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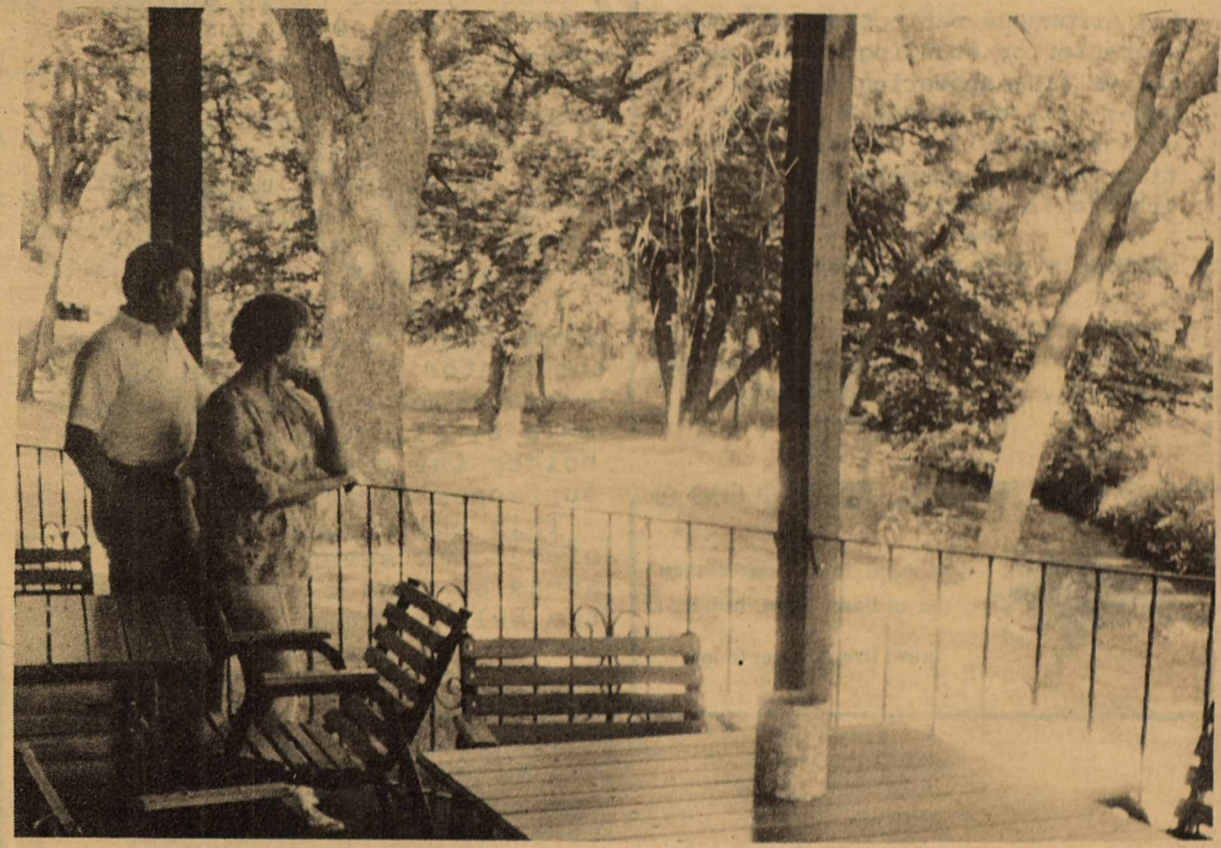
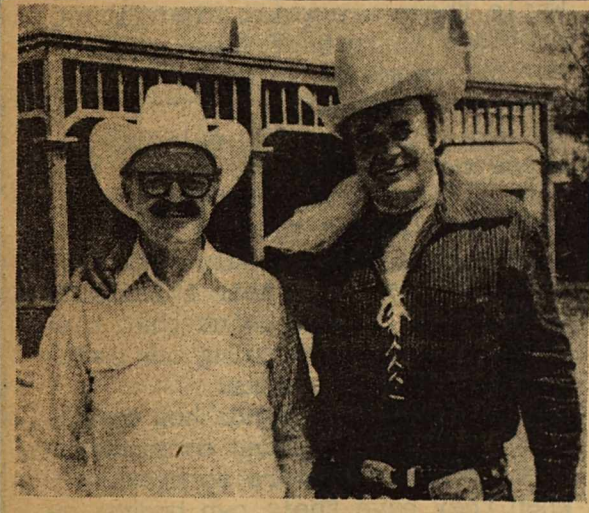

STATE MINERALS PROTECTED

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said today the Texas supreme Court ruling in Moser v. United States Steel was "gratifying" because it prevents a needless waste in legal fees and encourages development of state-owned mineral lands.

"We felt all along that the state was not subject to the earlier court ruling that allowed surface owners to claim some minerals to a depth of 200 feet despite someone else owning the mineral right," Mauro said. "But we were facing a situation of having to fight on a case-by-case basis across almost every courthouse in the state. This ruling will save the state millions in needless legal fees. At the same time, it will make mineral development more lucrative for the state by removing the element of doubt of ownership."

In the Moser case, the Supreme Court ruling reaffirmed the historic tradition of the surface and mineral ownership by allowing the mineral holder the rights to all sub-surface minerals.

This ruling will directly affect the seven million acres of land covered under the Relinquishment Act of 1919. This land was sold by the state btween 1895 and 1931. Under this act, the state retains ownership of the minerals as agents of the state. Minerals subject to the Relinquishment Act include oil, gas, coal, lignite, sulphur, and uranium and other minerals.

"When I took office as Texas Land Commissioner, I promised to run the agency like a business for the benefit of all the citizens of the State," Mauro said. "Orderly development of the Relinquishment Act lands for valuable minerals will insure we continue our contribution to the Permanent School Fund."

The money generated from the permanent School Fund was more the \$10 million in the past year.

"Only through the wise and prudent management of our state-owned lands can we provide the maximum revenues possible for the school children of Texas," Mauro said..

The recent summit meeting of NATO leaders to discuss economic issues is a sign of the degree to which all of our economies are inextricably linked. This linkage affects every level of business and commerce.

For Texans, there are two areas of particular concern in our trade relations with the European Economic Community--agricultural products and steel. Recently, I had the opportunity to express these concerns to Mr. Etiwne Davignon, Vice President of the European Economic Community. I came away from our discussion somewhat encouraged. While there are still significant problems in both of these areas, the EEC seems to to be shifting its approach to them.

In agriculture, EEC policies cause two problems for Texas farmers.. First , import barriers make it difficult for them to sell within the EEC; and secondly, the EEC nations subsidize their inefficent agriclutlure to the point that their farmers are understtuung our sales to Third World nations.

I asked Mr. Davignon how long European nations cound continue to subsize their farmers so heavily when they have their own budget deficit problems. He said the EEC is concerned about this problem and h

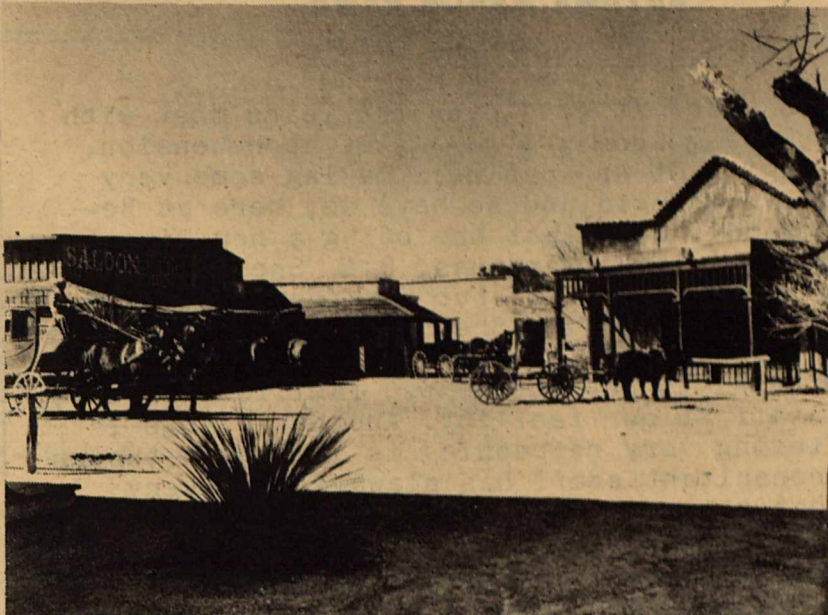

NEWS FROM BOB BULLOCK

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$43.8 million in local tax payments to 974 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax.

"The cities who lean most heavily on oil and gas for their local receipts are still suffering, but the rest of the state is beginning to make up for the drops in revenue we saw earlier this year," Bullock said. So far this year, local sale tax Cities have received \$353.5 million, less than one percent behind the \$354 million total paid by this time last year.

Houston received the largest check, \$8.4 million, a 12.5 percent increase from the city's June 1982 payment, but year-to-date payments for Houston are still about 8.3 percent behind last year. Dallas' check for \$5.2 million brought that city's 1983 total to \$41.7 million, 8.5 percent ahead of last year.

San Antonio's check received was \$2.9 million, boosting that City's increase over 1982 to 10.7 percent. Austin's check for 1.7 million equals a 16.7 percent rise above the last year. Fort Worth's check of \$1.7 million represents a 10 percent increase for 1983.

Midland and Odessa payment still lag behind last year. Odessa's \$456,000 June payment leaves 1983 year-to-date pay-


RETAMA MANOR NEWS

As a member of the ARA team and a member of this outstanding community. I again, wish to express my gratitude to you, as it is with your support that makes my profession a lot easier.

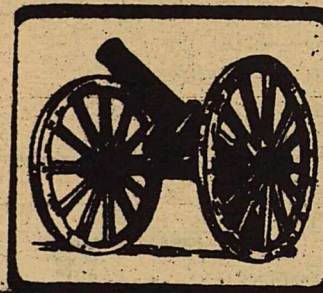

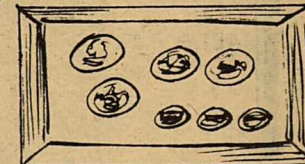

Notice is hereby given that RIO GRANDE ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC., (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective July 1, 1983, or as soon thereafter as permitted by law. The changes are applicable to all areas to which the Utility provides electric utility service. All classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The Utility expects that the proposed schedule of rates will furnish an additional 7.4% in revenue as compared to the amount of revenue furnished by the existing schedule of rates.

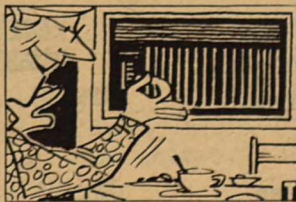

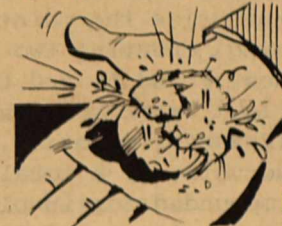
The legendary Bobby Jones won the British and U. S. amateur and open titles in 1930. His four wins are said to be the greatest feat in the history of golf.



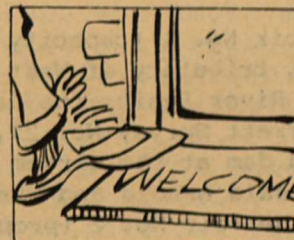

Notice is given that U.S. Companies, Inc., 16800 Dallas Parkway, Suite 200, Dallas, Texas, 75248, applicant, seek a permit pursuant to §11.121, Texas Water Code, and Rules 156.02.05.001 (31 TAC S303.1) et seq. to authorize the maintenance of two existing dams (actually low water crossing) creating two existing on-channel reservoirs (designed Reservoirs Nos. 1 and 5) and the construction and maintenance of three proposed dams (low) water crossings) creating three additional on-channel reservoirs (Reservoirs Nos. 2, 3, and 4); to authorize the impoundment in said reservoirs of a total of 45.2 acre-feet of water and use of the water so impounded for in-place recreational purposes; to authorize the diversion of not to exceed 10 acre-feet of water per year from Reservoir No. 1 for recreational purposes, that is, circulation through a man-made waterfall, with the water so diverted to be returned to Reservoir No. 1 for recirculation; and the diversion of not to exceed 60 acre-feet per year from diversion points located on the perimeters of Reservoirs Nos. 2, 3, and 4 for the irrigation of 60 acres of land out of a total of 908.874 acres owned by the applicant approximately 18.5 miles NE of Brackettville, Kinney County, Texas.

The respective capacities and locations of the reservoirs are as follows:

Reservoir No. 1 (capacity of 4.00 acre-feet) is located on Spring Branch, tributary of West Nueces River, tributary of Nueces River, Nueces River Basin; the dam creating Reservoir No. 1 is in the Arnold and Barrett Survey No. 29, Abstract No. 5, Kinney County and the midpoint of said dam at the stream is N 48°15' E, 5025 feet from the SW corner of the said Arnold and Barrett Survey;

Reservoir No. 2 (proposed capacity of 3.5 acre-feet) will be located on Spring Branch; the dam will be in said Arnold and Barrett Survey and the midpoint of the dam at the stream will be N 52°45' feet from the aforesaid survey corner;

Reservoir No. 3 (proposed capacity of 3.75 acre-feet) will be located on Spring Branch; the dam will be in said Arnold and Barrett Survey and the west end of said dam at the stream will be N 63° E, 3300 feet from the aforesaid survey corner;

Reservoir No. 4 (proposed capacity 3.75 acre-feet) will be located on Spring Branch; the dam will be in the B. Lopez Survey No. 26, Abstract No. 483, Kinney County, and the west end of the dam at the stream will be N 86°40' E, 3400 feet from the aforesaid corner of the Arnold and Barrett Survey; and

Reservoir No. 5 (capacity of 30.20 acre-feet) is located on the West Nueces River, the dam is in the aforesaid B. Lopez Survey and the West end of the dam at the stream is S 68°20' E, 3050 feet from the aforesaid corner of the Arnold and Barrett Survey.

Diversions will occur at the following points at the indicated maximum diversion rates:

No. 1: On the west, or right, shore of Reservoir No. 1 on Spring Branch, N. 46°15' E, 5525 feet from the SW corner of the aforesaid Arnold and Barrett survey at a maximum diversion rate of 0.7 cfs (300 gpm).

No. 2: From the periphery of Reservoir No. 2 on Spring Branch between a point N 49°20' E, 4975 feet from the aforesaid survey corner and a point (at the dam) N 52°45' E, 4325 feet from said survey corner.

No. 3: From the periphery of Reservoir No. 3 on Spring Branch between a point N 56°45' E, 3775 feet from said survey corner and a point (at the dam) N 63° E, 3300 feet from said survey corner.

No. 4: From the periphery of Reservoir No. 4 on Spring Branch between a point N 77° E, 3050 feet from said survey corner and a point (at the dam) N 86°40' E, 3400 feet from said survey corner.

Diversions from Points 2, 3, and 4 are to be made at a combined maximum diversion rate of 2.2 cfs (1000 gpm).

The Applicant estimates that of the 10 acre-feet of water per year diverted from Reservoir No. 1, approximately 9 acre-feet per year will be returned to the stream.

has asked its agriculture experts to examine the wisdom of subsidizing products which heretofore have been purchased more cheaply from the United States.

The EEC will address this point at a meeting this month in Stuttgart, Germany.

Steel mill and steel pipe and tube from Europe also are having a negative impact on the Texas economy. IN 1982, there was a reduced demand for steel pipe and tube products, which caused U.S. domestic production to fall. However, imports from the European Community and other nations continued to enter the U.S. in quantities significantly in excess of market demand.

The pressure of these increased imports on top of decreased demand brought about unprecedented U.S. layoffs and plants closing. For example, Lone Star Steel was forced to shut down its oil pipe and tube manufacturing operations in Texas last year.

Mr. Davignon told me the European Community has concluded that it is producing 55 million tons of steel a year above what is justified by market demand. He expects the EEC to cut the production by 30 million tons. However, he also indicated that the EEC likely will demand that we modernize our steel industry and cut our capacity as a condition of a new steel agreement. This causes me great concern.

The recession that has plagued our economy also has affected Europe some nations more severely than the U.S. This makes reaching trade agreements more difficult, but at the same time all the more important. We must continue to work together to solve our mutual economic problems, but we also must ensure the Europeans understand our basic philosophy--we are willing to compete on equal footing, but we will not tolerate unfair barrier on our goods while affording our trading partners free access to our markets.

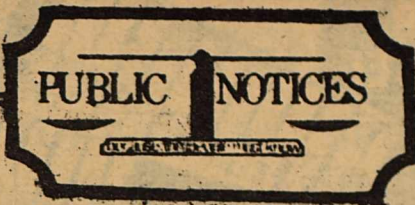

Those opposing the granting of this application may appear at the hearing and/or, not less than eight day before the hearing date, may file written protests with the Commission and serve copies on the applicant wwith proof of service to be provided to the Commission. Written protests shall contain the name and address of the protestant, an identification of the pending application,, the basis of protestant's interest, location of protestant's diversion points(s) or property, if applicable and any amendments or adjustments to the application which would result in a withdrawal of the protest. The written protest will be noted by the Commission but will not be considered as evidence since the right to cross-examine is absent. LUNG HAZARDS

The American Lung Association of Texas is concerned about millions of workeres in hundreds of occupations who are exposed to health hazards in their workplaces because of substances in the air they breathe on the job. Every year it is estimated 65,000 U.S. workers develop a respiratory disease related to their jobs, and an estimated 25,000 persons die from occupational lung disease.

Lung disease afflict workers wherever the air they breathe holds hazardous levels of dust, sprays, fumes, gases, vapors, or radioactive materials. Th problem is becoming more cm-complex and dangerous to a greater number of people as industrial production of toxic substances increases in volume. New substances whose dangers are not yet fully understood expose workers to unknown ha hazards. Pollution in the atomshpere adds to the hazards. And workers who smoke may significantly increease their risk of death or disability from smoke may siginificantly increae their rick of death or disability from some occupational lung disease.

The workplace can be made safer and the process is not always expensive or complicated although it may be at times. There are four basic approaches to controlling lung hazards on the job that can be done by: (1) changing procdures, (2) improving ventilation, (3) training workers to minimize exposure to toxic materials and (4) use of personal protective equipment.

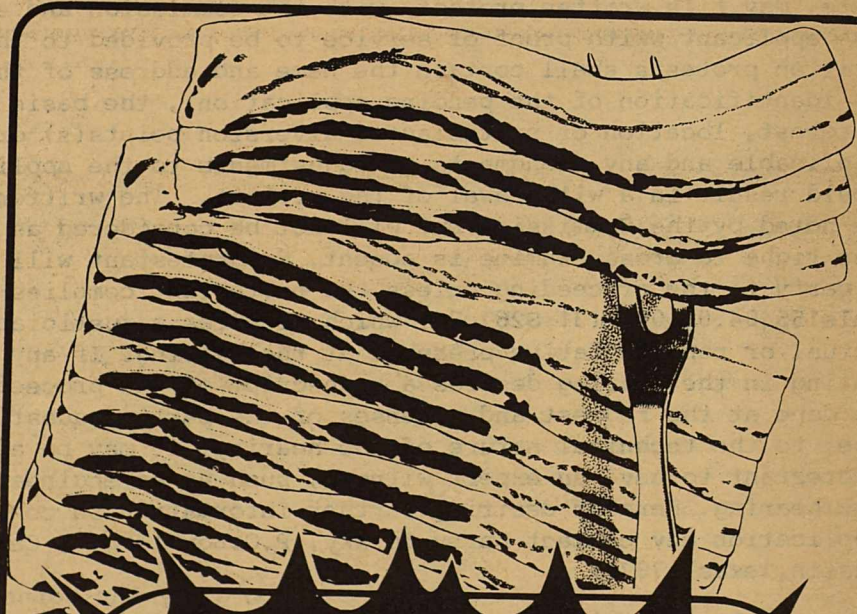

ments to that City 32.1 percent behind last year. Midland received \$376,000, leaving that City 25.5 percent behind 1982

Bullock also sent June rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$9.3 million, up from last June's \$8.7 million check. The San Antonio MTA got 1.3 million, up from from last June's \$976,000.

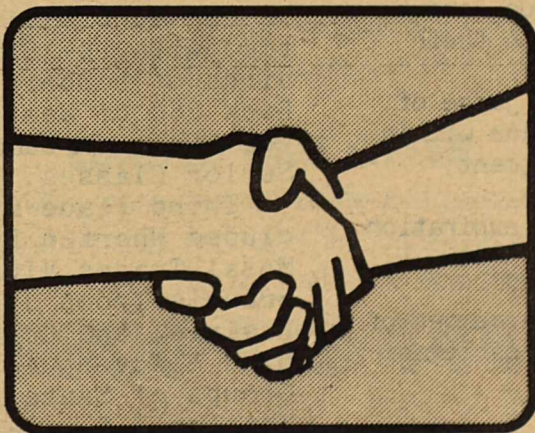

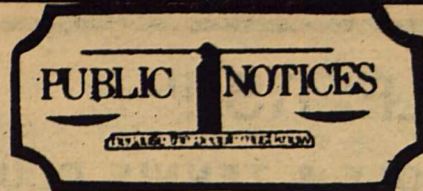

It appears to have been the burial site of an Indian due to the fact that remnants of deer antlers were found near the skull. The antlers were definitely part of the burial and could have possibly been placed on the head of the subject prior to being buried.

I contacted the director of the

Texas Archaeological Survey in Austin and they have agreed to accept the remains for study. Hopefully, the sex, age and other interesting information sometime in August. As soon as it is received I will pass it along to you.

The Kinney County Grand Jury recently indicated Domingo Montoya on burglary charges resulting from the burglary of Pop's Doughnut Shop. Trial date will be set for a later date.

Ramon Falcon, recently convicted in District Court here, has asked for a new trial. The hearing was first set for May 27, and was postponed until a later date by District Judge George Thurmond. No date for the hearing has been set as of this date.

Real County has set a hearing for Revocation of Probation on Mr. Falcon for a previous conviction and probation on Aggravated Assault charges in that county.

Burglary offenses in Brackettville and Kinney County has dropped off considerably lately.
