### ALAMO VILLAGE 23rd ANNUAL LABOR DAY WEEKEND

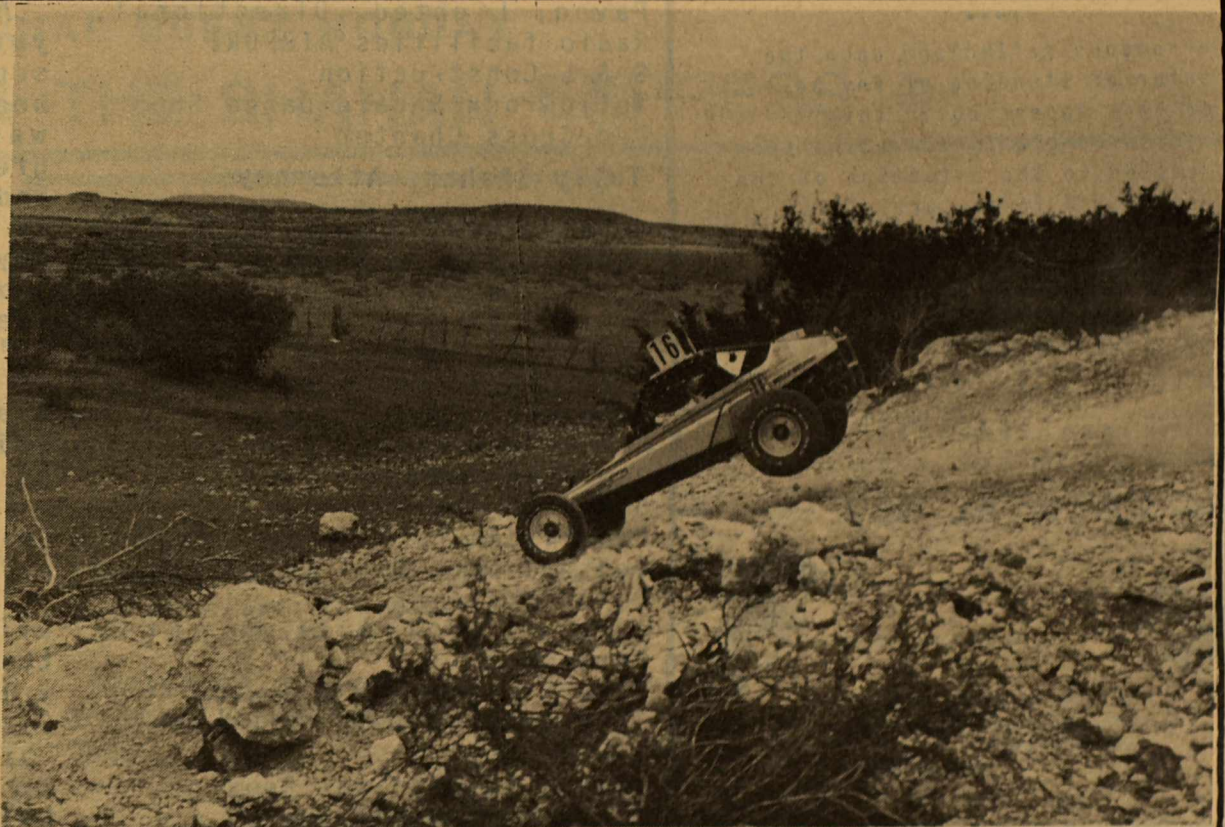

High desert Racing will begin between 9 am and 10 am Saturday, September 3rd with the "Hound & Hare" 150 mile cycle race. Sunday will host the 200 mile Off-road Auto races over the roughest terrain.

Cowboy Horse Races on the annual Labor Day celebration mark the highlight of the season. Any cowboy or cowgirl riding western saddle who feels their horse can win is invited to enter. Horse races will get under way immediately following the Texas style outdoor barbeque lunch on Monday, September 5th.

Recording star, VALENTINO and "The Shahan Express" will provide the musical entertainment for Labor Day. VALENTINO, star of the group, plays fiddle and lead; followed by Johnny Shackelford with the comic and bass; Rocco, employs the drums with an Italian flare, and Glenn Shankle supports with hot licks on the guitar and steel.

Myra Pearce, Washington; Ricardo Cortez and Ben Cantu, Falfurrias; Frank McKinnon, New Mexico; Randy and Gary McMoran, Arkansas; and Deanne Wells, Wisconsin, make up the Alamo Village Band that will be spotlighted during the three day festival and will be



delighting the youngsters with western melodrama and shoot-outs. Sherry Goodloe, on top of her horse, will be performing fancy rope tricks to round out the entertainment program.

An authentic stagecoach is running and there will be horseback rides, a shooting gallery and plenty of time for browsing through the museum, the Indian Store, the General Store and the Trading Post. The Cantina will be open serving food and soft drinks.

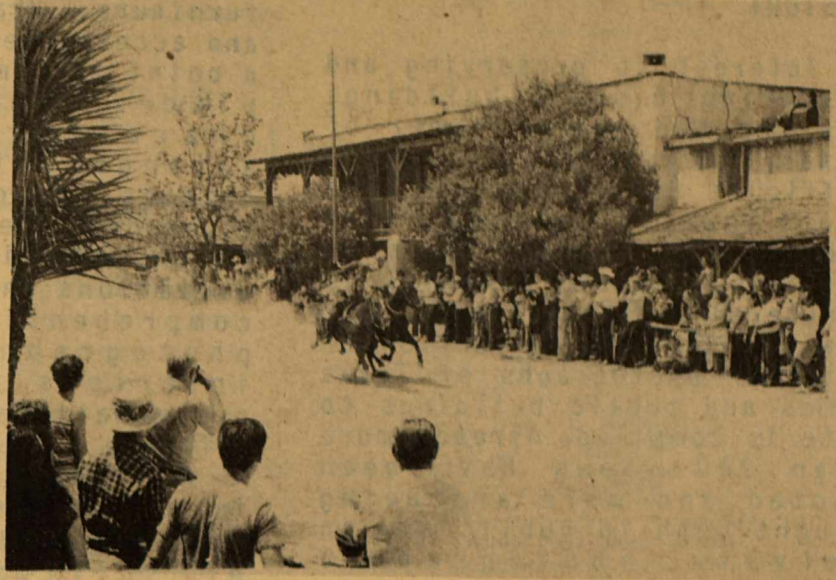

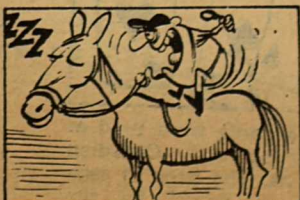

**OLD PHOTOGRAPHS OF TEXAS BUILDING INTERIORS NEEDED FOR HISTORY**

Interest in preserving and restoring hisroic buildings has reached every corner of Texas. However, it is still difficult for people who care about Texas' heritage to find photographic documentation on buildings because material is scattered over the state. But now the largest collection of interior photographs of Texas homes and public buildings to date is compiled. Already more than 200 views have been locted and more are being sought both in public and in private photographic collections. Area residents have a chance to use their old photographs to help this effort.

This project, "Images of Victorian Texas: 1860-1920", which has the support of many preservationist groups throughout the state, aims to locate photographs of the interiors of Texas Buildings, especially houses, taken

before 1920. These interior views shows what kinds of furniture, drapries, carpets, and accessories were in use at a point in time in a specific place. They document characteristic room arrangements, seasonal changes, special efforts to accomodate the climate as well as the ethnic and regional variations in teriors. Such a comprehensive survey of photographs of Texas interiors will enrich preservation and restoration efforts.

As many people know, interior photographs are rare when compared with the number of surviving portrait photographs are rare when compared with the number of surviving portrait photographs and exterior building views. Some interior photos survive in Library and Archival collections but many interior views are in individual collections and in family photograph albums. Dr. Cynthia Brandimarte, director of the project, is eager to hear from individuals or institutions that have interior photographs taken between 1860 and 1920. She wants to make sure that interiors from all areas of Texas and interiors of all groups of people are well-represtnted in the publication produced from this research. **MANY CHILDREN DON'T OUTGROW ALLERGIES**

Awidely held misconception is that most children with allergies outgrow them. The truth is that only about half will outgrow allergies at about age 15, and the rest stay the same or get worse, says the Texas Medical Association.

neglecting treatment in hpes that the child will outgrow allergic reactions can make the youth's early years miserable. This particularly true with asthma, a respiratory disease that often raises from allergies.

The child often us unable to get a good night's sleep, often misses school, and mayu be unable to take part in sports or have a normal social life. Parents should consider their child's present and future physical and emotional health may be affected by not seeking treatment.

Allergies are abnormal responses to certain substances in the environment. The substance that produces the allergic response is called an Allergen. It is not essentially a harmful substance since most people are not affected by it. Allergens can be somethin toch (wool, animals, rugs) something inhaled (pollens, molds, house dust, animal hair) or something you eat or drink.

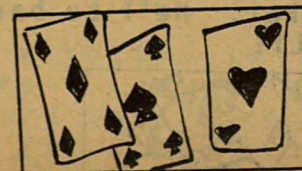
The allergic response may take many forms--skin inflammation, particularly in infancy, hay fever, chronic problems with sneezing and itching, a runny nose, and the coughing and wheezing and congestion that characterize asthma.

The usual method of treating allergies in children is to identify the allergen and remove it from the child's envionment. This calls for careful observation and cooperation by parents.

In some cases, thecause can be identified quickly and the allergen removed easily. Examples are when a child's attacks are worse when close to a pet or when the child sleeps on a feather pillow. In many cases, skin tests identify the allergen, especially if it is in the air.

In other cases, the allergy can be controlled with a series of injections of the specific allergies in hopes of building immunity. This method is about the only effective one for pollen allergies, although it is ineffective for food allergies.

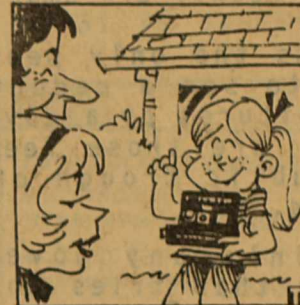

## CROP INSURANCE FOR WHEAT

AUGUST 31 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for WHEAT in KINNEY County, Texas, according to Tom Jean, Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (\*P).

Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production from damage caused by adverse weather conditions, insects, plant disease, wildlife, earthquake or fire. Insurance begins when the crop is planted.

Producers may choose from three coverage levels: 50-, 65-, or 75-percent of the established farm yield for insurance protection. "Three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged also are available,"

Jean says.

"Producers who can qualify for a new Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) plan are offered higher yield guarantees at no additional cost," Jean says. For information about eligibility under the IYC plan, producers should contact an authorized crop insurance agent well in advance of the AUGUST 31 deadline.

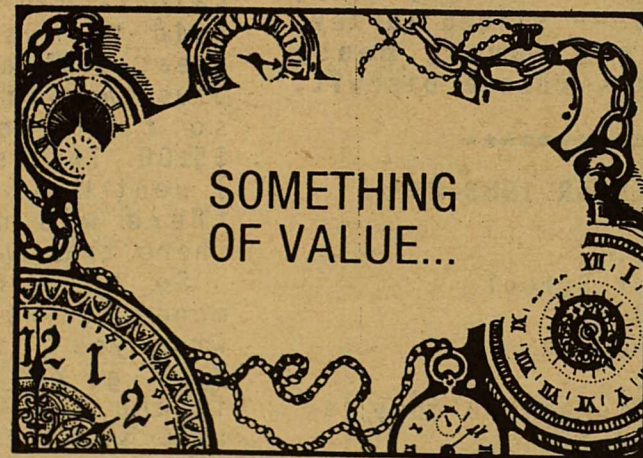
To select an agent, producers should check the list of agents available at their county ASCS office.

I would like to take time this week to recognize some people of our community who deserve our highest consideration and appreciation. We are very fortunate to have these people who are so willing to give their time and efforts toward the health care and emergency treatment of the citizens of Kinney County.

Many of us can remember when there was no doctor here and no clinic. If you needed medical care you went to Del Rio or Uvalde, or other cities far away. serious cases needing emergency treatment were either transported by car or in the old ambulance (if a driver could be found or if it would start, or if the tires were up or if the keys could be found). We tend to take things for granted and as the old saying goes, "you don't miss the water, till the well goes dry". I have worked closely with these dedicated people for several years now and they are well trained professional experts in their respective fields. I tend to breathe a sigh of relief when I am at the scene of a traffic accident or am called to assist with a sick or injured person and I see the EMS people coming. There has been a couple of times recently when yours truly was in need of medical assistance and the expert, professional care I received from people and the doctor and staff at the clinic was most appreciated. The confidence and ability shown

by these people makes one realize that he is in capable hands and can relax and let them do their job.

The Federal Prisoner Program at the County Jail would be seriously hindered were it not for the availability of the Clinic and the Doctor. We have sick call at the jail twice weekly and

with the number of prisoners kept at the jail now we often have emergency situations regarding the health and welfare of those prisoners. Dr. Luz, his staff, and EMS personnel are only a phone call away.

### \*\*\*\*\* ANTI-DRUG-ABUSE LAWS SIGNED BY GOVERNOR

Two bills supported by the Texas Medical Association to crack down on drug abuse have been signed into law by Gov. Mark White.

One measure makes look-alike drugs illegal in Texas and the other law in effect removes the much-abused drug methaqualone (Quaaludes) from the marketplace. The common street name is "ludes."

Attending the recent signing ceremony at the Capitol was Dr. Stuart Nemir, Jr., of Austin, chairman of TMA's committee on alcoholism and drug abuse.

The law prohibits the manufacture, sale, and delivery of look-alike drugs, also known as imitation controlled substances. They are made to resemble controlled substances such a amphetamies.

These imitations usually consist of some combination of phenylpropalomine, ephedrine and caffeine, all legal, over-the-counter drugs. But the combinations have not been tested and could cause serious side effects for users, often teenagers.

In addition, a particular danger exists for the person who has been taking look-a-like in modest amounts and then unknowingly take the real thing. The Food and Drug administration has confirmed 12 deaths associated with the

use of look-a-likedrugs.

For all of these reason, the 22,000 Meter TMA pushed for passage of this bill. The sponsors were Sen. Bob Glasgow(d-stephenville) and Rep. Gary Thompson (d. abilene).

The second law reclassifies methaqualone as a Schedule I drug, the most dangerous of the five categories under the state's Controlled Substances Act. the effect of classifying a drug under Schedule I is to make it unavailable for prescription by physicians. Heroin, codeine, and morphine are other Schdule I drugs.

Besides the problem with abuse by drug addicts, TMA supported the rescheduling of methaqualone because there are a number of less-abused, equally effective substitutes that doctors can prescribe.

Sponsors of the methaqualone bill were Sens. Glasgow and John Montford (d.lubbock) and Rep. Thompson.

THE TEXAS-MEXICO BORDER; A VACATION BARGAIN

"People usually bargain for several items at a time," say Chuck Snyder, director of the Convention and Visitors Council of the Laredo Chamber of Commerce. They start out offering a very low price for a particular item and then bargain for several additional items to complete the transaction." Among the most common of those goods are gauze blouses and embroidered dresses.

The proper bargain begins when the merchant tells the buyer the asking price. The buyer then extends a counter offer. This price is extremely low but serves as a starting point for the buyer. A series of counter offers is exchanged until a media price is reached and each party feels that he has ante the other. The two part as friends and the transaction is completed.

The combination of Texas and Mexico is an attractive vacation designation for the world traveler, bargain shopper or family. The trip is both economical and magical. Pack the bags, leave the worries behind and break for the Border--a vacation bargain.

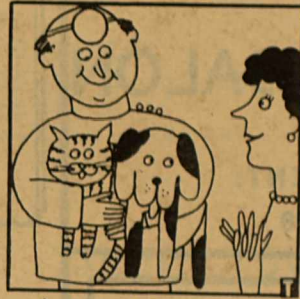

Pet Owners Proven Healthier And Happier

Q. Is it true that dog and cat owners believe they are healthier and have a more optimistic outlook on life than non-pet owners?



A. Indeed, it is true. Rutgers University conducted Health Opinion Surveys and Purpose in Life Tests among a group of pet owners and

non-pet owners. It found that people who own dogs and cats feel more healthy and have a stronger sense of purpose and direction in their lives than do a random sample of non-pet owners.

According to Dr. Rosanne Wille, this supports the notion that pets contribute to our overall health and well-being in life. She believes that health is more than just a state of body, but also a state of mind. A positive attitude and a feeling of wellness are essential to good health. People who are happy in life may be healthier, she says. And the attachment and love that a person has for a pet may, in fact, create purpose in life.

Interestingly enough, the study found that women were more likely to identify their pets as "family members" and "children," while men thought of their pets as "companions" and "protectors" whose most redeeming qualities were their extreme loyalty and dedication.

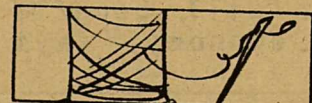
