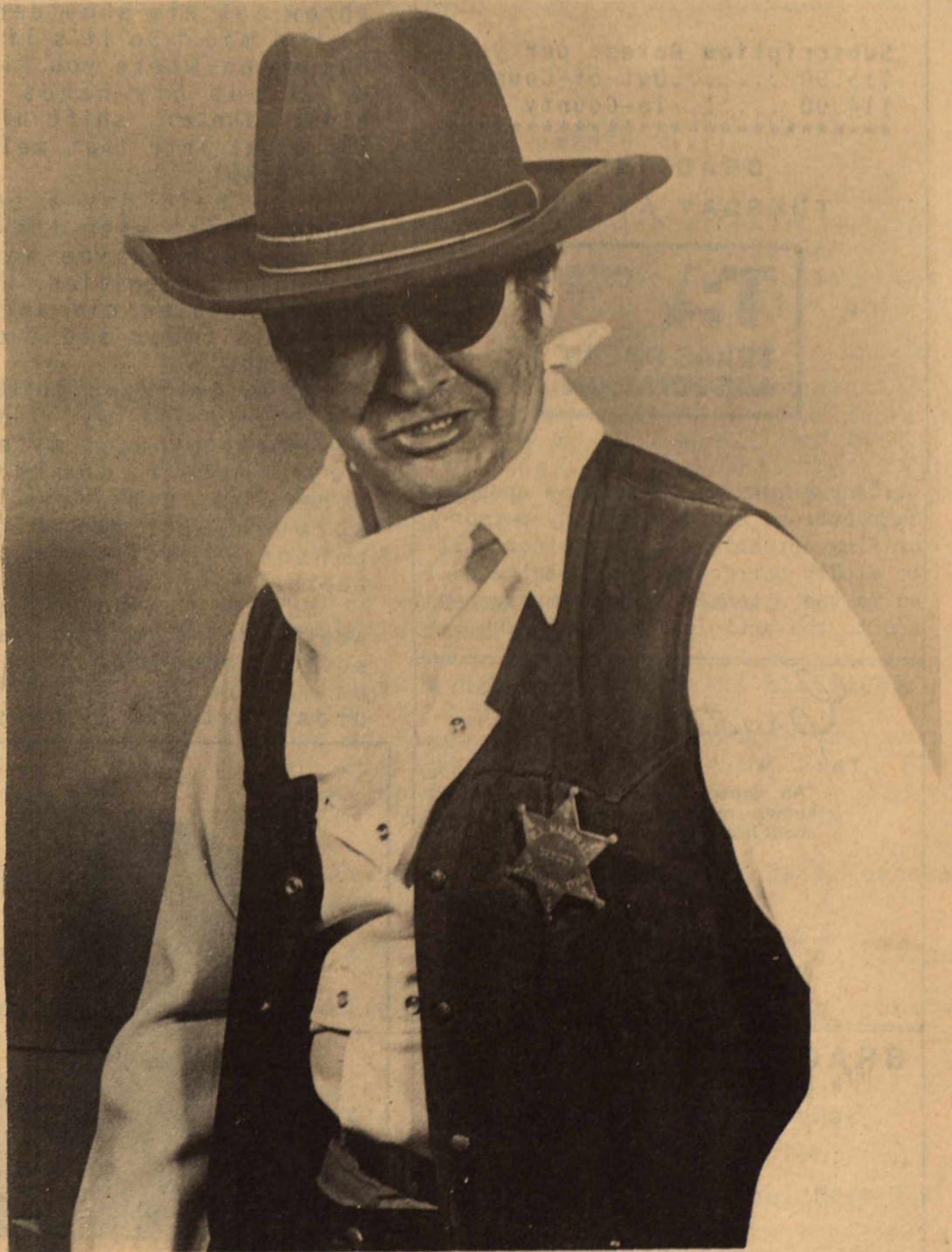

JOHN WAIN VISITS

One of the most significant personalities to leave his footsteps through the streets of Alamo Village was John Wayne. Many had the pleasure of seeing him there and working with him. Many didn't.

But, maybe many more will. Ridiculous? Not after you see John Wain. Pronounced 'Wayne'. He's not the spitting image of "The Duke", but the resemblance is striking enough to make you do a double-take and turn quite a few heads.

At 6'2" (2" shorter than the Duke) and 200 lbs., Wain brings back alot of memories. The 51-year-old impressionist/actor states: "I'm not just an impressionist who does John Wayne for 30 seconds to get a laugh. I'm actually him." And so it seems. Dressed in brown boots, jeans, a light brown shirt, a rust-colored neckerchief and black cowboy hat, with a black patch worn over one eye - "Rooster Cogburn", in "True Grit", comes to life.

WAIN - CONT'D

A native of Daytona Beach, Florida, Wain has been a Marine, a policeman, a pro Baseball player and a used car salesman. Since 1970, he has done comic impressions of various actors/entertainers. After a comment about his uncanny resemblance to Wayne, he started to devote all his research to studying the mannerisms, characteristics and movie monologs of "The Duke". Before Wayne's death, Wain had difficulty doing his research, movies were his best source. After he died, there were a number of books written and Wain states "I've got two of each."

"I studied his hand movements... his voice... his walk, even how he used to throw out his shoulders when he was mad." So it's likely to happen anywhere you find him. He'll put his hands on his hips, saunter, shift his torso and break into that well-loved Iowa drawl.

John Wain has a personal 'connection' with the famous actor. "John Wayne was ugly, strong and dignified. He was a weather-beaten old actor. But he had a clear sight of what was right."

"I've believed in a lot of his ideas all my life, and now I can express myself in a way that I couldn't do otherwise. I believe in this so much, I'd do it for one person standing in a phone booth."

Now it's a life's work, a weekly round of appearances at points throughout the country. His show is a 30 minute presentation, a message in

patriotism, a reflection of the 'Duke'. Dressed as Rooster Cogburn, Wain narrates the show, very similar to how John Wayne might narrate his work himself. Wain brings out the 'Duke's' view of his country, why he loved it, why he chose the movies he did, why he married and loved Latin women and more.

Next week, John Wain will be the house guest of Happy Shahan at Alamo Village. If you're there, perhaps you'll spot his magnetic enthusiasm while he strolls the streets. And the presence of Rooster Cogburn, alias Wayne, alias Wain.

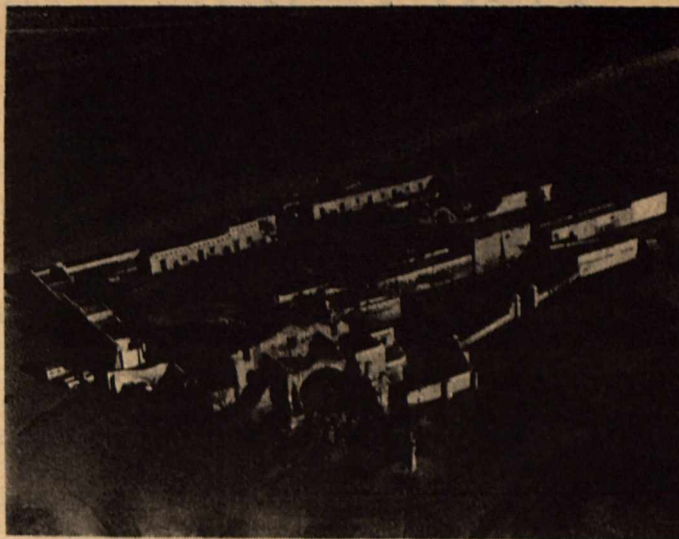
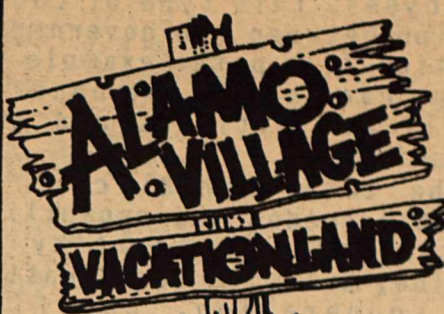

CITY NEWS

The Fort Clark Springs Board of Directors, in cooperation with the City Council of the City of Brackettville, have authorized a cooperative agreement between the City and Fort Clark Springs to provide the Brackettville Volunteer Fire Department personnel and the active members of the Kinney County Ambulance Service with Workman's Compensation Insurance.

This much needed support for our volunteers will provide insurance coverage as

is provided to all full-time employees. This type of cooperation between two government entities is a prime example of how we can work to the benefit of all our citizens and the Community.

The total annual cost of \$5,100 exceeded the capability of the individual entity to provide, but with coordination and cooperation, our Fire Department and Ambulance Volunteers are now provided with 1 million dollars of Liability Insurance plus individual Workman's Compensation Insurance.

A mature, sound and highly beneficial decision was made by the Board of Directors and the City Council of Brackett-

ville. A special thank you to the General Manager of Fort Clark Springs, Mr. Brittan. A former City Manager, he has brought his expertise, experience and maturity to our community. His leadership in this and other areas of common interest is appreciated.

For the last few months, some of you may have noticed the ambulance at City Hall parked with the Fire Department vehicles. This is the EMS backup ambulance and is being maintained by the City in conjunction with the Fire Department vehicles. The Volunteer Fire Department, under the leadership of Mr. Tim Ward as Fire Chief, Mr. Jim Nelson of FCS as Captain, and Justin Berry as Secretary, have done an excellent job recently in checking all of the City Fire Hydrants.

Two new hydrants have been set up on Keene Street with eight others throughout the City to be replaced.

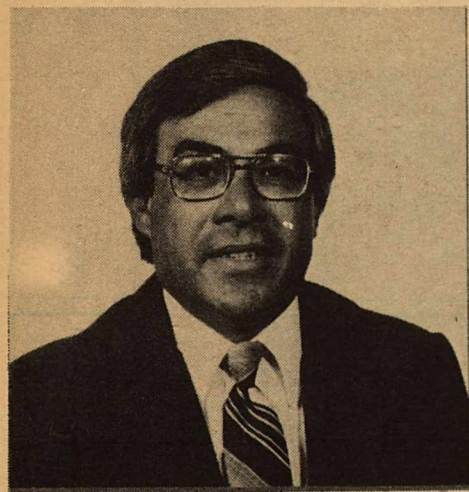

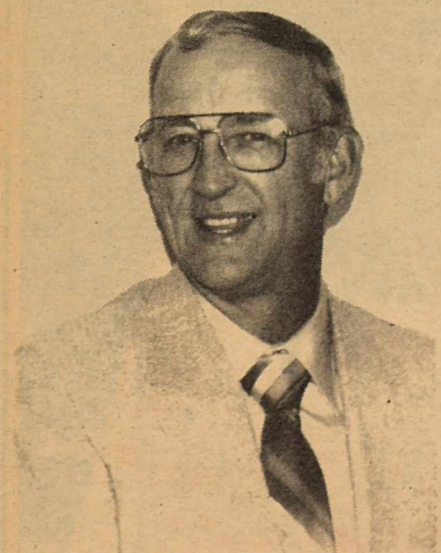

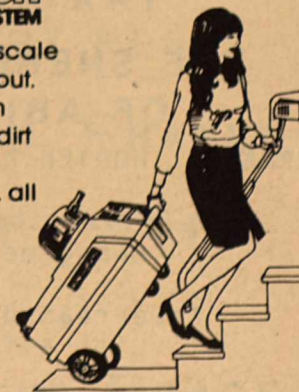

THE SHERIFF'S CORNER

Charges of RAPE, a second degree felony, have been filed against Ernest L. Lake, 30, a truck driver from the San Antonio area. He was apprehended and arrested in Uvalde early Monday morning after the victim, a 21 year-old from Pasadena, was found walking along U.S. Hwy 90 East of Brackettville. She was brought to the Sheriff's office by two Del Rio men. The victim gave a description of her assailant and his vehicle. An area-wide lookout was put out by teletype, which led to his capture by Uvalde authorities.

Her alleged assailant remains in Kinney County Jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Darrell Paul Franks.

Maria Elena Ortega, 43, of Brackettville pled guilty to charges of felony theft over \$750, in District Court, Tuesday, May 1. After hearing evidence in the case, District Judge George Thurmond assessed a 3 year term of punishment, which was suspended. He then placed Ms. Ortega on 6 years probation and assessed a \$1000 fine. Her conviction resulted from the theft of funds from the Tax Assessor-Collector's Office while she was Deputy Tax Assessor-Collector. Full restitution of the missing funds has been made and the case is closed.

Several DWI cases have been filed recently by DPS Troopers and local Police in an attempt to lower the number of drunk drivers on our highways. The stiff new DWI laws and proper enforcement by various law enforcement agencies hopefully will reduce the numbers of accidents and fatal injuries caused annually by drunk drivers on Texas highways.

Well, election day will be here Saturday, May 5, and hopefully we will have a good voter turnout. There are several important political races to be decided, especially on the local scene. The outcome of the local races will affect those of us in Kinney County for the next several years. I urge all of you to exercise your right to vote.

The right to vote for the candidate of your choice for the various offices on the ballot is YOUR right which has been fought for and protected by our Democratic society since we won our independence and became a country. It should not be taken lightly! Let's all exercise that right on Saturday, May 5th.

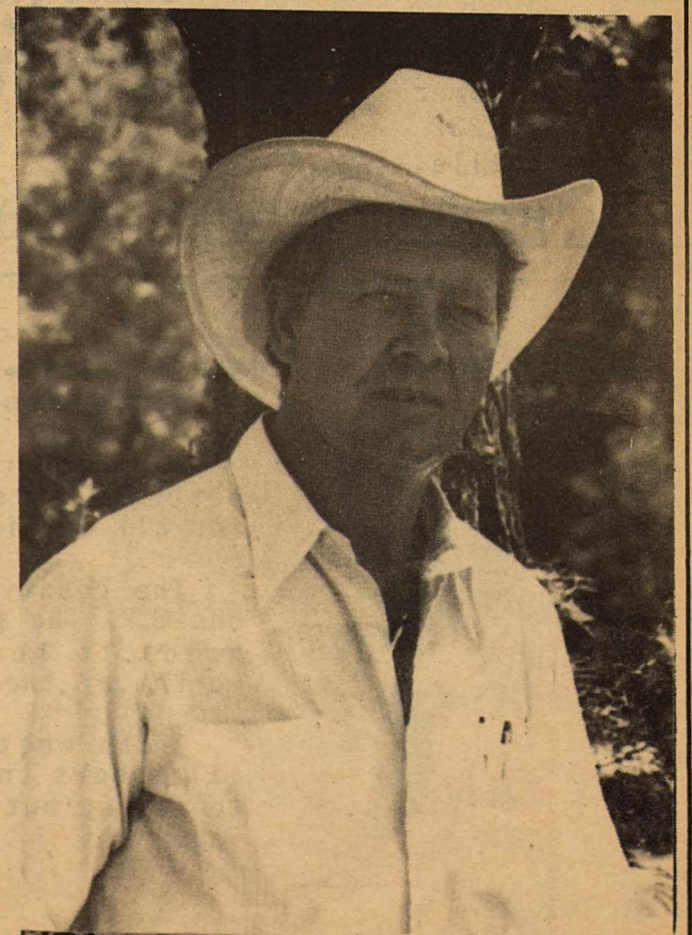

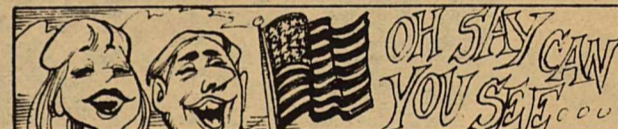
We are still collecting clothes and materials. We recently gave many things to Headstart.

Acid Rain And Your Health

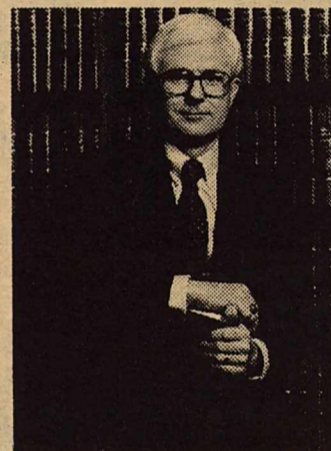
Scientists warn that acid rain and its precursors could have an indirect impact on human health. It could occur in several ways.

In addition to the nutrient minerals, acid rain causes leaching from soil of heavy metals such as mercury and cadmium. These metals accumulate in lakes and streams, and in the tissue of fish that are present in those bodies of water. In sufficient amounts, these metals may become toxic.

The National Commission on Air Quality has pointed out studies showing that fish caught in acid waters in both the U.S. and Canada have a higher concentration of mercury than fish taken from non-acidic waters.

Acidification also can cause leaching of lead and copper from the plumbing that supplies drinking water systems. Such an effect has been seen in western Pennsylvania. In New York, the Department of Environmental Conservation found that ground water in seven counties is sufficiently corrosive to leach copper and lead from pipes and soldered joints. The result? Water flowing through the pipes exceeds standards of safety set by federal drinking water regulations.

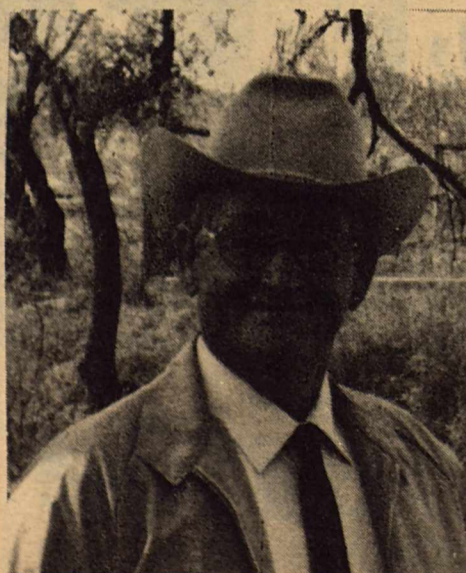

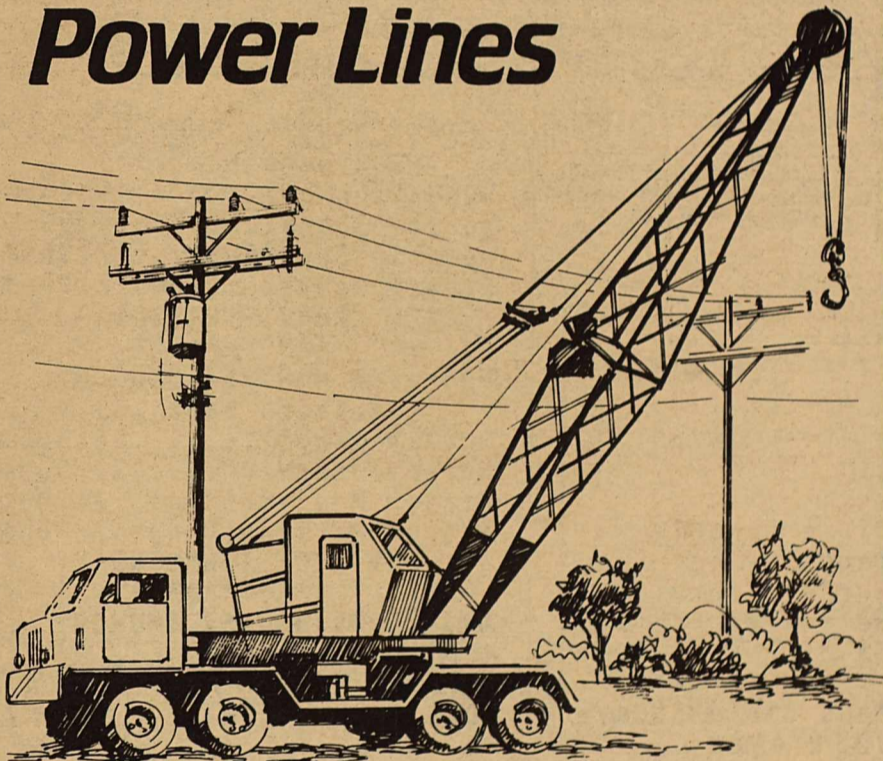
