

Ranch burglars struck again this past week. The Pinto Creek Ranch, off Hwy 277 in southwest Kinney County, was hit by burglars at 3:00am on the morning of March 31. The burglars broke a lock on a gate leading into the quarters. The main house and a travel trailer were broken into and burglarized.

Severe vandalism occurred in the main house. The burglars were surprised by the caretaker when they attempted to break into his residence. He chased them away, firing several shots in their direction. They excaped with a .30/.30 rifle and a shotgun stolen in the burglary.

I was called at 5:00am and immediately went to the scene. Val VErde Sheriff's Dept. Deputies were called into the investigation as we feel that the burglars are part of the same bunch that have been burglarizing ranches in Val Verde and Kinney County over the past month or so. Butch Davis, Special Ranger with the cattleman's Association is also working with us on these cases.

I would like to say a special "Thank You" to SEnior Border Patrol Agents Roy Dyer and "Pee Wee" Corder for their prompt response to my call for assistance in tracking the burglars from the scene of the crime to their vehicle. We had been told by the caretaker of

the ranch that some or the burglars might still be in the brush armed with the rifle and shotgun. We determined later, after assistance in tracking from Mr. Dyer and Mr. Corder and the use of a Border Patrol plane that the burglars reached their vehicle and fled the scene.

We are happy to report that the purse and all items within with the exception of \$30.00 in cash, was found by a local citizen and returned to Mrs.

The man was arrested by this officer after investigation provided evidence against the man. The man remains in jail charged with burglary and his bond has been set at \$30,000.00. The case is still under investigation and other charges may be filed.

#### NEWS FROM BOB BULLOCK

State Comptroller Bob
Bullock Tuesday said the State
of Illinois' loss last week of
its coveted Triple A bond
rating "should be a clear warning to Texans of the dangers
of deficit financing."

Last Thursday Standard and Poor's Corporation lowered its rating of Illinois bonds in what Governor James Thompson called a "warming for us to get our fiscal house in order"

"I've called deficit .....lock said.

state financing the fast land to nowhere," Bullock said. "I'mereporting the Illinois situation because it's the kind of danger that is right around the corner for Texas unless we stay on the pay-asyou-go-plan.

"The State of Illinois has a \$300 million deficit and might have to take out short term loans to cover it" Bullock pointed out. "in Texas, our Governor is saying the only way he can balance his budget is with \$700 mil+" lion worth of bonds and \$800 million worth of tax increases. What is happening in Illinois right now ought to change his mind about bonds to cover a deficit."

Early this week Bullock issued a report from his off+ ice showing that Governor Mark White's proposal to finance \$700 million in highway construction with bonds would cost the state \$100 million a year in debt service and could jeopardize Texas' Triple -A rating which insures the lowest interest rates available on Texas veteran and water bonds.

"Trying to balance our state budget on these bonds is a fiscal shell game," Bul-
