


CITY HALL WINS SUIT

PENA VERSUS CITY COURT CASE

On Tuesday January 25, 1983 the Pena Versus the City of Brackett-ville Court Case was heard in Judge Thurmonds' District Court before a selected panel of twelve jurors from Kinney County.

The suit for \$5,000 in alledged damages was intitiated on November 6, 1978 by Mrs. Elvira Pena when she suffered a fall when she slipped in the mud and broke her left arm while visiting relatives at the public housing project complex on West Thorn street.

The jury found that the area in question was maintained in a resonably safe condition and that the plaintiff not the defendant(City was negligent.

One thing that was pointed out to me at the trial was that City Hall was a monster, an ugly institution. City Hall is not a monster, it is not an ugly institution—it is nothing but a green building that sits on the corner of Keene and Spring Streets.


The City Council meets the second Tuesday of each month in the City Hall building and your interest and comments are and will be appreciated. Constructive criticism is the key to constructive city government.



College Station-Acreages of barley, wheat, and oates insured by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, or by a private insurance company reinsured by FCIC, in the Texas counties of Bandera, Crockett, Edward, Kerr, Kimble, Real, and Sutton must be planted no later than January 15,1983, to

eligible for insurance coverage according to F.W. "Ted" Crouch, Director of the College Station Field Operation Office of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

"The number of acres planted to these crops must be reported to the agents by January 31,1983 Crouch added. " Insured farmers who have questions should contact their agents."

The combined efforts of the Brackettville Police Department, the Kinney County Sheriff's Department and Juvenile Officers from Del Rio led to the arrest of two juvenile females Tuesday

They are suspects in a residential burglary reported by Mrs. Irene Villasenor Sunday night. Mrs. Villasenor returned from a trip to Eagle Pass to discover that burglars had entered her home during her absence and took an estimated \$600.00 worth of personal property and jewelery. Investigation determined that the burglars had entered through a bathroom window.

Mrs. Villasenor called me Tuesday and reported that a young female at the elementary school was wearing a pair of her earrings. Chief of Police Donnie Nance and I went to Jones Elementary School to investigate. We interviewed six juvenile females and recovered the earrings. I then called Juvenile Officers into the case. They obtained statements from two of the young females and recovered approx \$200.00 worth of Mrs. Villasenor's property. The case is still under investigation and more arrests are probable. We hope to recover the balance of the proper-

The Ordinance covering Posting of Bills and Notices; Council Place Assignments; Rabies Coutrol of Household pets; Personnel Policy for City Employees and Ordinance covering Emergency Disaster Operations were read, approved and adopted and are effective for City Operations.

Mr. Chris Gomez gave an interesting report on a program for community support for this years little league baseball season. The Council was receptive to the program presented and will consider specific request for support at the February meeting.




