CITY HALL

The City Council met Monday at City Hall for the regularly scheduled monthly meeting. The highlight of the meeting was the motion made and passed by Council to call a City wide election for Saturday, April 7, 1984 to elect a Mayor and three new Councilmembers. Mayor Jordan designated the City Hall as the polling place and called for applications to serve as Judge and Clerk to conduct the election.

The City Manager also presented to Council the results of the Heath Company Sonic Water Survey of the City utility water system. of the 24 leaks found, 21 were underground and 14 of these were old, outdated, nonrepairable fire hydrants. As these early hydrants were installed without cut off valves it will require the shutting down of the system in order to replace the hydrants and install the required valves. A schedule will be worked out and promulgated to insure the least inconvenience possible to our residences and business community. The repair program will require approximately six months to complete at which time we anticipate the water loss in the City and those that do not know or care to learn the truth would realize with a little effort that during this past year under the guidance of this Council the water loss was reduced by Frank Sanchez

and his crew by over 4 million gallons a month. The frosting on the cake was proven by this last cold spell when all that could be heard on T.V. was that major cities all over Texas had frozen water mains and shut down of gas. At no time during this last cold spell did any meter fail to deliver gas or water to you the consumer in the City of Brackettville.

A job well done and fully appreciated to Supervisor Frank Sanchez and his able crew of David Martinez, Hector Munoz, Blue Sanchez, Manuel Villarreal and Jaun Cardenas. Progress happens in many areas and is the result of good old fashioned team work. Who could ask for more in Eighty-Four.

Then at 8:00 a.m. the judging of the market lamb show will begin with the lightweight finewool lambs, followed by medium weight finewool lambs, heavy weight finewool lambs, light weight crossbred lambs. This years lamb judge will be Billy Rogers Crockett County Extension Agent.

After the completion of the market lamb show and ranch style Bar-B-Que will be held at 12:00 noon under the directorship of the 4-H and F.F.A. mothers. The presentation of special and showmanship awards will be held at 1:00p.m..

The junior Livestock Auction Premium Sale will then be held at 1:15 p.m. sponsored by Joe Hargrove's Southwest Livestock Exchange of Uvalde.

"The 4-H and F.F.A. Youth have been working hard for the last five months preparing their livestock projects for the Annual Livestock Show and we urged everyone to come out and support our 4-H and F.F.A. in Kinney County", states Carl R. Esser, County Extension Agent, Kinney County.

Two Brackettville men and a Sonora man were arrested after a routine traffic stop by this officer led to the discovery of marijuana and liquor in the vehicle.

Charges of Possession of Marijuana were filed against Floyd Stephen Frazier Jr., 18, Jose Antonio Sanchez, 18, and Narciso Requena Garcia, 26.

Additional charges of Unlawfully Carrying a Weapon and Minor in Possession of Alcohol were filed against Frazier, a Ft. Clark resident, who remains in County Jail at the time of this writing in lieu of bonds totalling \$4,400.00.

An additional charge of a Minor in Possession of Alcohol was also filed against Jose Antonio "Tony" Sanchez of Brackettville who was released Monday on a \$2,400.00 Surety bond.

Narciso Garcia of Sonora was filed on an additional charge of Purchase of Alcohol for a Minor and remains in County Jail in lieu of bonds totalling \$2,400.00.

These charges resulted from a consolidated effort on the part of local law enforcement officials to crack down on drug and alcohol abuse in Kinney County. We will continue to hold legal spot checks of suspected drug and alcohol violations in an effort to curb the widespread use of drugs and alcohol, especially among the young people of our community.

Minors who persist in obtaining and consuming alcohol and ALL those who continue to obtain and use illegal drugs and narcotics should take notice that this crackdown will continue in force by local law enforcement authorities until we feel that these illegal activities have

Input and information from concerned citizens and parents that will assist our efforts will be welcomed. Approximately 90% of the felony theft and burglary cases I have investigated and solved over the past few years

have been directly; y related to drug and/or alcohol use by the perpetrators of the crimes. Many of them have made statements to the effect that had they not been under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol they would not have committed the crimes.

100% of the family disturbance calls I have investigated and approximately 90% of the Disorderly Conduct cases investigated have been directly related to alcoholabuse and in some cases drug abuse.

I am not a teetotaler and enjoy a sociable drink with friends as well as the next person, but I am saddened to see the effect that alcohol and drug abuse is having on the young people of our community.

Those of us in law enforcement need the assistance and support of the parents, friends, and concerned citizens interested in the welfare of our young people. By the time the abuse has become a law enforcement problem it is quite often too late.

Help us to help our young people. Guide and counsel with them before they end up in trouble, in jail, or as is often the case DEAD.

Legislative Report

State Representative
DUDLEY HARRISON

Dudley Harrison, State Representative for District 68, filed today, January 7, in person with the State Democratic Headquarters in Austin for election to a second term.

Harrison said: "I have enjoyed serving in the 68th Legislature. It has been a tremendous learning experience and gratifying to become acquainted with so many dedicated people in state government. This session the Legislature was fairly productive: able to provide the opportunity for a permanent fund for our state colleges and universities not included under the Permanent University Fund, tougher DWI laws, and more promotion of agribusiness products -- among other worthwhile legislation. I am looking forward to working toward a water plan for Texas, tackling the challenge of our problems in public education, considering farm worker compensation, and other legislation that might

help District 68.

"The elected county and city officials of my district, as well as many other constituents, have kept me informed of their problems and

activities while I have been in Austin. I have gained greatly from their input and hope they will continue to keep advised of their needs."

Harrison served on the Agriculture and Livestock Committee and on the Environmental Affairs Committee, both of which are vital to District 68. Speaker of the House Gib Lewis has appointed Harrison to the Texas closeup advisory committee.

Agriculture Committee Chairman Leroy Weiting has appointed Harrison to chair the interim committee to study the cane borer infestation in the Rio Grande Valley and as a member of a committee to examine the utilization of computers to increase the efficiency of agricultural operations, as well as serve on a committee to examine economic feasibility of the conversion of irrigated farmland in West Texas to water-efficient crops and/or dryland farming.

Environmental Affairs Chairman Fred Agnich has appointed Harrison to membership on the steel vs. lead shot committee and the committee to review implementation of H.B. 1 by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Harrison belongs to the Mexican-American Legislative Caucus and to the House Study Group. He represents the Counties of Brewster, Kinney, Maverick, Pecos, Presidio, Ternell and Val Verde.

KICKAPOO HOMELAND NEAR

MCALLEN, TEXAS -- On January 13, 1984, the Kickapoo Trust Land Acquisition Committee will hold a press conference at the Kickapoo Campsite in Eagle Pass, Texas. It will commence at 4:00 p.m. and last approximately 30 minutes. The purpose of the press conference is to announce the signing of a contract to purchase a homeland for the Traditional Kickapoo Indians thereby ending 150 years of wandering landlessness, and to launch a fundraising drive to raise the remaining 30% of the purchase price needed to complete the sale.

Present will be the leaders of the Traditional Kickapoo Band, the Oklahoma Kickapoo Tribal Council, members of the Trust Land Acquisition Committee, Congressman Abraham Kazen, and representatives from churches and foundations that have donated money toward the purchase of a homeland for the Kickapoos.





OFFICE OCCUPATIONS PROGRAM

Southwest Texas Junior College office occupations instructor Brenda Tidwell assists students working with the Radio Shack TRS-80 computers recently purchased by SWTJC for the new vocational/technical program. SWTJC offers nine other vocational/technical programs that are designed to lead to immediate employment.

The Business Office Occupations program, the nebwest of the ten vocational/technical programs available at Southwest Texas Junior College, will be infull operation this spring.

Twelve Radio Shack computers were purchased and two new courses were initiated in the fall of 1983 to complete the program.

Other vocational/technical programs offered by SWTJC include air-conditioning and refrigeration, automobile mechanics, avaition technology, data processing, mid-management, diesel mechanics, farm and ranch management, law enforcement and vocational nursing.

"Our vocational/technical programs are designed to lead to immediate employment," said Billy word, SWTJC vocational/technical director. "We provide students with practical experience and instruction that prepares them to succeed in the profession of their choice."

Individuals trained to operate word processors and other modern office machines are some of the most sought after in today's job market, according to SWTJC office occupations instructor Brenda Tidwell.

"Word processors increase productivity, improve the

quality of work and reduce the cost of office operations," Tidwell said. "The demand for both general and professional electronic office clerks to operate these systems is tremendous."

The Business Office Occupations program offers two options: a one-year vocational/technical option leading to certification as a general electronic office clerk, and a two-year professional program leading to the Associate in Applied Science degree.

All vocational/technical programs will be available during Spring registration at SWTJC in Uvalde. Selected courses are offered at off campus locations.

Registration for day classes on the Uvalde campus will be held in the Matthews Student Center on Wednesday and Thursday, January 11 and 12

Evening and off-campus registration include the SWTJC Del Rio Center on Monday, January 9, at 207 Wildcat Drive from 10 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.; the SWTJC Eagle Pass Center on Tuesday, January 10, at 1980 Second St. from 3 p.m. till 7 p.m.

Uvalde evening students will register on Wednesday, January 11, beginning at 6 p.m. in the student; students registering for courses offered in the Asherton, Carrizo Springs and Cyrstal City area will convene at Carrizo Springs High School on Thursday, January 12, at 6 p.m.

Registration for courses offered in Devine, Dilley and Leakey will be held at the high schools in those cities on Monday, January 16, at 6 p.m. in each location.




