




ALL ABOUT DRUGS
The Good, The bad, and The Ugly

The yound drug abuser is a special problem to any community. They are less sophisticated about how they obtain their durgs and it is here that the sociological problem lies -- the "wasting" of innumerable young lives. Children as young as 9 or 10 years of age as well as adolescents are subjected to the most widespred "chemical warfare". Illicit drugs are commonplace in the halls and on the grounds of most high schools in the U.S.. ours is no execption. Marijuana usage is everywhere, probably as widespread in use as tobacco. Alcohol is frequently abused by young people as well and isstill the number one drug problem in the nation. A description of marijuana and its effects will follow in this article.

Other drugs becoming more commonplace include the hard drugs such as barbiturates, amphetamines and morphine derivatives. Recently there has been an upswing in the abuse of cocaine and other drugs with unusual pharmacological actions, such as phencyclidine (known on the street as PCP or "angel dust"), which is actually a veterinary product. An article in the Chicago Tribune indicated that a new "killer" drug had emerged on the streets of California. Drug abusers were turning up dead from some heretofore unknown, but apparently very potent narcotic. When a heroin addict would shoot up the equivalent of this drug to the usual "fix" amount of heroin, the drug was so potent that the addict would become nighty overdosed. Research and invest igation by the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) uncovered a new synthetic narcotic in the Los Angeles area called "China White" on the streets. This synthetic substance sold for the same price a heroin,

the new drug was shown to be a chemical analog of the compound fentanyl, marketed by Janssen Laboratories, and was calculated to be 80 times more potent than morphine! Some illicitly operating backroom chemist obviously copied the published patent description of the fentanyl analog to create a dangerous horror for narcotic users.

Even worse than the use of the conpounds cited above is the common practice in today's 'street drug' environment is the simultaneous use of multiple drugs. Often victims of overdosing with multiple drugs will appear in the emergency rooms of hospitals or poison control centers unable to be treated because of the conglomerate of drugs in their systems. One very dangerous but common combination is that "lacing" marijuana with "angel dust' or PCP. This often causes very detrimental psychological effects in inexperienced young users. Some of thses effects are listed as follows:

(1) ABRUPT CHANGES IN BEHAVIOR

(2) MOODINESS

(3) A TENDENCY TO SIT
LOOKING OFF INTO THE DISTANCE

(4) A TENDENCY TO LAUGH EXCESSIVELY OR TO LAUGH AT THINGS NO ONE THINKS IS FUNNY

(5) A HOPPED- UP APP-EARANCE, BRIGHT SHINY EYES, WHEN USUALLY HIS/HER LOOK IS THAT OF A FAIRLY CALM PERSON

(6) FLUCTUATIONS IN THE WIDNESS OF THE PUPILS OF THE EYES, NOT ACCOUNTED FOR BY CHANGES IN THE LIGHT INTEN-SITY.



Then, all those containers must be sorted by brand name for collection. While the piles of unwashed containers are waiting for pick-up, they could attract hordes of rodents and pests, necessitating frequent and costly pest control. Finally when the trucks from each distributor arrive, the containers must be recounted and checked for brand consistency.

It's a cumbersome process. And costly. Because unlike our voluntary recycling system that pays for itself, and PAYS TEXAS CON-SUMERS OVER \$20 MILLION A YEAR, the forced deposit law will result in higher prices. In fact, prices in forced deposit state prove that all the costs get passed along

to the consumer.

The real irony of the forced deposit law is that Texas already has the best voluntary recycling program in the nation. Last year, we recycled in excess of 73% of all aluminum can sold, and another 26 million pounds of glass. Those percentages are quickly approaching the recycling percentages in forced deposit states. But while lexas consumers are making money recycling thise states are paying for it.

So the next time you hear about how forced deposits are going to clean up Texas, Hang on to your wallet. And think about how much we have to lose







A 14 year old juvenile male was arrested Sunday afternoon, May 22 in connection with a daytime burglary attempt of the Kinney County Land Company on Highway 90, owned by Molly Ardrey of Brakcettville.

I received a call at approx. 6:15 pm from a concerned citizen who reported seeing two young boys attmepting to enter the building through a side window. Upon my arrival at the scene, the burglar jumped out of the window and took flight. I quickly gave chase and just as quickly fell flat on my face with a twisted knee. The young burglars incentive for speed was evidently greater than my own, as he quickly outran me. Wisdom gained through the years (and the fact that when I

was in my prime I had trouble breaking a 15 second 100 yard dash) had prompted me to have patrolman "Corky" McGuire waiting a block away and he captured the speedster with a flying tackle on Gove Street near the Burger & Shake. The case has been turned over to Juvenile Officers.

Another burglar, Francisco "Frankie" Martinez 17 years of age, was tried in District Court Monday, May 23, and received a 4 year probated sentence. Martinez was arrested by me almost a year ago in connection with the burglary of Gonzales Store, owned by Mary Paiz of Brackettville. Property valued at over \$700.00 was taken in this burglary. Approx. \$540.00 worth of that property was recovered with the arrest of Martinez. He was ordered by the court to make restitution to Mrs. Paiz for the market value of the property not recovered.




