## FILIPONE BLD-TO BE OR NOT TO BE

### CITY HALL

The Brackettville City Council met Monday evening, at a called Special Meeting to consider the tabled request of Mrs. H.Huey for a demolition permit to raze the old "Filipone" building on El Paso Street.

The City Manager expressed opinions offered by legal authorities that the owner of the building/land must request the permit. Based on this legal advice the Council rejected Mrs. Huey's application for a demolition permit.

Mr. Rufus Moore, the owner of the property, then requested a permit from Council to alter the "Filipone" building. The request included a plan to tear down the North and South walls as well as the front of the building and retaining the back wall to be used as a screening fence.

Three options were presented to Council based on legal advice given from San Antonio to New Orleans to Fredericksburg to Florida.

after much discussion between Council Members and Mr. Moore it was mutually agreed that his request would be tabled to enable further studies be conducted regarding City purchases of property for restoration.

Dr. Davis, who has been extremely active in this project, abstained from voting due to a possible conflict of



interest. Dr. Davis has spent many hours of his time and offered his expertise in contacting State and National Authorities on behalf of the local residents with the sole purpose of ascertaining a way to save and restore this historic landmark of the City.

Mr. Moore is to be complimented on his desire to cooperate. the strict use of the building if and after the restoration will be explored and if a workable program can be worked out between the City and Mr. Moore it is possible this 1880's building may be saved for the use, education and enjoyment of future generations.

as Miss Elsie Sauer so

eloquently stated this building restored would be a beautiful monument to Mr. Moore, his parents and grandparents and would establish a fine precedent for all to follow.

Following the discussion on the Filipone Building the City manager and Council member R.L.Tartt, briefed the Council on the City Community Development Block Grant Request. Mr. Tartt was appointed by the Governor to serve on the nine-county state regional commission and again proved to be an excellent representative of this area.

Reasonable people will reach reasonable solutions.

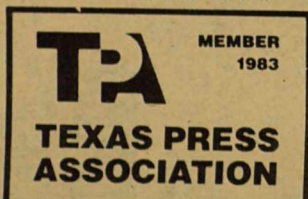

**VETERANS LAND PROGRAM RECORD-SETTING MONTH GENERATES \$16 MILLION IN LAND LOANS**

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro accounced today that the Veterans Land Board set an all-time agency productivity record for a 30-day period by requesting the issuance of 809 cash warrants from the State Comptrollers office totaling

\$16,600,000 during August to individuals selling land to the Veterans Land Program.

This record-setting pace in the Veterans Land Program is good news for our Texas veterans and the entire state economy, particularly our Texas realtors and the banking and savings and loan industry. It represents an additional \$16 million generated into the state economy by the Veterans Land Program and is the largest number of warrants ever requested for one month in the 37-year history of the program, Mauro said. "For every dollat loaned to the veterans from the program, another seven dollars will be generated for the entire state economy through additional related lending activities," Mauro said.

Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said the figures represnte 809 payments issued to individual land owners selling land to Texas veterans through the Veterans Land Program. the Veterans Land Board purchases land directly from the seller and then resells the land to the veteran through a long-term, low interest rate loan. The program is operated at no cost to the taxpayer.

mauro said the record number of warrant requests were achieved by eliminating

### newsworthy trends

#### Mutual Fund Investors Overwhelmingly Satisfied

Is everybody happy? Very nearly all mutual fund investors are, according to a shareholder survey recently released by the Investment Company Institute, the national association of mutual funds.

More than 2,000 investors in stock and bond mutual funds and more than 600 money market fund investors were asked if they were satisfied or dissatisfied with the service, communication, and performance of their funds.

Fund service satisfied 97 percent of both groups. Similarly, communications from their respective funds satisfied 96 percent of all those surveyed.

Investment performance was considered satisfactory by 99 percent of money market fund investors, and 79 percent of stock and bond fund investors.

Since the survey was

conducted, in 1982, performance figures for stock and bond funds have further enhanced their attractiveness as investments. Many investors have decided the best way to take advantage of the stock market is through mutual funds,

which spread risks and are run by professional money managers.

The rate of return from mutual funds investing in common stocks increased to an average of 20.8 percent a year for the five year period ended in June. During the same period, the Standard & Poor's 500—a measure of how the stock market as a whole behaves—rose 18 percent a year.

The increase in values has helped spur a steep increase in sales: in just the first six months of 1983, sales of mutual funds other than short-term funds totaled \$22.4 billion—40 percent above the whole of 1982, itself a record year.

A recent accident at the intersection of Spring Street and Ann Street is only one of many that have occurred at that location. There have been no serious accidents there-- YET-- but eventually one will occur if corrective action is not taken.

The problem lies primarily with the traffic control light at the intersection, a blinking red light for traffic on Ann street and blinking yellow light for traffic on Spring Street. Drivers approaching the intersection northbound on Ann Street have difficulty seeing on-coming traffic eastbound on Spring Street because of parking near the intersection in front of the businesses there. A regular 4-way traffic light would assist traffic control tremendously.

Efforts have been made by local law enforcement personnel, the Brackettville City Council and others to

persuade the Texas highway Department to install a 4-way traffic light at the intersection, all to no avail. The Highway Department did conduct a traffic survey at that location and found that we were 64% below the minimum requirements for a 4-way traffic light. Copies of accident reports of accidents at the intersection did not impress the District Engineer, Mr. D.R. Watson of San Angelo with our need or request for better traffic control. His answer was to quote statistics from the manual concerning traffic.

I have conferred with City Manager Bill Thurber, Chief of Police, Donnie Nance; and local Highway Department Supervisor, Daniel Kral about this matter and we are in agreement that the need for better traffic control at that intersection is needed. Mr. Thurber advised me that the City will soon prepare NO PARKING ZONES in front of those businesses next to the intersection in an attempt to provide a better sight picture for approaching drivers.

We intend to make another appeal to Mr. Watson about this matter. We do not want to see an accident causing

serious injury or death occur because of the existing situation. Should any of you wish to contact Mr. Watson about this matter pro or con, his address is following: Mr. D.R. Watson, District Engineer, District 7, State Department of Highways, Box 5500, San Angelo, Tx., 76902.

I would point out that the problem does not lie with local Highway Department personnel, Mr. Kral has been most receptive to our proposals and requests. The problem lies with the interpretations of regulations from the District Engineer living 150 miles away who does not have to contend with the everyday problems and concerns of our community.

**SOUTH TEXAS WHEAT SEMINAR SPOTLIGHTS INSECT CONTROL**

Insect damage to South Texas wheat crops are estimated at several million dollars annually although losses vary from year to year.

Pest of small grain include green bugs, armyworms, mites and a complex of soil insects that may destroy plant stands before they become established. Fortunately, widespread insect infestations do not occur each year, yet producers should be aware of the damage possibilities if wheat fields are not inspected regularly.

Wheat growers will earn about control measures for these and other insects which plague small grains at the South Texas Wheat Production seminar Thursday, October 13 at the Livestock Performance Center on Highway 90 between Castroville and San Antonio. The program begins at 1 pm and is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The seminar is designed to provide South Texas wheat farmers with the most recent wheat production and farm management information, according to Joe Pena, Extension management economist headquarters at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Uvalde. Information presented by some of the state's top wheat experts will assist producers in making their farm management business decisions for the coming production year.

In addition to a thorough discussion of wheat insect controls, producers have the opportunity of participating in discussions on wheat production, disease control, and weed control.

Pena says a special session on water management is scheduled, providing producers exposure to various water management strategies for dryland and irrigated production conditions.

Full details about the upcoming wheat seminar, including seminar brochures, can be obtained from Pena (512) 278-9151 or South Texas County agricultural Extension Agents.

"We're also very fortunate to have grain marketing economists at the seminar who will outline the small grain

market outlook from the international and domestic view with emphasis on the effect of the PIK program on carryover grain stocks," Pena explained.

The Texas A&M University farm management specialist pointed out that the 1984 farm program for wheat will be analyzed along with trends for the 1985 program. Improvements in the 1984 wheat crop insurance program is on the seminar agenda before production management discussions begin.

"this is an exceptional opportunity for our growers to get the 'big picture' in wheat production," Pena explained. "wheat is rapidly increasing its economic importance in Texas and this area. Last year it generated the largest amount of cash receipts among small grain crops in this region."

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**CALENDAR OF TEXAS EVENTS RELEASED**

The astonishing scope of colorful occasions that Texans choose to celebrate is to be found in the new CALENDAR OF TEXAS EVENTS just released by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Covering happenings throughout the state for the months of October through March, the Calendar is an inventory of things Texans do in the wintertime.

Crammed into 182 of the six-month period, Texans (and guests) will gather for 692 reasons to frolic, parade, dance, eat chili, rodeo, and race anything from antiques cars to rattlesnakes.

Twenty-one formal chili-cooking contests range from the Czech-accented Czhilispiel in Flatonía to the annual world championship affair at the unlikely site of ghost-town Terlingua. Other food fetes include the East Texas Yamboree in Gilmer, a gumbo cook-off in Seabrook, New Braunfel's rousing Wurffest, peanut festival in Floresville, Grapeland and Whitesboro, rice festivals in bay City, Katy and Winnie. They'll be cooking cabrito in Sinton, barbecue and beans in Ballinger, oysters in Edinburg, and shrimp in aransas Pass. There's even a sugarfest in Weslaco.

Autumn will be welcomed in Winnsboro throughout October. Winter is celebrated at the All Valley Vegetable Show in Pharr and in Mission at the Texas Citrus Fiesta. Lots of candlelight tours and carol events highlight the holiday season. March ushers in srping with azalea trails in Houston and Tyler, dogwood festivals at Palestine and Woodville.

In between, just for variety, Chappell Hill has scheduled a Scarecrow Festival, and the Great Gobbler Gallop is set in Cuero.

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## CAPITOL UPDATE

Legislation is needed to stop Unfair European trade practices in the steel pipe and tube product industry, U.S. Senator John Tower (r-tx) told a Senate subcommittee today.

Tower testified at a Subcommittee on International Trade hearing on legislation he has sponsored which would provide the United States with a mechanism to enforce the 1982 Steel Pipe and Tube Arrangement with the European Economic Community (EC).

Under the Arrangement, in exchange for the EC's promise to limit steel pipe and tube product exports, U.S. Steel manufacturers agreed to drop unfair trade cases pending against EC exporters, and to refrain from filing other such cases during the life of the arrangement. In the event that such cases are initiated, the EC specifically reserved the right to terminate its obligations under the Arrangement. By contrast, the only remedy available to the U.S. in the event of a breach of the Arrangement by the Europeans is the right to call for "consultations."

In other words, the promise of United States firms not to initiate unfair trade cases is enforceable by the EC, but the EC's promise to limit exports is not enforceable by the United States," Tower testified. "It is our steel and pipe tube industry that is now suffering the consequences of this highly inequitable situation."

Tower noted that European pipe and tube exports are running well above the agreed upon levels, with the most critical problem in oil country tubular goods. A substantial inventory of imports in these goods continues to make conditions in the depressed drilling market even more difficult.

"In total, EC exports to the U.S. of oil country tubular goods from November 1982 through December 1983

could be more than twice the amount anticipated if the present rate of export continues," Tower said. "while EC shipments of oil country tubular goods during the Arrangement base period were equal to 8.76 percent of the domestic market, such shipments have accounted for approximately 20 percent of U.S. apparent consumption through the middle of this year."

The effect of these over shipments have been profound," Tower said. "thousands of pipe and tube mill workers are unemployed. Mills have been forced to shut down or substantially curtail their operations."

"Though some of the present difficulties facing this critical industry are attributed to a general downturn in the world market for oil country tubular goods, the effects have been greatly aggravated by the EC's failure to comply with terms of the Arrangement.

"given this record, the need for actions is clear," Tower said, noting that his legislation, "the Fair Trade in Steel Pipe and Tube Products Act of 1983," (S.1035), provides the enforcement mechanism needed to ensure that the EC adhere to the terms of the Arrangement.

"the bill will accomplish this without altering the obligation of the parties under the Arrangement. Bolstered by this legislation, the Arrangement will be under much better able to maintain order in the steel pipe and tube industry in accordance with the original intent of the parties," Tower said.

He emphasized that his legislation is not a protectionist bill.

"Manufacturers of oil country tubular goods do not need protection from unsubsidized foreign competition

Over the last several years this industry has dramatically modernized at great expense. The Steel Pipe and Tube Arrangement and this legislation are not designed to build protective walls around an industry, but rather to prevent unfair trade practices from occurring when our trading partners have agreed in principle to cease such practices," Tower said.

In conclusion, Tower noted that S.1035 is not a quota bill. "It merely gives substance to an arrangement already negotiated between the U.S. and the EC. Together, the bill and the Arrangement provide the requisite means for enforcing the rights and obligations of both parties, in compliance with international trade law."

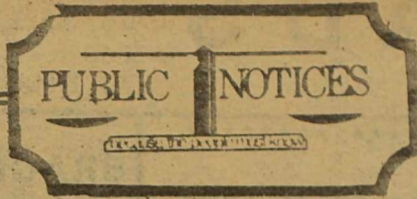

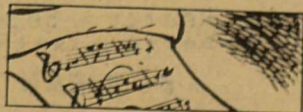

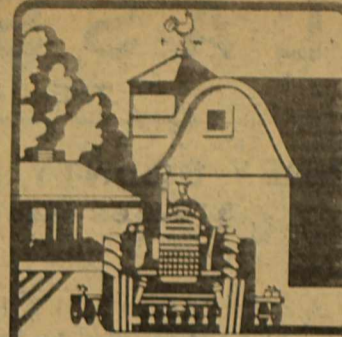
