



# FILIPONE CONTROVERSY

The City Council Meeting in regular session reviewed and approved the minutes of the regular September meeting and the Special meeting held in regard to the alternation request by Mr. Rufus Moore on the Filipone Building

Dr. Davis and the City Manager briefed the Council and guests on all events that had transpired regarding activities and actions taken regarding this treasured City Landmark. Mrs. Huey's request for a demolition permit had been denied at the Special Meeting and Mr. Rufus Moore, the owner of the property in question, then submitted an alteration permit request which was accepted by Council for consideration. The request was tabled with Mr. Moore's concurrence to enable the City Staff to ascertain the legalities of utilizing City funds to restore said property and formulate acceptable plans for projected use.

Mrs. Huey and her attorney, Mr. Garcia, from San Antonio, met with the City Manager and were thoroughly briefed on all events that had taken place.

Over this past weekend, October 8-10, three calls were received by the City Manager, from concerned citizens reporting demolition type activities taking place at the Filipone Building site. These facts were reported to the Council in open session and the recommendation made that this activity was in direct

violation of the City Ordinances that direct that a permit must be issued prior to alternation/demolition taking place. Due to the fact that Special Meeting had been called and held on the subject and a meeting was scheduled for the following Tuesday it

was strongly felt by Council, that before any decision could properly be made on Mr. Moore's request that the integrity and legality of the Ordinances that were blatantly challenged would be turned over to the proper law enforcement agencies for judication. The City Manager was authorized to contact the City Lawyer Mr. Ralph Brown and Associates to take the necessary legal action to enforce the law.

The Council also instructed the City Manager to call the Zoning Board into session with the primary purpose of establishing Historical areas and sites throughout the corporate limits of the City.

Other activity of the Council included approving Mr. Louis Flores' request for a change from residential to business on Lots 8,9,10,8 1/2, 9 1/2, and 10 1/2 of Block L, Brackett addition, in order to build and establish a garage. All property owners within 200 feet of the area were contacted and their comments were presented and considered by the Council.

The final reading of Ordinance #227, authorizing a \$1 per month rate increase, and addition of Public Broadcast, Nickelodeon and WTGN, Chicago, was on third reading passed and approved.

New stations are being tested on channels 2,8, and 10 with the rate increase being authorized commencing November 1,1983.

Two Parade Permits were presented and approved by Council. Headstart was authorized to hold a Halloween Parade on Saturday, October 29, at 10 o'clock and Fort Clark Springs' FORT CLARK DAYS Committee was authorized a parade permit for Saturday, April 7, 1984.

The two requesting agencies were complimented on their courtesy and foresight and assured the City will support their endeavors in any way possible.

Last month I stated, Reasonable People will find reasonable solutions to their problems. This month I must state that reasonable people are also expected to take reasonable actions.

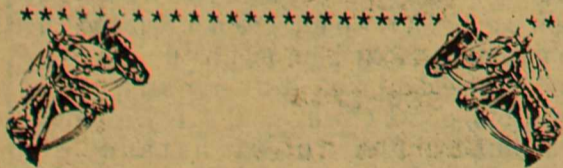

LET THEM LEARN ENGLISH

We thought bi-lingual  
education was being done away  
with, but it isn't.

Why is the obvious exception  
being made, and where will it  
all lead us?

We thought bilingual  
education, the concept of  
teaching immigrant students in  
American public schools in the  
native languages, had gone by  
the wayside, being discarded  
by the weight of its own  
illogic.

In one case at least, it  
appears this is anything but  
true. We wonder why this  
exception is being made and  
where it will all end.

A Scripps-Howard editorial  
presented the case so well we  
quote it here:

"I wish some sociologist  
would explain to me why the  
Hispanic population of the  
U.S., unlike any other ethnic  
group which has ever migrated  
to these shores, insists upon  
being taught by the public  
schools in its own native  
tongue.

"Or put a different way---  
why do the people of the U.S.,  
through their elected  
representatives, yield to the  
demands of the Hispanic  
population, as they have given  
in to no other ethnic group  
throughout our history?

"The Irish, Germans, and  
Poles, who began to come here  
in large numbers about 1830,

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sent their children to school where they were taught in English.

"The Russians and Italians, who began to arrive in large numbers about 1880, did the same.

"So did the Slavs, Jews, Sicilians and Greeks, who crowded Ellis Island from 1905

to 1915 at a rate of a million a year.

"More recently, the children of Vietnamese refugees have gone to our public schools to learn in ENGLISH.

"But consider the Hispanics. They're now the largest proportion of our annual immigration, both LEGAL and ILLEGAL. Wherever they congregate, they demand that their children be taught in Spanish.

"At present, California is bearing the chief burden of this demand. It has provided Spanish teachers at every grade level, in every district where Hispanic children compose an important fraction of the classroom. Geography, History, Arithmetic, --are all taught in Spanish. Of course, they're also given in English, so it's a double expense.

"It is absolutely wrong and against American concepts to have a bilingual education program that is openly dedicated to preserving the student's native language and

never getting him to become adequate in English."

"Obviously, this concept of bilingual education is a POLITICAL issue. Politicians are interested in scoring some political points at the expense of our children.

"But the issue is more than political. The question goes to the future and what we want America to become."

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**OIL AND GASS LEASE SALE BIDS ACCEPTED BY SCHOOL LAND BOARD**

The Texas School Land Board accepted bids Friday for oil and gas leases on 241,570.66 acres of state land that earned the state's Permanent School Fund \$29,102,416.04.

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, as chairman of the School Land Board, released the results of the lease sale which included 365 bids that were accepted and another 22 that were rejected, the first bid rejections at the General Land Office since 1968.

"we rejected 10 bids for tracts in the Gulf of Mexico and 12 bids for tracts in bays," Mauro said. "Most of the bids rejected in the Gulf were for tracts adjacent to federal tracts along the three marine league line. We rejected these because in every case we received a single bid and the federal government received substantially more per acre than we did. In some of the cases, the federal government accepted bids at \$5,000 an acre for proven production where we received bids for about \$300 per acre."

Mauro said the other bids were cases of companies submitting "go fishing" bids, a bare minimum bid on the chance that no competition would drive the price up. All of these were single bids.

"I am still going to encourage rank wildcat production and development of old land," Mauro said. "But these didn't seem to be those kind of cases."

The bids rejected by the School Land Board totaled \$1,197,658.99. Total bids on the tracts of land put up for lease equalled \$38,364,184.49 the Board reviewed 526 bids in all.

"I am very pleased that this lease sale will continue the growth of Permanent School Fund and continue our state's commitment to public education," Mauro said. After the proceeds from the sale were deposited in the Permanent School Fund, that account rose to more than \$3.9 billion.

Interest earned from the Permanent School Fund is used within the Available School Fund to support public education in Texas. Last year that meant school districts

across Texas received more than \$600 per student from the Available School Fund.

"by having a policy of accepting bids from companies that are showing a good-faith working relationship with the state in the development of its natural resources, we should be able to expand that fund to help meet the growing educational needs of Texas while lessing some of the tax burden that quality education places on the people," Mauro said.

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**MAURO ANNOUNCES VETERANS LAND PROGRAM CLOSED RECORD 1,000 LOANS**

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced today the Veterans Land Program set another agency record by requesting the issuance of 1,030 cash warrants from the State Comptroller's office totaling over \$20 million to sellers in the program during the month of september. The total number of warrants in September nearly equals the entire 1982 total of warrants issued by the Board

"This is the first time in the 37 year history of the program that we have closed over 1,000 loans in a single month. Not only is this good news for Texas veterans and those selling land through the Veterans Land Program, this is \$20 million which will be generated for the entire state economy," Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, stated.

The previous record was set only last month when the Veterans Land Board closed 809 loans totaling \$16,600,000. Payments are issued to individual land owners selling land to Texas veterans through the Veterans Land Program. The Veterans Land Board purchases land directly from the seller and then resells the land to the veteran through a long term, low interest loan. Over 80,000 Texas veterans have participate in the program since 1949.

"The Veterans Land Program is entirely self-supporting and has never cost the taxpayers a penny. We are going to continue to process and close loans within 90 days and offer the best service possible to all participants in the program," Mauro said.

Mauro noted the record number of closing was achieved through the elimination of needless paperwork and unnecessary steps in the loan application process. The simplification of the processing steps in the loan application process. The simplification of the processing procedures coupled with efficient management in the program has eliminated the waiting list and reduced the closing time for loans which often took as long as 18 months to the current average of 90 days.

"this new record during September could not have been accomplished without the dedication and hard work of the Veterans Land Board staff and the cooperation of our Texas real estate professional, lending institutions, title companies and the veterans organizations who have shown their support of the veterans Land Program," Mauro stated. "we plan to continue to operate this program in sound, businesslike manner for the benefit of our veterans and all the citizens of the State who are entitled to cost-efficient government with a minimal amount of red tape."

AUSTIN—Recession in the oil and gas industry this past year brought home a clear, sobering message for Texas: We cannot remain economically dependent on this single industry. It is time to concentrate our efforts on expanding other Texas businesses and attracting new ones to provide the necessary diversity for a strong and stable economy.

In the face of sluggish demand and dropping prices for oil and gas, we learned just how dependent we have become. By mid-summer, 637,000 Texans were looking for work and state tax revenues, heavily tied to the oil and gas industry, declined sharply, leaving the state with a decrease in estimated revenue for 1984-85 of about \$3 billion.

Not all our economic concerns are related to these diminishing energy resources. But even as the industry recovers economically, it will provide fewer and fewer jobs for Texans as we move toward the 21st Century. With our population growing at twice the national average, at least 160,000 people are entering the job market in Texas each year.

To meet this challenge, I have established the Governor's Office of Economic Development (OED), staffed by aggressive professionals working to broaden the markets for Texas products and services and to help Texas communities attract the kinds of new businesses they need and want.

This office will promote expansion of trade, particularly exports of Texas agricultural products,

manufactured goods and services. Through careful planning and technical assistance, the OED can help minimize the risk to small businesses ready to expand into new markets and help identify high growth businesses and their corresponding foreign markets.

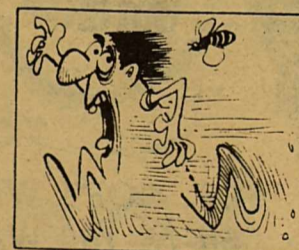
Studies show that 80 percent of our growth and new jobs are expected to come from expansion of existing businesses in Texas.

Currently, Texas lags third behind Florida and California in gross revenue from exports. With a concentrated trade expansion strategy, we can increase sales, create new jobs and rebuild this state's revenue base.

Attracting new businesses, which will improve a community's quality of life and tax base, has become a highly competitive enterprise. Not every Texas city and town has the resources and network to know what businesses to target.

The OED can provide local governments with needed background data on businesses looking to relocate. This office is developing a base of detailed economic and technical information to build a case for relocating to Texas.

Texas is a good place to live and work and, with a well-coordinated strategy at the state level, we can make our communities economically stronger and able to afford the quality schools, transportation systems and other public services which enrich our lives and provide a healthy future for our children.

- 2 tablespoons oil
- 1 1/2 cups sliced onion
- 2 1/2 cups chicken stock or broth
- 1/2 cup Bacardi light rum (80 proof)
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 2 medium acorn squash, pared and seeded
- 1 1/2 cups artichoke hearts
- 1 large green pepper, cut into strips
- 1 teaspoon grated lime peel
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 1 1/2 cups pineapple chunks
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- Lime wedges

In large heavy saucepan or Dutch oven, brown pork in oil on all sides. Add onion and cook several minutes. Add chicken broth, rum and salt. Cover and simmer 1 hour. Stir occasionally. Cut squash into 3/4-inch slices. Add squash and simmer 15 minutes. Add artichoke hearts, green pepper, lime peel and lime juice. Simmer 15 minutes longer. Add pineapple and brown sugar. Blend cornstarch into 1/3 cup pineapple juice or water. Stir into stew. Cook, stirring gently, until sauce is



thickened. To serve, garnish with lime wedges. Makes 8 servings.

### HEARTS 'N SPADES SOUFFLE

- 1 1/2 cups diced, mixed candied fruit
- 1/4 cup dark raisins
- 1/4 cup golden raisins
- 1/4 cup sliced, toasted almonds
- 1/3 cup Bacardi light rum (80 proof)
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon allspice
- 2 quarts vanilla ice cream, softened
- 1/2 cup crumbled macaroons
- Sweetened whipped cream
- Candied cherries

In bowl, combine first 8 ingredients. Let stand 30 minutes at room temperature until all liquid is absorbed. Stir often. Blend in ice cream and macaroons. Place in freezer. Make aluminum collars around 8 individual souffle dishes by

folding strips of aluminum foil long enough to overlap around each dish. Brush with oil on one side. Wrap around dish, foil side in. Fasten with tape. Spoon rum mixture into dishes. Freeze overnight. To serve, remove collar. Garnish with cream and cherries. Makes 8 servings.

## Clothing Care ALERT!

### CLOTHES ARE IMPORTANT AGAIN

Now more than ever and for more people, clothing is becoming an extension of personal lifestyle—influencing mood, professional and personal success and outlook on life.

Well-kept clothes have become an expression of quality of life. While it is not surprising that we are trying to get more mileage out of our clothes as clothing becomes more expensive, a deeper motivation is related to an increased clothes consciousness, uncovered in a recent study commissioned by the International Fabricare Institute (IFI).

Having clean and well-finished clothes expresses psychological attitudes more than economic status. Modern families are rejecting negligence about clothing. They want clothing that is alive and expressive rather than dull and dead.

While people surveyed in the IFI study did not verbally express very much interest in preserving clothes, they did appreciate wearing and owning well-cared-for clothes despite the higher costs of maintaining their wardrobes.

IFI is the world-wide association of drycleaners and launderers with research, testing and educational facilities in Silver Spring, Md. Its study uncovered a bipolar attitude about clothes. People either wear their "grubbies" or they dress up, and the dress-up must be stylish and lively, with regular cleaning considered the best way to preserve the life of a garment.

#### The New Fabrics

For a certain period of time "miracle" fabrics were



considered just that, but now dissatisfaction with synthetics is evident. On today's fashion scene the new fabrics are really the old fabrics—silks, pure cotton and wool, and blends of natural and synthetic fibers.

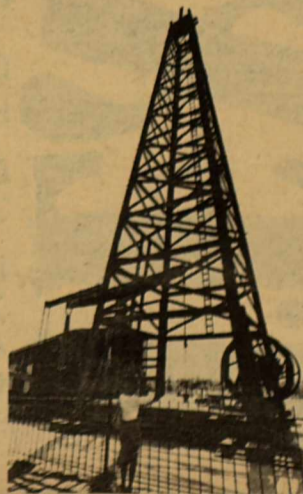
With this return to natural fibers is also a return to professional services. Those questioned in the IFI survey very easily granted the superiority of drycleaning.

"You are better off drycleaning. The clothes come out nicer," is a typical remark. Some respondents indicated they still have doubts about washing some fabrics and garments at home.

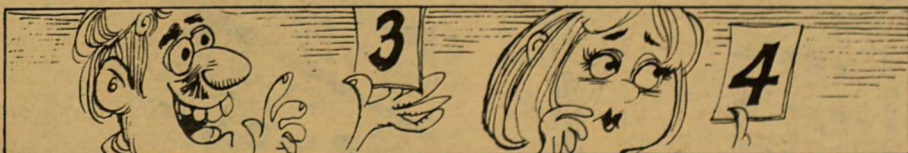
Wool, silk and many of the new synthetics respond best to expert care. Consumers disenchanted with many of the "wash and wear" promises are seeking the perceived high quality of natural fabrics. Many consumers reported trying to wash some "washable" articles at home, with disastrous results. They realize that their expensive and good-looking articles require, and are worth, the professional care the drycleaner can provide.

The main tool of the IFI study was the depth interview conducted in some 60 communities in 13 states to expose the expectations, fears and doubts drycleaning customers hold about the services they use.

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## BACKGROUND ON BUSINESS

### American Business: Good Sports

Numerous American corporations, associations and business people are expected to help sponsor a program to sell commemorative coins in support of our Olympic athletes. The companies are expected to incorporate the sale of coins in direct marketing and employee participation programs.

In addition, thousands of banks and post offices across the country will provide a network of centers for ordering and purchasing the coins.

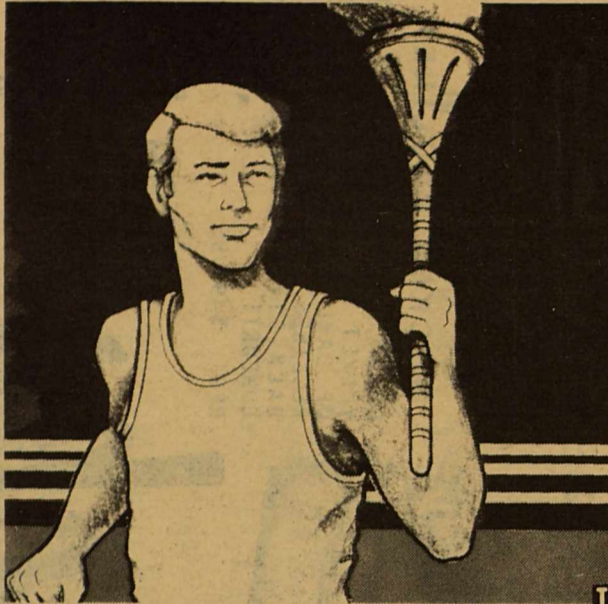
Many stars from American sports and entertainment have volunteered to appear in public service advertising on television and radio and in print.

Congress and the President have authorized the minting of three coins—two of silver, one of gold. They will be the first ever issued by the United States to commemorate the Olympics. The gold ten dollar coin will be the first minted in this country in 50 years. In all, two million gold coins and 50 million silver coins will be issued.

Each coin represents a contribution to the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) and the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee (LAOOC). According to the legislation, \$10 from the purchase of each silver dollar and \$50 from each gold coin will be divided equally between the USOC and the LAOOC. The Mint raised over \$15 million in advance sales already.

This is a non-profit program designed solely to support our Olympic effort.

One silver dollar will be minted in 1983 and the oth-

er in 1984. The gold coin will be minted in 1984. All three handsome designs will capture the spirit of Olympic competition in the United States and every coin will be legal tender.

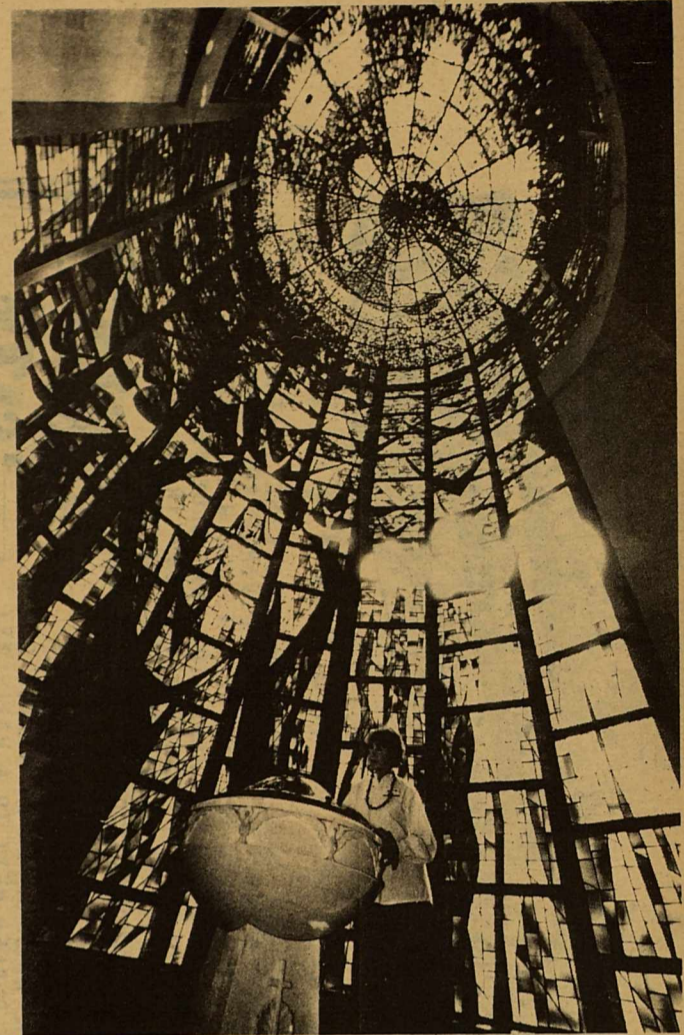
Although the issue of the coins will be limited, they are not just for coin collectors and dealers. They are for anyone who wants to help support the U.S. Olympic endeavor. In three different packages, the coins are priced so they are affordable for practically everyone. They make fine gifts, personal mementoes of the 1984 games—and an investment in coinage for the collector.

The first silver coin, minted in 1983 may be bought singly for \$32.

The next option is to buy a package containing both the 1983 and 1984 silver coins for \$64. For those who would like to purchase the gold ten dollar coin, the only option is to buy a single package containing the two silver coins and the gold for \$416.

The 1984 Summer Olympics will be the first in over 50 years to be hosted by the United States. It is an extraordinary event in our history, one that calls for an extra amount of support across the country. American business, it seems is prepared to give that support.

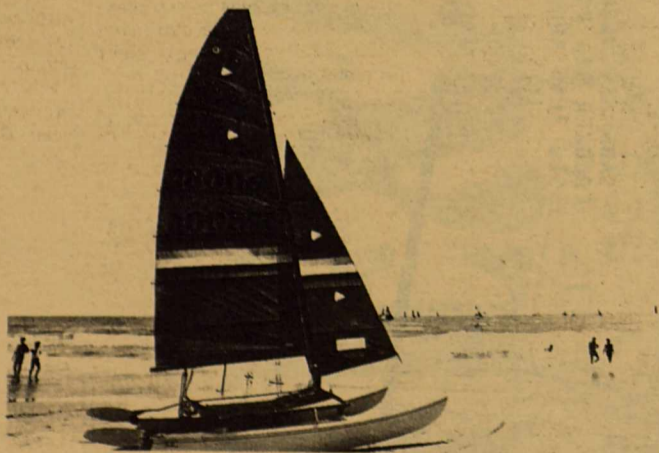

Sometimes it is necessary to send a child to school with medication. Here are the rules the Employees and Facility must abide by in administering the medication you send:

- 1) We require a written request to administer medication from the parent or legal guardian or other person having legal control of the student.
- 2) The medication must be in the original container and properly labeled.
- 3) You must state if it is to be stored in the refrigerator while at school.
- 4) Prescription medication must be from a physician licensed to practice in the United States and filled by a pharmacy in the United States.

If I am not available at the time the medication is to be given, any adult employed by the school district may give the medication. We shall make every effort to note the time it was given on the reverse side of your written request that we keep on file.

We do not give aspirin or Tylenol at school any longer. This must come from home. We usually call the parent to bring the child aspirin if it is needed.

\*\*\*\*\*

**Administering of Medication by  
School District Employees**

(a) As used in this section, "employees" means Superintendents, Principals, Classroom Teachers, Supervisors, Counselors, Registered Nurses, Teachers Aides, Secretaries, or any other classified person employed by a school district.

(b) The Board of Trustees of each school district shall adopt policies concerning the administering of medication to students by employees of the district.

(c) On the adoption of policies as provided in Subsection (b) of this section, the school district, its employees shall have immunity from civil

liability, injuries or injuries resulting from the administering of medication to a student if:

(1) the school district has received a written request to administer the medication from the parent, legal guardian, or other person having legal control of the student; and

(2) when administering prescription medication, the medication appears to be in the original container and to be properly labeled.

(3) Must be from Physician Licensed to Practice in the United States

(d) Nothing herein shall be construed to grant immunity from Civil Liability for injuries resulting from gross negligence.

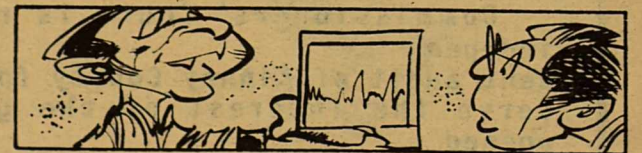
**SEEDS FROM THE SOWER**

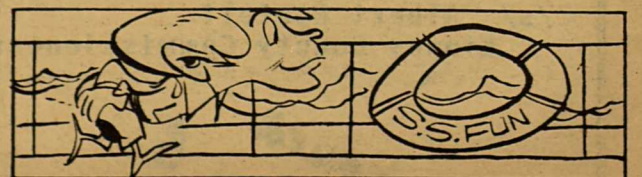

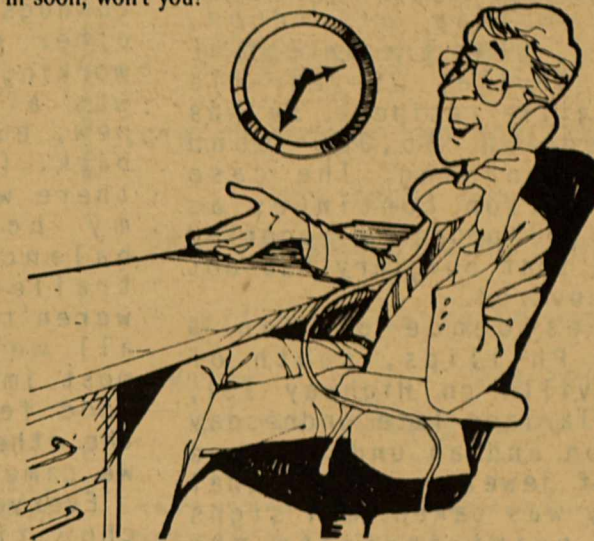

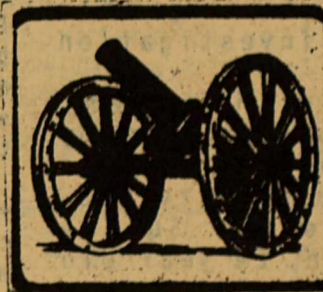

## SHERIFF'S CORNER

The burglary of the Longhorn Restaurant which occurred in the early morning hours of Tuesday, October 4, was cleared Friday afternoon, October 7, with the arrest of Michael Goulla, 19-year-old Brackettville resident. He was released on \$5,000 bond Saturday morning. The case investigation continues as some of the property reported taken in that burglary has not been recovered.

The residence of Ken & Barbara Phillips, south of Brackettville on Highway 131, was burglarized late Wednesday afternoon and an undisclosed amount of jewelry and personal property was taken. All signs at this point indicate the crime was committed by illegal aliens or someone traveling on foot, as the criminals entered the house through an unlocked door while Mrs. Phillips was a few hundred yards away at a barn. The case investigation continues.

A shooting incident involving a man employed by the Anacacho Ranch, 25 miles southeast of Brackettville, was reported early Sunday morning. The man, 24 year old Ubal Hernandez, claimed to have been shot in the left buttock at approximately 8:00 pm Saturday evening. A full-scale man hunt was launched Sunday with the assistance of U.S. Border Patrol personnel and equipment. We were searching for 5 illegal aliens that Hernandez said had shot him after he refused to give them food.

Further investigation, after suspicions were raised by discrepancies in the man's story, proved that Hernandez had shot himself accidentally when a small .22 cal. pistol he was carrying in his shirt

pocket had fallen out as he bent over to pick up some wood and went off.

Local charges of False Report to Peace Officers were waived in lieu of deportation proceedings by the U.S. Border Patrol. The man will be deported as soon as he is released from the care of a

doctor who is treating him from the bullet wound.

A few years ago I helped supplemental my income by dayworking for ranchers and friends in the Uvalde-maverick-Val Verde and Kinney County area. As the old saying goes, I sometimes rode for pay, sometimes for play.

I had a couple of pretty fair ponies, a couple of good cowdogs and saddles, ropes and other gear necessary to the working cowboy. My old pickup was a long ways from being new, but it got me there and back, (most of the time) and there was a time or two that my horses had to do a balancing act in my old trailer as the floorboards weren't too good. But all in all we had a good time and most important of all was the good fellowship we had with the other cowboys and ranchers we came into contact with.

Everyone would set around at chow time and brag on their horses and dogs and their roping ability. The cattle got bigger and wilder, the brush thicker, the rattlesnakes meaner and the horses faster at these gab sessions. Everyone expected a man to brag on his horses and dogs and we all knew that the other would carry his end when the time came.

There was one fellow who rode mules all the time and he could do anything on those mules that we could do

horseback. I was amazed at his ability to get along with them. He was well liked by everyone and I never heard anyone say a bad word about him. I got to know him pretty well over the years and one night we got to talking and I asked him about his ability to get along with mules so well. He said to me, "Hoot, a mule has got a mind of his own. He can do moot things and does them well, but he has to do things at his own pace and in his own way. I never try to force them to do anything, I just keep showing them what I want and pretty soon they come around their own speed."

I then asked them about his relations with people as I had never met a man who did not like him. He looked at me with a twinkle in his eye and said, "Mules and people sure are a lot like in many ways."

Dr. Norman Vincent Peale states in his book, "THE POWER

OF POSITIVE THINKING', that one of the deepest drives of human nature is the desire to be appreciated, well-liked and held in esteem by others. There is also a quirk in human nature whereby some people just naturally won't like you.

**BLOOD DRIVE AND HEALTH FAIR SCHEDULED**

If you care about your health and if you care about the recovery of patients in local hospitals, plan to get involved in the Brackettville Blood drive and Kinney County Health Fair on Saturday, October 15th.

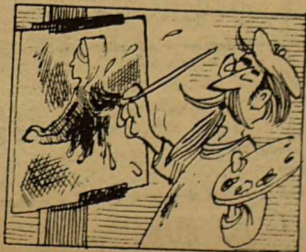
A community Blood Drive and health Fair is scheduled in Brackettville on Saturday, October 15 from 10 am to 5 pm at the Civic center. Any one between the ages of 17 and 66 is eligible to give blood. Donors must be in good health and weight at least 110 pounds. Seventeen-year-old donors need written parental consent before they can donate.

Giving blood takes less than a half hour of time ;and includes a health screening. The prospective donor fills out a medical questionnaire to make sure it is safe for him to give blood and for a patient to receive it. a donor also receives a brief physical examination where blood pressure, temperature, pulse and iron levels are checked. This procedure can often detect potential health problems for donors as well as patients.

Brackettville's blood drive is being sponsored in cooperation with the South Texas Regional Blood Bank, a non-profit organization which supplies blood to 54 hospitals in 35 counties. the blood bank depends upon volunteer donors to fill the blood needs of the medical community. The blood bank will also be offering free blood typing on the day of the health fair so people can learn more about their blood group.
