#### CLINIC NEWS



# SHERIFF'S CORNER

Criminal incidents involving juveniles kept us busy this past week.

I reported to you the burglary of a habitation that occured last week and the subsequent arrest of two juvenile females and the recovery of approx. \$200.00 worth of the stolen property.

The girls involved were released Tuesday of last week. Tuesday night of the day they were released they were caught in Jones Elementary by the janitor and told to leave.

Wednesday night two of the girls stole a local man's vehicle and fled to Del Rio where they were apprehended by Del Rio Police. They Were returned to Brackettville and placed in County Jail.

Thursday morning, while being interviewed by Juvenile Officers, I inventoried the property they had in possession at the time of their arrest and more of the stolen property that had been taken in the burglary was identified and recovered.

At approx. 1:30pm Thursday afternoon we received a call from Mr Bill Johnson, Principal of BHS who advised that the other two girls were causing a disturbance at school and appeared to be under the influence of drugs. Upon our arrival and further investigation it was determined that the girls w were not on drugs at the time, but were causing serious disturbances at school. They were transported to County Jail and held there until Juvenile Officers determined what action should be taken. They were released into the custody of Rev. Watson of the First Baptist Church of Brackettville. We appreciate the interest and cooperation from the various churches and ministers in our community. The City Council meeting in regular monthly session considered and discussed many items on the agenda last Tuesday evening that should be of interest to most residents.

First, the Council voted unanimously to support our younger generation and the Little League Program by agreeing to sponsor the All

The City will provide new uniforms,
balls and bats to enable our representatives on the diamond to look

We at the City have presented the appropriate reports and are listed to receive \$40,000.00 over the next two years for maintenance of our paved streets when and if the bill is passed.

### NEW AREA CODES FOR HOUSTON AREA

A new area code will be effective March 19 for telephone customers in parts of East and Southeast Texas.

The new area code, 409, will replace the current 713 area code for about 180 cities and towns, including Beaumont and Galveston, said Doyle Bebee, Community Relations Manager, for Southwestern Bell.

Houston and about 30 nearby towns will remain in the 713 area code. All other cities in the existing 713 area will switch to the new 409 area code.

Record growth, especially in the Houston metropolitan area, created the need to split the existing 713 area code, said Bebee.

He said forecasts indicated that without the new area code, all availalbe 713 area code telephone numbers would be exhausted by early 1984.

# KAZEN

Few issues have outraged so many Americans in such a short period of time as the new law requiring withholding taxes on interest and dividends.

I opposed the Tax bill which included this provision and I am pleased to report that among my first actions of the 98th Congress was to introducy my bill, H.R. 621, to repeal it.

Consider this:

--Roughly three quarters of all taxpayers already have too much money withheld by the IRS from their wage income.

--Not only is money being taken out of bank accounts and savings and loan institutions but Americans are losing the interest that would have been paid off on those withheld funds.

--Most interest and dividend earnings are already reported to the Internal Revenue Service by Banks and businesses, and a 1981 IRS study shows that with this information alone the IRS can achieve a 97.3 percent voluntary compliance

--At a time when we should be encouraging savings to assist individuals and the entire economy, this provision is cleary a disincentive.

Those who argue that there are regulations and formulas to assist persons in need should realize that the law is confusing even to banking experts. Just imagine the problems it will create for senior citizens trying to live off interest and dividend earnings.

My bill and others similar to it went to the House Ways and Means Committee for examination there. It is my feeling that if we can pers-

uade the Committee to release the legislation for a House vote, the withholding law will in fact be repealed, as it should be. I will be doing my best to see that this comes about.

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#### DOYLE BEBEE - COMMUNITY RELATIONS MANAGER SW BELL

Southwestern Bell has announced the appointment of Doyle Bebee as Community Relations Manager for the company's South Texas operations, including Brackettville.




