CABLE T.V. PUBLIC HEARING

The City of Brackettville City Council will meet Monday August 8,1983, at its regular monthly meeting to discuss and approve or deny a rate increase as requested by the Television Cable Company of Brackettville, Texas, Inc.

The City received a letter from the T.V.Cable Company June 24,1983, requesting a meeting with the Council and which was followed by a letter on July 13,1982, outlining their proposal. The City called a public notice to be printed in the local paper on July 1,8, and 15th of July announcing a public hearing to be held Tuesday, July 19, 1983 to allow all citizens to discuss the merits of the pro posal and thus give soul and timely input to the City Council upon which the Council would make a proper decision on the request.

Twenty-Four (24) persons attended the public hearing to hear Mr. Louy Younts and Mr. Fred Brien proesent their proposal.

Mr. Younts requested that a two-step rate increase be approved. One dollar for each subscriber commencing November 8, 1983, and an automatic one dollar increase on November 1, 1984 for a total of two dollars a subscriber incease in rates. To offset the rate

increase Mr. Younts offered three (3) additional channels to be made available to all subscribers. WGN-Chicago; CNN Headline News and Public Broadcast would be added. A choice or selection between thepresent Christian Broadcast (9) and Nicklodion-a preteenage station at no addition charge was offered.

The present charge of ten dollars (\$10.00) per subscriber would be increased to eleven dollars in November 1983, and to twelve Dollars

(\$12.00) in 1984.

The full range of stations that would be made available for the twelve dollars a month charge would be NBC, CBS, ABC, KWEX, (Mexican Station) WTBS Altanta; ESPN-Sports WGN-Chicage CNN-Headline News and Public Broadcast with a choice of either Christian or Nickelodion for subscribers selection of ten (10) Channels.

The movie channel (pay movies) would still be avilable to those desiring to subscribe.

A petition signed by subscribers from Fort Clark Springs and Brackettville was accepted the Council Manage to present to the Council for their consideration. The petition call-

ed for a desire to have PBS as an additional station. This station was included as an add-on station upon approval of a rate increase as outlined previously.

At the conclusion of the hearing of those attending it was recommended that the proposal as presented be approved.







TRUTH-IN-PROCEDURES REQUIRED LOCALLY

During the next two months, local governments will be bollowing "truth-in-taxation" procedures, giving taxpayers notice of tax increases and the opportuntiy to comment on theproposed increases.

Truth-in-taxation laws require a taxing jurdisdiction to oublish a series of notices and hold public hearings on its propsed tax rate if the rate would increase taxes beyond limits. In some circumstances, taxpayers may also petition for the election to limit the tax rate.

Tax assessors in many cities, counties, school districts and other jurdisdictions which levy property taxes are making preparations for a crucial step in truth in taxation--calculation of what is called the "effective tax rate":

According to Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (STPB), the effective tax rate is the basis for determining a taxing unit's final tax rate and must be publicized along with the calculations used to derive it.

"If the jurisdiction proposes to adopt a tax rate that is more

than three (3) percent higher than the effective rate, public notices and a hearing are required," Graeber said. "And if the jurdisdiction actually adopts a rate that is more than eight percent higher than the effective rate, local residents have the right to petition for an election to roll the rate back to eight percent above the effective rate."

Graeber explained that the effective tax rate for a particular taxing unit is the rate which, when applied to the value of property on the 1983 tax roll which was taxable last year, will generate the same amount of revenue for maintenance and operation as well levied the previous year. It also includes the rate necessary to satisfy the current year's bonded indebtness and takes into account increases in total taxable value due to reappraisal and new property, as well as decreases resulting from newly exempted property and other types of tax releif.

Amendments to the Texas Property Tax Code made by the 68th Legislature and effective last month allow the effective tax rate to account for revenue lost due to errors on the appraisal roll in the previous



tax rate which would generate that
amount of revenue.

If the proposed rate is more than three percent higher that the effective tax rate,, a public hearing on the tax increase must be scheduled and announced either by mail to each property owner in the jurisdiction or as a newspaer advertisement. The newspaper ad must be at least a quarter page, printed in large type and appearing in a section of the paper other than classifieds or public notices.

Many governing bodies also choose to publich an adjacent ad explaining the budget or outlining the actual impact of the proposed tax increase on individual property owners.

At the public meeting, officials must announce the date, time and place of the meeting at which they will vote to adopt a tax rate; tax-payers must be given notice of the meeting similar to the notice of the hearing.

If the adopted rate is high enough to permit a rollback election, then taxpayers have 90 days after the rate adoption to submit a valid petition calling for the election Within the following 20 days, the governing body must determine the petition's validity and order that the eledtion be held; if official take no action concerning validity, then the petition is automatically considered valid and the election must be ordered. The election must be scheduled 30 to 90 days after the last day on which the governing body could have acted to approve or disapprove the petition.

When a tax rate rollback electin is successful in a school district, the rollback is effective in the following year; in any other taxing unit, the rollback is immediate.

Graeber noted that a propoerty owner has opportunities throughout the year to influence the amount he pays in property taxes.

"Open planning meetings and budget hearings allow a taxpayer to express his opinion about the types of services provided by the taxing jurisdictin," he said .. "rights to receive notice of his property's appraised value and to an apprasial review board meeeting allow him to see that the value placed on his property for tax purposes is fair and in line with other values in the jurdisiction. And truth in taxationand the rollback election process then gives him the chance to have his say about tax-rate proposals that may increase his final tax bill."

This week's column will be dedicated to the memory of Chuck Renfro, 44 year-old-Upton County Deputy Sheriff who was killed in the line of duty at approximately 1:00 am on the morning of Friday July 15, 1983.

Deputy Sheriff Renfro was killed by a father/son burlary team when he answered a silent alarm that was wired into the Sheriff's Department from a Rankin, Texas business building.

Chuck was a 4 and 1/2 year veteran of the Upton County Sheriff's Office. His killers, Richard Graham, 40 years of age, and Thomas Graham, 18 years of age were captured by Pecos County authorities after a gun battle in which the older Graham was killed and the younger was seriously injured.

The Grahams shot Deputy Renfro three times after he had entered the building. Once in the back and once in the stomach with a shotgun and finsihed him off with a pistol shot between the eyes.

Please join me this week in sympathy for his family and friends and a silent prayer that something of this sort never happens to any of our local officers.

Two vehicle burglaries occurred within an hour or so of each other Saturday evening of the 16th in front of a local grocery store on Hwy 90.

The first burglary occurred at approximately 7:00 pm when a wallet wize checkbook containing personalized checks and approximately \$8.00 in cash was taken from the car of Mrs. Macario Munoz while she was inside the store

shopping. The second burglary occurred at approximately 8:20 pm while Kim Rose and a companion both Del Rio residents, went insided the store to purchase cigarettes. Miss Rose stated that she could not have been in the store more than two or three minutes. The thief took a blue handbag that had a picture of a horse and the name Kim printed on the side.

The purse contained approximately \$800.00 worth of jewelry and approximately \$40.00 in cash, as well as personal papers and her driver's license.

The cases were investigated by myself and City Patrolman "Corky" McGuire. We questioned several bystanders who were in the area at the time of the crimes and were unable to locate anyone who had witnessed the crimes.

The investigation continues at the time of this writing and anyone who may have information concerning these cases is asked to contact me at the Sheriffs' Office. Your name will be kept confidential.

You may remember a year or so back when two vehicles were stolen on two consecutive days from in front of a local store. 






VACCINATIONS ENSURE HEALTHIER CHILDREN

Although smallpox was once a dreaded disease that often killed its victims, a vaccine now appears to have eradicated it. And polio, the crippling childhood disease, has been brought under control with a vaccine.

Because of thses advances in immunizations, many infectious childhood diseases that once caused serious illness and death are now rare. To keep them that way, vaccinations are necessary.

The Texas Medical Association suggest this American Medical Association schedule of routine vaccinations to give a child maximum protec tion against serious infectious disease:

-- 15 months: Measles, Mumps, German Measles(rubella) --4-6 yrs: DTP, polio

-- 14-16 vears DT

-- 2 months old: Polio, DTP -- 4 months: DTP, polio -- 6 months: DTP

Also avilable are vaccines for other diseases such a pneumonia, influenza, typhoid fever, hepatitis B, rabies, plague, yellow fever, and cholera. These are not considered routine but are for specific situations.

Immunizations make people resistant to specific germs. A vaccine, administered by injection or by mouth, consists of dead or harmless versions of a particular infectious agent. The body produces antibodies to ward off the agent. Although the person does not suffer the symptoms of the disease -- except maybe slight fever -- the body becomes immune to the disease.

Parents should tell their doctor before immunization begin if their child has ever had convulsions. They also should tell the physician if the child is ill when the vaccine is to be administered. For instance, a cold could

mean a short delay in giving the vaccine.
