## FIRE

BY BILL MIEARS

One of the most devastating individual catastrophes that can happen to a family is to have their house burn. All irreplaceable pictures, possessions and lives can be destroyed.

I hope each one of you will take a few minutes to read a few "Fire wise" hints and sobering facts about home fires. I hope this will prevent your home from becoming "for whom the siren blows."

1. If you suspect a fire in your home, turn off all power and gas, if you know how!

2. Never leave your home or yard while major appliances are running; ie, washing machine, dryer, dishwasher.

3. Rubber hoses on space gas heaters are illegal. There must be a reason for this law--think about it. Only Brass or Bronze tubing and fittings are legal.

4. Do not check gas tubing or hoses for leaks, with a match! We've had local people have a sad experience in doing this, instead of

using the recommended soapy-water method. Your hoses or tubing, if there is a leak, should blow bubbles at the point where the gas leak is, when the gas is turned on. This is the safe recommended method of checking your system.

5. Before grease catches fire, the smoke will turn from grey to a yellowish color, "Beware!" Turn off the heat, throw baking soda into the fire. DO NOT USE WATER ON A GREASE FIRE!!!

6. If you discover a fire in your house "Get Out". Poisonous gases from wood paneling, plastics, man made fabrics, building materials, paint nearly everything. These will overcome you if they are present and are usually unseen. Go next door, phone the V.F.D-563-2233. If possible, close up the house to cut off oxygen or air. A fire must have 3 things to burn, heat, fuel and oxygen or air. Take away any one of the three and there can be NO fire.

7. If a door handle is hot to the touch on you way out of the house, and there is a window available, use it. Break the window with whatever you have available. Clear the

glass from the lower edge of the window and throw a blanket over the ledge and climb out.

8. If you must try to go thru smoke, crawl snake style along the floor to your nearest door out of the house.

9. Mr. Business man or woman, do you have an established meeting place for a head count outside the building should you have a fire? Do you have available extinguishers and do the employees know where they are and how to use them?

10. Know this phone number-- 563-2233, its our VFD.

11. Butane gas/Propane is heavier than air, unlike natural gas. Therefore, if you have a Butane/Propane gas leak and a low spot under your house, you may be collecting a pocket of gas just waiting for a match to be flipped nearby to cause your disaster.

Our VFD is on call 24 hours a day and these men work regular jobs besides. They should be applauded for their civic attitude and dedication they display. The employers

**HATS OFF TO 'ANGELS OF MERCY' OUR AMBULANCE VOLUNTEERS!**

They are called the Angels of Mercy and they're on call whenever an emergency requires in Fort Clark Springs as well as in Brackettville or elsewhere in Kinney County. When I donated an ambulance to the County in 1975 I hoped we could find dedicated volunteers to operate it and my hopes were more than realized immediately. Rose Mary Slubar, a paramedic and president of the Ambulance Volunteers, has been the leading Angel of Mercy since 1975 and has helped develop a trained staff to deal with a wide range of emergencies.

Kinney County now includes ambulance support in its budgets and with some continuing contributions from grateful citizens the ambulance is well equipped with emergency equip-

ment and ready to move when needed. A staff of 10 people-- all with certifications-- making up the present Angels: Rose Mary Slubar (who attended Seton School of Nursing in Austin and had years of nursing experience before coming to Fort Clark Springs); Kay Smith a paramedic; James Bitter, EMT-SS (that's Emergency Medical Technician-Special Skills); Doreen Tollett, an EMT/LVN (that's Emergency Medical Technician and Licensed Vocational Nurse); Sherri Scott, ECA (Emergency Care Attendant); Louis Starzell, ECA; Smiley Goodloe, ECA; Norma Perez, ECA; Sandy Herman, ECA and last but not least, Rosa Baker, EMT.

of the VFD members should be thanked as well because the men leave on a siren's notice and stay gone from their jobs till the fire is out. The service the VFD renders is immense and very necessary to this community as evidenced by the fact that mobile homes must be reached within 4 minutes of fires starting

and the men have saved mobile houses constructed in any other material, brick, wood, stone, must be reached within 7 minutes from the time the fire started to be saved and again these men have done just that! There is no more awesome and fearsome sight than a house on fire with the butane/propane opening spueing flame into the sky!

The main responsibilities of the VFD are/

1. Hold down insurance rates
2. Save property surrounding existing fire
3. Extinguish existing reported fire as soon as possible.

It is the public responsibility to be "fire safe" and you have a good group of men to help should the unexpected happen but please remember to prevent the opportunity for fires to start by being wise.

Another ranch burglary occurred on the Allen Moody Ranch in southern Kinney County. The lock on the gate was forcible removed and several hundred dollars worth of welding equipment was taken from a workshop near the ranchhouse. This case is still under investigation.

Pop's Dognut Shop, located at five points in Brackettville, was also the

victim of burglars earlier this month. A side door was forced open and approx. \$200.00 worth of food items were taken. This case is also under investigation.

## TEXAS SAFETY NEWS

DON'T WAIT UNTIL YOUR CHILD IS HARMED: FOLLOW SAFETY TIPS ON POISON PREVENTION FROM THE NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL

The Texas Safety Association, in connection with National Poison Prevention week, March 20-26 advised parents to follow these tips to prevent children from accidental poisonings.

1. Put away all household cleaners, solvents, paints, and medicines in upper cabinets. Install child-resistant safety latches on cabinets that contain these poisonous substances.

2. Keep household chemicals in their original containers. Never store them in containers which children might associate with food.

3. Purchase medicines with childproof safety caps. Never refer to medicine as candy.

4. Children learn by imitating adult behavior. Let them know medicine is serious business.

5. Keep household plants out of the reach of children, Use hanging pots or high shelves to store them.

6. Syrup of Ipecac should be kept at home for poison emergencies. Purchase it at a local pharmacy and use it only on the advice of your doctor or poison control center. It will help induce vomiting.

7. Keep the telephone numbers of your family doctor and local poison control center near the phone. Have the poison container in hand when you call so you can describe what your child ingested.

Don't let a poisoning interfere in your child's life. Texas Safety Association says. Keep hazardous materials out of a child's reach.
