(We especially thank Frances Pasler for the \$50.00 cash donation in memory of Mrs. Theresa Schubach.) This fine reference book is a limited edition #423, a 1959 reprint of an 1883 issue. It covers periods from 1855 to 1883. It is one of the few informative accounts dealing with the military based out of Fort Clark during 1857 (such as Captain Albert G. Brackett & his men, their raids and skirmishes).

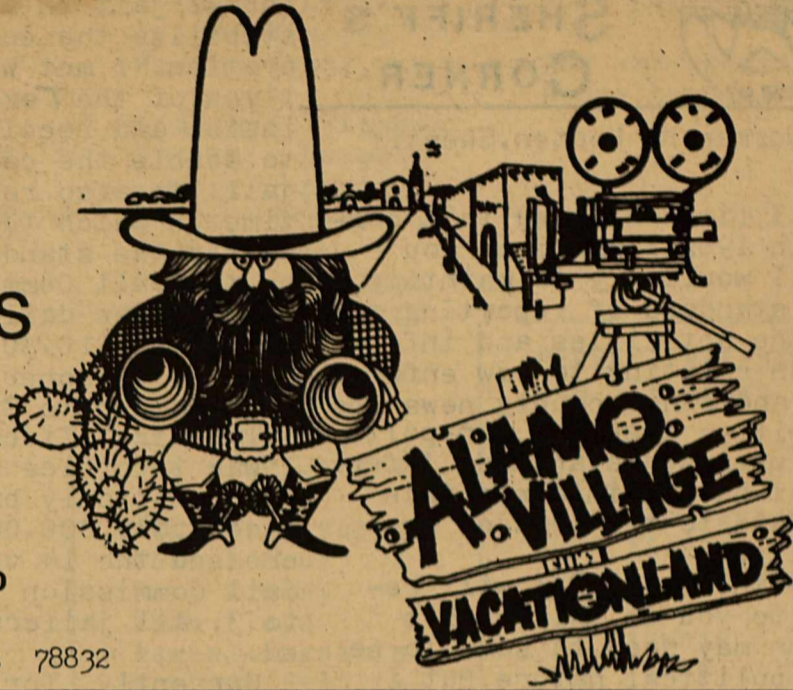

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THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

When I first started this column in 1982 I promised you that I would try to maintain a high standard of reporting to you the activities and information relating to law enforcement and other county news and activities based on non-political, unbiased standards. I feel that I have maintained this standard to the best of my ability.

The information I will relate to you in this week's column may seem to some to be of a political nature. But I feel that due to the nature of the information and its importance to the taxpayers of Kinney County that it should be made public for your consideration.

When I took office as Sheriff in Sept. 1982, the operation of the Kinney County Jail was disorganized, unlawful, and extremely costly to the taxpayers of this county.

The Texas Commission on Jail Standards was on the verge of closing the jail because of its improper operation and 14 violations of state law.

There were four jailers employed at the jail on a full time basis, only two of them were certified as required by state law. There were two other part time jailers, neither of whom was certified, which was a violation of state law. This factor alone could have cost the county up to \$1,000.00 per day for each violation. Lawsuit procedures could have also been filed by inmates of the county jail had some incident occurred affecting a prisoner and Kinney County would have had NO chance of winning and a huge financial loss to the county could have occurred that would have damaged this county for years to come.

The basic operation of the County Jail and the Sheriff's Department was costing the taxpayers approximately \$100,000 dollars a year to operate.

After I took office, I immediately re-organized the department and took steps to have all the jailers certified as required by law. I met with the U.S. Marshal's Service and secured a more profitable Inter-

Governmental Agreement for the detention of federal prisoners in the jail in an attempt to stabilize the costs of the operation. I met with representatives of the Texas Jail Commission and received permission to double the capacity of the jail. We also received more time in which to bring the jail within the standards required by the Jail Commission. We increased the daily prisoner care fees from \$10.50 to \$18.00 per day per prisoner (it has since been raised to \$25.00 per day).

The first fiscal year (82-83) I was in office the jail operation not only broke even, but made a \$41,000.00 profit. We decreased the 14 violations of Jail Commission requirements to 3. All jailers were certified.

Currently, for this fiscal year (83-84) we are at a break even level of expenditures vs. income and we have had to spend approximately \$27,000.00 on a new Inter-Com system and outside exercise yard. The Jail Commission also required that we add a new jailer to our staff which we have done. We have eliminated ALL violations of state law and have received preliminary approval for certification of the jail from the Commission. Our final inspection will be held this month and the County Jail will, at long last, be certified by the Jail Commission.

Now consider this, all the work and expenditures necessary to reach this point in our operation have been paid for from revenue generated by prisoner care fees charged outside agencies (primarily U.S. Marshal prisoners) for the detention of their prisoners in our jail. Where would the county be, financially, had your tax dollars been the source for the funding?

At an annual MINIMUM operational cost of \$100,000.00, it would cost YOU, the taxpayers of Kinney County, a half-million dollars every five years to operate an institution that is required by state law, the county jail!

Now, the main reason for the information in this column this week (all public record) is that my opponent in the upcoming Sheriff's election has stated to several reliable sources that should he win the election, he intends to do away with the federal prisoner program at the County Jail and go back to a "basic operation". This "basic operation" will cost YOU, the taxpaying public, approximately \$100,000.00 a year and a definite

tax increase to support the overall county operations!

This attitude is of extreme importance to ALL the taxpayers of Kinney County. There are many, many, taxpaying residents of our county who are on fixed incomes and any tax increases will put a tremendous burden on these people just to make ends meet.

Sure, no one knows better than I that the current program of operation of the Kinney County Sheriff's Department and County Jail is complex and takes a lot of plain old hard work. This operation has not been of any monetary value to me personally, in fact, I received a cut in salary along with the rest of the county officials this past year in an effort by Commissioner's Court to cut expenses to help get the county out of debt. My jailers are working at minimum pay scales and to me this speaks highly of their loyalty to me and Kinney County.

I have been and always will be, as long as I am in office, willing to spend the long hours and hard work necessary to at least support our own operation. And I will, as long as I am in office, attempt to seek out ALL means and methods to generate funding for the Sheriff's Department and County Jail that will ease the burden on the taxpayers of Kinney County.

To put it bluntly, the job of Sheriff of our growing county can be handled one of two ways, lean back in a chair and drink coffee with feet on desk and maintain a costly "basic operation", or put in long hours of hard work in, not only law enforcement, but also aggressive, competent, effective jail management.

I now personally challenge my opponent to an open debate on the issues of this campaign, with all the people of Kinney County invited to attend.

I do not think it is necessary nor will I participate in, any slanderous attacks on the character of my opponent. I will, most willingly, participate in making the true facts of our departmental operation known to the public. I will, most willingly, participate in an open debate with my opponent concerning the issues of this campaign. You, the taxpaying public should be made aware of the facts and make your choice of what the future holds for Kinney County.

In order to keep up with the rest of the world, not only in law enforcement techniques, but the continually rising cost of living, we must, like it or not, continue to upgrade the quality

and training of our law enforcement personnel and run the operation of the Kinney County Sheriff's Department and County Jail in an aggressive, modern manner or go back to the "old ways" and increase taxes to support these operations.

I do not think any of us can afford to regress in these days and times. The choice is yours!

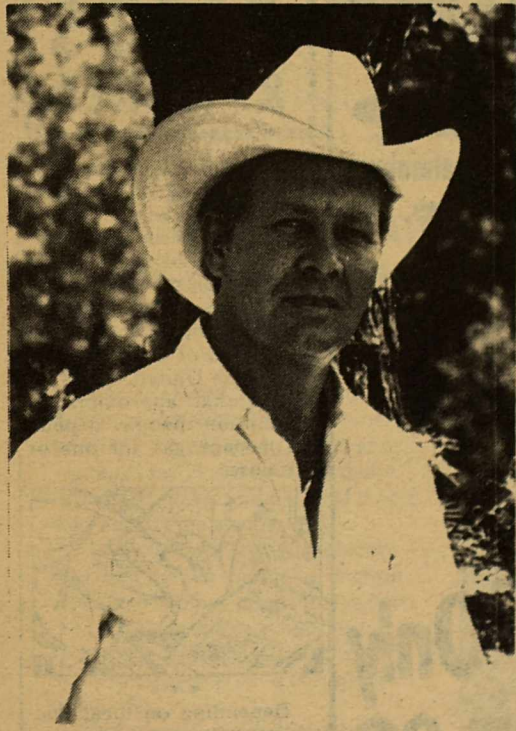

Understanding Science

Many people who've read about dioxin may be confused by the scientific terminology. Here are some facts about dioxin that could help answer some of your questions.

When people talk about dioxin, they're referring to what's really a family of similar chemicals of 75 different chlorinated compounds. Dioxin is a crystal that's made up of the basic elements of oxygen, hydrogen, carbon and chlorine. The whole story of where dioxin comes from is not yet known. It was once thought only to be a by-product of man-made chemicals. Now we know that it can also come from several types of common combustion processes, such as the burning of common fuels. Even burning wood in a fireplace at home produces soot containing dioxin.

Dioxin was a trace contaminant in Agent Orange, the defoliant used by the military in the Vietnam War, from 1965 to 1970,

to protect soldiers' from enemy ambush. There is little likelihood, based on overwhelming scientific evidence, that Agent Orange could have caused the health conditions some veterans have described. Veterans who believe they are ill should seek medical care. They have been through a difficult experience, a tough, demanding duty, which fortunately, more Americans are beginning to appreciate.

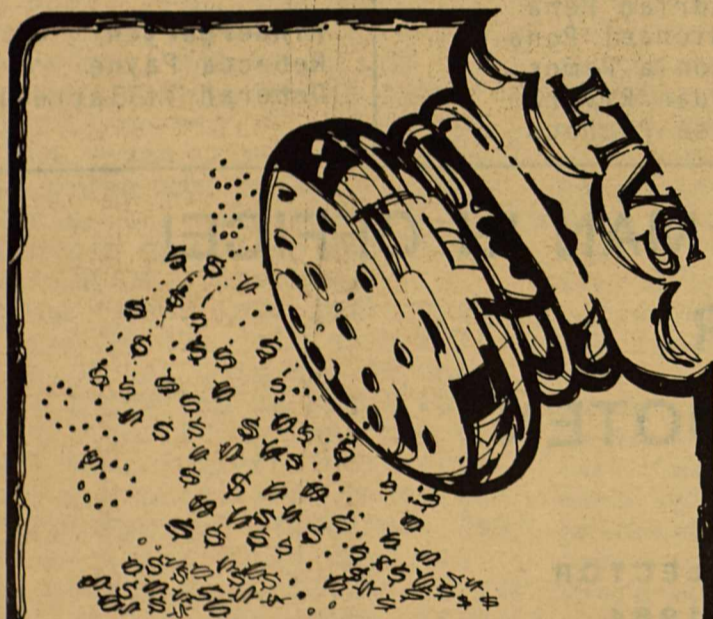
What about the health effects of dioxin exposure? Here's what the American Medical Association has to say. A review of available research has concluded that there is no convincing support for allegations that dioxin causes cancer, birth defects or other reproductive difficulties in humans. Studies of animals exposed to dioxin show a variety of health effects that vary widely from species to species. It seems that humans are less susceptible to dioxin than various animal species.

T.A.E.S. WORKSHOP

Anyone interested in learning to graft a pecan or fruit tree is invited to participate in a Grafting Workshop, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This workshop is scheduled for Tuesday, April 10, at 10:00 a.m. Those interested are asked to assemble at the Kinney County Courthouse on the above day and time, says Carl R. Esser, County Extension Agent.

Starting at the courthouse, the participants will make several stops around Brackettville and be able to do some grafting. This will be a learning experience and participants will actually be able to observe and do grafting on their own. Also, demonstrations on fruit trees will be observed as well as discussions on general fruit & nut tree care and maintenance.

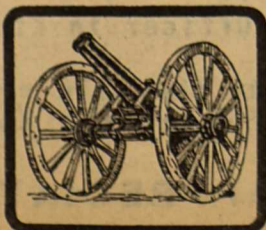

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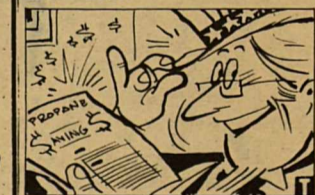

An 8 calf Match roping will take place that afternoon.

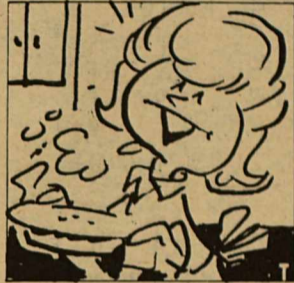
April 8th, after the barrel race short go, 30 professional steer ropers will compete.

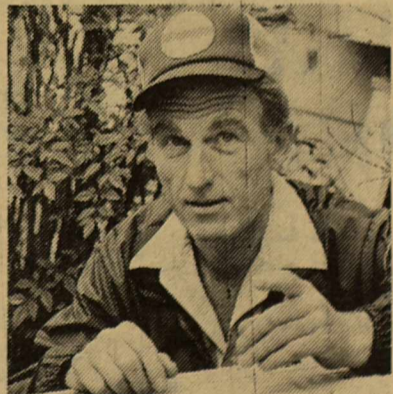
