Book Month.

"While many Texas authors have not yet earned fame of a Walter Prescott Webb, J. Frank Dobie, Katherine Anne Porter

or Fred Bipson, their works deserve recognition and appreciation," Madden added.

This weeks column is dedicated to the memory of Jesse "Jake" Smith who passed away last Saturday, January 8, 1983.

Jack was a tough, gruff, hard-working man. He owned and operated a wrecker service here in

town and was a pretty good mechanic. I knew him for fifteen years and never heard of him refusing a request for assistance from local citizens or motorists passing through. He was a special friend to those of us in law enforcement. He was always ready to come to our assistance, no matter that time for weather day or night. Many a time he came out late at night and on weekends to keep our cars running so that we could continue on patrol. He would put in

everything from fuses to batteries, fix transmissions and do other repair work. When asked what the charges were, he would answer "no" charges, that's the least I can do for you boys." He would come to the scene fo a bad accident and stay with us in cold, rainy weather, day or night, until the last piece of debris had been removed from the highway so that other motorists could pass safely through.

Jake enjoyed conversation and was often dropping by the jail late at night to visit, and most of the time he would bring doughnuts and other snacks for us to have with our coffee. His tough, gruff exterior was only skin deep. Underneath that he had a heart of gold as big as a house and he had a quality that is missing in many people this day and time, he had compassion for his fellow man. He will be sorely missed by those of us who knew him.

I considered it a privilege to know him and call him my friend.
