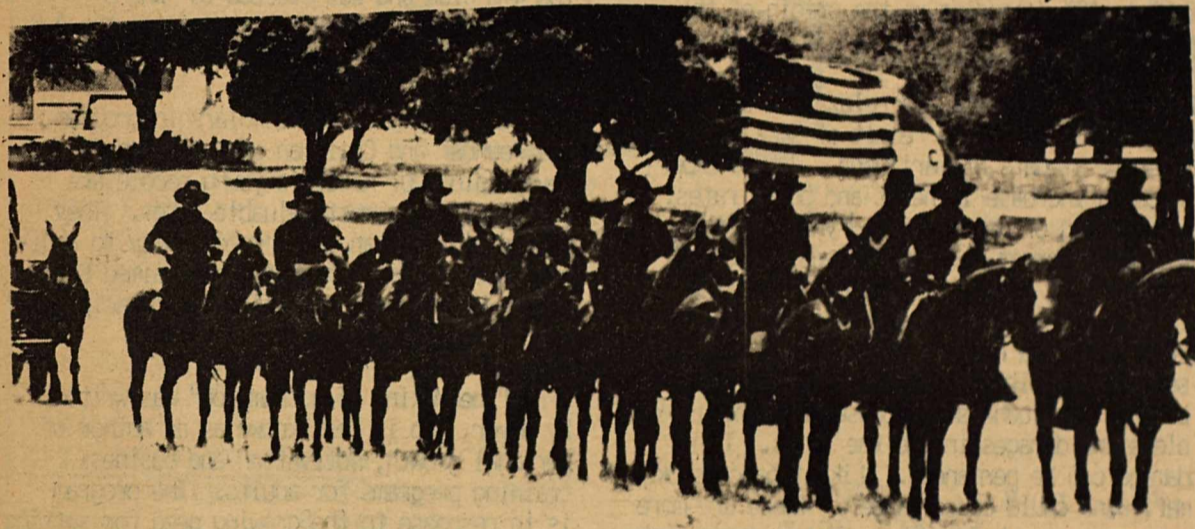

SHERIFF'S CORNER

Marijuana

Marijuana is the number one abused drug, excluding alcohol, in our society today. More than 3/5 of high school seniors have tried marijuana. The number of teenagers smoking marijuana daily has doubled in the last five years.

Marijuana is a green to brown colored, grasslike substance produced by drying the leaves and flowering tops of the plant, CANNABIS SATIVA. Hashish and hash oil are also derivatives of Cannabis and are more potent than marijuana. The chemical in marijuana that makes people 'high' is delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol or THC. There are more than 400 other chemicals in marijuana. The percentage of THC in marijuana averages from 1.5% to 2% today, although it may vary from 0.2% to 10% depending on the origin of the plant.

Feelings of euphoria and relaxation are commonly reported as the result of smoking moderate amounts of marijuana. Users experience an increase in heart and pulse rates, a reddening of the eyes, a dryness in the mouth and throat, a mild increase in body temperature, and an increase in appetite.

The use of marijuana causes many adverse effects to the human body. Some of the more serious are listed below:

LUNGS: Marijuana smoke causes breathing problems and damages inside the lungs. This damage can be permanent. Like tobacco smoke, marijuana could cause cancer. There are more cancer causing hydrocarbons in marijuana smoke than in tobacco smoke.

BRAIN: THD changes brain waves that control pleasure and emotion. THC changes within the brain tissues are still evident after marijuana use has been discontinued for six months. Marijuana smokers often demonstrate an inability to remember details, a loss of will power and motivation, difficulty in concentration, a sense of fear (paranoia), and an inability to "think fast".

REPRODUCTION: Marijuana can damage the female ova and the male sperm, resulting in impaired fertility, miscarriage and birth defects. Testosterone, the male hormone, decreases 25% to 35% within three hours after smoking marijuana. Marijuana can decrease male sperm count and interferes with female hormones also. Increases in irregular menstrual periods among female users has been reported. THC is passed to an unborn baby through the placenta and to a nursing baby through the mother's milk.

As shown by the above, the effects of drugs on the human body is tragic and detrimental to the good health and happiness of the user, young or old. I will continue with more information next week. Let me leave you with this fact: Most young people get their first taste of drugs from a friend who often feels that he or she is doing them a favor by turning them on.

SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED

SMI International, Inc. of Waco has announced that Toby Frerich, an eighth-grade student in the Brackettville Independent School District, has been awarded a \$1,000 scholarship for "excelling on the athletic field and in the classroom." The award was presented at the Brackettville Junior High School on Monday.

Frerich was named to receive the 1983 "Making of a Champion" scholarship after using the goal-setting program designed for young people. It provides guidance for setting goals for achievement in school, athletics and adult life, and is written with a sports theme using examples of athletes who practices principles of success to achieve greatness.

Frerich, who attends Brackettville Junior High School, has been involved in various sports activities at the school, including football and track. He also is involved in the 4-H Club and was elected to "Who's Who" in the seventh grade. He is on the A-B honor roll.

In announcing the scholarship program, SMI Founder and Chairman of the Board Paul J. Meyer said, "Our nation's young people are potentially our most valuable asset. They should all have an equal opportunity to achieve the greatness which can be claimed by those who learn and practice the principles of personal success."

"The Making of a Champion" was written by Meyer, who is best known as an author of personal growth, motivation and business training programs for adults. The program is in response to the growing need for setting goals that is, for the most part, lacking in most formal education.

Students are urged to apply the program's principles to their own experiences and learn good work habits, build self-confidence and adopt attitudes that will contribute to a happy and productive life.

"That's why we've produced this program and why we're giving scholarships to girls and boys, ages 8 - 19, who use 'The Making of a Champion' as a stepping-stone to becoming champions in all areas of their lives," Meyer said.

"SAFE BOATING WEEK" JUNE 5 - 11

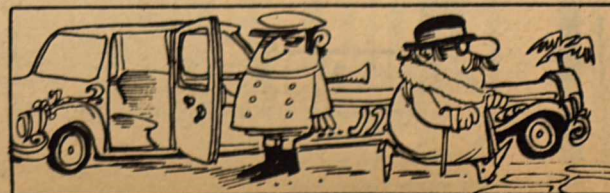
Governor Mark White has proclaimed June 5 - 11 "Texas Safe Boating Week" and the U.S. Coast Guard has named it "National Safe Boating Week" The special statewide designation was issued by Governor White in a ceremony at the Texas State Capitol.

Groups participating in the proclamation were the Boating Trades Association of Texas, MARINA Association of Texas, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Texas Safety Association, U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and U.S. Power Squadrons. The six organizations teamed up to form a coalition for Texas boating safety and to remind Texans that "safe boating is fun."

"Our main Safe Boating Week objective is to remind boaters to follow a few simple guidelines that not only make boating safer but make it more fun," said C.R. "Rob" Youker of San Benito, president of the Boating Trades Association of Texas. That all adds up to peace of mind."

You—Savvy on Spills?

Used with care and common sense, protective chemical products can be a key to beautiful lawns and gardens. Here, from the safety experts at Ortho, the country's leading manufacturer of home garden chemicals, are some safety tips in case of spills.

- Should you spill any chemical, set up a barrier to keep children and pets away. You don't want chemicals being tracked into the house.



- Ventilate the area of a spill by opening doors and windows, or setting up a fan. Chemical fumes may catch fire, so don't store them around pilot lights.

- Begin cleaning up a spill as soon as you can to minimize health exposure and possible problems with stains and odors.

- When cleaning up, wear rubber gloves and avoid breathing in vapors.

- Sweep spilled solids into a plastic bag.

- Spilled liquids should first be soaked up with an absorbent material such as Kitty Litter or paper towels and then placed in a plastic bag, sealed and put into a trash can.

- Scrub wood, cement or tile surface with a water solution of strong household detergent.

FIRE!

At least 72 Texans died and 599 were injured in fires during the last six months of 1982, according to statistics reported by 198 fire departments participating in the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS).

Lyndon L. Olson, Jr., Chairman of the State Board of Insurance, released the second report of the new TEXFIRS system operated by the State Fire Marshal's Office.

Property damage from fires was estimated at \$62,494,213.

Improper cooking techniques were blamed for most home fires and injuries, but careless smoking caused more deaths and incendiary/suspicious fires more property damage.

Twenty-one percent of all the 32,000 fires reported were of incendiary or suspicious origin, and 17.6 percent of the total dollar loss was attributed to these incidents.

Fires of unknown cause, plus the incendiary and suspicious category, accounted for 46 percent of the total number and 44 percent of the dollar loss.

The TEXFIRS report, based on a uniform, computerized reporting system, summarizes the causes and characteristics of fires and fire-related deaths and injuries. More than 200 fire departments protecting nearly 40 percent of the Texas population now report to the system.

Some of the largest cities were not able to provide data for the six months report. Most major cities either have developed, or are in the process of developing, systems compatible with TEXFIRS, however, and their statistics are being included as the system is expanded and refined.

"The TEXFIRS represents the first effort by a state agency in Texas to collect fire data continually in a uniform manner," said Olson.

State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson said TEXFIRS is a base of information which assists in detection of fire trends and development of solid information on the scope of the fire problem.

"This information will be categorized and correlated on a quarterly basis and returned to fire departments for local analysis," said Emerson. "The data provides an excellent fire department management tool as well as necessary facts for conducting fire protection and public safety programs."
