Speaker Gib Lewis today announced the appointment of State Reps. Noel Grishman of Round Rock, Bill Hammond of Dallas, and Dudley Harrison of Sanderson to the Texas Closeup Advisory Council.

At the same time, the Speaker re-appointed State Reps. Frank Collazo Jr., of Port Arthur, and Ed Emmett of Kingwood to the 18-member

Bill Hobby, Speaker Lewis, State railroad Commission Chairman Buddy Temple, Secretary of State John Fainter, Comptroller Bob Bullock, Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, Attorney General Jim Mattox, State Treasurer Ann Richards, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Jack Pope, Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals John f. Onion, Jr., two members of the Senate and five house members.

Also Commissioner of Education Raymoond L. Bynum, and one representative from each organization of teachers, school administrators, school board officials or other professionals involved in high school education as determined by the Texas Closeup Board.

The advisory council advises and assists the Texas Closeup Board in the development and implementation of its programs to provide 11th and 12th grade students an opportunity to visit Austin and observe state government.

the Texas Closeup Board is due for Sunset review under state law by the 69th

Legislature.

The three new appointees to the council are all first-term members of the House while Collazo is serving his fourth term and Emmett his third.
