A fight in front of a local grocery store on the night of May 27, 1983, sent three Brackettville youths to the hospital and resulted in Felony Assault charges being filed against two local men.

Two counts each of Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon were filed on two brothers, Raul Talamantez, 19 and Jesus Talamatez, 18. They were arrested at the scene and placed in County Jail by Patrolman Cruz "Corky" McGuire. They were later released on bonds totaling \$8,000.00. Their cases will be presented to the Grand Jury.

I wish at this time to extend my thanks and appreciation to those officers and citizens who assisted us in controlling and dispersing the crowd at the scene. This was one of those explosive situations that could have resulted in many injuries or possibly even death had the crowd not been controlled. It is times like these that make me appreciate the good people of Brackettville and Kinney County. So many times in other cities, police officers in similar situations are ignored and abandoned by the very people they are sworn to protect. Not so here in our community. So many times we are assisted by the people. This makes us realize that we have the support of the majority of the people here in our effort to preserve law and order. THANK YOU!

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

We have collected \$62,624.25 in prisoner care fees thus far this fiscal year. We have \$1,468.00 outstanding which should be collected. This will bring the total to \$64,092.25. Should the average continue, we should total close to \$100,000.00 by the end of September. Our new fiscal year starts in October and I hope to increase the income at the County Jail for next fiscal year by 50%. This will bring our total income close to \$150,000.00.

At the present time the cost to feed the prisoners at the jail is approximately

\$3.06 per day per prisoner.

Since January 1981 we have solved approximately 50% of the burglaries reported. This compares to the State average of 14%. Dallas Police Dept. reports an average of 26%, the San Antonio Police Dept. reports an average of 12%. The Uvalde Police Dept. reports an average of 59%.

 Tuesday, May 17th our community lost a firefighting, "brush truck", due to mechanical failure. The truck is considered a total loss. Fortunately, no lives were lost as well.
 The "brush truck" carried 1300 gallons of water and was called out for every fire alarm. Our community and county is now crippled by not having this vehicle to respond to, large fires of any kind.
 The officials at the Fire Dept. have been working hastily

ly to gather facts and figures to replace the truck. The truck was insured and the Fire Department is hoping to collect the entire insured amount. Presently the V.F.D. has approximately \$2,200.00 in Savings at our local bank. At this time there may also be small amounts from other sources that will come in and are pledged to the V.F.D. but are not confirmed at this printing. The estimated replacement cost will be, to officials best calculations, between \$20,000--\$25,000. to buy and equip another "1200 gallon brush truck."

We are asking local business residents, and all interested people to donate to the Brackettville Fire Department at our First State Bank of Brackettville, so that our fire fighting ability will not be crippled for a lengthy period. The replacement process will take a minimum of 2-3 months already and we are approaching the hottest and driest parts of the season when we can expect the greatest amount of large fires calls.

Residents of Kinney County you will need to be more vigilant than ever for the next few months about your fire safety as we all work toward replacing our destroyed equipment. Can we count on you to help by donating to:

How to cut the cost of staying cool

If your home is air conditioned, your cooling system uses up *more than half* the electricity you buy every month during the summer. And since summer in South Texas lasts a long time, it's worth a little extra effort to put the air conditioner on a low kilowatt-hour diet. Here are some reminders that will help.

TUNE IT UP. Before the hot season begins, have your air conditioner cleaned and checked by a qualified technician. An annual checkup can prevent costly repair bills and keep your unit running at top efficiency.

DON'T OVERCOOL. Keep the thermostat at 78°. Each degree below that setting could add another 14% to the cost of operating your air conditioner.



KEEP IT CLEAN. At least once a month, clean or replace the filter. Clear obstructions away from outside unit so air can



circulate freely.

STOP AIR LEAKS. A large amount of costly air infiltration enters through wall light switch outlets and plug-in sockets. For about \$10, an entire house can be sealed in these places with inexpensive gaskets. In addition, you'll want to caulk all cracks and

holes, and install weather stripping around windows and doors.

BLOCK OUT THE SUN. Keep direct sunlight out of the house with draperies, blinds, shades or awnings. Plant trees and shrubs for additional shade.



TURN ON THE FANS. You'll use less air conditioning comfortably at a higher thermostat setting with electric fans.

SHOP CAREFULLY. If you plan to buy a new air conditioner, choose a unit with an Energy Efficiency Ratio (EER or SEER) of 8 or above. You also need to make sure the unit is properly sized.

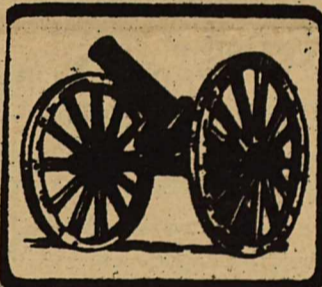

SONORA WOOL & MOHAIR CONTESTS JUNE 14-----16

The 46th Annual Sonora Wool and Mohair Show and the 1983 National 4-H Wool Judging Contest will be held here June 14-16. Both events are sponsored by the Sonora Lions Club in cooperation with the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company and Texas Agricultural Extension

service.

Junior judging activities begin at 8 am. June 15 for livestock, range, and wool and mohair contests. Judging of individuals in wool and mohair starts also at 8 a.m.

The National 4-H Wool Judging Contest kicks off at 8 a.m. on June 16 followed by the awards luncheon and auction of Junior Show Champion fleece at the Sutton County 4-H Center.

Special awards to be presented include the Joe and

W.F. Berger Memorial Trophy, Fred T. Earwood Memorial Trophy and E.B. Keng Memorial Trophy. The Berger and Earwood trophies are rotating trophies for junior wool and mohair exhibitors respectively. After one individual receives them for the fourth consecutive year, each trophy then remains in that person's permanent possession. The Keng Trophy is a perpetually rotating trophy.

For over 40 years the Sonora Wool & Mohair Show has been known as the finest and largest show of its kind in the world. For this reason and because of the high public demand, training opportunities found here are made available to 4-H Clubs throughout the country.

Since its beginning in 1947, wool judging contests have spread to many county wool shows in Texas and to other states. Top teams from Texas and other states participate in the National Wool Judging
