## POLICE CAR FOR CITY

### CITY HALL

The regular City Council Meeting held Monday, November 14 at City Hall was highlighted by the visit of the City Attorney Mr. Ralph Brown.

Upon conclusion of the normal discussion and approval of the previous minutes of the October Meeting the Council approved the operational and financial reports from the City Staff.

The Council recessed to executive session authorized under the Open Meeting Law Article 6252-17 to confer with the City attorney regarding land acquisition.

Upon re-opening session Council declared no decisions were made and proceeded with the official agenda.

A lively discussion followed regarding police department operations and use of the police vehicles. The 1975 Chevrolet police car blew its' third engine on a high speed chase on Highway 90 and was declared not economically feasible to repair and retain as a police vehicle. The Mayor presented a letter submitted offering a used vehicle for sale.

If was determined by Council to purchase the used vechile to replace the disabled vehicle.

Rose Mary Slubar presented a request for City support of the Ambulance Service. It was concurred for the backup

ambulance recently purchased as its contribution to this most worthy County wide support.

The City Manager presented information on the proposed FmHA and EDA grant requests covering repair of elevated water tank, replacemnt of ground storage tank and the purchase of an emergency generator.

Following a brief discussion the Council elected to cast thier 400 votes for Mr. Gwartney to serve on the Kinney County Appraisal Board.

The request of Mr. Rufus Moore for a demolition/alteration permit for the Filipone Building was again considered and after a lengthy discussion with Mr. Moore denied. Additional efforts will be made to obtain and restore this official City landmark for the enjoyment of all citizens today and for the future generations .

A preliminary verbal report was made to Council regarding the recenly completed audit of the City's financial records. The firm of Freeman and Horne was selected to conduct the audit as their reputation of being extremely knowledgeable and efficient was felt to be what was needed. they have caused many headache pills to be taken by the staff and generated many hours of work ahead but once established will insure accountability and proper procedures for the expenditure of your tax and utility monies.

A first Class organization needs first class people but it also requires first class support and cooperation.

Last week we began a report on Posse Comitatus, a radical, racist, militarist organization that is gaining in strength in various sections of the United States. This report is to make the people of Kinney County aware of this organization so that we will be better prepared should they attempt to organize here.

**POSSE COMITATUS: Part II**

The PC does not advocate a strong central organization, other than the supplying of charter, badges, and printed material relating to the tax protest movement. According to the PC's constitution they have established only a few requirements, as follows:

1. The group must contain at least seven male individuals.
2. Each individual must be of the "White race".
3. Each individual must be patriotic.
4. Each individual must be of good character.
5. Each individual must be interested in the preservation of law and order.
6. Each individual must be a Christian.

It should be noted that not all Posse groups are militant. Many are not involved in survivalist and/or paramilitary training. Numerous groups are basically involved in non-violent tax protest portions of the movement.

**CHURCH AND THE PC**

Many of the churches established by the PC members have been a concern to the Jewish community. These churches, referred to as 'IDENTITY CHURCHES' are alleged to be pseudo-Christian movements which hold the belief that white Anglo-Saxons, not Jews, are the "true Israel and God's chosen people. The Identity Movement is allegedly rooted in anglo-israelism, a movement which developed in the mid-19th century. Anglo-Israelism identifies Anglo-Saxons with the Ten Lost Tribes. One Identity member is reported to have stated, "We believe that Scandinavian-Germanic-Teutonic-British-American people to be the lost sheep of

the House of Israel, which Jesus was sent for." Basically the "identity" belief holds that blacks and other minority groups are inferior and pawns of the Jews who are the seed of the devil.

**EXTENT OF POSSE MEMBERSHIP**

According to James Wickstrom and other members of the PC, the Posse Comitatus is a rapidly growing organization presently consisting of 2.5 million members with established chapters in every state except Hawaii. Their ultimate membership goal is to have at least one chapter in every county in the United States. (From all available information, it has been estimated that the PC actually consists of no more than 3,000 to 10,000 members.

As stated previously, the PC is not a nationally controlled organization; various chapters are established throughout the United States with different names. According to newspaper accounts the following are some names associated with Posse Comitatus:

1. National Emancipation of the White Seed
2. Life Science Church
3. Basic Bible Church
4. Christian Liberty Academy
5. Life Science Church of the Christian Family
6. Life science Church of Dominus Nobiscum
7. Life science Church of Truth
8. Life Science Church of Unity
9. Life Science Church of Casmus & Damian
10. New York Patriots
11. U.S. Christian Posse Association

**ASSOCIATED GROUPS**

By their nature, most extremist groups are inter-related. In many cases member of one extremist group will also maintain membership in other similar groups. Such associated groups reported in the press include:

1. The Minutemen
2. Committee of Ten Million
3. United Klans of America
4. the Covenant, The Sword, and the Arm of the Lord
5. Christian Conservation Churches of America

Next week we will present more information about the Posse Comitatus and the confrontations with law enforcement, their equipment and armament and training camps. This group is not an overnight fad that will be

gone in a week or so. They are gaining in strength and becoming more dangerous to society and law enforcement officers every year.

### HEALTH CAUTION: Check Before Giving Aspirin To Children With Flu

The United States Surgeon General has issued a warning to parents: don't immediately give aspirin to children who are suffering from chicken pox, influenza or a flu-like illness.

The caution is a result of medical research that indicates a possible association between children under age 16 taking aspirin and a condition called Reye Syndrome.

Reye Syndrome (pronounced "rye" and sometimes called RS or Reye's Syndrome) is a dangerous condition that may follow influenza or chicken pox infection in children from one month to late teens. It is characterized by persistent vomiting, violent headaches and bizarre mental and physical behavior. The affected children are usually recovering from a viral illness when Reye strikes.

The condition, according to C. Everett Koop, M.D., U.S. Surgeon General, is rare but may be fatal. Fewer than 1,200 cases occur each year in the U.S. Death occurs in 20 to 30 percent of all reported cases and permanent brain damage has been reported in many children who have survived.

Reye syndrome most often occurs in children be-

tween the ages of five and 16.

Although the relationship between aspirin is suspected, not proven, Dr. Koop recommends that parents with children who are sick with chicken pox or a flu-like illness leave aspirin on the shelf. Instead, he suggests calling a pediatrician or family physician for advice. The American Academy of Pediatrics makes the same suggestion.

Most childhood illnesses, Dr. Koop points out, are minor and self-limiting... they quickly go away with no need for medication. Therefore, it's not only unwise to give your child aspirin during a viral illness, it's probably also unnecessary.

If there is a need to reduce fever, to make the child more comfortable, seek the advice of your physician.

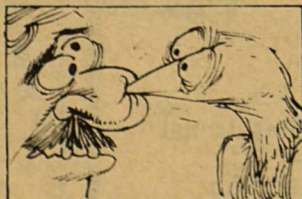

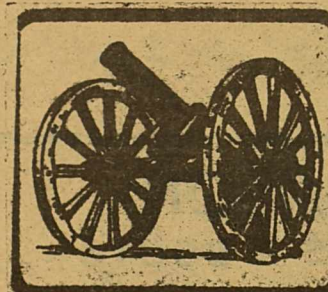

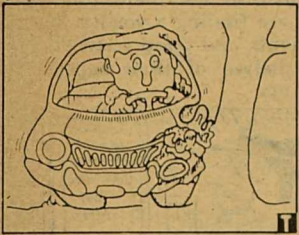




**Stay In Touch With Your Brakes**

Before taking off on a trip in your car, always be alert to trouble in the braking system.

Strange noises from the wheels and unnerving sensations in the brake pedal often are early warning signals.



Most noises are the result of wear. If brakes squeal when bringing the car to a halt, it could be due to glazing of the lining on brake pads or shoes. Glazed linings don't grab effectively and drums or discs can become damaged and scored.

A metallic grinding sound means that brake linings are worn down to the metal backing and the pressure of metal-against-metal is all that's stopping the car. This can damage drums or discs beyond repair.

If the pedal must be pumped before the brakes take hold or if the pedal sinks to the floor under steady pressure, there probably is air in the system or leakage in one of the hydraulic cylinders. The same symptoms can occur when the brake fluid level is low.

Brakes that pull to one side are another hazard.

A thorough brake inspection can stop problems before they occur, says the Car Care Council, which emphasizes that quality brake work is the car owner's best investment in safety.

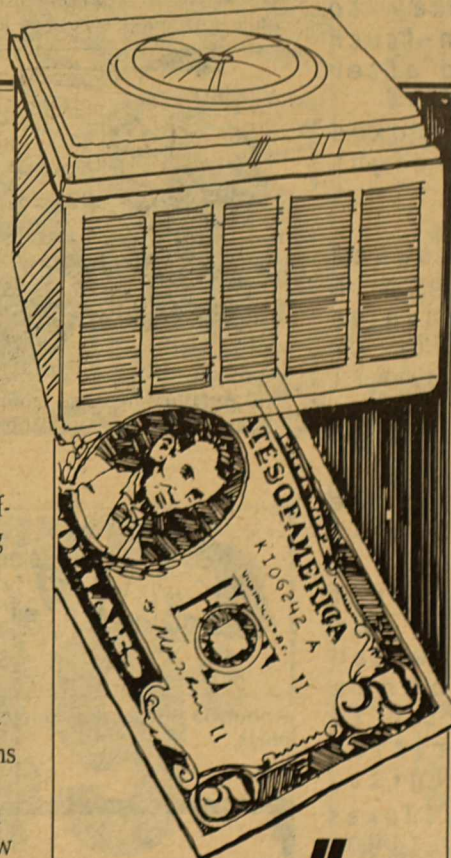

## SCHOOL NURSE UPDATE

The staff of the Bureau of Epidemiology, in an effort to help reduce the risk of foodborne illness due to contaminated food sources, offers the following recommendations regarding the preparation and storage of turkeys:

**COOKING:**

1. The internal cavity of a turkey should not be filled with dressing until the fowl is completely thawed. Turkey can be overcooked before the internal dressing reaches and sustains a high enough temperature to inhibit and destroy harmful bacterial growth. Some health authorities recommend that the turkey and dressing be cooked separately.

2. The cooking temperature of turkey should reach 165 degrees in the thickest part of the breast to insure thorough cooking.

**HOLDING, SLICING, AND COOLING:**

1. Never allow a turkey to stay in an unheated oven (such as for overnight holding after cooking).

2. Never refrigerate cooked whole turkey for overnight storage without first deboning or slicing.

3. As soon as the cooked whole turkey cools to a temperature at which it can be handled, debone and slice or cut the meat into small pieces.

4. Store turkey and stock in separate containers.

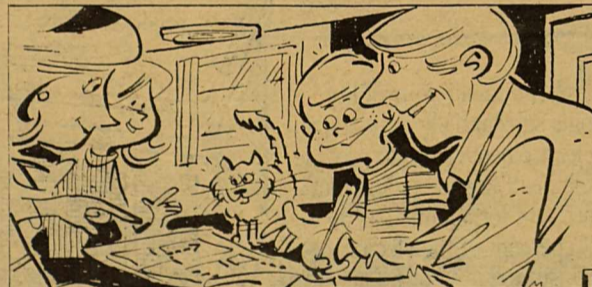

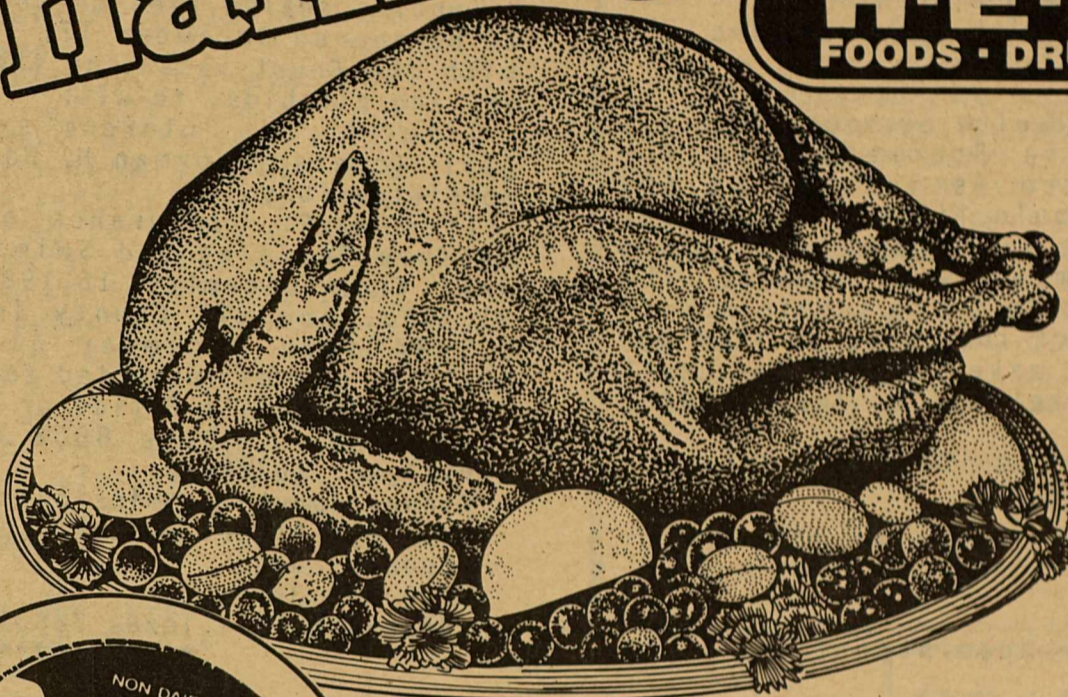

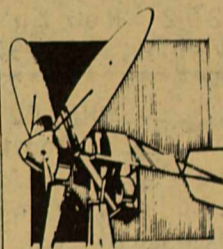
