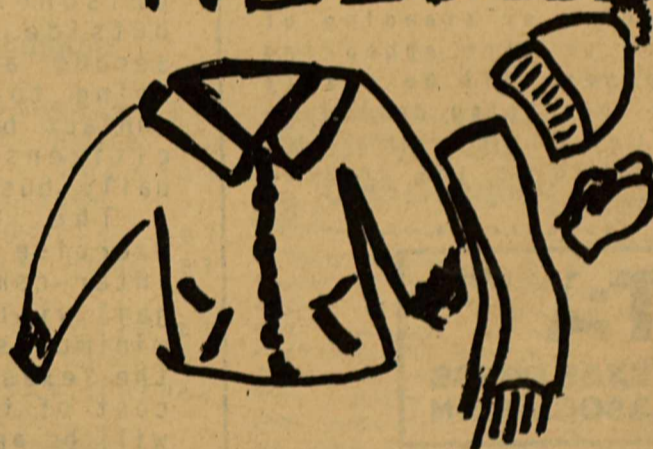

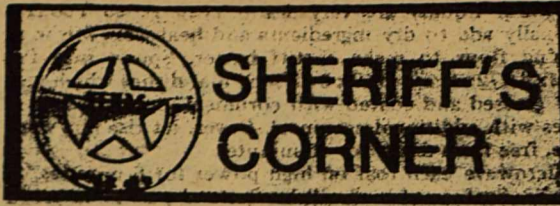

The holidays are over and the
new year has begun and we all
hope that it will bring with
it health and prosperity for
all.

Some of have noticed
construction work going on in
the jail parking lot. This is
the wall for the outside
exercise yard that were
ordered to build by the Texas
Commission on Jail Standards.
The decision was made by me to
build a solid wall for several
reasons, the most important
being security of the
prisoners while allowed
outside for exercise. The
second and also important
being to prevent any visual
contact between prisoners and
citizens going about their
daily business.

The building of the
exercise yard and a modified
inter-com system within the
jail will bring us within the
minimum standards required by
the Texas Jail Commission. The
cost of the inter-com system
will be approximately
\$15,000.00 and the the cost to
complete the outside exercise
yard an estimated \$8,000.00.
These funds will be generated
by the Federal Prisoner
program at the jail and will
not cost the taxpayers of
Kinney County.

Several new laws have gone
into effect with the beginning
of the new year. One that has
received much publication is
the new D.W.I. law. A brief
summary of that law will be
shown below for your
information. The state
legislature enacted this law
to try and help cut down on
traffic accidents, deaths and
injuries caused by those who
continue to drink and drive.

SUMMARY OF NEW D.W.I. LAW
1st OFFENSE: (misdemeanor)
Fine: \$100 to \$2,000; Jail:72
hours to 2 years; Probation:
May be granted, but defendant
must undergo alcohol or drug
dependency evaluation; License
Suspension:90 to 365 days. On
unaggravated list offense the
defendant can take D.W.I.
educational course as term of
probation; of course
completed within 180 days of
date of probation, license
will not be suspended.

2nd Offense (misdemeanor)
Fine: \$300. to \$2,000; Jail:15
days to 2 years; Probation: May
be granted, but 3 days jail
sentence is MANDATORY
condition of probation.
Alcohol and drug treatment may
be condition of probation as
well; License Suspension: 180
days to 2 years

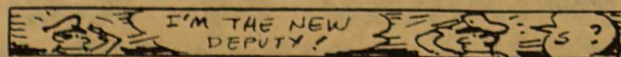
3rd Offense (Felony)
Fine: \$500 to \$2,000.; Jail:30
days to 2 years in County Jail
or 60 days to 5 years in TDC;
Probation: May be granted,
but 10 day jail sentence is
MANDATORY condition of
probation. Alcohol and drug
treatment may be condition of
probation as well; License
Suspension:180 days to 2
years.

AGGRAVATED DWI--If ANOTHER
person suffers serious bodily
injury as a result of the
defendant driving while
intoxicated then the following
punishment schedule applies:

1st Offense (Misdemeanor)
Fine: \$600 to \$2,500; Jail:63
days to 2 years; Probation: May
be granted, but 30 day jail
sentence is a MANDATORY
condition of probation.

2nd Offense (misdemeanor)
Fine: \$800 to \$2,500; Jail: 75
days to 2 years; Probation:
May be granted, but 30 day
jail sentence is MANDATORY
condition of probation.

3rd Offense (Felony)
Fine:\$1,000 to \$2,500; Jail: 90
days to 2 years in county jail
or 120 days to 5 years in TDC.
Probation: May be granted, but
30 day jail sentence is
MANDATORY condition of
probation.



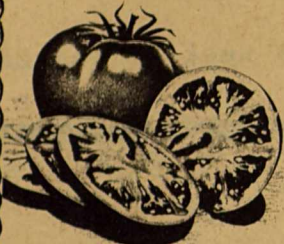

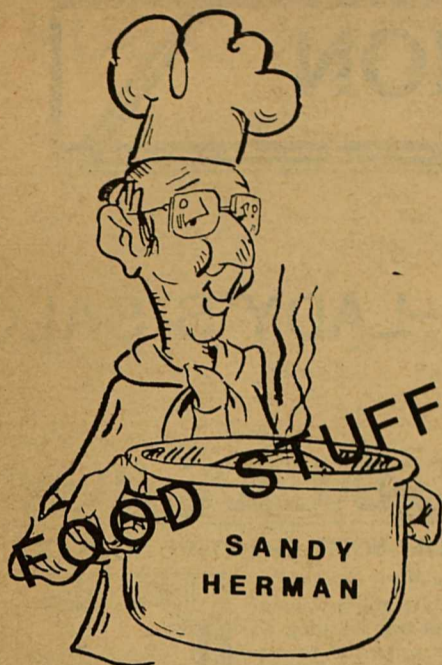

I hope you all had a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

There are two contests coming up between January 1, 1984 and March 1984. I am trying to entry blanks and information pertaining to both contests.

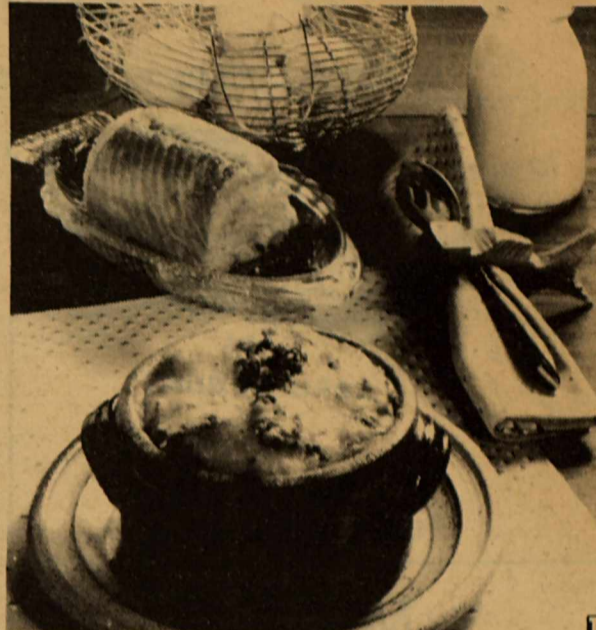
The games should focus primarily on the importance of eating a balanced diet, but can also include other good habits, such as brushing teeth, exercising and getting enough sleep.

CREATIVE COOKING



Savory Salmon Custards require very little preparation. They need an hour in the oven, so you'll have time to toss a salad, set the table and relax a bit too.

SAVORY SALMON CUSTARDS

- 1 can (15-1/2 oz.) Bumble Bee Pink Salmon
- 4 slices French bread (1/4 to 1/2-inch thick)
- 2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 2-1/2 cups milk
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme, crumbled
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Drain salmon. Place slice of bread in four (1-1/2-cup) casseroles or oven proof bowls. Break salmon into bite-size pieces and place over bread. Top each with 1/4 cup cheese. Beat together milk, eggs, thyme, salt and cayenne. Pour mixture equally into each casserole. Top each with remaining cheese. Fill 3-quart casserole dish with 1 inch warm water. Place casseroles in dish. Bake in 300°F oven 1 hour 15 minutes until knife inserted along sides comes out clean. Let stand 15 minutes before serving. Makes 4 servings.

What Parents Can Do About Drug Abuse

You can help your children say no to drugs. That's the message from the National Institute on Drug Abuse. Strong family support helps children develop the personal values and self-confidence they need to resist peer pressure.

Start early, the Institute advises parents. Talk to your children before they have a problem. Although peer pressure can have a strong influence on your children, your love and guidance will help them resist negative pressures. Let them know it's okay to say no to drugs.

Learn about drugs so that you can give your children accurate information. Talk to them before they have problems. As early as the fourth grade, your children may have knowledge of drugs and much of it will be wrong. Set the record



straight and let them know where you stand.

While your children need your support, you, too, may find the need for help if drug problems arise. Many parents find getting together with other parents to set behavior guidelines and standards is helpful.

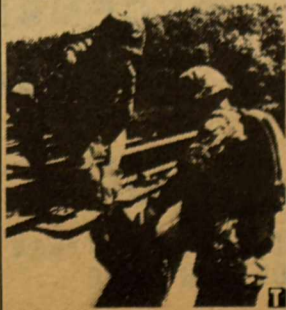

MICROWAVE MENUS

TRY SOME CREATIVE COOKERY

Gradually, microwave oven owners are learning the enormous potential for creative cookery in these marvelous appliances. For years, many used their amazing ovens only for warming and defrosting.

Now, a growing number are discovering the versatility at their fingertips. Here are some hints that may help you to enjoy your microwave to the fullest:

- If you're not sure about the doneness of a food, use an instant registering thermometer. Cooked foods should test between 165° and 190°, depending on the food and the degree of doneness desired.

- Choose lightweight utensils such as those made with Udel polysulfone. These utensils can be used to cook, serve, freeze and re-heat food.

- Use containers that are large enough to allow stirring and mixing. Try this recipe to test your microwave ability.

EGG SPINACH BAKE

1 package (10 oz.) frozen chopped spinach
2 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 cups sour cream
2 tablespoons flour



Main dish casseroles can be a breeze in a microwave.

3 tablespoons grated
Parmesan cheese
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon finely
chopped onion
1/8 teaspoon pepper
6 hard cooked eggs,
chopped

Pierce spinach package several times with fork. Microwave at HIGH power five minutes to defrost. Press spinach to remove moisture. Add sour cream, flour, cheese, salt, onion and pepper to beaten eggs. Stir in spinach and fold in chopped eggs. Pour into polysulfone tube pan, muffin cup ring or six custard cups. Microwave at MEDIUM LOW power ten to 15 minutes. Let stand uncovered for ten minutes before removing from mold or cups. Serves six.

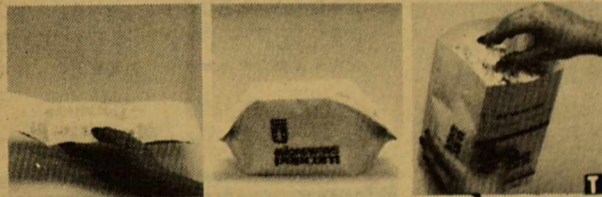

MICROWAVE MAGIC

MAKING POPCORN



Step-by-step, this is how you make fresh popcorn right in your microwave oven.

With microwave ovens already cooking in some 40 percent of America's kitchens—and that number is growing daily—homemakers have acquired a whole new set of cooking equipment to work with these appliances.

Why shouldn't you cook in conventional pots and pans when using a microwave? Food must absorb the microwaves to get the cooking done. Those waves must pass through the cooking utensil. 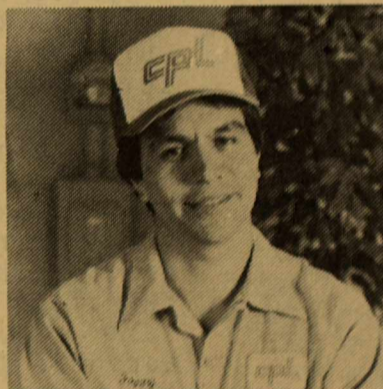
