CITY TO APPLY FOR EDA GRANT

The City of Brackettville in response to our inquiry has been confirmed as being eligible for a Economic Development Administration grant under public law 98-8. Under this Act the EDA received a \$100 million appropriation for public works grants. \$75 million of this amount will be available to targeted areas of which the City is a part.

As in every silver cloud there are questions to be answered. First our unemployment rate was designated as but 3.7 percent. To obtain a 80% grant we must have a minimum unemployment of 12% or higher or a median family income of \$3,743 or lower. The report designating our median family income is \$8,200. Both of these "reports" as designated in our certification for qualifications for applying for a grant will be contested.

It is felt by most in the community that our unemployment rate as structured by the Texas Employment Commission is false and misleading. As there is no office in the County, it is not feasible to presume that either Eagle Pass or Del Rio Employment office an/or do make the proper contacts and therefore the accuracy of

their reports are questioned as it effects some \$400,000; in funds for our Community.

We will be requesting monies to replace and or repair the elevated water tank the ground storage water tank, emergency generator backup; capabilities for both the water and sewer services and to expand our services to the West part of the City.

The age of our elevated tank built in 1928, the lack of local emergency electric support and the recommendation of the State Health Department to replace our ground storage tank as well as the drop in sales tax revenues make for a strong presentation of need.

We will keep you informed as the City Council continues to strive for support and service to all segments of our community.

ESSER HONORED

Carl served as assistant County Extension Agent in Uvalde County for two years before assuming the County Extension Agent's Agriculture position in Kinney County at Brackettville since 1975. While at Brackettville he has conducted an outstanding program with agriculture producers with emphasis in sheep and goat selection and management programs and wildlife production. Carl has also built a very active 4-H Club program where Kinney County 4-H Members feed approximately 300 head of 4-H Club lambs annually, and exhibit these lamb projects at major shows across Texas where they have exhibited many champions and other high placing lambs.

Just this year Kinney County 4-H Club exhibited both the champion pen of 15 rambouillet market lambs and the champion pen of 15 finewool crossbred market lambs at the San Angelo Livestock show.

Carl is married to the former Debbie Thompson and they have three children Richard 7 years, Walt 6 years, and Lacey Lea 2 years.

COMING: CLEANER COAL BURNING

Did you ever hear of anyone washing coal?

Through proper washing, it is possible to remove as much as 25 percent of the sulfur from coal. In some cases, that's enough for a customer to burn coal and still meet air-quality requirements, reports Conoco Inc.

At its new research laboratory in Library, Pa., the energy company is striving to cut sulfur content even further to make coal-burning more environmentally acceptable. SONORA PERFORMANCE TESTED BILLIES SET SALE RECORD

Sonora-- Seventy-eight head of performance tested Angora billies sold for a record average at the 3rd annual Angora Billie Performance Test and Sale held at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Ranch on Highway 55 between Sonora and Rocksprings. The new mark is \$175 above the 1982 average and \$227 above the 1981 sale average. The sale animals grossed \$60,425.

The top indexing buck was consigned by Perry Bushong, Mountain Home, and purchased by Joe David Ross, Sonora, and Bob Childress, Ozona, for \$2,000.

The high selling Angora billie was purchased by Juno Ranch Company, Sonora, for \$2,150 and

consigned by Fritz Kuebel, Jr., Blanco.

Sixteen of the performance tested goats sold for more than \$1,000 and 53 broke the 1982 sale average of \$600.

Volume buyer was John Wade, Sonora, who took home eight lots for \$5,900. A total of 278 animals, also test record , had been entered in the performance trial. The top 35% were sold sheared at the auction. Color slides were shown of each animal during the sale depicting their fleecing ability. Forty Angora breeders participated in the test by consigning animals.

"This performance test was undertaken to assist producers in identifying and developing more productive Angora goats," said Jack Groff, Texas agricultural Extension Service sheep and goat specialist. "The program is intended to provide assistance to purebred and commercial producers. From the enthusiasm exhibited at the sale by the large attendance and active bidding, it appears our producers have much more confidence in their industry and the economy as a whole."

The test is conducted by Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System and the cooperation Angora breeders.

NEW FOOD STAMP STATUS REPORT

status Report which they must complete and return to TDHR.

Monthly Reporting is a new way for clients to report any changes that took place in their households during the month. This report along with proof of income change and/or expenses must be back in the Food Stamp Office by the 5th day of the next month.

Those Households who do not correctly fill out the Status Report, or fail to return it along with proof of change to TDHR on time will have their food stamps held up or stopped.

Two types of Households will be required to report monthly.

1. Households who have two or more Adults and at least one Adult is employable.

2. Households who have one adult and at least three children. The adult must be exempt from work registration.

Persons participating in the Food Stamp Program who do not receive a Status Report must continue to report any change in their household within 10 days as usual.

Persons with questions on monthly reporting must call their local Food Stamp Office.

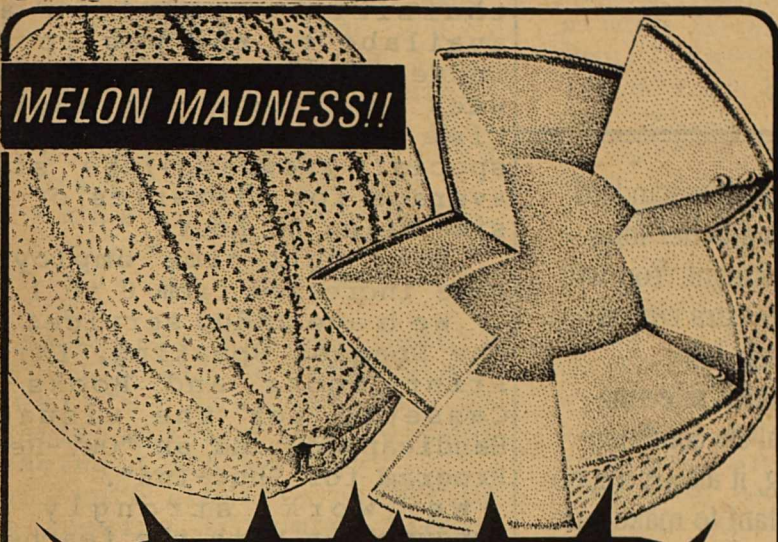

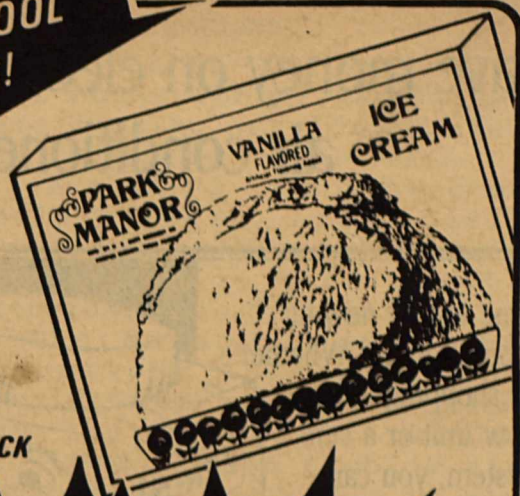

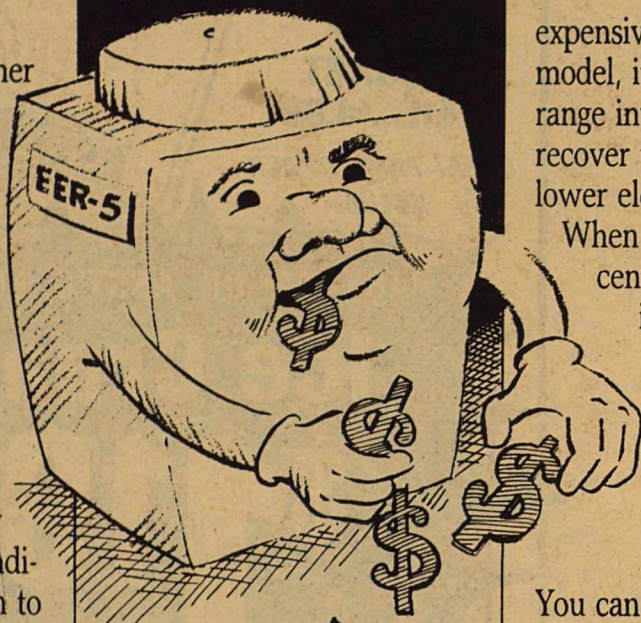

The total number of books held has increased from 3,437 to 10,052--over 200% INCREASE!

The total number of hours that Library services are available to the public has increased from 20 to 40 per week (this does not include time Library is open for special programs); the state average for libraries of our size being 31 hours.

Paid full-time employees have increased from 0 to 1.

We have added services for the Spanish Speaking, Large-Print books and Books on Cassette for the visually Handicapped, and an "Out-Reach Program for Shut-Ins".

We work strongly in conjunction with the teachers, parents and students of our district and assist the people of Fort Clark Springs to gather historical data for personal use and development of their museum.

Indeed, Kinney County Public Library has grown, but has it kept pace with other communities of the same size?

Let us compare Castroville Public Library (C.P.L.) serving a population of 3,570 to Kinney County Public Library (K.C.P.L.) serving 2,279 and the use the statistics published by Austin in 1982 from "Texas Public Library Statistics for 1981: An Analysis".

Kinney County Public Library--number of volumes held 10,052, Volumes per capita 4.41; Castroville--8,121, Volumes per capita 2.27; Kinney County Public Library--number of items held 13,861, number of items per capita 6.08; Castroville--

LIBRARY NEWS

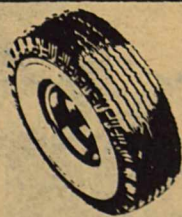
In 1982 the Kinney County Public Library moved into its current facility at the corner of Spring at Ellen Street.

Since the move from the building previously owned by the New World Study Club--who started the library on their own shelves in 1966, and thanks largely to this Woman's Club, the Friends of the Library, property owners of Kinney County, and a grant from Economic Development Association (E.D.A.) the library has grown steadily.

In the 10 short years since 1973 and thanks to the county commissioners, the Library's county funded budget has grown from \$600.00 to \$19,370.00 which is pending a cut back to \$17,432.57 (a 10% cut back along with all other county departments and offices) and

the Librarian's salary has grown from 0 to \$7,820.04 with a planned cut to \$7,741.84 (a 1% cut for all County Officers' salaries to help pay-off the County Bank Note.)

Comparing Kinney County Public Library to Texas State Library's statistics of Libraries serving populations averaging 3,106 we show: Texas State Library--number of film showing 3; number Viewer count 55; Brackettville--5,306, number of Viewer Count 13,337; Texas State Libray expenditures for books \$2,,599, expenditures for periodicals \$216; Brackettville expenditures for books \$2,068, expenditures for periodicals \$81.

Expenditures for salaries and wages: Texas State Library--\$9,490.00 Brackettville--\$7,741.84 (as of next year)

If one looks at the cost of a theater movie it would average about \$3.50 per person

(not including transportation to another town). Had the library paatrons topay theater prices to watch our films they would have spent a total of \$46,679.50 last year or \$20.48 per capita.

County expenditueres for our Library utilities has inceaased from \$90.00 per month of \$1,775.00 at the old Library to close to \$350.00 per month at the new library which has central air conditioning.; You will notice we have shut off our central air and are using only our ceiling and floor fans for cooling to help meet our budget(our last month's electricity bill was \$299.63). We also have had one of out two telephones removed ;to help meet costs.

We appreciate the City's taking over costs of our gas, water and sewer which averages around \$20.00 per month.

There is no question that the people of Brackettville and the surrounding County use thier library. It is our goal to continue to up-grade the quality of services to our deserving community.

TELEPHONE RECEIVERS OFF HOOK CAUSES PROBLEMS

Telephone recievers left off hooks for privacy's sake are causing service problems in the Brackettville area.

According to Southwestern Bell Manager, Lou Garza, a portion of the central office equipment is tied up when receicers are left off hooks.

The Manager noted that receivers left off hooks register as service problems on the company's testing equipment. "One problem also associated with this is slow dial tone."

"When this happens, employee time and expense is spent on these service situations instead; of geniune service-related problems," Garza said.

There are several alternatives to leaving your receiver off the hook.

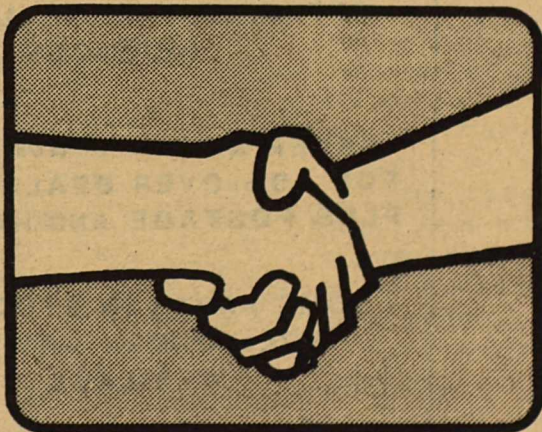
"In most cases, your telephone can be unplugged fron the wall at the wall jack," Garza said. This prevents the telephone from ringing however, the person calling you will hear the ringing and may assume no one is home," he said.

Another alternative is adjusting the bell. Most telephones have a a bell adjustment that can raise or lower the volume of the ringing.

What's the best thing to do? "Always leave the receiver on the hook," Garza said. "That way you will never miss an important call."

GOVERNOR MARK WHITE REPORTS;

Energy conservation grants totaling \$4.5 million have been requested for Texas universities, schools and hospitals, Governor Mark White announced today.

The Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council has submitted grant applications to the Federal Department of Energy for technical studies on energy conservation as well as physical improvements that will increase the energy efficiency of buildings owned by public and non-profit agencies.

Technical Assistance grants will provide matching funds to assist in comprehensive energy analysis of individual buildings. Eighty-three buildings were recommended for technical assistance grants totaling \$690,821.

Energy Conservation Measures grants provide matching funds for projects recommended in technical assistance reports. Grants would be used for equipment, materials, labor and project design. Sixty-nine buildings were recommended for physical improvement grants totaling \$3.8 million.

Although the Institutional Conservation Program operates on a 50 percent match basis, the use of federal Jobs Bill

funds expanded the funding capacity and will allow up to 90 percent grant support for projects in economically depressed areas.

Governor White said the outlook for approval of the projects recommended by TENRAC appears favorable. Energy conservation is but one of the factors involved in the efficient operation of public facilities, Governor White said, while endorsing the efforts of TENRAC and the Institutional Conservation Program.

On The Way: More Powerful Batteries

Fluorinated carbon—it's a material you'll probably be hearing lots more of in the years ahead if you buy batteries, say scientists, as manufacturers scramble to produce units offering high energy density, greater power, more compact size and longer life—five years minimum. Fluorinated carbon, they say, looms large as one of the key ingredients for the cathode in lithium batteries.

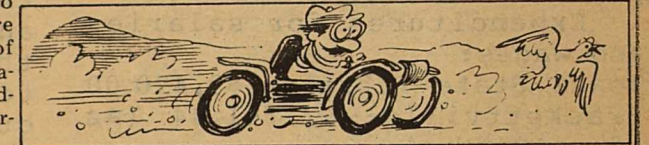

Illegal aliens forced their way into the residence of Charles Ray "Ford" Dodson approximately 12 miles East of Brackettville, Friday, July 22, and took personal property valued at approximately \$200.00

We received a phone call from Mr. Dodson at 4:00 pm, Friday afternoon, and upon my arrival and subsequent investigation it was determined that entry into the home had been through a screened porch and window on the East side of the house. Mr. Dodson had one of the aliens in custody, and interrogation of the suspect by Border Patrol Agent Kenneth Hobbs led to the recovery of the stolen property approximately 1/2 mile East of the Dodson home.

Charges of Burglary of a Habitation (a 1st Degree Felony) have been filed against Gregoria Martinez Velasquez, a 21 year old illegal alien from Mexico. Bond was set at \$15,000.00 by Magistrate Louis Starzel and Velasquez remains in County Jail in lieu of said bond. His unnamed companion in the crime escaped capture.

The tremendous influx of illegal aliens from Mexico will continue to cause problems of this nature for all of us along the Mexico Border. I have seen a big change in the type of people coming into the U.S. from Mexico over the past 15 years or so. The old time "cowboy" and hard; working ranch hand has been replaced by the young, City raised man in his late teens; or early twenties who has had to rob; and steal most of his life in order to survive. Most of these people are just "passing through" our part of the country on their way to the larger cities of our country. They will not hesitate to commit crimes such as burglary or theft. The old time "wet" would often ask for food or would sometimes even go into a house or a camp and take what he needed to eat.

The new breed will take your valuable property that can be traded or sold later. In many cases they will harm someone if caught in the act. Citizens of our area should take proper steps to see that your valuables are protected.

Glenn Rex Morgan, a 29-year-old Brackettville man was sentenced to 4 years in the Texas Department of Correction at Huntsville by District Judge George Thurmond, Monday. This sentence was the result of his plea of guilty to several charges of violation of his probation.
