

## "CACTUS JACK" LIVES AGAIN

UVALDE OPERA HOUSE PRESENTS "SIDESHOW"

A song and laugh filled musical called SIDESHOW, a South West Texas style celebration called "Cactus Jack Days" and for those who take their politics and history more seriously, a Symposium titled "The Politics and Personality of John Nance Garner" will all happen in Uvalde the first week end in June.

"Washington politics is a freak show!" Garner, vice president under Franklin D. Roosevelt, was quoted as saying. In 1977, Rick Smith, then a columnist for the San Angelo Standard Times took that freak show quote and wrote a rollicking musical comedy about Cactus Jack Garner's life in Washington. The old politico's story, woven in song and narrative through the hubbub of a circus sideshow, is peopled with a

sideshow barker (Garner), a mechanical man (FDR), Siamese twins (House & Senate), a strongman (John L. Lewis) and other New Deal players

other New Deal players.

SIDESHOW won top honors at the American College Theatre Festival at Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., receiving standing ovations and critical acclaim.

Uvalde Area Community Theatre has hired New York director Joel Casey to direct their musical. Casey grew up in the Nueces Canyon Hill Country just 30 miles north of Uvalde.

Uvalde County Historical Commission and Uvalde Arts Council will give Texans a look at presidential politics of the past when they host a Symposium Friday, June 1st, titled "The Personality and

Politics of John Nance Garner". This series of discussions about the wit and wisdom of Cactus Jack will feature former U.S. Senator, Ralph Yarborough, Former U.S. Congressman, O.C. Fisher, former Governor of Texas, Dolph Briscoe, Jr., former Texas Supreme Court Justice, Ross Doughty, T. R. Fehrenbach, author and historian and Dr. Lionel Patenaude, Professor of History.

Both SIDESHOW and the Symposium will be presented in Uvalde's recently restored 1891 Grande Opera House. The Opera House was a gift to Uvalde from the Garner family.

Sideshow is scheduled to run concurrently with Uvalde's

"Cactus Jack Days", which features horseraces, arts and crafts booths, C & W Dancing, Jalapeno eating contests and Bar-B-Que and fiddlin'.



#### TEXAS AND SOUTHWESTERN CATTLE RAISERS ASSOCIATION TO HOLD 107TH ANNUAL CONVENTION

Texas cattleman will attempt to sort out industry priorities in an election year beginning Sunday, March 18, in San Antonio as Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association opens its 107th annual convention, trade show and Heritage sale, says Frates Seeligson, TSCRA president. The four-day meeting in the San Antonio Convention Center and Hyatt Regency is expected to draw more than 2,000 cattleman.

The cattleman, representing the association's 14,500 members in Texas and surrounding states, will concentrate on agriculture research needs, soil and water resources, labor, animal health, association promotion, livestock theft investigation, marketing outlook and range conditions, wildlife resources, consumer beef demand and industry trends.

U. S. Senatorial candidates for the seat being vacated by Senator John Tower, R-TX, will add a political touch to the convention. Addressing the cattleman will be Phil Gramm, R-TX, ; Bob Krueger, D-TX; and Kent Hance, D-TX.

Former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger will deliver the Keynote address at a kickoff luncheon Monday, March 19.

## This Land Is Your Land

Texas Land/Commissioner

One of my proudest moments since I became Land Commissioner was the day the first two Texas veterans had home loans approved through the newly-created Veterans Housing Assistance Program (VHAP).

I'm happy to report that these loans came through only 83 days after Texas voters approved the formation of the program.

The VHAP was a priority in both my campaign and my first year as Land Commissioner. I have always felt that the benefits offered through the Veterans Land Board should be rounded out to meet the needs of our urban Texas veterans. Because a program of this nature would be such a large undertaking, it also must help our entire state by creating jobs and opportunities in the private sector. Most importantly, this program would have to not cost the taxpayer a single penny.

Under the VHAP, an eligible Texas veteran can borrow up to \$20,000 at 9.97 percent interest to apply toward the purchase of a home. The veteran applies for the loan at an approved local lending institution.

Often government programs become meaningless words and we don't have the opportunity to actually see anyone benefit from them. But this program is already having a great impact on people's lives.

Rolando Castro of San Antonio and John Youngblood of Georgetown became the first two veterans to qualify and make the

Castro, 34, an employee of the State Comptrollers Office in San Antonio, and Youngblood, 37, Director of the Austin Christian Counseling Center, both received loans with no down payment since they obtained combined loans from the Federal Veterans Administration and

Castro and his wife, Mireya, have been married three years and have a two-year-old son. This is their first home. He said he had been following this program since I began talking about it during my campaign. "We were looking at houses last year and I told my wife -- let's wait

The Castro's received the balance of their loan from Texas Homestead Mortgage of San Antonio. He advises other veterans to look into the VHAP and says his family is very pleased with their new home.

John Youngblood has been married to his wife, Bobbi, for 13 years and they have two sons and a daughter. Bobbi is a naturalized U.S. citizen, originally from Greece.

Youngblood first heard about the VHAP from his real estate agent, Carolyn Smith, with McLester and Grisham Realtors. He says that thanks to Smith's hard work, his family didn't even have to pay closing costs on the house they purchased. The balance of their loan was handled by Norwest Mortgage of Austin.

Youngblood figures his savings to be \$50-100 per month and advised other interested veterans to look into the program.

"Buy now," he says, "Don't wait. It's easier than you think. It could have been terrible and gotten bogged down in bureaucracy, but it didn't." Youngblood served in the U.S. Air Force from 1967-77, then took time off to attend a seminary. From 1981-83 he was an Air Force chaplain.

Ironically, John Youngblood says he is a staunch Republican. I am proud that my administration is able to serve all the people of Texas, no matter what their political affiliation.

## Texans Can Improve Home Energy Savings

AUSTIN – Another hot summer is approaching and almost every home in Texas can undergo inexpensive improvements so that it uses less electricity to keep people comfortable.

Before temperatures climb to annual highs, I am initiating the Texas Home Energy Program, the first statewide effort to bring consumers and utility companies together to meet a common goal: keeping utility bills as low as possible.

For the last several months, I have worked with major utility companies, electric cooperatives, and the Public Utility Commission to develop a program that will help customers make immediate reductions in the number of kilowatts they are purchasing each month.

By helping whole communities and the state at large hold down energy demand, we can relieve the urgency to build expensive new generating plants at ratepayer expense.

Eighteen electric utility companies and about 40 electric cooperatives have designed programs tailored specifically to the climates and homes in their service areas. Civic groups, like the Boy Scouts and the Texas Jaycees, are helping publicize these programs in many parts of the state.

Some utilities and electric coops will offer free or inexpensive home energy audits to help people know what steps they can take to help their home use less energy. In some areas, the Boy Scouts will sell water heater wraps doorto-door at bargain prices. An easy to install water heater wrap can save a family \$1 to \$1.50 a month on utility bills.

Last week, I joined Al Erwin, chairman of the Public Utility Commission, and utility representatives in Lubbock, Fort Worth, Houston, Beaumont and Corpus Christi to stress the benefits of having consumers and utilities work together to keep energy costs under control.

At the state level, we are working to tighten regulation over utility operating costs, find ways to compete for cheaper fuel and fuel transportation, work to bring about money-saving changes in national energy policy, and explore alternative sources of energy.

The Texas Home Energy Program offers consumers the opportunity to exert control over their own energy expenses. I am urging all Texans to contact their local electric utility to find out what energy-saving programs that company is offering its customers.

## Cigars, Pipe: Not Safe Options?

Many cigarette smokers who switch to cigars or a pipe fail to lower their risk of lung cancer and perhaps heart disease because they continue to inhale, a University of Minnesota researcher recently reported. The tobacco smoke inhalation pattern becomes so ingrained that many ex-cigarette smokers adapt it to their pipe and cigar smoking, Terry F. Pechacek, Ph.D., told an American Heart Association meeting.

"These pipe and cigar smokers exhale much of the smoke, but then deeply inhale a blend of air and the small amount of smoke left in the mouth," he explains. Because pipe and cigar smoke is much more dense than cigarette smoke, it contains significant amounts of damaging chemicals even when it's diluted, says Dr. Pechacek.

Until now, pipes and cigars were considered to be a relatively safe alternative, but those risk assessments were based on data collected in the 1950s and early 1960s, says Dr. Pechacek. He is an assistant professor of epidemiology at the School of Public Health in Minneapolis. "Back then, pipe and cigar smokers had never smoked cigarettes regularly, so they usually did not inhale," he "Large numbers of regular cigarette smokers switching to pipes and cigars happened only more recently.

Dr. Pechacek and his colleagues surveyed 9,106 male and female smokers in several communities in Minnesota and North and South Dakota. They located 114 cigar, cigarillo or pipe smokers who had never smoked cigarettes and 194 who had. The 194 ex-cigarette smokers who had switched had significantly higher blood serum levels of "thiocyanate," a chemical indicator of smoke inhalation, Dr. Pechacek says. "The thiocyanate data suggest the amount of smoke that actually goes into the lungs of pipe and cigar smokers is surprisingly high."



Some doctors are starting to notice cases of lung cancer in people who quit smoking cigarettes 15 or 20 years ago but continue to smoke pipes or cigars, Dr. Pechacek says. Because switching from cigarettes to pipes and cigars is a relatively recent trend, it will be years before a large number of such cases shows up in death statistics, he says. "We think it's wrong to wait for those statistics before warning cigarette smokers that switching to pipes and cigars may not lower their risk of

## Consumer Update

With the deadline for filing income tax returns closing in on us, the Public Utility Commission reminds Texans that federal law provides tax credits for eligible home energy conservation improvements completed during 1983.

The law — which is due to expire at the end of 1985 — allows homeowners to claim 15 percent of the first \$2,000 spent on improving the energy efficiency of existing homes, with a maximum credit of \$300. New homes are not eligible for the credits. The law applies only to improvements on homes built prior to April 20, 1977.

Though you may own or rent the residence, improvements must be to the taxpayer's "principal residence" (not to a rent house or vacation cottage).

Energy conservation improvements that qualify for tax credits include insulation, storm doors and storm windows, caulking, weatherstripping, and certain devices such as automatic setbacks on thermostats, meters for measuring energy consumption, and furnace ignition systems that replace pilot lights.

Items that do not qualify for the tax credits include siding for the outside of the home, heat pumps, woodburning stoves, and ceiling fans.

To qualify for the tax credits, energy-conserving items must be new; they must be expected to last at least three years; and they must meet certain performance and quality standards set by the federal government.

Tax credits also are available for expenditures for cer-

tain renewable energy devices — solar, wind-powered, or geothermal — that are installed on the taxpayer's principal residence. You may claim 40 percent of the first \$10,000 spent on such devices. The full \$10,000 in expenditures may be spread out over several years, but to qualify for the 1983 tax returns, the work must have been completed during 1983.

Improvements which qualify under this section of the law include:

- solar equipment for heating and cooling the home or for providing hot water or electricity for use within the home;
- wind energy equipment for generating electricity for use within the home; and
- geothermal energy equipment.

Qualifying expenditures include labor costs, installation, and equipment, but do not include structural components of the dwelling. You may claim the credit more than one year if you expand an existing system or purchase more than one system, but the maximum cumulative credit is \$400 on any one residence.

To qualify for the tax credits, the equipment must be new, and must be expected to remain in operation for at least five years.

## COMING CLEAN at work

Innovative new products—some twice as absorbent as a 100% cotton towel, and three times more absorbent than a rag made of synthetic fibers—have found increasing favor with users of wiping materials.



Such re-usable, disposable wipers are made for such specialized uses as cleaning optical surfaces, wiping precision metal parts, heavyduty clean-up, and general industrial maintenance.

But, suggests the Commercial Products Division of the Scott Paper Co., the user should be cautious in selecting the correct disposable.

Some, for example, are reinforced with a network of fibers for strength, but are so hard-surfaced they simply smear liquids around rather than absorbing them. Others are "stiff"—which may be fine for some chores, but not at all functional when a wiper should be soft enough to conform to the curves and angles of the surface on which it is being used.

The best way to select a wiper is to consult a knowledgeable paper company representative. He will, for example, explain that in some cases disposables are not recommended—such as in a few printing operations. But when disposables are used, they can reduce costs by 50%, and sometimes more.





## CAPITOL UPDATE

One of the most controversial and emotional issues to come along in years is now before the Senate. This is the question of whether to allow prayer in our nation's public schools

The Voluntary School Prayer Amendment -- introduced by Senator Strom Thurmond and supported by the Administration -- would allow audible prayer in schools. Other amendments have been proposed by Senators Howard Baker (R-Tenn.) and Orrin Hatch (R-Utah). Senator Baker's measure would allow prayer in public buildings. It does not distinguish between audible and silent prayer. Senator Hatch's amendment allows for silent prayer and meditation in schools.

Any of these amendments must pass by a two-thirds majority of the Senate and House of Representatives as well as be ratified by 38 states to become part of the United States Constitution.

I support audible prayer in schools and will vote for it when it comes before the Senate. If that measure does not pass, I will vote for any of the alternate amendments.

My fellow Texans also have been voicing their support for school prayer in large numbers. I have received thousands of letters and telephone calls, with an overwhelming majority of them in support of allowing voluntary prayer in schools.

As the son and grandson of Methodist ministers, I am well aware of the role prayer has played in our country's national tradition. This nation allowed prayer in schools until the Supreme Court ruled it unconstitutional in 1962.

Religious freedom was one of the basic principles on which this country was based. Allowing voluntary prayer would be consistent with the ideals of our Founding Fathers and our long-held traditions and customs.

In allowing religious freedom, the framers of the Constitution never intended a complete separation of government and spiritual matters. They were guarding against the establishment of a national religion. In other words, "Freedom of religion, not freedom from religion."

The United States Congress from its beginnings has opened each session with a prayer. In fact, both the Senate and House of Representatives have their own chaplains. The military services all provide chaplains for their members.

Surely, the First Congress, which established the chaplain program, would not have taken such action if its members had felt such activities to be in conflict with separation of church and state.

A Constitutional amendment restoring school prayer would not be a federal endorsement of any one religion or denomination. Passage of a prayer amendment also would not necessarily require prayer in schools. Since education is the responsibility of the state and local communities, the amendment would allow them to decide whether to allow prayer in schools.

I hope Congress will act favorably on the Voluntary School Prayer Amendment and send it to the states for ratification.




